President Peddie called the special Council meeting to order at 9:10 a.m. in the Village of Beverly Hills municipal building at 18500 W. Thirteen Mile Road.

ADDITIONS TO AGENDA/APPROVE AGENDA

Motion by Money, second by Mueller, to approve the agenda as published.

Motion passed.

FINANCES

The Village millage passed in 2010 expires with FYE 06/30/2020 and total operating Millage reverts to 11.0 mills, which would leave roughly 9 mills for Public Safety (PS) and 2 for General Fund (GF), without library. With library (.8 mills) included, it would leave roughly 8.5 mills for PS and 1.7 for GF. Funding at this level could be achieved due to savings to OPEB costs of roughly \$800,000 annually, which are subject to change.

Library millage could be pursued separately. Inclusion of 0.8 mills +/- for Library in operating millage would require ending subsidy to trash operations and ending GF contributions to roads. Trash fee is currently set at \$150 for FY 19/20 but would need to increase to \$175 to be self-supporting. The Council does have the power to vote on a dedicated trash millage that can cover the cost of trash but generates no profit. State increases would cover some, but not all, of previous GF contributions to roads.

There are several renewal options that Council could consider. Seek renewal at current operating levels; 9.1 Public Safety and 2.0 General Fund and 0.85 for Library; for 11.95 mills total. This is higher than the Charter allowance (11 mills) but less than the 12.9184 approved in 2010 and fiscally sustainable based upon best projections. Council could pursue other millage issues independently.

Council could pursue renewal at 2010 level of 12.9184+/-; 9.9 for Public Safety and 2.1 for General Fund and 0.8462 for Library; for 12.8462 mills total. Millage for Public Safety would be higher than current operating level, which would allow for rapid growth of PS Fund Balance. Council could then pursue other millage issues independently.

Council could pursue renewal at current operating levels with specific earmarks; 9.1 Public Safety & 1.9 General Fund & 0.85 Library & 0.25 Parks & 0.75 Roads; for a 12.8500 mills total. This

would generate roughly \$150k annually for parks and \$450k annually for roads. It would sufficiently operate PS and GF at current levels.

Mooney supported the idea of the omnibus approach and believes they should consider asking for 13.9 mills; this would allow for park funding, paying off the water and sewage fees and removing them from the quarterly bills, as well as adding to infrastructure funds. It will be important to specify the amounts allocated for each department. There should be a 10-year cap to guard against Headlee reductions as well.

Peddie and Mueller agreed, believing that the priority will be showing residents what it would cost per household, where costs will be rising, where costs will be reduced, and where costs saving measures have been taken.

Nunez wants to ensure that the park does not continue to take the loss in millage allocations. He asked that administration prepare a one-page comparison of the proposed millage options.

Abboud, George, and Mooney will work with Administration on the options around the millage proposals.

INFRASTRUCTURE

The Village has a few blocks of 4" water mains, all over 60 years old. Most of them run through rear yards and some portions are located under garages and trees. Although consideration has been given to replacing these, it is a costly project, and they have not experienced any problems in this area. Administration will follow up on the approximately 150 homes with unknown service pipe line status.

Council will need to work with Administration to determine if the Village will focus on concrete or asphalt this spring. A major road project is scheduled for 13 Mile in 2021.

George would like the Council and Administration to explore grants and funding options for creating a more walkable and bikeable Village; connecting neighborhoods, schools, and parks.

Mueller, Nunez, and Peddie will meet to discuss infrastructure concerns and goals; with a prepared report for the March 5, 2019 meeting.

PUBLIC SAFTEY

The Department has taken delivery of the smaller pumper truck, and plan to take delivery of the large pumper in May 2019. The officers are extremely happy with the new trucks. Upcoming expenses include 2 new vehicles, and replacement of the boiler. The replacement of the boiler will be a big project, and will need to be done in the spring. The current generator is over 20 years old and will need replacing.

The Department does not use body cams; they currently use cameras in the vehicles as well as body mikes, and have had no issues. There was discussion around opening up the reception desk in the entrance of the public safety building, however the main reason it is not open at all times is the safety of the officers and staff in the building. It was suggested that all of the glass in the lobby

be replaced with bulletproof glass. More lighting is needed around the exteriors of the Southfield Township office and the Public Safety building.

PERSONNEL

Mooney reported there were five candidates being interviewed for the Village Clerk/Assistant Manager position, and an amended Village Manager contact was being drafted.

Comeau continues to provide all Public Works for the Village. Marty Collins will be retiring in August 2019, and work in a part time supervisory role. He is training his replacement over the course of the year. Council and Administration should begin to consider a long-term contingency plan; they would be hard pressed to find another company that provides the level and quality of services that Comeau does.

George requested the McCarthy provide the Council with a full breakdown of provided services to explore potential comparisons with other options.

Council and Administration are happy with the services provided by the Village Attorney. He has been serving the Village for over 30 years; the personnel committee will discuss his long-term retirement plans with him and develop next steps.

Administration was instructed to evaluate the current level of service being provided by the Village Planner and Village IT services and place bids for service out.

Wilson reported that SAFEBuilt; the current contracted company for Planning and for Building Inspections; was drafting a bid for a 20 hour a week code enforcement patrol. This would not replace the Village employed Code Enforcement officer, but would enable stricter patrol for violations.

There was extensive conversation about the concerns related to habitual offenders, ticket follow up, enforcement, record keeping, and reporting to Council.

Peddie, Abboud, and Administration will meet to establish guidelines for Code Enforcement reporting, tracking, and follow up procedures.

CHARTER AND ORDINANCES

Hrydziuszko, Nunez, and George will review and report on potential additions to the Municipal Code including the addition of definitions where needed, removal of language that no longer applies. They will also consider a simplified Tier approach to the Village Code; icons and color coordinated Visuals to simplify Rules and Codes.

COMMUNICATION

Hrydziuszko, Mueller, and Peddie will meet with Administration to discuss better use of the website and social media. They will also discuss additional ways to proactively communicate with residents about issues before the Council.

VILLAGE BOARDS

The Council agreed that there is value in having long standing members of the Boards and Committees, however it can be discouraging to residents who are interested in applying or becoming involved.

Hrydziuszko, George, and Abboud will discuss potential changes to Boards and Commissions related to term limits and by-laws.

PLANNING COMMISSION

Administration will work with the Village Attorney to draft ordinances related to car and wood storage. It was agreed that if there were a change to allow chickens in Beverly Hills, there would need to be clear guidelines and repercussions in the ordinance. Enforcing the ordinance would fall under not just Code Enforcement but also Public Safety and Animal Control.

Discussion was had about the need for traffic calming on the residential streets; particularly ones being used as reroutes during construction. Unfortunately, speed bumps do not deter drivers, and are not permitted on public streets. Solar powered radar signs were discussed; however, they average \$3,000 - \$5,000 per sign.

Hrydziuszko would like to see a tree census of the trees along the right of way. She believes it is important to begin establishing new trees before the mature trees begin to die. She is the new Planning Commission liaison and looks forward to bringing these discussion points to them at the joint meeting in February.

PARKS AND RECREATION

Mooney reported on the continuation of the Park Ranger Program. The 2019 duties and projects include spreading woodchips on the disc golf course, repainting the dugouts, repainting fence on the hill, and assistance with the reforestation project.

Mueller reported there are no major projects outside of the buckthorn removal and reforestation project in the next two years.

Nunez encouraged the Council to consider things like holiday lighting/Village Christmas tree in public areas and ice skating in the park.

George, Nunez, and Mueller will work on developing plans for Park growth.

MISCELLANEOUS

Council discussed the need to generate more Village brand awareness: re-visit welcome signage, re-visit village hall, create a mission statement for our community, and would like to see the pavilion at Beverly Park expanded to be a useable year-round space.

George and Abboud will review and develop an Emergency Preparedness Plan, potentially creating a handbook for Council, Administration and Employees outlining what protocol for emergencies.

Abboud reported there are SEMCOG and MML funds available for many different projects.

BUSINESS AGENDA

SECOND READING AND POSSIBLE ADOPTION OF AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 22, SECTION 22.08.100 ACCESSORY BUILDINGS, STRUCTURES, AND USES

At the Council meeting held July 17, 2018 the Planning Commission subcommittee presented a report regarding the analysis of two matters: mechanical units in side yards and permit requirements of sheds/small buildings 120 square feet or larger that otherwise do not require a building permit. This was per the assignment by Council in February of 2018 to evaluate the two issues. Council subsequently made a motion instructing the Planning Commission review and make a recommendation for modifications to Section 22.08.100 Accessory Structures, Buildings and Uses, to establish regulations to permit mechanical units in side yards and to establish requirement for zoning permit for sheds/small buildings 120 square feet or larger that otherwise do not require a building permit.

As part of the process in analyzing the matter, the subcommittee of Planning Commission and Administration reviewed existing conditions in the Village and impacts of the proposed amendment to the ordinance. The Planning Commission discussed the topic at numerous meetings, minutes provided. A copy of the report that was presented to Council in July was also provided. On October 24, 2018 the Planning Commission held a public hearing and on November 28, 2018 Planning Commission made a recommendation to approve changes to Section 22.08.100 to add regulations for mechanical units in side yards and establish requirement for zoning permits for buildings 120 square feet or larger. Procedurally, the Village Council must hold a public hearing, and first and second readings prior to adoption. A public hearing was held by Council at the meeting held January 2, 2019. Upon adoption by Council, the language will take effect 20 days after publication.

A copy of the ordinance is available at the Village office.

Mueller continued to be concerned for the large quantity of homes that are current non-conforming. There are many units in the Village that are closer than 5 ft. and moving a unit can be costly to the resident. Wilson explained that valid legal non-conforming use will be permitted to continue.

Nunez reiterated the need to be forward thinking in the development of ordinance updates.

Hrydziuszko agreed with regulation related to side yard units, however, believes that requiring compatibility with the principal building in terms of style, design, material and/or color(s) is an overstep.

George Ostrowski, Planning Commission Chairperson, explained that a detached building could be not just a shed, but a garage, pool house, etc. and the language used was standard. There are no current guidelines related to side yard unit placement, so the purpose of the ordinance would be to codify what is currently a spoken agreement. This amendment would also mean that all detached buildings would get zoning compliance verified.

Mueller thanked the Planning Commission for their time and hard work on the draft of this ordinance. He would like to see clear definitions for compliance to be enforced.

George believes although the intention is good, the side yard unit placement and the detached building specifications should be considered as two separate issues. He continues to be wary of creating additional cost burden for residents as well as attempting to regulate color and design of detached buildings.

Ostrowski explained that the decisions related to the need for a floor or rat wall is made by the building inspector. The primary focus of the ordinance amendment is to be proactive related to the construction of new homes or major renovations.

David Miller, Downing Place, believes that there should be different regulations regarding generators and air conditioning units. He also expressed concern that there is potential that a green screen would not provide adequate protection from noise or sight.

Sharon Tischler, Virmar Court, reported that when units are not maintained they will get louder. She also expressed concern that if you allow structures to be built without floors or rat walls it will lead to rats.

Motion by Mueller, second by Nunez, be it resolved that the Beverly Hills Village Council approve the proposed modification to Section 22.08.100 Accessory Structures, Buildings and Uses in Residential Zone Districts to regulate mechanical units in side yards and to require zoning permit for small buildings 120 square feet and larger that are otherwise not require to obtain building permits.

MANAGER'S REPORT

Office Closed – Village Offices will be closed on Monday, January 21st in observance of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day. Trash collection service will not be interrupted.

Joint Parks and Recreation Committee Meeting – There will be a joint meeting of the Council and the Parks and Recreation Committee on Thursday, January 17th at the Village Hall.

Final Water Testing Results – I have included for your review a copy of the 170 water tests that were completed in the Village in December. All the 170 sites tested received a reading of less than the action level of 15 parts per billion (ppb) for lead. As you can see, a significant majority of the tests were lower than 1 ppb (test results are reported in mg/L; to convert to ppb multiply by 1,000). Between the June and December testing periods the Village received and tested over 300 residential water samples.

Best Cities in Michigan – The website Homesnacks has compiled their annual list of the best places to live in Michigan and the Village of Beverly Hills ranked 4th for the second year in a row.

Kevin Sheard, Buckingham, submitted a letter to administration related to his concerns regarding a new home that has been constructed next to his. Administration has contacted the builder to meet and review Village requirements and expectations.

COUNCIL COMMENTS

George would like the Council to consider the potential for Beverly Park, and what the appropriate allotment of millage would be to achieve that vision. There are underutilized assets in the Village, and he believes people will support what brings value.

Chairperson Borgon called the meeting of the Parks and Recreation Board to order at 7:30 p.m. in the Village of Beverly Hills municipal building at 18500 W. Thirteen Mile Road.

APPROVE MINUTES OF A REGULAR PARKS & RECREATION BOARD MEETING HELD NOVEMBER 15, 2018

Motion by Schmitt, second by Kondak, that the minutes of the Parks & Recreation Board meeting held on November 15, 2018 be approved.

Motion passed.

LONG TERM PLANNING FOR VILLAGE PARKS

Mueller reviewed the long-term budgeting plan that was developed in 2018. The spreadsheet shows the year installed, approximate installation cost, annual maintenance cost, scheduled replacement and replacement cost. Replacement costs, or reserves, have been calculated based on life expectancy and prorated over the number of years until replacement. Budgeted expenses for FY 2019-20 total \$215,000; a large majority of this expense will be the buckthorn eradication. The large-scale removal of the buckthorn means that the reforestation project will be the top priority of the Board. This should include applying for grants and reaching out to the community.

Ruprich arrived at 7:35 p.m.

Longer term, Mueller would like to see a focus on Riverside Park and pocket parks located throughout the Village. The intention of the Council is to include the Parks in the 2020 millage request.

Hrydziuszko offered to reach out to the MSU Forestry program and consult on appropriate plants for the wetland areas. She and Hausman will work together on grants and the reforestation project plan. She also hopes to work with the Board on ways to help residents learn more about combating buckthorn on their own properties.

Hausman encouraged the Board to look forward to 2023 when the playground equipment will need to be replaced, at that time they should also consider changing the surface material on the playground.

George believes that residents want to, and will, invest in making the community a better place. He believes that publicizing the suggested Riverside Park design would help to get people excited to see their money going back into the community.

The Board and Council discussed ways to promote the millage and the allocation of millage funds for the Parks. They agreed the need for a balance between using upcoming projects to generate support and excitement and recognizing residents concern about tax rates. The intention is to prioritize pockets parks if the millage is passed.

Other suggestions included adding a few new community events at Beverly Park, possibly having a warming cabin at the back of the park for the winter season, murals, new signs, concert events, more lighting, seasonal events and holiday decorations.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

None.

COUNCIL COMMENTS

Council thanked the Board for their work and dedication to the parks and the beautification of the Village.

Mooney reported the Park Ranger program will continue in 2019. In addition to their normal daily duties, their project list includes painting the fence on the hill, repainting the dugouts, painting the disc golf signs, spreading fresh wood chips on the walking paths, and cleaning up the fence line at Allerton.

ADMINISTRATION COMMENTS

Wilson reported that he was contacted by the DNR and they requested some updates to the Five-Year Plan, which Administration will follow up on. Buckthorn eradication has begun in Beverly Park; they will have the areas where they are working taped off, ensuring the safety of park users.

BOARD COMMENTS

All members of the Board thanked Council for their ongoing support.

Goodrich reported the hope is to have the Winter Family Fun Day popup in the upcoming weeks when the snow comes.

Hausman reported the logo for the Board continues to be a project she is collaborating on.

Kondak asked that DPW work on the gravel path come spring; it will need filling and grating, and better drainage.

Borgon suggested a small fence to create a defined space for the pocket park at Beverly and Greenfield. She suggested doing Park fundraisers like a 5K, sponsored tree decorating or scarecrows along the fences during the Halloween Hoot. She presented Wilson with \$300 raised at the Holiday Lights event.

Re: Manager Employment Agreement Amendment for Chris Wilson

Date: January 29, 2019

Background

Municipal Consulting Services provided information to the Village showing compensation packages for City and Village Managers from the following Communities: Berkley, Birmingham, Clawson, Farmington, Grosse Pointe Farms, Grosse Pointe Park, Grosse Pointe Woods, Huntington Woods, Plymouth, Rochester, Saline, and the Village of Milford. The average compensation for these communities is \$116,017. In addition to comparable salaries, the Personnel Committee also reviewed other areas such as paid time off, deferred compensation, retirement benefits and plans and retiree health care. Chris Wilson does not participate in Medical Coverage from the Village and is therefore not eligible for retiree healthcare.

Recommendation

The Village of Beverly Hills Personnel Committee has reviewed the compensation study provided by Municipal Consulting Services and recommends the approval of an amendment to Chris Wilson's existing contract. This amendment changes the rate of pay to reflect \$112,000 yearly compensation, adding a monthly \$400 car allowance and extending the term of the contract to 2023.

Suggested Resolution

Be it resolved that the Beverly Hills Village Council approves the Manager Employment Agreement Amendment for Chris Wilson. This agreement is retroactive to August 5, 2018 and will terminate on August 5, 2023. The Village of Beverly Hills shall pay Chris Wilson \$112,000 annually and provide a monthly car allowance of \$400.00. After August 5, 2018 Chris Wilson will receive increases in compensation commensurate with those proved to other non-union personnel of the Village.

BEVERLY HILLS VILLAGE MANAGER

EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is made as of this 5th day of November, 2012, between the VILLAGE OF BEVERLY HILLS, Oakland County, Michigan, by and through its Village Council (hereinafter referred to as the "Employer") and CHRIS D. WILSON (hereinafter referred to as "Employee").

The parties recite and declare that:

The Employer is desirous of continuing to engage the services of Employee under the direction of the Village Council for the period of time set forth in Section V of this Agreement. The Employee is desirous of providing services to the Village of Beverly Hills.

The parties hereto agree as follows:

SECTION I

MUTUAL ASSENT TO EMPLOYMENT

The Employer hereby employs, engages and hires the Employee to act as Village Manager for the Village of Beverly Hills, and the Employee hereby accepts and agrees to such employment, engagement and hiring.

SECTION II

GOVERNING LAW

This Agreement shall be interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of Michigan.

SECTION III

DUTIES OF EMPLOYEE

The duties of the Employee will be those designated and assigned by the Employer. In general, these duties will consist of all lawful duties of Village Manager, together with all other lawful assignments and directives given to Employee by Employer. The Village Manager shall report to the Village Council of the Village of Beverly Hills.

SECTION IV

PLACE OF EMPLOYMENT

The duties required of the Employee hereunder shall be rendered at 18500 West Thirteen Mile Road, Beverly Hills, Michigan, and such other place or places as the Employer shall, in good faith, require or as the interests and needs of the Employer shall require.

SECTION V

TERM OF EMPLOYMENT

The Employee shall be employed as Village Manager for the period of time from August 1, 2013, and shall terminate on August 5, 2018 (Base Term). Thereafter, this Agreement shall be extended, unless and until terminated pursuant to the provisions of Section X below ("Employment/Termination"). Any extension of this contract must be in writing and must be signed by the parties, and nothing herein shall obligate either party to extend this Agreement beyond the Base Term.

SECTION VI

COMPENSATION

The Employer shall pay the Employee, and the Employee shall accept from the Employer, in full payment for the Employee's services hereunder, compensation of ninety seven thousand dollars (\$97,000.00) annually effective August 1, 2013 paid in semi weekly installments. After August 1, 2013 and during the duration of this contract Employee will receive increases in compensation commensurate with those provided to other non-union personnel of the Village. The Employee will continue to be compensated at a rate of ninety thousand dollars (\$90,000) from the execution of this contract until August 1, 2013.

SECTION VII

OTHER EMPLOYMENT

The Employee shall devote all of his time, attention, knowledge, and skill solely to the interest of the Employer, and the Employer shall be entitled to all of the benefits arising from or incident to all work, services, and advice of the Employee. The Employee will not engage in any activities while at Village Offices, or during normal office hours, which are unrelated to his employment with the Village.

SECTION VIII

FACILITIES, SUPPLIES AND ASSISTANCE

The Employer shall furnish the Employee, with a suitable office, a cellular telephone, together with such supplies, equipment and material as may be required in the performance of the Employee's duties. Employee will not be provided with a vehicle nor will any car allowances be paid.

The Village recognizes that certain job affiliated expenses will be incurred in the conduct of Village business for meals, dues, mileage, etc. The Village agrees to budget and pay or reimburse the Village Manager for such expenses upon submission of receipts or statements. It is agreed that the Village will pay the necessary dues for the Employee to belong to the MLGMA and ICMA. It is agreed that the Village will pay for travel, meals, and conferences to ICMA

Annual Conference, MLGMA annual conference, MML annual conference and Oakland County Manager Meetings and Region IV Meetings.

SECTION IX

BENEFITS

The parties recite and declare that for the time period covered in this Employment Agreement, the Employee shall receive the following benefits:

A. Life Insurance:

\$100,000.00.

B. Medical Insurance:

Employee opts out of Village Medical Insurance.

C. Dental Insurance:

Employee opts out of Village Dental Insurance.

D. Long-Term Disability:

60% of salary.

E. Retirement:

The Village shall contribute to MERS the required

statutory percentage.

F. Retiree Health Care:

Employee is not eligible for Retiree Health Care upon separation or retirement from the Village and will not participate in the Retiree Health Care Fund.

G. Deferred Compensation:

In lieu of Retiree Health Care coverage for the Employee and his spouse, the Village shall contribute five percent (5%) of employee's base pay into a deferred compensation plan administered by the ICMA on the employee's behalf. This percentage will increase by one percent (1%) annually on August 1 to a maximum of ten percent (10%). Section IX (G) may be reviewed on an annual basis by the Village Council as part of the

annual Village budget process.

Employee shall be entitled to four (4) weeks vacation and four (4) personal days including birthday per year. Employee shall receive time off with pay for all legal holidays observed by the Village. Employee shall receive three days paid for immediate family funeral and emergency leave. Employee shall receive sick leave of thirteen (13) days per calendar year, with an accrual of a maximum of 100 days. Sick time may be redeemed at any time during or subsequent to the term of this Employment Agreement through a cash payment equal to: [number of accrued sick leave days being redeemed] x 50% x [the then applicable daily base compensation rate]. Employee is entitled to any and all of the benefits currently and in the future, extended to any other employee, as determined by the Village Policy and Procedures Manual as long as same are not contradictory to this Agreement. It is understood by the parties that the above benefits run for the term of this contact and shall not be decreased by the Employer at this current level of benefits during the term of this contact.

The Village shall reimburse employee for the cost of tuition up to a maximum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) per year, provided the employee remains employed by the VILLAGE for a minimum of three (3) years from the date of such tuition reimbursement, only for job-related college courses provided (a) the employee received a final grade of "C" or better in the course and (b) the employee produced satisfactory written proof of having paid the tuition.

SECTION X

EMPLOYMENT/TERMINATION

A. Employment:

The Employee acknowledges that he serves at the pleasure of the Employer, and therefore can be terminated: (i) with cause, upon thirty (30) days written notice, or (ii) without cause with six (6) months severance pay and accrued benefits.

The Employee also understands that no official of the Village, except for the President signing as authorized by the Village Council, has the authority to enter into any Agreement contrary to the terms of this provision.

B. <u>Termination by the Employee</u>:

This Agreement may be terminated at any time by the Employee, upon sixty (60) days notice effective upon the execution of this Agreement. Said notice shall be in writing and given to the Village President and the Village Council.

SECTION XI

MODIFICATION

No modification or waiver of this Agreement or any covenant, condition, or provision herein shall be valid unless in writing and duly executed by the parties to this Agreement.

SECTION XII

SEVERABILITY

All agreements and covenants herein are severable and in the event of any of them, with the exception of those contained in Section I, II, III, IV and V hereof, shall be held invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, this Agreement shall be interpreted as if such invalid agreements or covenants were not contained herein.

SECTION XIII

COMPLETE AGREEMENT AND WRITTEN CONTRACT

This written Agreement embodies the entire Agreement between the parties and there are no inducements, promises, terms, conditions, or obligations made or entered into by either the Employer or the Employee other than those contained herein. This Agreement supersedes all

prior Agreements, whether oral or written, and specifically supersedes all written contracts or agreements previously executed by the parties hereto.

SECTION XIV

INDEMNIFICATION

The Village shall defend, save harmless and indemnify the Employee against any tort or professional liability claim or demand or other legal action arising out of an alleged act or omission occurring in the performance of the Employee's duties. The Village may compromise and settle any such claim or suit and shall pay the amount of any settlement or judgment rendered.

SECTION V

TERM OF EMPLOYMENT

The Employee shall continue to be employed as Village Manager for the period of time from August 5, 2018 and shall terminate on August 5, 2023 (Base Term). Thereafter, this Agreement shall be extended, unless and until terminated pursuant to the provisions of Section X – Employment/Termination of Employee's Employment Agreement dated November 5, 2012.

SECTION VI

COMPENSATION

Re: Special Land Use and Site Plan Approval for Detroit Country Day School

The Village has received revised plans, dated December 13, 2018, from Detroit Country Day School (DCDS) for approval to keep a playground and basketball court on the Middle School grounds, and add a guard house in the Middle School parking lot. Village Ordinance, Section 22.14.030 requires special land use approval for accessory structures at a private school in a Single Family Residential Zone District. Additionally, Section 22.08.300, j requires any modifications to the site after approval that are not in accordance with the approved site plan to obtain special land use approval.

The Planning Commission held a public hearing on October 24, 2018 for plans submitted by DCDS to retain the playground and basketball court previously installed on the Middle School grounds. A recommendation on the request was postponed due to the incomplete submittal. In the interim, the school has revised their request and is also seeking approval to add an additional accessory structure, guard house, in the Middle School parking lot area concurrent with the request to retain the recreational structures already installed.

Due to the addition of a new structure, the Village held a public hearing on the revised submittal before the Planning Commission at the meeting held January 23, 2019. Upon receiving public comments and reviewing the submittal, the Planning Commission made a recommendation that the Village Council deny the site plan and the special land use requests. Procedurally, a public hearing on the special land use request must be held by the Council prior to issuing a decision on the requests for special land use and site plan approval. The Council meeting to be held March 5, 2019 is the first date a public hearing can be held within notification deadlines.

Suggested Motion

Village Council directs administration to notice a Public Hearing on March 5, 2019 to receive comments on request from Detroit Country Day School, 22305 W 13 Mile Road, for special land use approval to retain a playground and sports court and add a guard house at the Middle School grounds.

Background

Over the last two years the Public Safety Department has made changes to our fire operations to improve the delivery of services and our Insurance Service Office (ISO) rating. In 2017 Village Council approved Automatic Fire Aid Agreements with the City of Huntington Woods and the City of Berkley. This agreement helped improve our ISO rating from a five to a three.

Administration meets with neighboring departments monthly to ensure services and resources are deployed in an efficient manner. We review policies and conduct training together. Upon reviewing the resources of the Franklin-Bingham Farms Fire Department we found our Mutual Aid Box Alarm Card needed to be adjusted. The Franklin-Bingham Farms Fire Department agreed to provide resources outlined on our Mutual Aid Box Alarm Card. This department provides fire protection for the Village of Franklin and the Village of Bingham Farms.

The Franklin-Bingham Farms Fire Chief has requested the approval of an Automatic Aid Agreement between Village of Franklin and Village of Beverly Hills. This agreement would improve fire response and would help improve their ISO rating. The agreement is specific in nature as outlined in Section II. Response. I have had the opportunity to review the agreement with our Fire Marshal and the Deputy Director who agree this is in the best interest of both communities.

Suggested Resolution

Move to approve the Automatic Aid Agreement between the Village of Beverly Hills and the Village of Franklin to provide aid on a reciprocal basis for fighting fires and responding to emergency incidents occurring in the territory of either of the member communities.

AUTOMATIC AID AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE VILLAGE OF BEVERLY HILLS AND THE VILLAGE OF FRANKLIN

This Automatic Aid agreement ("Agreement") is executed of the date and set forth below among the Village of Beverly Hills, a municipal corporation located within the County of Oakland in the State of Michigan, having its principal office at 18500 Thirteen Mile Road, Beverly Hills, MI 48025; and the Village of Franklin, a municipal corporation located within the County of Oakland, in the State of Michigan, having its principal office at 32325 Franklin Road, Franklin, MI 48025 ("Members").

WHEREAS, the member municipalities each currently maintains its own separate fire apparatus, equipment, personnel, and;

WHEREAS, it is desirable and advantageous to the members to arrange for aid on a reciprocal basis for fighting fires and responding to emergency incidents occurring in the territory of any of the members, and;

WHEREAS, the members participate in the Oakland County Fire Mutual Aid Association and the Oakland County Mutual Aid Box Alarm System for fire services, both of which provide for rendering mutual aid among the participating municipalities for rendering fire and emergency medical services, and;

WHEREAS, the members desire to supplement and enhance those mutual aid agreements with respect to fire services as defined below;

NOW THEREFORE, pursuant to the provisions of the Urban Act of 1967, the Members agree to provide Automatic Aid as follows:

I. DEFINITIONS

- a. Fire Services Providing fire protection, fire suppression, hazardous materials response, or technical rescue.
- b. Incident A public Emergency, conflagration, serious threat to public safety or disaster.

II. RESPONSE

- a. Limits: This agreement shall apply to all incidents occurring within the member municipalities requiring a fire service response, including residential, commercial, industrial and recreational properties; and any other emergencies where the first fire response is provided by the Members within their own municipal boundaries or on a border road, as agreed upon by the Fire Chief or Public Safety Director of the affected jurisdiction.
- b. Situations where Automatic Aid is provided: All calls for confirmed structure fires within the Member municipalities shall result in an automatic, simultaneous response from the Members as assigned in the current Mutual Aid Box Alarm System agreement.

c. No Reimbursement for costs: Members shall not be required to reimburse each other for the cost of providing the fire services under this agreement. Each member shall be responsible for its own costs of responding to incidents.

III. PERSONNEL AND EQUIPMENT

a. Personnel and Equipment Provided: The Fire Chief/Public Safety Director, or their designee, for each agency shall establish a response plan regarding the deployment of personnel and equipment to incidents covered under this agreement. Any other required personnel and/or equipment will be determined by the Incident Commander in his sole discretion. In the event that a Member's responders arrive first at an incident and determine that the other Member's assistance is not needed, then they shall notify the other member to cancel or recall its response.

IV. INCIDENT COMMAND SYSTEM

a. Command at an Emergency Incident: The first arriving unit at any incident will establish an incident command management structure that is consistent with policy under the Oakland County Mutual Aid Box Alarm System agreement. All personnel will operate accordingly under the command structure established and will work at times in assigned sectors as directed.

The commanding officer of the assisting Member retains the right to withdraw, at any time, in their discretion, its personnel and equipment and is not obligated to keep its personnel and equipment in the requesting community for longer than the commanding officer of the assisting community deems necessary.

V. RADIO COMMUNICATIONS

a. Procedure to Dispatch Resources: The host jurisdiction's communications center will dispatch the designated agency, then immediately notify the responding Members communications center via the ALL DISPATCH frequency. Responding units to emergency fire incidents will switch their radio traffic to the appropriate fire talk group under the shared 800 MHz system as determined by the host jurisdiction's communications center.

VI. LIABILITY/INDEMNIFICATION

a. Waivers of Claims: Each Member waives the right and all claims against the other member for compensation or damages for any property loss or damage, and/or personal injury or death occurring as a consequence of the performance of this agreement. Each Member shall bear the liability and/or cost of damage to its equipment and the death of, or injury to, its personnel, whether or not the death, injury or damage occurs within or without of its boundary. To the extent allowed by Law, each member shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless all other Members for damages, claims demands, suits, judgements, costs and expenses arising from loss of or damage to

private property and/or death or injury to private persons caused by a Member department responding within the parameters of this agreement. Provided, however, nothing contained herein shall limit the immunity of a Member granted to it by law with respect to third parties.

- b. Emergency Incident Command: With respect to "Command at the Emergency Incident" as provided above, each Member waives all claims against the other members for compensation for any property loss or damage, and/or personal injury or death occurring as a consequence of any negligent acts, conduct, instructions or commands given by the individual that assumes command as the Incident Commander at any emergency incident. This provision shall not apply to any acts, conduct, instructions or commands given by an officer in the capacity of Incident Commander, which are later determined at any time to have been grossly negligent, wilful, wanton or reckless.
- c. No Third Party Beneficiaries: Except as expressly provided herein, this agreement does not create, by implication or otherwise, any direct or indirect obligation, duty, promise, benefit, right or indemnification or right of subrogation as to either member's rights in this agreement, or any other right in favour of any individual or legal entity.
- d. No Waiver of Governmental Immunity: All of the privileges and immunities from liability and exemptions from laws, ordinances and rules; and all pensions, relief, disability, worker's compensation and other benefits which apply to the activity of the Member and their officers, employees and agents when performing their representative functions within the territorial limits of their respective agencies, shall apply to the same degree and extent to the performance of such functions and duties of such Members and their officers, employees and agents extraterritorially under the provisions of this agreement. No provision of this agreement is intended, nor shall it be construed, as a waiver by either member or any governmental immunity as provided by law.
- e. Independent Contractor: The members agree that at all times and for all purposes under the terms of this agreement each party's relationship to any other party shall be that of an independent contractor. Responding units to emergency fire incidents will switch their radio traffic to the appropriate fire talk group under the shared 800 MHz system as determined by the host jurisdiction's communications center.

VI. LIABILITY/INDEMNIFICATION

a. Waivers of Claims: Each Member waives the right and all claims against the other member for compensation or damages for any property loss or damage, and/or personal injury or death occurring as a consequence of the performance of this agreement. Each Member shall bear the liability and/or cost of damage to its equipment and the death of, or injury to, its personnel, whether or not the death, injury or damage occurs within or without of its boundary. To the extent allowed by Law, each member shall indemnify, defend and hold

harmless all other Members for damages, claims demands, suits, judgements, costs and expenses arising from loss of or damage to private property and/or death or injury to private persons caused by a Member department responding within the parameters of this agreement. Provided, however, nothing contained herein shall limit the immunity of a Member granted to it by law with respect to third parties.

- b. Emergency Incident Command: With respect to "Command at the Emergency Incident" as provided above, each Member waives all claims against the other members for compensation for any property loss or damage, and/or personal injury or death occurring as a consequence of any negligent acts, conduct, instructions or commands given by the individual that assumes command as the Incident Commander at any emergency incident. This provision shall not apply to any acts, conduct, instructions or commands given by an officer in the capacity of Incident Commander, which are later determined at any time to have been grossly negligent, wilful, wanton or reckless.
- c. No Third Party Beneficiaries: Except as expressly provided herein, this agreement does not create, by implication or otherwise, any direct or indirect obligation, duty, promise, benefit, right or indemnification or right of subrogation as to either member's rights in this agreement, or any other right in favour of any individual or legal entity.
- d. No Waiver of Governmental Immunity: All of the privileges and immunities from liability and exemptions from laws, ordinances and rules; and all pensions, relief, disability, worker's compensation and other benefits which apply to the activity of the Member and their officers, employees and agents when performing their representative functions within the territorial limits of their respective agencies, shall apply to the same degree and extent to the performance of such functions and duties of such Members and their officers, employees and agents extraterritorially under the provisions of this agreement. No provision of this agreement is intended, nor shall it be construed, as a waiver by either member or any governmental immunity as provided by law.
- e. Independent Contractor: The members agree that at all times and for all purposes under the terms of this agreement each party's relationship to any other party shall be that of an independent contractor. No liability, right or benefit arising out of any employer/employee relationship, either expressed or implied, shall arise or accrue to either Member as a result of this agreement. Personnel dispatched to aid a member are entitled to receive benefits and/or compensation to which they are otherwise entitle under the Michigan Worker's Disability Act, any pension law or any act of Congress.

- f. Insurance: Each member shall maintain appropriate liability insurance and workers compensation insurance, including employers' liability coverage, in accordance with all applicable laws.
- g. Employee Benefits: Each member is responsible for the salaries, workers' compensation, retirement and other fringe benefits of its employees responding to an Automatic Aid Request.
- h. Term: This agreement commences on the effective date and shall continue until terminated in accordance with Section VII.

VII. TERMINATION

a. Termination of Agreement: Any member may withdraw from this agreement by giving thirty (30) days advanced written notice to the other member by certified mail.

VIII. LIMITED RIGHTS

a. Conferment of Rights: This agreement shall not confer any rights or remedies upon any person or entity other than the Members hereto.

IX. MISCELLANEOUS

- a. Execution of Agreement: This agreement may be executed in one or more counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original but all of which together will constitute one and the same instrument.
- b. Validity and Waivers: no amended or any provision of this agreement shall be valid unless the same shall be in writing and signed by each Member then signatory hereto. No waiver by any Member of any default, misrepresentation, or breach hereunder, whether intentional or not, shall be deemed to extend any prior or subsequent default, misrepresentation, or breach hereunder or affect in any way any rights arising by virtue of any prior or subsequent such occurrence.
- c. Effective Date: This agreement is executed and effective as of Friday, March 01, 2019

Notice of Construction

2019 14 Mile Road Construction

14 Mile Road will be under construction for most of the 2019 construction season, with traffic often limited to one lane in each direction. Motorists are encouraged to find alternate routes during construction, especially during rush hour. The following projects are scheduled:

Water Main Improvements (January through June)

The Southeastern Oakland County Water Authority (SOCWA) will be rehabilitating their water main on the south side of 14 Mile Road from Greenfield Road to west of Fernlee Avenue starting in late January. The City of Royal Oak will also be replacing the city's water main from Woodward Avenue to Cooper Avenue and from Mankato Avenue to the CN Railroad starting in March.

This work will require lane closures along 14 Mile Road from Greenfield Road to Delemere Boulevard, with only one lane open in each direction. Traffic is expected to be very congested and alternate routes are advised.

The water main work will include water main installation by drilling, water main lining, water main connections and water service connections to the new water main. Some areas of pavement and driveways will be removed for this work, and these areas will be temporarily restored with stone and asphalt. Permanent pavement repairs will be performed later in the summer as part of the road resurfacing project.

There will be temporary water shutoffs for connection of the water main, and affected properties will receive a door-hanger with the anticipated shutoff duration at least 24-hours in advance. Additionally, the water to individual properties will be shutoff for a short duration to connect the property's water service to the new water main.

14 Mile Road Resurfacing (June through November)

14 Mile Road will be resurfaced from Greenfield Road to Crooks Road after the water main work is complete. This work is being administered by the City of Royal Oak with federal funding under the direction of the Michigan Department of Transportation. As 14 Mile Road is a border roadway, work will take place in the cities of Royal Oak and Birmingham.

Work will include: Asphalt milling, concrete patching, and asphalt resurfacing of 14 Mile Road, replacement of damaged curb sections, installation of a traffic calming island at Coolidge Highway, replacing all noncompliant handicap sidewalk ramps at intersections, and re-striping the roadway.

This work will require lane closures along 14 Mile Road from west of Greenfield Road to Crooks Road, with one lane open in each direction.

Greenfield Road Traffic Signal

The Road Commission for Oakland County (RCOC) will be replacing the traffic signal at the intersection of Greenfield Road and 14 Mile Road. This work is not expected to significantly impact traffic since there will already be lane closures in place for the road project. RCOC tentatively expects to have this work performed throughout the spring and summer.

Woodward Avenue Traffic Signal Replacement

The Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) will be replacing the traffic signals at the intersection of Woodward Avenue and 14 Mile Road, along with several other signals along Woodward Avenue. This work is not expected to significantly impact traffic since there will already be lane closures in place for the 14 Mile road project. MDOT tentatively expects to have this work performed throughout the winter and spring.


<u>Driveway Access:</u> There may be periods of time where a side-street or driveway is temporarily blocked by construction operations. When this occurs, properties will be notified 24 hours in advance via door hanger.

<u>Landscaping</u>: Lawn areas disturbed by the contractor's operations will be replaced with topsoil and seed. Lawn restoration may not begin until after Labor Day, depending on the weather. The city does not replace special landscaping, brick, timbers, plantings or shrubs placed on city property or within the public utility easements. The contractor will make every effort to avoid damage to any specialty landscaping.

<u>Private Sprinkler Systems</u>: If your property has a sprinkler system that is located within the public right of way of 14 Mile Road, please contact the City of Royal Oak Engineering Division at 248.246.3260 or generaleng@romi.gov. We will try to avoid damage to the sprinkler systems when possible. The city is not obligated to repair private sprinkler systems located within the public right-of-way.

<u>Trash / Recycling Pickup</u>: There will be no change in the pickup dates and the trash and recycling will be taken care of as usual during the construction operations unless otherwise notified by the city.

The city realizes that this construction will be an inconvenience and all efforts to expedite this work will be utilized to minimize traffic conflicts and access to the various properties abutting the project.
