PUBLIC HEARING TO RECEIVE COMMENTS ON REQUEST FROM DETROIT COUNTRY DAY SCHOOL, 22305 W. 13 MILE ROAD, FOR SPECIAL LAND USE APPROVAL AND SITE PLAN APPROVAL TO RETAIN A PLAYGROUND AND SPORTS COURT AND ADD A GUARD HOUSE AT THE MIDDLE SCHOOL GROUNDS

The Village has received revised plans, dated December 13, 2018, from Detroit Country Day School (DCDS) for approval to keep a playground and basketball court on the Middle School grounds, and add a guard house in the Middle School parking lot. Village Ordinance, Section 22.14.030 requires special land use approval for accessory structures at a private school in a Single Family Residential Zone District. Additionally, Section 22.08.300 (j) requires any modifications to the site after approval that are not in accordance with the approved site plan to obtain special land use approval.

The Planning Commission held a public hearing on October 24, 2018 for plans submitted by DCDS to retain the playground and basketball court previously installed on the Middle School grounds. A recommendation on the request was postponed due to the incomplete submittal. In the interim, the school has revised their request and is also seeking approval to add an additional accessory structure, a guard house, in the Middle School parking lot area concurrent with the request to retain the recreational structures already installed.

Due to the addition of a new structure, the Village held a public hearing on the revised submittal before the Planning Commission at the meeting held January 23, 2019. Upon receiving public comments and reviewing the submittal, the Planning Commission made a recommendation that the Village Council deny the site plan and the special land use requests due to failure to demonstrate compliance with the Village Ordinance, Chapter 22, Section 22.08.300 Procedures and Standards for Principal Uses Permitted Subject to Special Conditions. Procedurally, a public hearing on the special land use request must be held by the Council prior to issuing a decision on the requests for special land use and site plan approval.

Detroit Country Day School has submitted plans for Council's review that also include an optional Landscape Plan that notes the addition of seven (7) Norway Spruce to be installed along the western border near the playground and sports court. Additionally, in the cover letter from Cunningham-Limp, they have requested the Village Council postpone decision to allow time for the school and property owners to come to a mutually agreeable resolution.

Provided for review are the cover letter, specifications for guard house and site plan submitted by Detroit Country Day School, the review letters from SAFEBuilt Studio dated October 15, 2018 and January 17, 2019, excerpts of the minutes of the October 24, 2018 and January 23, 2019 Planning Commission meetings, and the letter received in January 2019 from 63 residents in opposition to the project. Also included are correspondence sent to the Village upon request from the Michigan DEQ regarding work conducted on site, a copy of the approved site plan dated August 12, 2016, and excerpts of the minutes of the Zoning Board of Appeals, Planning Commission, and Council meetings held in 2016 relative to the approval of the variance, special land use, and site plan for the addition to the Middle School.

Peddie opened the public hearing at 7:44 p.m.

Sam Ashley, Cunningham-Limp, requested that the Council postpone their decision to allow for continued positive progressive discussion between DCD and the homeowners towards a resolution.

Natalia Petrazczuk, Lincolnshire, spoke on behalf of the Georgetown neighbors, expressing their support of the request for a postponement while conversation towards an agreement between them and DCD continues.

A letter from Jon and Amy Everly, Lincolnshire, in favor of the postponement was also submitted.

No one else wished to be heard, therefore Peddie closed the public hearing at 7:50 p.m.

Mooney questioned Ashley, confirming that DCD did not provide the items on their original site plan, and made a decision to construct the sports court and playground structure anyway.

Nunez voiced his dismay that DCD chose to circumvent input by the Planning Commission by not submitting the sports court and play structure with the original plans.

Abboud expressed his disappointment in the decisions by DCD, and his hope that a consensus with the neighbors could be reached.

Hrydziuszko reported that in their meeting the Planning Commission was adamant that they would not have approved the sports court or playground in their current location.

Mueller stated that regardless of the consensus reached between the neighbors and DCD, it would not supersede any decision made by the Planning Commission, and therefore would have to go back to the Planning Commission for review.

George questioned Ashley on the decision-making process that allowed this situation to happen, as well as expressed his desire to see the security report, contingent on a non-disclosure. Ashley explained that there were some minor changes made to the site plan that were approved by Village Administration related to the removal of a home, and addition of some brick. Based on that, the DCD team did not believe permission was needed for the playground and sports court, as they are not physical buildings.

Peddie expressed her frustration on behalf of the residents who are involved in this; had DCD gone through the proper procedure this would be a non-issue for them.

Motion by Peddie, second by Nunez, be it resolved that the Beverly Hills Village Council postpone decision on request from Detroit Country Day School, 22305 W. 13 Mile Road, for special land use approval and site plan approval to retain a playground and sports court and add a guard house at the middle school grounds, until April 16, 2019, to allow time for the school and property owners to come to a mutually agreeable resolution.

Tyler Tennant, legal counsel for DCD, submitted a letter related to the decisions made by DCD, and the continued discussions taking place between them and the residents on Lincolnshire. He further argued that DCD has taken responsibility for their violation of Village ordinances in Civil Court and therefore it has been resolved.

Ryan explained that the Council can vote to rescind their decision and conduct a new vote. The changed plans will be required to be submitted and reviewed in compliance with the Village ordinance site plan review requirements.

MANAGER'S REPORT

Beverly Park Buckthorn Project – The contractors for the buckthorn removal project at Beverly Park have made significant progress in the last two weeks. Village Administration was on site with the contractor for a walk through on Tuesday the 26th. There are areas of the project that are very sparsely populated with standing vegetation at this time. The is due to the predominance of buckthorn in these areas. According to the contractor, some of the areas had likely been growing

unchecked for 40+ years. It was also reported that the contractor encountered some of the largest buckthorn they had ever treated during this project.

The contractor is completing the mowing process this week and will begin treating the remaining stumps. The existing pathways are being cleared of debris and the shredded material is being cleaned and piled as space allows. I am hopeful that some of the larger debris can be chipped and used as material for the walking paths this season. The smaller debris that cannot be chipped will biodegrade.

With the area exposed there will likely be a lot of germination of existing seed bed this spring. This will result in some rapid regrowth of some areas of buckthorn. Accordingly, there will be another cutting in the spring followed by a broadcast treatment to eliminate this round of buckthorn. Once that is completed, the Village can begin with the planned replanting and reforestation project.

Per the recommendation of the contractor, a buffer area along residential areas on Mayfair have been spot treated but not cut and removed at this time. The contractor suggested, and Village Administration agreed that it was best to treat these areas to kill the buckthorn, but leave the plants standing as they are to create a bit of a buffer from the sparser areas. As this buckthorn has been treated it will not spread to the areas that were totally removed. The treated plants in the buffer area will either eventually fall or if needed can be cut down and/or removed later; hopefully after some successful regrowth has taken place to lessen the transition to residential yards.

Another issue that has been brought up by Comeau is that some of the areas that have been cut have exposed some old dead ash trees. These trees are now exposed to more wind than before and are at greater risk of failure. Village Administration plans to work with Comeau to identify these trees and have them felled for safety.

Overall, the project will be successful in removing the expansive overgrowth of buckthorn and eventually providing a situation than can be adequately addressed by the Village. In the interim there will be a period of a drastic reduction in overall vegetation. The buckthorn growth was at a stage in some areas that removal of all the buckthorn left very little behind. This can and will be remedied over time, but it will require some patience.

Old McDonald's Site – Late this week the Village received a site plan from Robertson Brothers Builders for a residential development on the site of the old McDonald's property. Village Administration and SAFEbuilt are in the preliminary stages of reviewing the proposed development.

SOCWA and SOCRRA Quarterly Reports – Attached please find the most recent quarterly reports for the Southeastern Oakland County Water Authority (SOCWA) and SOCRRA.

Re: Ordinance to add Chapter 45 Marihuana Establishments

The Village Attorney has prepared the attached draft language pursuant to the requirements of the Michigan Regulation and Taxation of Marihuana Act to prohibit commercial recreational establishments in the Village of Beverly Hills. The Village is required to take formal action to opt-out of allowing commercial recreational marihuana establishments; however this will not disallow individual use as is permitted in the Act. Additionally, the Village's decision to not allow commercial medical marihuana establishments remains unchanged.

Procedurally, the Village Council must hold first and second readings prior to adoption. Upon adoption by Council, the language will take effect 20 days after publication.

AN ORDINANCE TO ADD CHAPTER 45 MARIHUANA ESTABLISHMENTS OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE VILLAGE OF BEVERLY HILLS, OAKLAND COUNTY, MICHIGAN, TO PROHIBIT MARIHUANA ESTABLISHMENTS AS DEFINED IN THE MICHIGAN REGULATION AND TAXATION OF MARIHUANA ACT, AND PRESCRIBE A PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS.

THE VILLAGE OF BEVERLY HILLS ORDAINS:

<u>Section 1.01</u>. Chapter 45 shall be added to the Municipal Code of Ordinances of the Village of Beverly Hills, as follows:

Section 45.01 Chapter 45 Marihuana Establishments

Pursuant to Section 6.1 of the Michigan Regulation and Taxation of Marihuana Act, the Village of Beverly Hills completely prohibits marihuana establishments, as defined in the Act, within the Village's municipal boundaries.

<u>Section 2.01.</u> <u>Severability</u>. This ordinance and each article, section, subsection, paragraph, subparagraph, part, provision, sentence, word and portion thereof are hereby declared to be severable, and if they or any of them are declared to be invalid or unenforceable for any reason by a court of competent jurisdiction, it is hereby provided that the remainder of this ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

<u>Section 3.01</u>. <u>Penalty</u>. All violations of this ordinance shall be municipal civil infractions and upon a determination of responsibility therefore shall be punishable by a civil fine of not more than \$500.

<u>Section 4.01</u>. <u>Effective Date</u>. The provision of this Ordinance shall become effective 20 days following its publication in The Eccentric, a newspaper circulated within said Village.

• IDENTITY THEFT UPDATE: Warning Signs of Being Victimized

- Could you be a victim of identity theft? About 10 million Americans a Year have their personal information compromised. Often, the stolen Information is used to take over accounts, open credit cards or obtain medical care long before the theft is ever discovered. While many people first find out about identity fraud from their financial institutions, there are some red flags that indicate your personal information may have been stolen and used for fraudulent purposes. Every 2 seconds, an American becomes a victim. Watch for the following warning signs to make sure you don't fall prey.
 - 1. Unexplained charges or withdrawals. Check your financial account statements each month and be sure you recognize the transactions. Thieves will often make small test purchases first, so don't ignore small charges that seem unfamiliar.
 - 2. Medical bills for doctors you haven't visited. Likewise, if your Health insurance carrier denies a legitimate claim, find out why. It's possible for a thief to use your identity to obtain medical care or max out your insurance benefits.
 - 3. New credit cards you didn't apply for. If you receive an unexpected credit card in the mail, contact the company issuing the card right way. Similarly, any statements that arrive for unknown accounts are a red flag.
 - 4. Errors on your credit report. Review your credit reports for any suspicious activity, such as accounts you didn't open. (You can review your reports for free once a year at annualcreditreport.com.)
 - 5. Collection notices or calls for unknown debt. Don't assume the information is an error. Find out what the debt is for. If you believe the debt isn't valid, send a letter via certified mail to the collection agency requesting proof of the debt and creditor within 30 days.
 - 6. Your credit card or application for credit is denied. If you haven't reached your credit limit or normally have good credit, ask the reason for the denial. An identity thief may be racking up debt on your behalf or ruining your credit score with unpaid bills.
 - 7. Missing mail or email. Haven't seen a monthly statement in a few months? A thief could be stealing your mail or may have changed the mailing or email address on the account to keep you from seeing fraudulent charges. Alternately, you may receive a

notice from the post office that your mail is being forwarded to another address when you haven't requested a change of address.

- 8. Errors on your tax return or Social Security statement. The Internal Revenue Service may notify you that more than one tax return was filed in your name or that you have income from an employer you don't know. Check that the earnings reported on your Social Security statement (available at socialsecurity.gov/myaccount) match your actual earnings.
