Local and National Elections November 8th

Finally, it's the home stretch of this latest election season. The national election as well as Bingham Farms' local election will take place on **Tuesday**, **November 8th**.

On the national scene, voters will elect a new President, Vice President, and representatives to Congress.

On the state scene, there will be a bevy of positions up for election from state representatives and to judges.

However, there's an important election on the local level whereby three residents of Bingham Farms are looking to become part of the Village Council. They are Carl Grenadier, an incumbent, Carole Chiamp, currently serving on the Village Planning Commission, and Ben Templeton, a newer resident who is interested in the government of the Village.

The precinct for Bingham Farms' voters is Bingham Farms Elementary School. Polls will be open from 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.

Applications for an absentee

ballot may be obtained through Southfield Twp. located at 18850 Thirteen Mile Rd. in the Beverly Hills complex.

The last day to register to vote in the November election is October 11th. Stop by Southfield Twp. or any Secretary of State office to register.

Winter Maintenance

One of the major problems the Village faces each year is with snow removal, especially residents and/or their contractors who plow snow from the driveway across the street onto a neighbor's property. What remains are called snow rows.

These snow rows can freeze and cause problems with the Village's snow plow contractor, pedestrians and public safety vehicles.

This procedure is against Village ordinance. Years ago, Council passed an ordinance that prohibits snow to be deposited on another property, public or private. Violations can be ticketed.

It is important that residents inform

their private snow removal contractors that the snow that falls on your property must stay on your property.



The Village

will continue its contract this winter season with Johnson Landscaping to provide snow removal services and salt applications on Village roads.

The snow plows are called out as soon as 2 inches have fallen on the roads. In heavy storms, the contractor will plow several times to keep the roads passable.

The Village will request additional work when conditions warrant. The decision to plow and salt the roads is based on the assessment of the police department. Similar

Large Item Pick Up Scheduled

It's TIME again. The Village's semi-annual, no charge, large item pick up will take place on Thursday, October 6, 2016. Items must be out at the curb by 7:00 A.M.

The purpose of this event is to give residents the opportunity to dispose of large items such as sofas, chairs, washing machines and similar large items.

All you have to do is bring the items to the street, right along with your regular trash. Car Trucking will haul it away. Then it's gone...for good. Better yet, there are no extra charges.

The contractor also picks up freezers and refrigerators if doors and the Freon are removed prior to placing them at the street. Car Trucking is not licensed to remove Freon or transport appliances that have Freon in them.

DTE has resumed offering appliance recycling of old WORKING refrigerators and freezers. They recycle

95% of these old units and that's good for the environment. If you meet certain requirements, you could get a check too. To find out more call DTE at 1.866.796.0512

Battle Against the West Nile Virus Continues

It just won't go away; the West Nile Virus that is. So far this year, 5 blood donors tested positive for the virus. As of September, 22 people have been confirmed to have the West Nile Virus, 3 in Oakland County..

Last year, there were 18 cases in Michigan with 2 deaths

These events make it so important to take precautions that will limit

the number of human infections.

The incubation period from bite to symptoms ranges from 2 to 14



days. Most people infected with West Nile do not show any symptoms. Twenty percent however, have flu-like symptoms, including fever, fatigue, headache and muscle or joint pain. Less than 1% of infected humans become severely ill.

The fact that people are still coming down with the virus, shows that West Nile Virus remains a problem. There are still plenty of mosquitoes carrying the virus. Prevention measures do work. The best advice — keep doing what you can to avoid those pesky mosquitoes.

The Oakland County Health Department recommends that folks take steps to:

- Reduce areas where mosquitoes breed.
- Repel to protect against mosquitoes, and
- Report potential mosquito breeding

areas.

Other measures that can reduce the risk of contracting the virus include:

- Repair all holes in window and door screens to keep mosquitoes out of your home.
- Empty water from mosquito breeding sites such as buckets, barrels, cans and old tires.
- Avoid being outdoors when mosquitoes are most active (dawn and dusk).
- Wear light colored, long-sleeved shirts and long pants when outdoors
- Apply insect repellants that contain DEET to exposed skin or clothing. Always follow the manufacturer's directions for use. Do not apply repellent containing DEET on children less than two years of age.

If you find any dead birds, report your findings to the Oakland County Health Division Hotline at 1-877-377-3641. Then properly dispose of the bird. Wear gloves to protect yourself from direct contact with the bird.

U.S. police make over eleven million arrests every year that go without remark yet when a handful go south, it so poisons the atmosphere that all that good is forgotten. As a consequence the nation has seen targeted killings of police officers, police officers less likely to vigorously enforce the law in several major cities, and a material decline in the number of individuals entering the law enforcement field that has already produced hiring difficulties.

We can, and do, provide the Franklin-Bingham Farms Police and Fire Department with the resources they need and wish we could do more. These individuals risk their lives daily to protect us.

Your Village Council would like to recognize the great work of our Police Officers and Firemen. We publicly thank the personnel of both departments for their outstanding service. If you want to express your support personally, Councilor Larry Freedman suggests rolling down the car window, waving and saying thank-you when your see one of our public safety personnel.

A delegation of our Police Officers attended the funeral of recently slain Detroit Police Sergeant Kenneth Stiel to express their condolences and solidarity. Forty-six years old, murdered with a shotgun, he was a husband and father of two boys, ages 3 and 5.

Council formally expressed their support and respect for fallen Sergeant Stiel at the September meeting.

Council Passes New Design Ordinance

The Village Council recently passed a zoning ordinance amendment setting up new guidelines for review of new home construction and major additions.

The new guidelines put into place certain principles outlined in the Village's Master Plan and establish clearer measures for plan review. Besides residential reviews, guidelines are also established for the Pro-

fessional Services and Commercial Districts.

On the Residential side, an applicant



must meet at least five of the following eight guidelines.

- 1. New homes should respect the form, bulk, and size of characteristic homes in their neighborhood, and should have comparable setbacks. A house's bulk, which is a function of its height, floor area, and proximity to the street, should not exceed that of nearby characteristic homes
- 2. The proportion between a house's footprint and lot area should be similar to that of characteristic neighborhood homes.
- 3. New homes should be built as a central section with side wings.
- 4. For a new residence, the maximum number of recommended stories is two. A story that is less than 75% of the floor below is considered a half story. Half stories on characteristic homes typically feature dormer windows.
- 5. Both front and side setbacks should be generous, fostering a country-like setting.
- 6. Side setbacks should correspond with the side yard dimensions of characteristic neighborhood homes.

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Signs, Signs, Signs

With the National elections right around the corner, it's important for Village residents to understand the rules for political signs per Village ordinance.

Only one political sign per candidate or issue is allowed. (Sec. 98.02(E).) Political signs in Residential areas cannot exceed 3



square feet in area. These signs may not be placed in the public right of way.

All signs must be removed within 5 days after an election.

Real estate signs are allowed (Sec. 98.02 A (2)). These signs cannot exceed 3 square feet in area. These signs shall be at least 12-feet away from all street lines.



Contractor signs are not allowed. (Sec. 98.02(D)). This includes painting, window, paving companies etc.

It is very possible that any illegal signs will be removed by the Village Code Enforcement Officer.

Reminders

For new residents, there's a substantial learning curve as to the do's and don'ts per Village ordinance. The following gives a sneak peek of what you should know.

Home Renovations - any change to the outside of the house usually requires approval from the Design Review Board.

Permits - required for electrical and plumbing as well as roofing. The City of Southfield Building Department issues these permits along with roofing permits. This is per an agreement between the Village and the City of Southfield.

Driveways - any driveway work requires a permit from the Village. This is for new driveways, repair work and sealcoating. If you are putting in a new driveway or extending an existing one, please remember driveway widths (in most cases) cannot exceed 12-feet.

It is always best to check in with the Village office to avoid delays in

projects. A simple call can save you time and money.

SIGNS

Contractor signs ARE NOT ALLOWED.

Political Signs are allowed on residential properties. They must be removed within 5 days after the election.

RUBBISH PICK UP

Rubbish pick up is on Thursdays. Have trash cans at the road by 7:00 a.m.

RECYCLING

The Village contracts with **SOCRRA** to handle the Village's Recycling materials and Household Hazardous Waste. The facility is located on Coolidge Rd. in Royal Oak. It is between 14 Mile & Maple Rd.

Simple Recycling is a for profit company which takes items bound for the landfill and finds alternate sources to dispose of the items.

Adult Services Renovation

The Adult Services area of the Baldwin Library will be renovated this fall and winter. The renovation, which is expected to last six months, will bring the following enhancements:

- *Improved acoustics, energy efficiency, infrastructure, wayfinding, and lighting;
- *More natural light, let in by new exterior windows along the curved wall on the southwest side of the Building:
- *Exposure of the original brick color of the 1927 building

Be Prepared

It seems Bingham Farms and some of our surrounding areas are the target areas for power outages. Parts of Bingham Farms have lost power four times since April.

It is imperative for every person to call in to DTE and report their outage. The more calls they receive, the better idea they have of the extent of the outage. Do not assume your neighbor has called it in. Everyone should. The number is **800-477-4747** or via computer at **dteenergy.com** and click on Report Power Outage.

Here are some helpful hints to make sure you are ready for the next outage.

- Check the batteries in all your flashlights to make sure they work.
- If you have portable generators, make sure they are in good condition and ready to be fired up. Place them in an open area so no carbon monoxide enters your home.
- Have at least a 3-day supply of water in case there is an interruption.
- Disconnect your major appliances so they won't succumb to a power surge when the power returns.

This last storm created many dangerous situations in several areas of the Village. The weather folks say a lot of the damage was caused by a microburst, a downdraft in a thunderstorm.

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Virginia Creeper and Other Pesky Vines Creeping into the Village

When you're walking down any road in the Village, take a careful

look at the trees and notice vines intertwined with the leaves and branches.



Most of these vines are similar to what is

known as Virginia Creepers. It's a climbing vine that can reach 50-feet in height. It is a fast growing vine and if not controlled, can eventually choke a tree. Getting rid of them is not easy. The recommended way is to cut the vine at

the root, if you can find it.

Then put the strongest amount of RoundUp that can be purchased and apply it to the fresh cut. Even after doing this, keep an eye out for new growth as this vine is aggressive.

The organic way to remove them is to dig them out. However, this is very difficult to do as the vines spread in all directions. The vines are sticky and you might have to really tug at the vines to remove them from the tree. They can easily come back.

This is an ongoing battle and one residents will have to fight for a number of years and be vigilant even after you think you've gotten rid of them.

It's also not uncommon for drivers to push oncoming cars further to the side of the road because they don't want to wait for walkers to get by. The drivers just squeeze between the walkers and oncoming cars. This might save them a few seconds but it jeopardizes everyone's safety. Kindly slow down.

How to Dispose of CFL & LED Light Bulbs

Did you know that CFL & LED Light Bulbs contain hazardous materials? Did you know those burned out bulbs can be returned to mega stores such as Lowe's and Home Depot? And it's free disposal.

While the
Village participates in
a Household Hazardous Waste Program
with SOCRRA (South
Oakland Resource
Recovery Authority) on Coolidge
Highway, it costs the Village \$30 per
car. Recently, a resident dropped off 3
of these bulbs. That's it. The cost to

the Village was \$30.

For economic reasons, please wait until you have a number of other products before dropping off light bulbs to SOCRRA.

Better yet, just bring them to a local Lowe's or Home Depot store and drop them in the recycling bins at any time and there is no charge.

Was This A Dry Summer or What?

What a summer! It was so difficult keeping the flowers thriving without much rain.

According to the Southeaster Oakland County Water Authority, rainfall was way below average and even below last year.

As measured at their Webster Pumping Station, rainfall equaled:

June - August 2016 2015 30 yr. avg. 6.2" 6.8" 8.69

Year-to-date, rainfall has totaled 12.9" compared to the average rainfall of 19.84 inches, 7 inches below average.

Single Stream Recycling Coming Soon

Single Stream Recycling may be coming to the Village of Bingham Farms as early as July 2017.

It's a single-sort process in which all paper fibers, plastics, metals, and other containers are mixed in a col-

lection truck, instead of being sorted by the depositor into separate commodities

(newspaper, paperboard, corrugated fiberboard, plastic, glass, etc.) and handled separately throughout the collection process.



This means that Village residents will be required to use special recycling containers that most probably will be picked up by an apparatus attached to the truck. *The current bins will no longer be used.*

The Village Council will be working with other municipalities relative to the cost of the program, procedure for ordering the new containers and method of payment.

For now, keep the containers you have and if at all possible, wait before purchasing new ones.

We'll keep everyone informed as new information becomes available.


- 7. Homes should not use minimum setback standards to establish their maximum desirable footprint.
- 8. The front yard setback of an infill house should be equivalent to the average front setback of homes within 200 feet on the same side of the street; this may permit a front setback that is less than the minimum required for the applicable zoning district.

DTE Resumes Appliance Recycling

It was a pretty popular program and then DTE discontinued it. Recycling old appliances that are still in working condition. Now the program is back.

It's the easy way to clean up and save. If you have an old refrigerator or freezer that still works, DTE

Energy will recycle it for free and mail you a \$50 check. Add an air conditioner or dehumidifier with your old refrigerator or freezer and they



will throw in an additional \$20. By getting rid of that energy guzzler, program participants could start saving upwards of \$150 a year on their energy bill.

*Never approach or touch a coyote

*Never intentionally feed a coyote

*Eliminate all outside food sources, especially pet foods

*Put garbage out the morning of pickup day

*Do not allow pets to roam free when coyotes are present.

Recycling News

There are actually two ways for residents to recycle.

1. Roadside Pick Up

Roadside Pick Up is a weekly service provided by the Village.

Residents place recyclables in a bin. Items do not have to be separated as the hauler separates items at the street.

Simple Recycling Program Takes Off

It's been six months since the Village began an additional source for keeping materials out of landfills.

Simple Recycling is a company that circles the Village on Thursdays and picks up those green bags at the street. These bags contain items that one deems too worn to give to the Salvation Army or other non-profit agencies.

These materials can be used clothing, small kitchen appliances, old dishes etc. Simple Recycling takes these items to a sorting location, separates what can go to places like the Salvation Army and then works with other groups who take acceptable items to distribute to third world countries. What doesn't fit the criteria will end up in a landfill, but it's far less.

Here's how the numbers shake out for what residents of Bing-

BURNING LEAVES IS ALLOWED IN THE VILLAGE Regulations (Chapter 50.02)

- 1. Do not burn leaves, grass or rubbish on any paved or bituminous surfaced street;
- 2. Do not burn any type of refuse where smoke, ashes or odor will create a nuisance, public or private;
- 3. Do not burn rubbish closer than 15 feet to a building;
- 4. Do not leave a fire unattended.

ham Farms have mostly kept out of landfills so far.

February 530 lbs.

March 1,024 lbs.

April 924 lbs.

July 1,031 lbs.

That totals just over 4500 lbs. of materials that, for the most part, avoided the landfill heap and helped a lot of people in need.

LARGE ITEM PICK UP REGULATIONS

Date: Thursday, October 6, 2016

Time: All items at street by 7:00 a.m.

ACCEPTABLE ITEMS

- Large appliances, furniture and hot water heaters (Refrigerators & freezers must have Freon removed prior to placement at the street)
- Only small tree stumps
- Brush and tree branches must be bundled and the length should not exceed four feet
- Rolls of carpet and linoleum must be tied together with the length not to exceed four feet
- Disposal of construction materials is limited to one 32-gallon trash container

UNACCEPTABLE ITEMS

- Large tree stumps
- Hazardous waste
- Tires
- Automotive parts
- Loose gravel
- Large amounts of construction material & loose items

Large items such as appliances and furniture may be placed at the street the weekend before the pick up.

Car Trucking has the right to refuse to pick up excessive amounts of materials. If you have a large quantity of items, please call Car Trucking at 586-791-8480 and make special arrangements to rent a dumpster.



Change Your Clocks! Change Your Batteries!

Spring forward and fall back. This time of year is when we can garner an extra hour of sleep.

Turn your clocks back one hour on **November 6th**. Or as many do, turn them back before you go to bed on Saturday night. Eastern Standard Time begins at **2:00 a.m. November 6th.**

Unfortunately, it also means that shorter days are coming and another Michigan winter is not far away.

While changing your clocks, remember to change the batteries in your smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors.

Be proactive. Take a few minutes to make sure all your detectors are working. It might not just save your house, it may also save YOU.

Will Your Mailbox Hold Up This Winter?

There's an easy test. If your mailbox is on a post, just shake the mailbox. If the mailbox or post is loose, take the time now to tighten screws and secure the posts.

Every winter there are a few residents who complain that the snowplow knocked over their mailbox. Eric Wilson, Chairman of the Road Commission says

"In most cases, the snowplow doesn't actually hit the mailbox. The force of snow thrown from the roadway is enough to knock down a loose mailbox".

So, if you're putting up a new roadside mailbox, it should be 36 to 42 inches off the ground and the post should be 8 to 12 inches behind the shoulder or curb. The mailbox should not protrude into the road.
