OhioMeansJobs Athens County and Athens County Veteran's Services moved to our new location in Athens and opened for business the beginning of March 2020. Unfortunately, we closed to public face to face contact on March 17th until the Covid-19 quarantine is lifted. The new center is still under some renovations and upgrades. There is more space available for our staff as well as more privacy for interviewing participants. There are multiple county staff under the direct supervision of Joe McGowan and Jason Terry who have been long term employees of Job and Family Services. We also have several state community partners offering various services. The Athens County Reentry Program has been a part of the Athens OhioMeansJobs Center for about 8 years. When a person is released from prison or a treatment center, they can address their reentry needs with me and are easily referred for additional educational and employment related services with current staff. Upon entering the center they are greeted by Cathy Shumway at the front desk. They can work on their GED through the ASPIRE program with Scott Hatfield and Sally Young. Resumes, online applications, job leads, and mock interviewing are provided by the employment counselors Nancy Stotts and Rocky Brunty. Adults who are interested in attending short term college or certifications can be referred to the WIOA program with Raeh Ledford to discuss their training needs and goals for securing an in-demand occupation. Sociology Internship ends early due to Covid 19

My name is Stephanie Sarpong and I come from Ghana which is in

West Africa. I am currently pursuing my master's in Sociology at Ohio University; I am interested in prisoner reentry and will graduate in May hopefully. I began my practicum with the Ohio Means Jobs Center-Reentry Program in Athens, Ohio, in January 2020. I have always had an



interest in the criminal justice system, hence my involvement in the Athens Reentry Program. I plan to return to my country to partner with an NGO to establish a similar reentry program and task force to assist formerly incarcerated persons to fit into the community and become productive citizens. In my country, prisoners or ex-convicts are not exposed to proper reintegration programs which have led to an increased rate in recidivism. I had a great time here at the OhioMeansJobs Center and I learned about the well-designed programs that they have for formerly incarcerated people which includes helping them to get their driver's license back, providing clothing, shoes, antiperspirants and sometimes shelter, educating them and assisting them with their resumes and employment. These gestures made me understand that indeed all our fingers are not equal, and we should avoid stigmatizing and victimizing criminalized people. I also had the opportunity to meet people of different backgrounds and attended meetings with my immediate supervisor, Shawn Stover, which centered on supporting people in the Athens neighborhood.

I deem it a great privilege to join the Reentry Program for the few months I have worked with them. Moreover, Shawn Stover has been a great leader and has taught me what reentry is all about and made sure I was conversant with some of the terms used. I had so much fun meeting people and introducing myself repeatedly because I was African. I am surely going to miss the Reentry Program. I plan to utilize what I have learned to also impact others especially the less privileged.

In early October 2019, Dan Enger of Toastmasters reached out to me, expressing interest in offering a one-month public speaking course at a prison in or near Southeastern Ohio. Dan, who splits his time between Georgia and Appalachian Ohio, is a Distinguished Toastmaster who began teaching public speaking over thirty years ago and has been offering Toastmasters programs in prisons in Georgia since 2017. He says that he considers his work in prisons to be some of the most fulfilling and personally enriching work he has ever done. I was able to link Dan with Jay Forshey of ODRC, and at the end of November Dan, Jay and I attended a meeting with key staff from Chillicothe Correctional Institution (CCI) and Ross Correctional Institution (RCI). We were pleased to hear that both CCI and RCI were positive and open to the public speaking training for the inmates. Toastmasters is provided in many Ohio prisons but had not been offered at CCI or RCI previously. Just after Christmas, Dan and I attended a one-day, special ODRC volunteer training that Rachel Huff from RCI was kind enough to give us at the Athens OMJ Center.

CCI and RCI staff did an exceptional job in making all necessary arrangements for the intensive, eight-session Toastmasters *Speechcraft* course, which was conducted throughout the month of February. Classes met for two hours twice a week, and the students diligently dedicated many additional hours studying and preparing outside of class. The course culminated in graduation events at the two facilities on Friday, February 28, 2020. Highlights of the ceremonies were inspirational speeches presented by each of the graduates, as well as the opportunity for graduates and their family members, prison staff and outside guests to enjoy a meal together. Speaking and sharing personal stories helps a person to process and work through adversities. Previous mistakes do not have to define a person, and hope gives people a chance to write a new story for their lives. The friends and family members can see them in a different, more positive light.

I have great admiration for the speakers, most of whom were notably nervous and apprehensive about talking in public. All of them were changed afterwards and walked a little taller knowing that they could accomplish great things in their lives by stepping outside of their comfort zone. The comradery and respect formed with the Toastmasters participants and their appreciation to Dan Enger for treating them like human beings was tremendous. Freedom can be taken from a person, but as the core is charged with kindness and wisdom a person gains internal strength. I was honored to be a part of the audience with the other prison staff, guests and family/friends of the speakers. I found myself taken outside of the prison walls to another place of past regrets, healing and retrospection by the speakers' personal messages and passionate storytelling. Special thanks to Clark Goble, Holly Uhrig, Rachel Huff, Alan Szoke, Brad Williams and all the other prison staff working behind the scenes to make this experience possible. Ask yourself: What can you or your community promote to encourage personal growth in individuals who have so much potential but so little opportunity?
