The Reentry Task Force has partnered with the agency for Opportunities for Ohioans with Disabilities (OOD) to provide individuals with disabilities the opportunities to achieve quality employment, independence, and disability determination outcomes. Michael Blevins has been working for OOD for 16 years now and has been a member of the Reentry Task Force for the last 3 years. Mike works with any client that has a disability regardless of their employment barrier and has helped many Reentry Program participants. He tailors employment goals to each individual's needs and abilities. Mike states that the agency has one new counselor and is in the process of hiring two new case load assistants which can accommodate more referrals. The Period Project is a student organization at Ohio University, with a mission to provide feminine hygiene products to all populations of women, especially those in poverty. The organization was founded by then-freshmen Madison Sloat and Zach Gheen in the spring of 2016, so the organization is still very new. TPP currently has around twenty-five active members that work on charitable initiatives, legislative efforts, and campus/community outreach. Last semester, The Period Project raised around

\$1600 dollars, which is still being used to purchase hygiene items like the donation given to the Reentry Program. However, The Period Project also accepts physical donations, which it uses in both community outreach and on campus for its "Take a Tampon, Leave a Tampon" Initiative. The Period Project is working to educate and train communities of all genders on the importance of accessibility to feminine hygiene products. ANOTHER SUCCESS STORY!

A woman who was released from prison in December 2015 after being incarcerated for 6 years on various drug related charges, became a Reentry Program participant and story of success. During the initial video conference prior to her release, she was goal oriented about her career path. She had OSHA training, operated a fork lift, and worked in a warehouse for 3 years during her incarceration at The Ohio Reformatory for Women. She hoped that those skills would transfer to getting a degree in heavy equipment operation. She came to The Work Station



upon release with a positive attitude. As luck and timing would work in her favor, there was a slot available for the WIA/WIOA program to help financially supplement her financial aid and help with the hidden costs of college like transportation or books. It has been a little over a year since her release and she continues to work with Laurie McKnight in the WIOA program. She now reports completing most of the heavy equipment degree and will be working on the CDL portion this semester. In addition, she was recently promoted to Assistant Manager at the restaurant where she has been working since October 2016 while attending school. Did we save one? Yes we did and that has made all the difference!

A special thanks to Jay Forshey at Noble Correctional for helping 2 recently released individuals to obtain an offender release ID. Occasionally due to judicial release or other unusual circumstances ex-offenders are released without an ID. Many people have been in prison for years and have a difficult time obtaining needed documents without at least some initial form of identification. These ID's allow the person to exchange the Offender Release ID plus \$8.50 to get the Ohio State ID. Many organizations and employers require some sort of photo identification in order to provide services or become hired. Thanks again Jay for going above and beyond!
