VILLAGE COUNCIL

The Village Council is responsible for establishing policies through ordinances and resolutions that guide the community. Council meetings are held twice a month on the first and third Tuesday at 7:00 p.m. in the Municipal Building. All meetings are open to the public, and residents are encouraged to attend and participate. Regular meetings are also broadcast on public access cable television and streamed live on the Village's YouTube channel @VillageofBeverlyHills.

Every two years, the Council elects a president and president pro-tem. The president presides over meetings and serves as the ceremonial head of the Village. Each councilmember also serves as a liaison to an advisory board or commission, which provides recommendations that help guide the Council's decisions on important community matters.

COUNCIL-MANAGER GOVERNMENT

The Beverly Hills Charter provides for the Council-Manager form of government. The Village Council is the Legislative branch and sets all Village policy. The Village Manager is the head of the Executive branch and is responsible for the administration of those policies.

ADMINISTRATION

The Village Council appoints the following department heads: Village Manager, Village Clerk, Village Treasurer, and Village Attorney. All Village departments operate under the authority of the Village Manager, who oversees daily operations and ensures efficient coordination among departments.

Southfield Township is responsible for administering all property assessment functions and managing all aspects of local, state, and federal election processes.

The Administration is responsible for the day-to-day management of Village operations, including the coordination, development, and implementation of local ordinances, community services, public relations, and economic development initiatives. These efforts work together to maintain the high quality of life that Beverly Hills residents enjoy.

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BEVERLY PARK PAVILION RENTAL

The pavilion can be rented from one to eight hours between 9:00 a.m. and 9:00 p.m. from April 1 to November 30, 2026. Beverly Hills residents can begin making reservations for the pavilion at Beverly Park on the first Wednesday in February. Applicants must be at least 18 years old and provide proof of residency. Rental fees are as follows:

Residents \$75/first hour; \$15 each additional hour up to 8 hours

Non-residents \$150/first hour; \$30 each additional hour up to 8 hours

A \$250 damage deposit is also required for each reservation

There is an additional charge of \$20 for Friday, Saturday, and Sunday rentals.

There are picnic tables and grills in the covered pavilion area. Picnic tables must be returned to their original setup if moved during the rental.

LIBRARY SERVICES

The Village of Beverly Hills contracts with the Baldwin Public Library in Birmingham to provide library services for Village residents. Through this contract Village residents also have reciprocal privileges at several other libraries in the area, although not with the Bloomfield Township Public Library. In 1992, the Village negotiated with the Baldwin Library Board of Trustees to extend its contractual arrangement indefinitely, instead of having to renegotiate every three years. In 2010 Beverly Hills voters passed a millage establishing a Special Revenue Fund for the Baldwin Library. The Baldwin Public Library offers a full range of services, all of which are available to the residents of Beverly Hills. Some of the services available include:

- Books, magazines, DVDs, video games, music CDs, and books on CD
- Downloadable e-books, audio books, music, magazines, movies, and television shows
- Online access to newspapers from around the world, plus the New York Times suite of games
- Computers with Internet access and free wireless, plus mobile hotspots and Internet-to-Go kits to borrow
- Programs for all ages (including author visits, book clubs, story times, Lifelong Learning, computer classes, teen programs, etc.)
- Interlibrary loan
- Home delivery service for those who cannot visit the Library
- Idea Lab with 3D printer, laser engraver, and computer design software.

Several Beverly Hills residents serve as officers on the Executive Board of the Friends of the Baldwin Public Library and actively work to improve the quality of library services. The Beverly Hills Village Council has an appointed liaison who regularly attends Baldwin Library Board meetings and facilitates communication between the two bodies.

The Baldwin Public Library provides the Beverly Hills Reading Center located at the Village office. The Beverly Hills Reading Center consists of titles in hardcover and paperback. There is also a Baldwin book return box at the Village office. Visit Baldwin online at www.baldwinlib.org

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GRASS AND LEAVES

Yard Waste Collection begins Monday, April 6th (through December 15th)

PLEASE USE **BROWN PAPER YARD WASTE BAGS OR CANS WITH YARD WASTE LABELS**

Please place compostable items in one of the following containers:

- Garbage can with a yard waste label
- If you wish to use the same can for trash, please cover the yard waste label
- Brown Paper bag designed for yard waste disposal
- Containers shall not weigh more than 50 lbs.

Labels are available at the Village Offices at no cost.

Compostable items include:

- Grass clippings and leaves
- Garden waste, spent flowers, and weeds
- Tree and shrub trimmings, branches, and vines
- Pine cones, seed pods, and tree litter
- Brush, roots, small stumps, and bark
- Fruit & vegetable peelings from kitchen*
- Halloween pumpkins and straw bales
- Clean fill dirt (no hazardous materials or construction debris)
- Potting soil, garden soil, play box sand, fertilizer, and sod
- Flowers of all types
- Wood chips, small twigs, and chipped trees
- Sawdust and wood shavings
- Firewood and logs that are less than 2" in diameter and less than 2' long, and wood ashes
- Untreated, unpainted wood boards (2x4s or 4x4s)(nails removed) up to 4' long

*apples, apple cores, bananas, banana peels, carrots, corn, corn on the cob, cornstalks, peppers, beans, kiwi, lemons, limes, lettuce, peas, oranges, orange peels, radishes, squash, cucumbers, pumpkins, pineapples, pineapple husks, melons, melon rinds, peanuts, peanut shells, mixed vegetables, potatoes, potato peelings, tomatoes, peaches, plums, pears, etc. – from your garden, tree or kitchen.

The following items are NOT considered yard waste

These items are **TRASH** and should be placed in colored trash bags or 35 gallon metal or plastic trash containers manufactured for refuse disposal.

PLEASE: No plastic bags of any kind from fertilizers, weed n' feed, mulch, topsoil, manure, stones, pesticides, etc.

Availability of screened compost: SOCRRRA compost is returned to SOCRRRA member communities for distribution to residents and for community gardening projects. Compost may also be picked up for free at the compost site at certain times (usually Saturday mornings). *For information on times, call the office at 248-288-5150 or www.socrra.org.*

Materials used to make SOCRRRA compost: Leaves, grass clippings, other yard waste material collected from SOCRRRA communities, and woodchips.

Recommendation for use: Mix SOCRRRA compost with native soil on a 50-50 basis. SOCRRRA compost is an excellent amendment and top-dressing for all gardens and lawns and has been extensively used by local gardeners and some landscapers in Southeast Michigan.

Benefits of compost for healthy soils and water quality:

- Increases water-holding capacity of sandy soils.
- Enhances the permeability of clay soils.
- Slowly releases nutrients to plant roots.
- Improves soil structure and tilth.
- Restores microbial populations.
- Suppresses certain soil-borne diseases.
- Prevents soil erosion.
- Degrades oils, pesticides, and other soil contaminants.
- Binds heavy metals carried by storm water runoff.

Grass Recycling...

As you mow your lawn, let the clippings fall back on it. This adds nitrogen from the clippings to the soil and can cut fertilizer use by 30% or more.

Tips for best results:

- Keep the mower blade sharp
- Cut the grass high - cut as often as necessary
- Keep the deck of the mower clean
- Cut when grass is dry

REMEMBER! Collection begins at 7 AM and containers MUST be removed by 7 AM the following day. Yard waste collection is from April 6th to December 15th

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Parks & Nature Preserves

BEVERLY HILLS PARKS

Beverly Hills is home to four wonderful parks.

Beverly Park, located at 18801 Beverly Road, is a vibrant community destination filled with activities for all ages and interests. Families can enjoy the spacious playground, athletes can hit the tennis courts, and outdoor enthusiasts can explore the scenic nature path or test their skills on the disc golf course. In the winter, the park transforms into a snowy wonderland with its popular sledding hill. Whether you're looking to play, relax, or connect with neighbors, Beverly Park is the perfect place to enjoy the beauty of the outdoors all year long.

Riverside Park is located along the Rouge River on Riverside Drive near Evergreen Road. Visitors can enjoy nature and utilize the picnic area.

Beverly Green is the semi-circle parcel located at Beverly Road and Greenfield Road near the roundabout. Phase 1 of the Beverly Green project has brought a new landscaping and grading creating a fresh, inviting space for everyone to enjoy. Phase 2 is on the way, promising even more exciting improvements to make the park an even better place to gather, relax, and play.

Wendbrook Park, located at 30815 Wendbrook Lane, is Beverly Hills' newest addition to the community, offering open green space full of potential for future development. Though still in its early stages, the park provides a peaceful natural setting where residents can imagine and look forward to what's to come.

NATURE PRESERVES

Beverly Hills is home to two beautiful nature preserves. These pieces of natural area in our urban community provide valuable green space in an otherwise developed area.

Douglas Evans Nature Preserve, located on Evergreen Road just north of 13 Mile, is an area dedicated to preserving its 18-acre natural landscape. Donated to the Village in 1973 with restrictions prohibiting any development, the property is protected by deed to remain in its original state. Public access is limited, but visitors are welcome to enjoy quiet walks and nature study. Ecologists have long recognized the preserve's importance for its diverse native plant species, making it a treasured part of Beverly Hills' natural heritage.

Hidden Rivers Nature Preserve is located on the south side of 14 Mile Road east of Evergreen. The 15-acre area is restricted by deed to remain a natural area. The land peninsula is surrounded by branches of the Rouge River with the northern edge abutting a private golf course. The preserve serves as a valuable plant and wildlife habitat virtually undisturbed by humans.

Please note while dogs are permitted at our parks and nature preserves they must remain leashed at all times and waste must be cleaned up properly. Allowing dogs to roam off-leash is prohibited and violation may be result in a citation.

SCULPTURES IN THE PARKS

The Sculptures in the Parks program will continue in 2026, adding creativity and charm to Beverly Hills' beautiful outdoor spaces. Each sculpture, on loan to the Village, is displayed throughout the parks with a sign featuring a QR code that links to the Village website for more information about the artist and their work. All sculptures are available for purchase directly from the artist, with a portion of each sale benefiting the Village. This inspiring program continues to celebrate art, nature, and community connection in Beverly Hills.

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GUIDE TO RUBBISH COLLECTION

REGULATIONS:

Trash must be placed at the curb or roadside edge by 7:00 am and not earlier than 5:00 pm the day preceding collection. It is required that empty containers be removed by 7:00 am the day following collection.

HOLIDAY COLLECTION SCHEDULE:

When a **scheduled** refuse collection day falls on a major holiday; New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving or Christmas, collections will be one day later. The holiday must fall on a regular collection day for this to occur. Example: If a major holiday falls on Monday, both Monday and Tuesday collection will be delayed one day. If a major holiday falls on Tuesday only Tuesday's collection will be delayed one day. If a major holiday falls on Sunday and the Village Office is closed on Monday (in observance) collection will not be interrupted.

APPROVED GARBAGE, RUBBISH AND RECYCLING CONTAINERS

All garbage and rubbish must be placed in containers no larger than 35 gallons with handles, or in 2-mil plastic garbage bags. Plastic bags shall not weigh more than forty (40) pounds. Cans shall not weigh over 60 lbs. Recyclables are to be placed in the green 65 gallon recycling can. Please separate trash and recyclables several feet apart.

BRUSH AND BRANCHES

Brush is generally considered to be branches larger than 2 inches in diameter. Small twigs are not considered brush and should be placed with yard waste. Branches should be cut into lengths of 4 to 4 ½ feet, bundled with twine and placed at the curb on collection day. Bundles cannot weigh more than 40 pounds.

LOGS, FIREWOOD AND LUMBER

Logs 2" – 6" in diameter must be cut to 2 foot lengths or less, bundled and set to the curb for yard waste pick up. Logs over 6" in diameter must be disposed of privately. Painted or stained 2x4s and 4x4s must be cut to 4 foot lengths or less, bundled and set to the curb for trash collection. Unpainted 2x4s and 4x4s can be composted. Please cut in lengths no taller than a yard waste bag or yard waste container weighing no more than 50 lbs. (Please remove nails).

LARGE/IRREGULAR ITEMS

Large items such as console TVs, sofas, mattresses and household furniture are picked up on your regular rubbish day. Very large items like a swing set must be broken down into sections.

CARPETING

Carpeting must be tied in bundles no wider than four (4) feet and not exceeding 40 lbs. Please do not put carpet out if rain is expected. If it gets wet, the contractor will not pick it up because of the weight.

DEMOLITION MATERIAL

Items such as wood (please remove nails), gutters, and other building materials must be cut into 3' lengths and tied in bundles that do not exceed forty (40) pounds.

APPLIANCES (SPECIAL ITEMS)

Large metal items such as refrigerators (remove door & set next to unit), stoves, washers, dryers, hot water tanks & lawn mowers (remove gas, oil & plug) are picked up on your regular trash day.

ITEMS THE VILLAGE WILL NOT PICK UP

Liquids, radioactive items, syringes, flammable products, explosives, infectious materials, asbestos insulation, tires, hazardous waste, tree stumps, engines, transmissions, rear axles, construction items from a private contractor's work, bricks, broken concrete or dirt. Please call SOCRRA (248) 288-5150 for methods and services available for disposing of such material.

REMINDERS TO PROTECT WORKERS

Now more than ever please follow the trash and recycling guidelines to help keep our essential trash and recycling workers safe.

1. **BAG ALL TRASH:** Please bag and securely tie all trash. When using a trash can, all trash must go into can bagged and securely closed.
2. **EMPTY ALL FOOD AND LIQUID FROM CONTAINERS:** All containers should be empty.
3. **KEEP RECYCLABLES LOOSE:** Place recyclables loosely in your cart or bin.
4. **WIPE/DISINFECT HANDLES AND LIDS:** During this time of caution, please wipe down lids and handles of your trash and recycling containers to help prevent the spread of disease.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE:

Drop-offs are welcome by appointment only. This Special Household Waste program offers residents a convenient and effective means of disposing of those household waste products that require special handling, processing and disposal, such as batteries, paints, solvents, garden chemicals, household cleaners, automotive products, insulin syringes, fluorescent light bulbs, oils, and other household hazardous waste from homes, **NOT** businesses. Please visit the SOCRRA website, www.socrra.org for a complete list of acceptable items.

SOCRRA also accepts computers and other electronics at the drop off center. Please call (248) 288-5150 for an appointment.

The drop-off center is located at 995 Coolidge Road (between 14 and 15 Mile Roads across the street from Meijer).

Why should you recycle? Recycling saves energy! Recycling saves natural resources! Recycling saves landfill space! Recycling pays! Beverly Hills gets paid for recyclables, whereas we pay to dispose of trash.

CURBSIDE RECYCLABLE ITEMS

MILK CARTON-TYPE MATERIALS

- Milk cartons, drink boxes, food and beverage paperboard boxes and paper cups.
- Clean.

PAPER (including all fiber material)

- Mix all paper items, including newspaper, magazines, catalogs, phone books, junk mail, office paper, computer paper, paperback books, paperboard (cereal boxes, tissue boxes, shoe boxes, etc.) And place in cart.
- Shredded paper (place in tied, see-through plastic bag in recycling cart).
- Please do not recycle paper disposables such as napkins, tissues, plates, hand towels, binders, table covers, and placemats.

CARDBOARD

- Non-wax coated with wavy corrugation in the middle.
- Discard any packing material, loose food or badly stained cardboard as trash.
- Unfold, flatten and place inside cart; pieces should be no larger than 2' x 3'.

PLASTIC JUGS & BOTTLES

All plastic containers that fit in your bin; discard hard plastic caps or drop them off at the SOCRRRA center. Please no plasticware.

GLASS BOTTLES & JARS

- Clean.
- Clear, green, blue and brown.
- Metal lids are OK. Labels are OK.
- NO ceramics, mirrors, coffee cups, plates, window glass, broken glass or light bulbs.

METAL

- Metal food containers, beverage cans, pie tins.
- Clean. Labels are o.k.
- Clean aluminum trays and pie tins (clean foil please).
- Place loose metal lids inside cans and bend so lids don't fall out.
- No scrap metal.

PAINT & METAL AEROSOL CANS

- Must be empty
- Recycle metal lids.
- Do not try to flatten or remove the ends.
- Aerosols - do not puncture or remove ends.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE & ELECTRONICS

Drop off is open by appointment only. Please call (248) 288-5150 or visit <https://www.socrra.org/> to schedule an appointment.

- **Old Medicines** - Pour into a clear plastic baggie, recycle the containers and take the combined medicines to SOCRRRA. Keep old medicines out of our water.
- **Latex paint is not a HHW material** Check out the SOCRRRA web site for ways to dispose of latex paint, www.socrra.org.
- **Electronics Recycling** includes TVs, cell phones, computers and computer components. There are many dangerous metals in electronic devices. Let's work together to keep them out of the landfills.
- **Batteries** (all types) must be taken to the SOCRRRA drop-off (no appointment).

Waste Wizard

SOCRRRA launched the Waste Wizard app to help people determine how to properly dispose of certain items. This comprehensive search tool has assisted residents of SOCRRRA's twelve member communities to determine which materials can be reused, recycled, composted, or disposed. It's easy – download the app on your phone. Then type the name of a waste item and the Waste Wizard will tell you how to recycle or dispose of it.

Tips for Using the Waste Wizard:

What is your item made of? When typing in an item, start with what it is made of. For example, instead of water bottle, type plastic water bottle. Identify the type of material your item is made from will help with the search results.

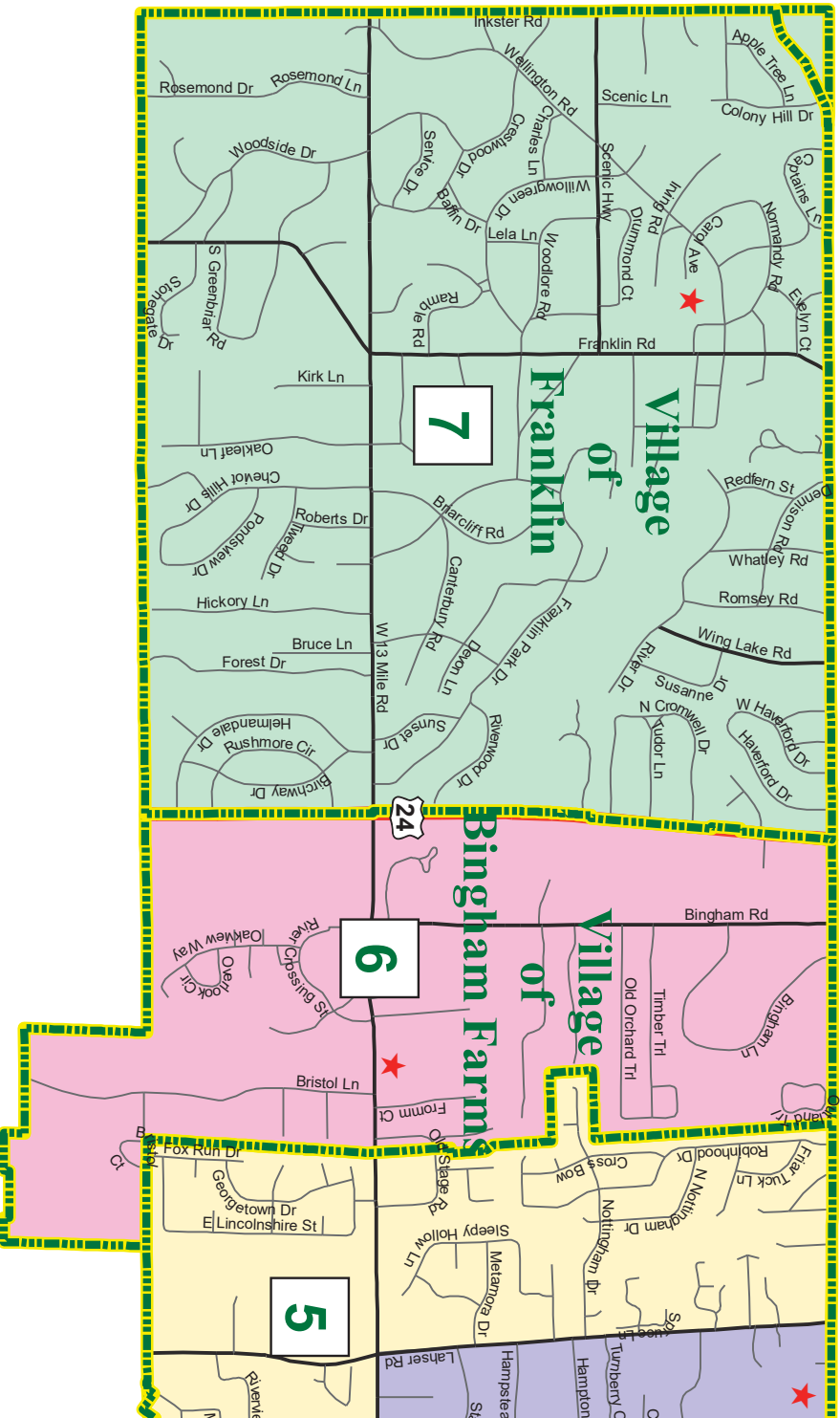
Keep it simple! Most of the entries in the Waste Wizard are one or two words, so no need to type out lengthy descriptions.

Taxes

The **Village of Beverly Hills** issues **one tax bill per year** — the **Village Operating Tax** — mailed on **July 1**.

- Village taxes are paid at the Village Office.
- **Pay without penalty:** July 1 – September 14, 2026
- **1% penalty:** September 15 – September 30, 2026
- **Additional 1% per month:** Beginning October 1 through February

If taxes remain unpaid by **February 28**, they are turned over to the **Oakland County Treasurer** and must be paid to the County with additional penalties and interest.

Residents also receive **summer and winter tax bills** from **Southfield Township**, which include township, county, and school taxes.

- Winter taxes are payable without penalty at Southfield Township December 1, 2025 - February 14, 2026
- Summer taxes are payable without penalty at Southfield Township July 1- September 14, 2026
- These bills are payable at the Township Office. For questions about winter and summer tax bills, please contact Southfield Township at (248) 540-3420.

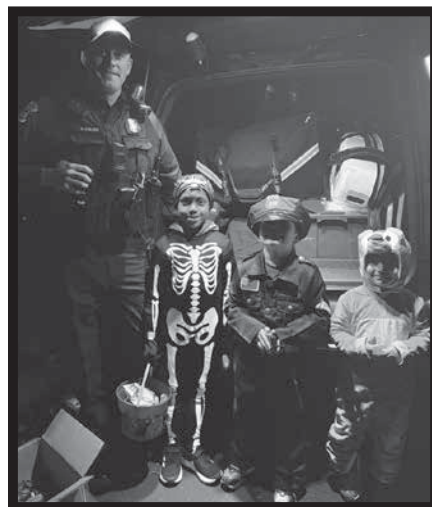

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Public Safety Department

Police/Fire Department Hours

The Village of Beverly Hills Public Safety Building is open 24 hours a day and 7 days a week. We are here to serve the Village residents with all police, fire and EMS incidents. If you wish to pick up a copy of a police report, you will need to fill out a Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request. The Administrative Assistant is at the station during normal business hours to help you file and obtain your information requests.

Lobby Telephone

A telephone is located inside the front lobby on the south side of the building. Anyone needing to speak with the on-duty officer or file a report can use the telephone to speak with an officer immediately.

Dispatch Services

The Village of Beverly Hills contracts dispatch services to Birmingham Police Department, which gives us a greater opportunity to increase the number of Village Public Safety Officers to patrol the Village.

How it works

Emergency Calls on 9-1-1

All 9-1-1 calls are automatically directed to the Birmingham Dispatch Center (24/7). This change will not result in any delays in reaching a professional police dispatcher. This service will include all cell phone 9-1-1 calls also. As always, 9-1-1 calls will be given highest priority. All residents are reminded to use 9-1-1 for true emergencies.

Community Outreach

The Beverly Hills Department of Public Safety is continually searching for ways to better serve and connect with the residents of the Village. Over the years the department has instituted several community outreach programs that have built and strengthened relationships throughout the community, disseminated information, enhanced services and actively sought out persons in need.

Vacation Watch

Beverly Hills Public Safety offers to keep a watch on your home while you're on vacation or out of town. To request this service, visit the Public Safety Building or online through the www.beverlyhillspolice.com website.

Key Box

A Key Box is a small, but secure, box that contains a key to one of the doors of your house. If you are familiar with the type of device used in real estate to allow access to realtors, this is something like that but much more secure. Every Key Box in Beverly Hills can be opened with a key kept by the Beverly Hills DPS and no one else.

Normally, when officers respond to an emergency call and the location is locked, forced entry must be made. Making forced entry into a building not only results in damage to the occupancy but delays emergency crews in getting to those requiring assistance. To help with this problem (getting help to those in need) your Beverly Hills Department of Public Safety has begun a Key Box Program. Homeowners purchase the Key Box through the Beverly Hills Public Safety Department and when they are done using it we ask the homeowner if they would like to donate the box so we can distribute it to people who cannot afford it. Fire Inspections and Prevention

The Public Safety Department has a State Certified Fire Marshal who can answer any questions regarding Fire Inspection, Fire Alarms, and Carbon Monoxide Alarms. We are pleased to announce the Department has achieved an ISO Class 3 rating. Our Fire Marshal, Lieutenant Robert Ginther, can be contacted by telephone at (248) 540-3417.

Alarms for Residents

Officers respond to all alarms in the Village and investigate the incident quickly. If the alarm is a true alarm, the officers will determine the criminal violation, if any, and render a decision. However, if it is a false alarm, the officer will still investigate and conduct a thorough check of the home or business. The Officer will then leave a green card with documentation of the time and date of the alarm. Residents are permitted up to three false alarms in a calendar year without being charged. However, on the fourth false alarm there will be a charge of \$50.00. The fifth false alarm will be \$100.00, and the sixth false alarm will be \$200.00. Residents must register their alarm with the Public Safety Department. There is a \$25.00 registration fee.

Child Car Seat Safety Inspections

Beverly Hills Public Safety has an Officer certified in Child Car Seat Installation and Inspection. This service is available to Village residents only. To schedule an appointment contact Sergeant Jeff Moore at (248) 540-3400 x4424 or jmoore@beverlyhillspolice.com.

School Liaison Officer

The Public Safety Department has a designated Officer assigned to all of the Birmingham Public Schools. The Liaison Officer specializes in juvenile crime, instructs children on matters pertaining to the school and attends athletic events after hours.
