President George called the regular Village Council meeting to order at 7:30 p.m. in the Village Council Chambers located at 18500 W. Thirteen Mile Road, Beverly Hills, MI 48025. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited by those in attendance.

AMENDMENTS TO AGENDA/APPROVE AGENDA

BUSINESS AGENDA

PRESENTATION ON SOUTH EVERGREEN INTERCEPTOR REHABILITATION PROJECT FROM HUBBELL, ROTH, AND CLARK, INC.

Brad Shepler from Hubbell, Roth, and Clark, Inc. was in attendance and presented on the upcoming South Evergreen Interceptor Rehabilitation Project. There is a 54-inch interceptor beneath Evergreen Road that needs to be rehabilitated. The rehabilitation will consist of grouting around the outside of the pipe to seal leaks and repairing the concrete degradation to prevent further erosion. The project will require the closure of Evergreen Road between 14 Mile Road and Village Drive. The project is to begin on January 3, 2022 and will have a duration of 4 to 5 months.

Shepler presented a map of the road closures and discussed maintaining traffic. Evergreen will be closed, but the 14 residential driveways on Evergreen will have access. A one lane roadway will be provided and these residents have been notified separately. All side streets that intersect with Evergreen on this stretch will be closed. The intent of this maintaining traffic plan is to minimize

cut through traffic and promote worker safety. Residents in the surrounding area received a notice and traffic map in the mail. The notice and map can also be found on the Village website.

O’Gorman asked if the road signs could go up sooner rather than later since January 3rd is the first day back to school and people would appreciate advance notice.

Mooney thought the notice that was mailed out was good. He asked that there be increased enforcement on Beverly Road during the project.

Abboud stated the notice is on the Village website.

Tony Dellucci, Sunnyslope Drive, asked what the interceptor does. Shepler stated it carries sewage flow from the surrounding area down to 8 Mile Road.

DISCUSS RESIDENTIAL BACKFLOW PREVENTION PROGRAM

Keckskemeti stated that Hubbell, Roth, and Clark, Inc. has put together an outline of the ongoing discussions regarding backflow prevention.

Brad Shepler, HRC, Inc. gave a presentation on combined sewer area stormwater management. As an overview, the current system was designed in the 1940s and was designed to carry sewage and rainwater (“combined”). Intense storms are happening more often and basement backups in the combined sewer area may occur during intense rain events. The goal is to minimize the risk of basement backups.

Shepler discussed regional, local, and private options to mitigate basement backups. He suggested focusing on the local and private options. Local options included a relief sewer or a new storm sewer/partial separation. A partial separation in the GWK district would serve approximately 330 homes and cost about \$6.3 million. Private options include backflow preventers, sewage pump systems, footing drain disconnect, public education efforts, and cost sharing.

Keckskemeti went over the proposed Basement Backup Protection Pilot Program. Eligible homes would be in the combined sewer area with a basement. Eligible improvements would include backflow preventers, sewage pumps, and footing disconnects. Through the program, the Village would reimburse 50% up to \$2,500 for one of the eligible improvements. A plumbing permit, inspection, and waiver of future liability would be required to participate. The proposed initial funding would be \$250,000.

George stated that the Village has done everything to maintain the system and the sewers are up to standards. The Pilot Program would be a proactive approach to reducing the risk of basement backups.

Abboud asked how one would propose we educate residents, since public education was a highly recommended option. He suggested an MML Zoom webinar with experts.

Keckskemeti stated that there is information on the Village website. She proposed a workshop or webinar on infrastructure, different ways water gets into basements, and potential solutions. She suggested more information be added about this topic in the quarterly newsletter or calendar. She

would prefer the information by hyper local and specific to Beverly Hills. She stated that the Council does not have an obligation to do this program, but it would be nice for the residents.

Mooney asked for the reason why some houses flood and some do not. He asked if there is something systematic and how we would find out. He also noted these problems seemed to be occurring in an isolated area.

Shepler stated there are several possibilities including elevations and tree roots. He noted water will find the lowest point it can. A topographic survey could be done to find the elevations of the basements.

The Council discussed eligibility further. It was noted that a resident would not have to show that their basement has backed up before in order to be eligible.

The Council discussed potential impact on neighbors.

The Council discussed other options such as rain barrels, digging deeper ditches, and hydraulic pumps. Shepler noted that it is difficult to measure the benefit of low impact options like rain barrels.

Abboud stated that it is beneficial to televise sewer lines.

The Council asked specific questions about installing valves or backflow preventers. Shepler advised residents to speak with their plumbers and follow manufacturer's guidelines because every house could be different.

Keckskemeti stated she would like the Village to be prepared for the next rain event. The Council discussed gathering data and sharing information by way of door hangers.

O’Gorman asked about a capacity assessment to determine how much water went into basements during the last intense rain event.

Council discussed what other communities were doing, such as televising sewers, installing restrictor plates, and public education.

Council agreed there should be an affordability option for low-income residents should this program move forward. Hrydziuszko suggested looking at the City of Lansing’s similar program as an example.

Mooney expressed concern about spending public money on private home improvements and was uncomfortable with reports of raw sewage in basements. He was concerned that plumbers would inflate their costs if participating in the reimbursement program.

The Council discussed the option of using ARPA funding for this pilot program. George stated it is a public health issue.

Mooney thanked Shepler for attending on behalf of HRC and said the discussion was informative.

REVIEW AND CONSIDER DIRECTING ADMINISTRATION TO REQUEST PROPOSALS FOR CODIFICATION SERVICES

Rutkowski provided an overview. Codification is the editing, rearranging, and/or grouping of ordinances under appropriate titles, chapters, and sections. Standard practice is to recodify a municipal code about every ten years and the Village is overdue. Recodification can include a legal review for consistency with federal and state laws, supplements (such as an index and list of cross-references), recommended updates, and a general clean up of the existing code. Companies that provide codification services also provide web hosting services for codes that are user friendly and have advanced search features.

Administration believes recodifying the Municipal Code is in the best interest of the Village and recommends moving forward with obtaining bids for codification services.

Keckskemeti asked about updating the Building Code. Ryan clarified that the State Construction Code is automatically updated without required Council action.

Ryan stated improved searchability of the Municipal Code would be a benefit.

Motion by Abboud, second by Mooney, be it resolved, the Beverly Hills Village Council directs Administration to seek bids for codification services for the Village Municipal Code.

REVIEW AND CONSIDER PLANNING COMMISSION'S RECOMMENDATION TO NOT AMEND THE VILLAGE MASTER PLAN

Rutkowski provided an overview of the recommendation. The Michigan Planning Enabling Act (MCL 125.3845(2)) requires every community to review its master plan every five years. On February 24, 2021 the Planning Commission established a schedule to review individual chapters of the Village Master Plan. After a three months long thorough review and discussion, the Planning Commission decided at the June 23, 2021 meeting to focus on the implementation of the plan rather than opening it to amending. It was suggested and agreed upon, that implementation of the plan should be the focal point of our next Master Planning strategies. Furthermore, they agreed that Village staff shall formulate an action/work plan that includes implementation of the Master Plan along with other agreed upon planning priorities.

At their August 25, 2021 meeting, the Planning Commission passed a motion stating: in accordance with the Michigan Planning Enabling Act (MCL 125.3845(2)), the Planning Commission has held numerous public meetings where the five-year review of the Village Master Plan was discussed. As a result of said discussion, the Planning Commission hereby concludes no amendments are needed to the Village Master Plan and recommend to Council the same accordingly.

Excerpts from the Planning Commission meeting minutes were provided to the Council.

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conducting a five-year review in accordance with the Michigan Planning Enabling Act (MCL 125.3845(2)).

SET STRATEGY SESSION DATE FOR JANUARY 2022

The Council set a strategy session meeting date for Saturday, January 8, 2022 at 9:00 a.m. to be held in the Village Council Chambers located at 18500 W. 13 Mile Road, Beverly Hills, MI 48025.

DISCUSSION ITEMS

1. LANDSCAPE DESIGN RFP/COMMUNITY INPUT COMPONENT ON PARK #5 GOALS

George discussed creating a landscape design request for proposals bundle to include Park #5, the Southfield Road Corridor, and any other public property that that Council sees fit. George would like public input regarding Park #5 and proposed meeting at the park in February to gain feedback.

Mooney stated there is a list of landscape architects that could do this work. He suggested coordinating with Southfield Township on beautification along Southfield Road. He thought the Council should encourage walkability to Park #5 and he would like to see a new sign.

Hrydziuszko stated a subcommittee met at Park #5 and created a wish list that included a welcome sign. She said the park has limits given its size and location on a main road.

2. SCHEDULING DEPARTMENT UPDATES WITH VILLAGE MANAGER

George stated that Mooney suggested it would be good to get more frequent updates from each department in the Village Administration. George asked that Council be mindful that there are individuals serving in interim roles and it may be better to implement this once a new manager is hired.

Mooney stated he does not think the Council is kept in the loop enough regarding the Village Engineer. In addition to the budget and the audit, he would like more information from the Finance Department on things such as bond obligations and ARPA. He would like to know about new construction updates from the Building Department. He thinks Council should be introduced to new hires. He would like to know of any pending issues from the Village Attorney. Finally, he thinks that Council should be made aware of any serious issues from the Public Safety Department.

Kecskemeti agreed and she would appreciate these updates.

O’Gorman suggested putting some structure and cadence on the department updates. He would like feedback from Administration regarding the timing of updates.

COUNCIL COMMENTS

RESOLUTION OF SUPPORT FOR SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL

WHEREAS, the Village of Beverly Hills supports policies and programs that promote health and wellness and healthier community environments; and

WHEREAS, the health and safety of children is of highest concern to the residents of the Village of Beverly Hills; and

WHEREAS, walking and biking can help enhance the health and overall physical activity of children, improve air quality and the environment, and reduce traffic congestion and speed in and around school zones; and

WHEREAS, Safe Routes to School (SRTS) is a national and international movement to create safe, convenient, and fun opportunities for children to walk and bike to school; and

WHEREAS, SRTS efforts help remove barriers to walking and biking to school through improvement of infrastructure and facilities and the creation of education, encouragement, engineering, enforcement, and evaluation programs; and

WHEREAS, the SRTS program is a federally funded program administered in Michigan by the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT); and

WHEREAS, the SRTS program provides up to \$220,000 of infrastructure funds per school and requires a minimum local match of 20%; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Beverly Hills is applying for funds from the Safe Routes to School Program to construct certain infrastructure projects throughout the Village, including sidewalks, crosswalks, and signage to enable and encourage children to safely walk and bike to school. The project, also known as the Beverly Hills Safe Routes to School Connector Program, will provide safe walkable connections for the Beverly Elementary School, Our Lady Queen of Martyrs School, and Greenfield Elementary School by completing the sidewalk gaps impacting these educational facilities; and

WHEREAS, the total project construction cost is estimated at \$1,265,600 and the Village of Beverly Hills will seek a SRTS grant of \$660,000 (or \$220,000 per school); and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Village of Beverly Hills supports the Beverly Hills Safe Routes to School Connector Program and its construction to provide safe walkable connections for the subject schools.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Village of Beverly Hills commits to pay the local match of the SRTS grant for an amount equal to \$605,600 or approximately 48% of the construction costs.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Village of Beverly Hills commits to pay engineering services required to design and supervise the construction of the path or any non-participating costs required for the realization of the project.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Beverly Hills Village Council authorizes the Village Manager to act as an agent/representative on behalf of the applicant agency during project development, request SRTS funding, and sign a project agreement upon receipt of a funding award.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Village of Beverly Hills commits to being responsible for engineering for design and construction, permit fees, administration costs, potential cost overruns, and any non-participating items.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Village of Beverly Hills commits to owning/operating the facility constructed with SRTS funding and funding/implementing a maintenance plan/program in perpetuity or causing operations and maintenance to occur.
