BUSINESS AGENDA

DISCUSS 14 MILE ROAD IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM SCOPE OF WORK

Campbell provided an overview of the 14 Mile Road Improvement Program scope of work and cost options. At the May 3, 2022 Council Meeting, the Council approved a bid of \$1,537,817 to

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complete asphalt pavement repairs on 14 Mile between Evergreen and Cranbrook. The project also included the installation of a sidewalk on the south side of 14 Mile Road. Recently, the Village discovered that certain engineering costs and a contingency were not contained in the FY 2023 Budget numbers. Those costs will exceed the amount budgeted for the in Major Road Fund for the Project.

As of this date, the Village has not signed the contract with the contractor, and it is my understanding that the Agreement allows for changes to work. The Village Attorney is confirming that understanding to make sure the scope of work can be altered.

Work on the project is scheduled to begin the third week of June, and the Council will need to determine whether it intends to move forward with the current scope of work or an altered scope of work. Estimated budget numbers for completing the project with the road and sidewalk and completing just the road project were provided for Council's review.

George noted that the intent of the discussion was to talk about whether to take out sidewalks from the project or make a transfer of funds.

Mooney stated that he has been in favor of sidewalks along 14 Mile Road for quite some time. He provided some history on the sidewalk plan. He noted that the TAP grant has not been awarded for this project and he was concerned that residents are under the impression that the Village is not using Beverly Hills tax dollars for it. He wants to be straightforward with the residents. He said the Council's goal is to make the Village a more walkable community and they will be incrementally working toward that goal. He also stated that he thinks grant applications should be completed in house by Village staff.

Abboud stated that he would like to see the project move forward and that it is more cost effective to do the road and the sidewalk at the same time. He said kids, families, and seniors will all benefit from the new sidewalks and he would like to see Beverly Hills become a more walkable community.

George stated that he has hope that SEMCOG can help with the TAP grant. He said that the cost of sidewalks programs has increased substantially over the last decade and wished we started the grant process sooner.

It was noted that a budget amendment would be needed at a later date.

Motion by Hrydziuszko, second by Mooney, be it resolved, the Beverly Hills Village Council approves the scope of work set forth in the proposed contract with Asphalt Specialists, Inc. to perform the road work on 14 Mile from Lahser to Evergreen/Cranbrook and move forward with the installation of sidewalks along the south side of 14 Mile Road.

MANAGER'S REPORT

Interim DPW Director – While we are still seeking a new, permanent DPW Director, the Village hired an Interim Director, Tom Trice. Mr. Trice is the former DPW Director for Bloomfield Township and the City of Royal Oak. He has over 50 years of experience working with neighboring local governments. Mr. Trice will assist the Village with our summer projects, addressing residents' concerns/questions and assisting the Administration in the hiring of the permanent DPW Director.

July Newsletter – An extra Village Newsletter will be going out at the end of June or early July that will explain the required increases to the Village's water rates and debt services, informing residents of these changes. We will also include links to the information on the Village website and Facebook.

Construction Updates – Weather permitting, work on 14 Mile Road will likely be starting before the end of June. Additional updates will be posted on the Village's website and Facebook page. Further, weather permitting, the Beverly Park Pathway Improvements Project will begin and be completed by the end of this week. The Park Pathway Improvement Project consists of the installation and grading of the trails and the installation of pipes along the trails and four maintenance basins. Please be advised that there have been several trucks parking next to the water tower on Kirkshire. Those trucks belong to a contractor who is performing work for a Consumers Energy project in the Village.

Updated Stormwater Planning Standards – Administration will be participating in an Oakland County gathering on the County's updated stormwater standards as they relate to planning considerations needed early in the site planning process. Stormwater management is an important part of site development. The earlier stormwater is considered in the planning process, the easier it is to incorporate stormwater management practices on the site. WRC and many communities recently updated their post-construction stormwater standards in conjunction with the separate storm water sewer system (MS4) permit renewal.

Memorial Day Parade, Ceremony and Festivities – Thank you to all the employees, volunteers, parade participants, and residents for coming out to celebrate Memorial Day and remember the service men and women who died in service to our country.

Mooney asked Public Safety Director Torongeau about active shooter training given the recent events that have taken place nationwide. Torongeau stated that the Public Safety Department is well trained and has a good relationship with the Birmingham Police Department and Birmingham Public Schools. Mooney thanked the Director and the Public Safety Department for their continued efforts to keep residents safe.

COUNCIL COMMENTS

Peddie stated that the May Planning Commission meeting was cancelled.

Abboud stated that SEMCOG's General Assembly meeting will be later in June and that he has an Infrastructure Task Force meeting coming up. He talked about the MML's micro grant program called Bridge Builders and that the application period is June 13 to July 10. He stated that short term rentals should be qualified as businesses given the amount of revenue they bring in. He will be attending the Groves Convocation this Thursday. He attended the Memorial Day Parade,

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Carnival, and Ceremony and thanked Eileen from Next for chauffeuring him in her Camero. He thanked Public Safety, Administration, sponsors, and volunteers for making the event successful. He thanked the Men and women who gave their lives for this country.

Mooney said his intention is to contact the infrastructure and finance subcommittees to set up meetings soon. He said there was no question that the Village Council has the best interest of the Village in mind. He stated that he does not generally think that the Council should get involved with national politics unless it directly impacts the Village. He reminisced on days when schools served as community centers for residents. He noted that now the leading cause of death for school aged children is gun violence. He expressed his personal views on gun violence in the nation, noting that 2nd Amendment rights should not trump the rights to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. He said he was sick of the gun violence.

Hrydziuszko thanked Mooney for his comments and said that gun violence issues weigh heavily on her as a parent. She thanked the community and volunteers for coming back to participate in this year's Memorial Day festivities. She said Memorial Day is a celebration to those who laid down their lives for our country. She wished the community a happy Pride Month. She recognized all of the adults and youth who celebrate Pride Month. She stated that everyone is welcome in the Beverly Hills community.

George would like to get a meeting going with members of the Planning Commission, Council, Village Manager, and Village Attorney regarding short-term rentals. He said the Memorial Day celebration was fun and had a great turn out. He is glad to see an interim DPW Director coming on board. He noted the Municode contract process is moving forward. He wants to see sidewalks for the entire community and said they will help connect people to Next. He said he appreciated Mooney's words and struggles on how to address school shootings.

Re: FY 2022 Budget Amendments

Attached are proposed FY 2022 Village of Beverly Hills Budget Amendments.

In the General Fund there are revenue amendments adjusting to final property taxes received, \$12,000, amendments for building permits to adjust to a slower level of year end activity, (\$20,000), and an amendment to reflect a higher level of State Shared revenue, \$75,000, as well as other amendments adjusting to expected level of year end activity. There are expenditure adjustments to salaries, and benefits predominately relating to the open Public Service position, Interim Village Manager position and Interim Planning and Zoning position. The total salaries and related expenditure amendments are roughly \$100,000 decrease. Capital expenditures have been amended downward by \$11,000. No major General capital items were purchased in FY22. The effect of the amendments is a net of revenue and expenditure increase of \$259,027.

In the Major Road fund there are revenue amendments for additional State Shared revenue, \$25,000 and additional monies to be billed for work completed on the Federal 13-mile Road Project, \$55,000. There are also amendments to true up the estimated construction and engineering cost per HRC for final billing on 13-mile as well as engineering costs for the 14-mile Road Improvement Program. HRC is estimating we will incur (by June 30th of 2022) \$75,000 of the \$200,000 budgeted construction costs on the 14 Mile Road program. There is a \$125,000 budget amendment downward to reflect the revised construction cost estimate. There is a budget amendment to increase the 14-mile engineering cost of \$75,000 to the revised estimate of \$129,629. Other amendments adjust various line items to estimated actuals. The effect of the amendments is a net of revenue and expenditure increase of \$242,116 in Major Roads.

In the Local Road fund there is an amendment to adjust to a higher level of State Shared Revenue, \$10,000. There is an amendment to Concrete Replacement of \$26,000 for concrete work as well as an amendment of \$45,000 for engineering related to concrete projects. Winter maintenance has been decreased by roughly \$17,000 to adjust to final actuals. There are other expenditure line item amendments to adjust to estimated actuals at year end. The effect of the amendments is a net of revenue and expenditure decrease of \$10,817 in Local Roads.

In the Public Safety fund there are amendments adjusting to final property tax revenue, \$34,000, other revenue line items, (\$18,500) and an amendment for the Sale of 2 Police vehicles, \$19,000. There are amendments totaling \$230,000 reducing salaries and benefits for open positions and adjusting for forfeited terminated public safety employees Defined Contribution. Also, there are amendments to capital purchases adjusting expenditures downward by \$207,000. Due to supply issues, the budgeted capital was not able to be purchased in FY22. Capital will be purchased in FY23. The effect of the amendments is a net of revenue and expenditure increase of \$490,980 in the Public Safety Fund.

In the Park Improvement fund there is an amendment to include engineering costs on the park pathway as well as Park landscaping. The effect of the amendment is a net of revenue and expenditure decrease of \$20,000.

In the Capital Fund there are amendments decreasing the budgeted capital for the generator for the administration building that will not be installed by year end and an amendment for Oakland County radio equipment that was unavailable to purchase in FY22. The net of revenue and expenditure increase is \$85,000.

These proposed FY 2022 Budget Amendments have been reviewed by Village Administration and are recommended for approval.

Recommended Resolution

Be it resolved that the Village of Beverly Hills Council authorizes Village Administration to transfer or adjust monies reserved in the General, Major Roads, Local Roads, Public Safety, Park Improvement Fund and Capital Fund as reflected in the June 17, 2022, memorandum from Finance Director, Sheila McCarthy.

Construction Updates – Weather permitting, the Village offices have been informed that construction will begin on 14 Mile on Thursday, June 23, 2022. The traffic detours for 14 Mile will also start on Thursday, June 23, 2022. The estimated duration of the project is approximately 4 months. The Pathway Project in Beverly Park work was completed last week.

New Schedule for Chipping Services - The Village started providing free curbside chipping services to residents on a trial basis beginning in May 2021. This program allows residents to place branches by the side of the road on their normal trash day. Branches are then picked up during that week by Village staff for chipping and removal. The program has been well-received, and the Village would like to continue providing this service. To prevent cost overruns, the Village will be right sizing the program. Curbside chipping will take place during the week of the 4th Monday of each month, beginning in July of 2022. The first week of curbside chipping will begin on July 25th. Please note that branches will not be chipped except on the scheduled weeks. The new schedule will be posted on the Village website, the Village Facebook page, and will also be included in the extra newsletter that is going out to residents in the next two weeks.

5 Top Crypto Scams to Watch in 2022

From the "pig butchering" crypto scam to the classic pump and dump, watch out for these schemes.

With digital assets rising in popularity, there's no better time to familiarize yourself with common crypto scams.

[Cryptocurrency](#) crime soared 79% and hit an all-time high in 2021, with bad actors illicitly pilfering \$14 billion in funds last year, according to Chainalysis.

Crypto scams easily accounted for the biggest chunk of that total, while [stolen funds](#), mostly taken from cryptocurrency businesses, were the second-leading cause of loss.

With digital assets a growing part of the global financial ecosystem – [cryptocurrency](#) transaction volume surged 567% in 2021 to \$15.8 trillion – it pays to stay abreast of the various nefarious ways you can be duped, conned or victimized on the [block chain](#).

Here are some of the top crypto scams to watch for in 2022:

- "Pig butchering" crypto scam.
- "Pump and dump" crypto scam.
- "Rug pull" crypto scam.
- Airdrop crypto scam.
- Phishing crypto scam.

'Pig Butchering' Crypto Scam

At least some of the top crypto scams out there have colorful names. For victims of this cruel scam, however, the results are very serious.

This scam typically begins on online dating sites, where the scammer uses an attractive profile picture to lure in the "pig," then proceeds to "fatten up" the proverbial swine over a period of time via online messaging, with the victim steadily growing closer to and more trusting of the perpetrator.

The scammer eventually tells the victim about some huge gains they've made in cryptocurrency markets and gets their mark to follow along in some investments, which initially pay off handsomely on paper. Of course, the money is lost as soon as it's sent, with the scammer using phony sites to dupe their victim into sending greater and greater sums of money to this fake account.

Withdrawals prove impossible, and the "pig," now fattened up to the point of slaughter, is left in the wind. This type of scam is thought to have originated in China and is notable for its relatively long duration.

'Pump and Dump' Scam

"Pump and dump" scams aren't unique to cryptocurrency, but without the [regulation](#) enjoyed by stocks traded on major U.S. [exchanges](#), for instance, the Wild West of finance suffers with a good degree of fraud, including the pump-and-dump scam.

Such scams, which are also primed to occur in the stock market in [penny stocks](#), are characterized by a small group of insiders who own a given asset – in this case, a digital currency. These thinly traded assets are then hyped up through publicity, whether it be through social media, word of mouth or other forms of promotion.

When the unknowing [investing](#) public rabidly buys up the cryptocurrency, which is often newly issued with little trading history, the insiders begin to sell, or dump, the shares at high prices, sparking a steep sell-off and profiting at the expense of the duped masses.

In one case from June 2021, some members of FaZe Clan, one of the world's most popular esports organizations, were involved in promoting a new cryptocurrency called Save the Kids, with a portion of proceeds promised to charity. It took mere days for the coin to plunge, and the members of FaZe involved with the launch were all either suspended or removed from the group, which distanced itself from their activity.

The team member who was dismissed tweeted that he had "no ill intent" in promoting the cryptocurrency, but some investors accused the group of taking part in a pump-and-dump.

'Rug Pull' Scam

"One particular scam to avoid is 'rug pulls,'" says Vincent D'Agostino, head of cyber forensics and incident response at BlueVoyant. Rug pulls happen "when a cryptocurrency's promoters pump their new coin to get prices up before disappearing with the funds. [Investors](#) are left with a valueless token," D'Agostino says. "This especially happens with coins with zero fundamentals and no real future."

One key difference between a pump-and-dump scam and a rug-pull scam is that the latter often doesn't even allow the non-insider owners to sell, with the token coded in such a way

as to allow only insiders to exit. There are several other ways insiders execute these scams, which are specific to cryptocurrency.

The rug-pull scam got a lot of attention in late 2021, when a newly debuted cryptocurrency known as Squid Game – named after the suddenly popular Netflix Inc. (ticker: [NFLX](#)) series about a game in which all contestants are killed except one, who emerges with riches – lived up to its name and disallowed selling.

SQUID, the ticker for the coin, began selling at one cent, then rocketed above \$90, before immediately plunging back toward zero when the scammers "rugged" the masses.

Airdrop Crypto Scam

Another scam, prominent in the decentralized finance, or [DeFi](#), field, is related to something in crypto called an airdrop.

"More recently popular, nefarious actors have grabbed ahold of the popular trend of airdropping tokens, which is typically done to start and grow a grassroots community," says Alan Eschweiler, chief revenue officer at Stacked, a simplified crypto investing platform.

An airdrop literally drops tokens in your [digital wallet](#) as a reward for taking certain actions with [a given platform or software](#).

The scam works like this: "An entity will airdrop you a token that appears to have value, and when you go to exchange that airdrop for another more well-known token, you give a protocol more permissions than you realize," Eschweiler explains. This "allows the hacker to access all of the assets in your wallet," he says.

The simplest way to avoid this scam? "Never give an unknown user permission to your decentralized wallets," Eschweiler says, "without understanding the abilities you are granting this person."

Phishing Scam

One of the most common scams in cryptocurrency is the phishing scam, which, like the classic pump-and-dump, is not specific to digital currency. "Simply put, it means tricking the victims into revealing sensitive details like passwords, keys, etc.," says Marie Tatibouet, chief marketing officer at Gate.io, a digital cryptocurrency trading platform.

Keys refer to the "private keys" needed to open any secure [crypto wallet](#). It's equivalent to your password and is the only thing that gives you exclusive access to your funds. Phishing scams, which are also used in run-of-the-mill identity theft and various types of corporate fraud, often come via email, with scammers posing as some authority and asking for credentials. These schemes also proliferate on social media.

"Please do not click any random link that you see on Twitter," Tatibouet says. Often, "attackers promise riches and 'yields' in return for" sensitive information, Tatibouet warns.

"Double-check the Twitter handles or the Discord ID," Tatibouet says, referencing another popular communication platform. "Make sure that you are sourcing links from real and verified" accounts.

"It takes a bit of time, but it is extremely worth it," Tatibouet says.

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
