That the following Charter Amendment be voted upon by the qualified electors of the Village of Beverly Hills at the regular Village election to be held on Tuesday, November 6, 2018, to-wit:

BALLOT PROPOSAL 1

It is proposed that Section 9.1 of the Charter of the Village of Beverly Hills be amended to read as follows:

POWER TO TAX:

YES

SECTION 9.1 (B) the Village of Beverly Hills shall levy an additional 0.20 mill (20 cents [\$0.20] for each \$1,000 of taxable value) for a period of ten years, the years being 2019 to 2028, inclusive. Such new millage, which is estimated to raise \$115,779 the first year, shall be used exclusively to improve, enhance and preserve the parks and their facilities throughout the village.

SECOND READING AND POSSIBLE ADOPTION OF AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 22 SECTION 22.08.150 FENCE, WALL, AND PRIVACY SCREEN REGULATIONS OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE

The ordinance was presented to the Council containing the following change as put forth at the first reading;

A. General Requirements: 1. Permit. d. If a permit is issued it shall contain language indicating the village permit does not relieve the applicant of compliance with the Homeowners Association regulations or deed restrictions if applicable.

A copy of the ordinance in its entirety is available for review at the Village of Beverly Hills Administration office.

Motion by Nunez, second by Peddie, to adopt Ordinance #362 amending Chapter 22, Section 22.08.150 Fence, Wall, and Privacy Screen Regulations. This includes the following amendments;

- B. Requirements in Single Family Residential Districts: 2. Fences: a. Approval Standards: bullet point 2: The subject site is adjacent to a non-single family residential land use *or cluster development* or Zone District.
- B. Requirements in Single Family Residential Districts: 2. Fences: a. Approval Standards: bullet point 4: ...a licensed landscape architect or *certified* arborist.
- C. Amortization of Noncompliant Fences.1. ...shall be removed or brought into compliance with ordinance requirements by the I^{st} day of January 2019.

This ordinance shall become effective 20 days following publication in the Eagle newspaper.

PRESENTATION FROM SUB-COMMITTEE REGARDING BACKYARD CHICKENS

Mueller reviewed the history of the backyard chicken initiative which included a request to Council to consider an ordinance revision to allow for backyard chickens (Feb 14, 2017), a follow up request to Council with signed resident petition (May 2, 2017) - 98 Beverly Hills resident signatures, and a subcommittee initiated at Joint Planning Commission/Council meeting (Feb 14, 2018). He explained that 11 surrounding communities, and over 50 communities across the United States allow back yard chickens. Each of these communities have ordinances that regulate number of chickens, lot size allowances, enclosures, roosters, slaughtering, and sales. These communities report low numbers of homes that have backyard chickens and very few if any complaints related to chickens or ordinance violations.

Mooney submitted emails received regarding backyard chickens; Cindy Bruin in opposition; Todd Schafer, in opposition; Carol Gorlick, in support; Kim Thorston, in support; Stacey Barns, in support; Stacey Burns in support; Janet Ramsayer, in support; Laura Litka, in support.

The following residents spoke in opposition of allowing backyard chickens for reasons of subcommittee bias, failure to seek input from a larger sampling of Village residents, concerns related to enforcement, education, property values, and public health.

Dianne Brody, Sunset Drive Lisa Mosher, Englewood

The following residents spoke in support of backyard chickens for reasons of sustainability, and defended that chickens do not generate excessive noise and would not be noticed or disruptive to neighbors; suggested that regulations would require permitting, cleanliness checks, and enforcement of code. They also contended that although there may only be a few residents who would keep chickens, they would be committed to the welfare of those chickens. Several residents would not keep chickens themselves, but support that others should be able to.

Motion by Mueller that the Village Council directs the Planning Commission to develop a draft revision to the Village of Beverly Hills Zoning Ordinance 22.08.430 Keeping of Farm Animals and Other Animals, to allow for the keeping and raising of hen chickens, and a draft addition to the Village of Beverly Hills Municipal Code: Chapter 14: Dogs and Other Animals which would provide regulations specific to the keeping and raising of hen chickens for Council review and discussion for a date to be determined.

Motion failed. Lack of support.

REVIEW AND CONSIDER RESOLUTION TO CREATE AN AD HOC JOINT SENIOR SERVICES COMMITTEE

The City of Birmingham Administration has spearheaded a proposal to reconvene the Joint Senior Services Committee between the Beverly Hills, Birmingham, Bingham Farms, Franklin, Southfield Township and Birmingham Schools. The Committee previously met in 2012 and 2013 and made a formal presentation to all the local governing bodies that consisted of a two phase approach to addressing senior services. As these needs are still a priority it is desired to have the municipal governments participate directly in a committee to review these two phases and development an acting plan going forward.

The resolution creates an Ad Hoc committee that would meet until March 30, 2019 and would consist of one member from each Governing Body, one resident member from each community and an ex-officio member of each administration.

Mueller expressed support for providing senior services, however he was concerned about the use of tax payer monies toward entertainment for a single demographic.

Greg Burry, Birmingham Next president, explained that their programs connect people who may otherwise be disconnected. This resolution is to form a committee to review these kind of issues, and start to consider options.

RESOLUTION CREATING AN AD HOC JOINT SENIOR SERVICES COMMITTEE TO CONDUCT A LONG TERM STUDY AND EVALUATION OF THE NECESSARY FUNDING AND GOVERNACE MODEL TO EFFECTIVELY PROVIDE ADEQUATE SENIOR SERVICES TO PARTICIPATING COMMUNITY RESIDENTS.

Motion by Delaney, second by Oen, to adopt the following Resolution:

Whereas, the senior population aged 65 and older in Birmingham, Beverly Hills, Bingham Farms and Franklin is projected to be the largest growing population segment over the next several decades and these communities wish to prepare for the service needs of this growing demographic, and Whereas, the communities of Birmingham, Beverly Hills, Bingham Farms, Franklin and Southfield Township along with the Birmingham Public Schools (herein referred to as Governing Body) had previously established a Joint Senior Services Committee in 2012 to present recommendations for improved senior services, and

Whereas, the Joint Senior Services committee presented their final recommendations to the municipalities in 2013, which was comprised of a two phased approach to address near term (Phase 1) and longer term (Phase 2) initiatives, and

Whereas, Phase 1 involved increased services and hours based on increased funding requests to the member communities, and

Whereas, Phase 2 involved a longer term focus centered on a dedicated funding source to address further increasing service demands and facility needs, and

Whereas, additional study and analysis is necessary to advance recommendations for Phase 2 as the current senior services funding and governance model in these communities may be insufficient to meet the increasing demand for senior services, and

Whereas, the governing bodies of the Birmingham Public Schools, City of Birmingham, Village of Beverly Hills, Village of Bingham Farms, Village of Franklin and Southfield Township wish to explore ways to meet the increasing demand for senior services.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that an Ad Hoc Joint Senior Services Committee is hereby established to develop and recommend a long term plan for addressing the increasing demand for senior services in accordance with the following:

- 1. The Committee will be Ad Hoc. The term of the Committee shall continue until March 30, 2019 and the Committee will cease functioning unless otherwise directed by their respective Governing Body at that time.
- 2. The Governing Body hereby appoints representatives to the Ad Hoc Joint Senior Services Committee to be comprised of the following members.
- a. One elected official from each respective Governing Body.
- b. One resident member from each respective municipality appointed by each municipality.
- c. One ex-officio member from each school and municipal administration.
- 3. All meetings of the Committee shall be open to the public. Agenda and minutes for all meetings shall be prepared.

- 4. The scope of the Committee shall be to develop a long term plan on how to best proceed in addressing the increasing demand for senior services in accordance with the following:
- a. Review the Joint Senior Services Committee Final Recommendation to the Municipalities Report from June 2013.
- b. Evaluate current service demands and projected trends for senior demographics and future service demands.
- c. Analyze current funding sources and operational structure of the current contracted senior service model.
- d. Compare and contrast current senior services funding and governance models in the participating communities to other area communities and best practices.
- e. Review and evaluate cost and budget implications of any proposed recommendations and include strategic funding alternatives.
- f. Compile the Committee's findings and recommendations into a report to be presented at the end of the Committee's term.
- 5. The Committee is not authorized to expend funds or enter into agreements. All recommendations made by the Committee shall be in the form of a report to the Governing Body.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Beverly Hills Village Council hereby appoints James Delaney as an elected official to the Ad Hoc Committee, Dorothy Pfeifer as the resident member of the committee, and Chris Wilson as an ex-officio administration official to the committee.

Roll call vote: Motion passed (6-0).

REVIEW AND CONSIDER AMENDMENTS TO FY 2017-18 BUDGET

There are amendments relating to the General Fund to adjust various accounts to anticipated year end levels, Major Fund to record additional revenue received and reallocate the budget between accounts, Public Safety fund to adjust accounts to anticipated year end levels and reallocate the budget between accounts, Capital Fund to record fire truck modifications previously approved by Council and Water Fund to adjust the administration fee to agree to Fund 101. These proposed FY 2017-18 Budget Amendments have been reviewed by Village Administration and are recommended for approval.

Motion by Oen, second by Nunez, be it resolved that the Village Council authorizes Village Administration to transfer or adjust monies reserved in the General, Major Roads, Public Safety, Capital fund and Water Fund as reflected in the June 15, 2018 memorandum from Manager Chris Wilson.

Roll call vote: Motion passed (6-0).

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Racheal Hrydziuszko, Evergreen Road, explained that she started the "Village Town Hall" Facebook group as a place for residents to stay up to date, and although it is a closed group any resident that requests admission would receive it.

MANAGER'S REPORT

Water Testing – The Village has begun residential water testing as required by the DEQ. At this time, 61 collected samples have been submitted for a testing. An additional 65 will be submitted on June 20th. The DEQ requirement for the submission of 60 samples by June 30th will be met. Some residents have reported difficulty in meeting the regulations set forth by the DEQ for collecting a valid sample. If a resident is unable to meet these requirements, their sample will be accepted and tested, however it cannot be included in the population reported back to the DEQ. Any resident who wishes to have their water tested can contact the Village and their water can be tested at no cost to them.

Former Church Property – The Village has been in contact with the individual who has purchased the large parcel on the south side of 13 Mile west of Evergreen, the former Albanian Church. The preliminary indications are that the new owner wishes to pursue a residential development of multiple houses. Based upon the current zoning it would be possible to get 4-5 homes on this property. The owner has not submitted a site plan to date, but we anticipate something coming forward later this year.

Roads Analysis – HRC has completed the physical inspection of the roadways in the Village and is preparing the ratings analysis and cost projections. This project is expected to be completed by late June or early July. A presentation will be given to Council upon completion.

Southfield Corridor Analysis – CORE Properties is in the final stages of their report on the Southfield Rd. Overlay District. The report will be available by the end of the month.

Compensation and Classification study – Municipal Consulting Services has completed their review of our wages, classifications and job descriptions and has received the final comparable from surrounding similar communities. A final report and presentation to the Personnel Committee and Council should be ready by early to mid-July.

Greenwich Village Traffic Study – Based upon the comments from residents in Greenwich Village the Village was able to commission a traffic counts analysis from TIA for Evergreen and 14 Mile as well as Old Stage, Carriage Ln, Old Post and Wellesley. The traffic counts were taken on Wednesday, June 13th to try and capture normal school traffic. As this was the last week of school there was some concern that the traffic levels were not indicative of typical school traffic. If the numbers do not show sufficient peak hour traffic counts then we can retake these counts in September. Village Administration is analyzing some potential signage and regulations that would limit turns off of Evergreen and 14 Mile to these local streets during particular times of the day. Similar regulations have been utilized on Stafford to successfully limit cut through traffic.

Office Closed – Village Offices will be closed on Wednesday, July 4th in observance of Independence Day. Trash collection will not be interrupted this week.

COUNCIL COMMENTS

All members of Council thanked the fence subcommittee for their hard work on the fence ordinance.

Mueller announced there would be a Parks and Recreation Board meeting at Beverly Park on Thursday, June 21.

Mooney explained that the lack of support on the motion to move forward on a backyard chicken ordinance was reflective of the fact that the agenda item was a preliminary discussion on backyard chickens, and requires further study before a potential ordinance change.

Re: Class C Liquor License Application 31255 Southfield Rd. Suite A.

The Village is in receipt of an application to the Michigan Liquor Control Commission for a Class C liquor license in care of 2 BLU L.L.C. The applicant is a Steve Campbell. The Village has also met with Bruce Cobb, a partner in 2 BLU L.L.C. The intent of the liquor license will be to sell alcohol in a new sushi restaurant planned for the former Beverly Hills Hair Club location on Southfield Rd. The applicants are pursuing a Class C license under the Village's quota with the State of Michigan. Additional licenses are still available.

2 BLU L.L.C. has submitted a site plan to the Village for the planned renovations for the space at the address referenced above. The Village's Planning and Zoning Administrator has reviewed the site plan and finds it to be compliant. As it is an internal renovation of existing space the site plan does not need to be reviewed by the Planning Commission. Per the submitted site plan, the proposed establishment will have seating for up to 40 people. Hours of operation are proposed to be 11AM to 11PM Monday thru Sunday. The focus will be on take out business with an option for customers to dine in.

Per the square footage (948 sq ft) of the site plan the applicant will require approximately twelve spaces (11.85). The property has adequate parking on the parcel. Functionally, however, this property does often have congested parking in the lot immediately in front of this and the adjacent businesses. There is a significant number of parking spots to the immediate north of the plaza that satisfies the overall parking requirements for this plaza. Applicant will be advised to have employees utilize the parking on the north end of the property and to work out parking in the lot adjacent to Southfield Rd. with the landlord and neighboring businesses.

The applicant has provided evidence of a lease for the address submitted on the application. The Michigan Liquor Control Commission requires a resolution of local government approval as a part of the process of approving this type of license. The applicant(s) will also be required to pass a criminal background check by the State of Michigan and the Village of Beverly Hills prior to granting the license request.

Village Administration has reviewed the site plan submitted, lease agreement and hours of operation as submitted by the applicant and has no objection to the approval of this license request. If Council does not object, the following motion would be in order:

Birmingham Country Club Fireworks – Birmingham Country Club has notified the Village that they will be having a fireworks display this year on Tuesday, July 3rd at approximately 10:00 PM that will last for 15-20 minutes. BCC sent notices to all the residences adjoining their property in the Village as well as Birmingham and Bloomfield Township.

Fireworks Regulation – As a reminder, fireworks can be legally used in Michigan on the day before, day of and day after recognized holidays until midnight. For this July 4th season, fireworks could be used on the days of Tuesday, July 3rd, Wednesday, July 4th or Thursday, July 5th. Please be safe and considerate of your neighbors in the use of fireworks.

Water Testing – The Village is concluding our water testing for lead and copper as has been required by the Department of Environmental Quality. We will be submitting around 145 tests of homes in the Village. All samples have been collected and sent to the lab. We are awaiting test results for around 40 samples as of the writing of this report. Of the more than 100 test results from residences in the Village received to date, none have exceeded the action level of 15 parts per billion (ppb) for lead. A significant majority of tests revealed levels of less than 1ppb for lead, the lowest level that our lab can detect. In addition, there have been no test results that have exceeded the action level of 1300 ppb for copper. Residents are being notified of their test results. The Village has far exceeded the minimum requirement of additional testing of 60 homes.

CUSTOMER COMPLAINTS

We have received eight (8) complaints since the date of my last report. Complaint Nos. 2018-12 & 2018-13 were received from the two Beverly Hills neighbors who attended our last meeting. As you know, they had been without AT&T service for many days and had trouble getting AT&T to restore their service. On the afternoon of our meeting date, AT&T technicians came to their homes and worked for several hours. They were able to restore the service that same day and these complaints are now closed.

Complaint No. 2018-14 was submitted by a Beverly Hills resident who requested assistance in getting AT&T to remove a big cable spool and several tree branches they left in his backyard after installing a new line. Although AT&T did send out a worker after the complaint was filed, the homeowner had already removed the debris. This complaint is closed.

Complaint No. 2018-15 was received from a Birmingham resident who wanted a bundle of cable hanging from the pole behind his garage cleaned up. Although he originally believed that it belonged to WOW, they sent a technician out who informed him that it belonged to Comcast. I contacted the resident to follow up on this matter who indicated that the Comcast technician (a new employee) who subsequently came to the home informed him that they could not remove it due to the number of homes served by the line. The original WOW complaint has been closed but I have submitted a subsequent complaint to Comcast (see below).

Complaint No. 2018-16 was submitted on behalf of a Birmingham resident who needed removal of a Comcast cable line that had come down in his backyard. This work has been completed by Comcast and the complaint is now closed.

Complaint No. 2018-17 was received from one of our Cable Board members who was having difficulty getting Comcast to schedule a service call to her home. Her TVs in her home were all pixelating and some channels were not working at all. They finally fixed the service issues but left her with an unacceptably noisy replacement DVR and an outside cable line that needed to

be buried. The unacceptable customer service issues and numerous contacts with Comcast representatives will be detailed by our Board Member at the next meeting. This complaint is still pending.

Complaint No. 2018-18 was received from a Beverly Hills resident who would like a low-hanging wire raised that runs along her backyard as well as her neighbors' yards. The cable is believed to belong to Comcast and since she is not a Comcast subscriber, she has requested assistance in getting a Comcast crew out to address this situation. This complaint is pending.

Complaint No. 2018-19 has been submitted to Comcast after the first complaint (Complaint No. 2018-15) was submitted to WOW. This Birmingham resident would like a bundle of cable hanging from a pole behind his garage cleaned up and Comcast cable on the ground along his driveway removed. When he contacted Comcast, they sent a technician out who was not helpful. I have requested that the escalation team send another technician to the home to reevaluate and hopefully resolve this situation. This complaint is pending.

FINANCIAL

The account balance for the MBS, BBCU and Beverly Hills accounts as of May 31, 2018 will be emailed to all Board members. This information will also be provided via hard copies at the meeting, as well as budget to actual figures.

CHECK DISBURSEMENT

Since the date of our last meeting, I have written five (5) checks as follows:

- 1. BBCU (Visa- Norton anti-virus software renewal): \$111.29
- 2. Bluewater (truck equipment): \$86,398.04
- 3. Muniweb (payment #1 for website redesign project): \$2,370.00
- 4. Charter Township of Bloomfield (quarterly contract payment): \$53,200.00
- 5. Charter Township of Bloomfield (BCTV filming of sports event): \$2,500.00

ADDITIONAL NOTES:

- 1. The Birmingham Bloomfield Chamber of Commerce has provided us with a quote to place a BACB ad in their Membership Directory and Community Guide again this year. The cost would be the same as last year (which includes a 30% discount) and would be \$1,046.00. It is respectfully requested that the Board authorize this purchase.
- 2. The Village of Bingham Farms has requested that the BACB cover the cost of its membership in PROTEC this year in the amount of \$138.00. PROTEC is a governmental organization formed

over 20 years ago to protect the rights of way from encroachments by telecommunications providers. It has provided a municipal voice in this area to enhance the limited resources of the Michigan Municipal League. The BACB has paid these dues in the past and it is respectfully requested that the Board authorize this payment in the amount of \$138.00.

- 3. In an effort to increase attendance by the cable providers' representatives at our meetings, I have mailed letters to all three companies. I have informed them that the Board is requesting that they attend meetings on at least a quarterly basis.
- 4. Comcast has notified us of certain upcoming programming changes. As of July 1, 2018, Tru TV will be available as part of the Digital Starter service and NFL Network will move from Digital Starter to Digital Preferred.
- 5. WSJ.com reported on June 12, 2018 that a federal district court has ruled against the Justice Department in its attempt to block the merger of AT&T and Time Warner. The Wall Street Journal also pointed out that the merger was not really about dominating the market for cable television. In fact, AT&T-Time Warner is more interested in gaining a piece of the growing market for subscription streaming services rather than the shrinking cable television market. Between 2013 and 2017, the number of streaming-only households in the U.S. tripled.
