REVIEW AND CONSIDER REQUEST FROM BEVERLY HILLS ATHLETIC CLUB FOR USE OF BEVERLY PARK TENNIS COURTS DURING THE MONTHS OF JUNE AND JULY 2019

The Beverly Hills Athletic Club submitted a request to reserve exclusive use of both tennis courts at Beverly Park for 18 days during the months of June and July 2019. Last year they were issued a permit for exclusive use of one court for 23 days. This year's request is as follows:

9:00 am to 3:00 pm -	June 17, 18, 19, 24, 25, 26

A representative from the Beverly Hills Athletic Club attended the Parks and Recreation Board meeting on March 21, 2019 to answer questions. BHAC made a \$500 donation to the Village for the opportunity to reserve the tennis courts. A completed permit application and certificate of insurance has been filed with the Clerk's Office.

At their March 21st meeting, the Beverly Hills Parks and Recreation Board recommended approval of this request.

Motion by Mueller, second by Mooney, that the Beverly Hills Village Council authorize the Park Superintendent to grant exclusive use of one tennis court on a limited basis to the Beverly Hills Athletic Club at the discretion of Village Administration on June 17, 18, 19, 24, 25, 26 and July 1, 2, 3, 8, 9, 10, 15, 16, 17, 22, 23, and 24, 2019 as requested provided that a Certificate of Insurance naming the Village of Beverly Hills as an additional named insured under its certificate of liability is filed with the Village Clerk prior to use of the tennis courts.

Motion passed.

SECOND READING AND CONSIDERATION OF ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE MUNICIPAL CODE OF ORDINANCES TO ADD CHAPTER 45 MARIHUANA ESTABLISHMENTS, PROHIBITING RECREATIONAL MARIHUANA ESTABLISHMENTS WITHIN THE VILLAGE

The Village Attorney has prepared the attached draft language pursuant to the requirements of the Michigan Regulation and Taxation of Marihuana Act to prohibit commercial recreational establishments in the Village of Beverly Hills. The Village is required to take formal action to optout of allowing commercial recreational marihuana establishments; however, this will not disallow individual use as is permitted in the Act. Additionally, the Village's decision to not allow commercial marihuana establishments remains unchanged.

Procedurally, the Village Council must hold first and second readings prior to adoption. Upon adoption by Council, the language will take effect 20 days after publication.

A copy of the ordinance is available at the Village offices for review.

Motion by Mooney, second by Hrydziuszko, that the Beverly Hills Village Council, upon conducting a first reading March 19, 2019, and a second reading on April 2, 2019, formally adopts Ordinance #365 amending the Village Municipal Code, adding Chapter 45 Marihuana Establishments. Ordinance #365 will be published in the Eccentric Newspaper on Sunday, April 14, 2019 and the ordinance will take effect Saturday, May 4, 2019.

Motion passed.

DISCUSSION ON REVISIONS TO CH. 22, SECTION 22.08.280 NUISANCE ACTIVITIES, SUBSECTION B, ITEM 3 FENCES

In 2017 the Village adopted an ordinance amending Chapter 22, Section 22.08.280 Nuisance Activities, to add subsection B, item 3 Fences which regulates fencing surrounding construction sites. At that time, the decision was to require a four (4) foot fence for the duration of time in which an open hole or excavation was accessible on the project site.

The current language is as follows:

Fences. Every excavation and/or demolition resulting in an open hole shall be enclosed with a rigid barrier not less than four (4) feet high and sufficient to prevent the entry of unauthorized persons. All barriers shall remain in place until such time as the open hole or excavation has been filled or enclosed. All barriers shall be of adequate strength to provide suitable protection for the general public as required by the building official.

Since enacting the ordinance, the Village has had compliance concerns regarding the time such fencing is installed as well as the general security of the fencing. Language is printed on the building and demolition permits noting the requirement, as well as communicated verbally, to ensure contractors are aware of the regulations. Administration has reviewed other community's regulations relative to construction fencing and suggests modifying the language to require higher fencing, a longer duration, and specific details regarding gates and accessibility.

As this language is in the Zoning Ordinance, it requires review and recommendation by the Planning Commission as well as a public hearing to be held by both bodies before approval. Administration can draft language for Planning Commission review at their April 24th meeting.

Hrydziuszko would like the ordinance to require a six foot, gated, and locked chain-link fence. Requirements for portable restrooms, and dumpsters on site. She would also like the ordinance provided to contractors and posted on site to assure neighbors of awareness and compliance.

Nunez would like to see fences or barricades required for any unsafe structures or areas, and a code of conduct related to fences.

Wilson explained that the current ordinance did not have six-foot fences required because it was written prior to the changes to the Village fence ordinance. Administration supports six-foot fences at construction sites; a construction site would be considered the building envelope.

Council unanimously directed Administration to work with the Planning Commission to draft an amendment to Chapter 22, Section 22.08.280 Nuisance Activities, to add subsection B, item 3 Fences and proceed with a public hearing.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Harry Names, Buckingham, would like to see a community garden at Beverly Park.

MANAGER'S REPORT

14 Mile Rd. Paving Project - The Village is having a pre-construction meeting with the contractor for the 14 Mile Rd project on Wednesday, April 3rd. This project is a mill and paving project for the section of 14 Mile from Lahser west to the Village limits. Council may recall that this project was delayed from last summer/fall to this spring due to the number of paving projects last year. The contractor is anxious to get this project started and completed as soon as possible. Weather and ground conditions will need to continue to improve before this project can begin. I will forward along a construction schedule as soon as one is available. We will also inform and try to coordinate the schedule with Berkshire Middle School.

Memorial Day Parade and Carnival Registration - The annual Memorial Day Parade and Carnival will be held on Monday, May 27th beginning at 11 :00 AM. Those who would be interested in participating can now register via on-line registration on the Village website.

Yard Waste Collection - Curbside Yard waste collection begins the week of Monday, April 1st. Yard waste can be placed in paper yard waste bags or containers with a yard waste sticker on them. Stickers are available at the Village Office.

Consumer Confidence Report - A copy of the Village's annual Consumer Confidence Report (CCR) was included in the Council packet. This report us a summary of the testing done by the Village, SOCWA and GLWA over the course of a year. This testing includes, but is not limited to, such things as lead, copper, sodium, turbidity, chlorine, fluoride, radium, nitrate and E. coli bacteria.

COUNCIL COMMENTS

Hrydziuszko reported the Planning Commission created their subcommittees related to the items put forth at the joint meeting. Their intention is to be prepared to report on them at the July Council meeting.

Mueller reported the Parks & Recreation Board will be hosting their first Concert in the Park on June 7. The first phase of buckthorn eradication has been completed and Administration continues to coordinate with Public Works for the removal of debris. The Board continues to apply for grants for the plantings in the fall.

Mooney is looking forward to the concert, and thanked Delaney for serving on the Cable Board.

Abboud offered condolences to the Borgon and Cavanaugh families on the passing of Camilla Duffy Cavanaugh.

The Village has received a written request from Cunningham-Limp on behalf of Detroit Country Day School (DCDS) to withdraw their request for special land use and site plan approval to amend the approved site plan for the Middle School to retain two recreational structures constructed and add a security structure in the parking lot. DCDS has stated their intent to remove the recreational structures, play structure and sport court, no later than June 28, 2019. Additionally, they have committed to submit a new, separate request for the security building to be located in the parking lot. Attached is the letter detailing the request from DCDS.

Administration and the Village Attorney have reviewed the matter and recommend Village Council postpone decision on the request until the first meeting in July, at which time Administration can confirm the structures have been removed and the site has been restored to the conditions of the approved site plan.

Re: Detroit Country Day School Structure Removal Sent Via Email

Dear Mr. Wilson:

Thank you for taking my call yesterday regarding the current request from Detroit Country Day School (DCDS). As we are all aware, DCDS has an open request into the Village for consideration of retaining the Play Structure and Sport Court. It also includes the consideration of installing a small guard structure on Hillview Drive.

At the March 5, 2019 Village Council meeting, a direction was made to table the DCDS request until the April 16, 2019 Village Council meeting. After the March 5th meeting, representatives from DCDS and individual neighbors directly adjacent to the School conducted a series of meetings and exchanged correspondence associated to the Play Structure and Sport Court. The conclusion of the efforts between the school and neighbors will result in the School removing the Play Structure and Sport Court. The areas currently occupied by the two structures shall be re-graded and seeded to be in compliance with the 2016 Village Approved Site Plan.

Given the recent decision to remove the structures, Cunningham-Limp is in the process of securing subcontracts to perform the work. The work is targeted to commence in the Mid-May or early June time frame. Factors that impact the start of the work are subcontractor availability and weather. In any event, the work shall be completed no later than June 28, 2019. At the completion of the work, the Village will be contacted to schedule a site visit to validate the removal and restoration work. After the site inspection, and assuming there are no issues, it is requested that a letter from the Village be provided indicating all work has been completed/restored in accordance with the 2016 Site Plan Approval and Village expectations.

It should also be understood that the School has not used the Structures since the end of September when the School was given notice by the Village. The School will continue to abstain from the use of the unapproved structures.

A separate and new submittal shall be provided for the request of the proposed Security Structure on Hillview Drive.

Given the position of the School to remove the unapproved structures and submit a new and independent submittal for the Security Structure, it is assumed that there is no need to be placed on the Agenda for the Village Council meeting on April 16, 2019. If this is not the case please let us know and a representative from our firm will be present.

Attached are proposed FY 2018-2019 Village of Beverly Hills Budget Amendments.

There are General Fund amendments relating to additional revenue from the State of Michigan and other sources, adjustments to budget line items such as legal fees, salaries, professional services, insurance and other various expenses to more accurately reflect projected actuals for FY19.

In Major Roads there are amendments for other state grants received from the State of Michigan, additional interest income and expenses relating to the 13 mile road Federal project, adjustments to reflect various expense line items to more accurately reflect projected actuals and an amendment for the 2018 Concrete Road Improvement Program previously approved by Council.

In Local Roads there are amendments for additional interest income, additional expenses in Traffic signs and Asphalt & Cold Patch.

In Public Safety there are amendments to adjust salaries, workers compensation and insurance to more accurately reflect projected actuals for FY19.

In the Capital Fund there is an amendment to adjust capital building improvements to the deposit amount for the boiler and generator in FY19. The work will be completed in FY20.

In the Water Fund maintenance line items are adjusted to estimated actuals for FY19.

These proposed FY 2018-2019 Budget Amendments have been reviewed by Village Administration and are recommended for approval.

Be it resolved that the Village of Beverly Hills Council authorizes Village Administration to transfer or adjust monies reserved in the General, Major Roads, Local Roads, Public Safety, Capital and Water funds as reflected in the April 11, 2019 memorandum from Finance Director Sheila McCarthy.

VILLAGE MANAGER'S REPORT CHRIS D. WILSON APRIL 12, 2019

14 Mile Paving Project – The Village has confirmed with the contractor for the 14 Mile Rd paving project that this project will commence on Monday, April 22nd. The project will be a reconstruction of 14 Mile Rd. from the Lahser intersection west to the Village limits. Eastbound traffic on 14 Mile will be maintained. Westbound 14 Mile traffic will have to detour at Lahser. Both northbound and southbound Lahser traffic will be maintained. Construction should last approximately three (3) weeks. Signage for the detour will be in place by Monday, April 15th.

Recycling Market Status – SOCRRA Executive Director Jeff McKeen has produced a memo on the current status of the recycling market in the SOCRRA service area. Recycling has been a hot news item of late and I thought his memo was timely and worth sharing. As the memo indicates, the prices for some of our recycling commodities has declined, most notably glass. Cardboard prices have declined as well. This is not a direct reflection of the restrictions put in place by China as we have not shipped recyclables directly to China for many years. However, the regulatory changes implemented by China have indirectly impacted commodity prices for the domestic processors that we do deal with. Regardless of changes in the commodity prices of our recycled materials all recyclable material received by SOCRRA is still being recycled and will continue to be recycled. No recyclable materials are being sent to the landfill. Commodity prices are currently down, but there has also been volatility in these markets. SOCRRA produces a high-quality product that we feel will always have market value. Mr. McKeen and SOCRRA continue to monitor these markets and seek viable vendors for our products. Residents should feel encouraged to continue their recycling efforts as they have in the past.

Budget Workshop – The annual Budget Workshop will be held on Tuesday, April 23rd at 6:00 PM in the Village Council Chambers. Village Administration will be working on a revised draft of the budget document based upon the FY 2018-19 budget amendments on the agenda for consideration at the meeting of April 16th. Any members of Council that have questions or concerns can reach out to Finance Director McCarthy or myself prior to the meeting of April 23rd.

Subject: Recycling Markets Status

Board Members:

Given all the bad press that recycling has been receiving in recent months, I wanted to provide an update on the status of SOCRRA's recycling markets. In summary, we are able to sell all the recycled materials that we produce except for glass, which we are paying to have recycled. However, the prices that we are receiving are substantially lower than the prices projected in our budget for 2018/19. The prices that we are receiving as of March 2019 and the prices used in the 2018/19 budget are displayed in the table below. The budget prices were the average of the actual prices received from January 2018, when the MRF reopened, through April 2018. The commodity by commodity review is as follows:

Paper Products

All of our paper products are being purchased by GFL Environmental (Royal Oak Recycling) under a three-year agreement that began in November 2018. GFL is paying a premium over the monthly prices published in the PPI Pulp and Paper Week ("Yellow Sheet"). We have not had any issues with GFL, and they are able to promptly pick up paper loads. We typically schedule pickups two weeks in advance although GFL provides flexibility to allow us to either add additional loads or to cancel loads as needed. GFL has had us load a handful of newspaper loads in export containers in the past month. We believe these are test loads being sent to Europe and South Korea.

Plastic Products

All of our plastic products except for mixed #3-#7 are being purchased by CleanTech in Dundee, Michigan. We have not had any issues with CleanTech. We typically schedule pickups for the month at the beginning of the month. Plastic prices have been fairly stable and close to the budgeted levels this year although we did see a 35% decrease in the price of natural HDPE for April. Our mixed #3-#7 plastics are being purchased by Revital in Sarnia, Ontario. Revital separates out #5 (yogurt containers) and any residual #1 and #2 plastics from our mixed plastic stream and burns the remainder in a waste to energy facility. Revital is working on recovery of #6 (polystyrene) from the mixed plastic stream.

Metal Products

All of our metal products are being purchased by Ferrous Processing in Detroit, MI. Metal pricing has been strong for most of the year except for aluminum, which has dropped about 40% from last year's levels. We have had minor issues with timely load pickups from Ferrous Processing.

Glass

We have only been able to find one outlet for our recycled glass, Strategic Materials in Chicago, Illinois. Strategic is taking a mix of the three recycled glass streams that we produce (the different streams are separated by the size of the glass fragments), but we are having to pay to have the glass recycled. The main reason for the payment is the trucking cost to transport the glass to the Chicago area. We are working to identify alternative outlets for our recycled glass materials.

SOCRRA has not sent any materials to China in a number of years. However, the problems in the China market have served to reduce commodity prices, particularly in the paper market. We have seen price swings of this type in the past although the duration of the depressed prices has been unusually long. The one potential bright spot on the horizon is that Pratt Industries is scheduled to open a large paper factory in Wapakoneta, Ohio in 2019 that could be a good outlet for our recycled cardboard and mixed paper.

We are using our social media and e-newsletter to communicate the general message that we are still recycling all the materials that we collect and that residents can help by making sure that the materials being placed into the carts for recycling are consistent with SOCRRA's guidelines.
