New Recycling Program Off to a Strong Start

Single Stream recycling has arrived. Last month a new recycling cart was delivered to every residence in Bingham Farms. It's bigger and on wheels, so you just have to roll it out to the street.

Plus, there's no sorting. Newspapers, magazines, glass, cans etc. all go into the one container. No more lugging the old containers to the street.

The carts provide greater capacity too; meaning less materials going to the landfills.

Not all the recycling trucks have been retrofitted with the automatic arms so the carts, at times, will continue to be emptied by hand. The ultimate goal is to have this process fully automated.

There are a few tips to get residents used to the carts and ready for full automation.

1. On the cover of the cart, it

says, "This side facing street". Put that side facing the street.

2. Cardboard boxes are to be placed inside the recycling cart. All boxes must be cut down to a 3'x3' size, otherwise they may get stuck inside the cart.

Due to a grant received from the MDEQ, residents will not be charged for the carts. But this means the carts are tied to

the residence, not the resident. Should you move, leave the cart behind for the new owner.

Large Item Pick Up Scheduled

It's TIME again. The Village's semi-annual, no charge, large item pick up will take place on Thursday, October 5, 2017. Items must be out at the curb by 7:00 A.M.

The purpose of this event is to give residents the opportunity to dispose of large items such as sofas, chairs, washing machines and similar large items.

All you have to do is bring the items to the street, right along with your regular trash. Car Trucking will haul it away. Then it's gone...for good. Better yet, there are no extra charges.

The contractor also picks up freezers and refrigerators if doors and the Freon are removed prior to placing them at the street. Car Trucking is not licensed to remove Freon or transport appliances that have Freon in them.

DTE has resumed offering appliance recycling of old WORKING refrigerators and freezers. They recycle

95% of these old units and that's good for the environment. If you meet certain requirements, you could get a check too. To find out more call DTE at 1.866.796.0512.

There are also several companies who remove Freon for a fee.

The large item pick up is not an opportunity to clean out the attic or basement, or for residents

Winter Maintenance

One of the major problems the Village faces each year is with snow removal, especially residents and/or their contractors who plow snow from their driveway across the street onto a neighbor's property. What remains are called snow rows.

These snow rows can freeze and cause problems with the Village's snow plow contractor, pedestrians and public safety vehicles.

This procedure is against Village ordinance. Years ago, Council passed an ordinance that prohibits snow to be deposited on another property, public or private. Violators can be ticketed.

It is important that residents inform

their private snow removal contractors that the snow that falls on your property must stay on your property.



The Village

will continue its contract this winter season with Johnson Landscaping to provide snow removal services and salt applications on Village roads.

The snow plows are called out as soon as 2 inches have fallen on the roads. In heavy storms, the contractor will plow several times to keep the roads passable.

The Village will request additional work when conditions warrant. The decision to salt the roads is based on the assessment of the police department. Similar

Battle Against the West Nile Virus Continues

It just won't go away; the West Nile Virus that is. As of September, 16 people have been confirmed to have the West Nile Virus, 1 in Oakland County.

Last year, at this time, there were 22 cases in Michigan, 3 in Oakland County.

These events make it so important to take precautions that will limit the number of human infections.

The incubation period from bite to symptoms ranges from 2 to 14 days. Most people infected with West Nile



do not show any symptoms. Twenty percent however, have flu-like symptoms, including fever, fatigue, headache and muscle or joint pain. Less than 1% of infected humans become severely ill.

The fact that people are still coming down with the virus shows that West Nile Virus remains a problem. There are still plenty of mosquitoes carrying the virus. Prevention measures do work. The best advice — keep doing what you can to avoid those pesky mosquitoes.

The Oakland County Health Department recommends that folks take steps to:

- Reduce areas where mosquitoes breed.
- Repel to protect against mosquitoes, and
- Report potential mosquito breeding areas.

Other measures that can reduce the risk of contracting the virus include:

- Repair all holes in window and door screens to keep mosquitoes out of your home.
- Empty water from mosquito breeding sites such as buckets, barrels, cans and old tires.
- Avoid being outdoors when mosquitoes are most active (dawn and dusk).
- Wear light colored, long-sleeved shirts and long pants when outdoors.
- Apply insect repellants that contain DEET to exposed skin or clothing. Always follow the manufacturer's directions for use. Do not apply repellent containing DEET on children less than two years of age.

If you find any dead birds, report your findings to the Oakland County Health Division Hotline at 1-877-377-3641. Then properly dispose of the bird. Wear gloves to protect yourself from direct contact with the bird.

who asked not to have the carts for various reasons. For now, the old bins are acceptable.

Letter from the President

Back in March, a series of questions were posed to our Police Chief Dan Roberts. The purpose was to give residents a sense of the caliber and commitment of our police officers. This is a continuation of that Q&A.

How is our staffing level versus communities relative to other departments?

The Franklin – Bingham Farms Police Department is smaller in size to most other area departments. We have 10 full-time sworn officers and funding for 4 part-time officers. We currently have two part-time officers. Also, we have 8 volunteer reserve officers who work at special events.

The Southfield Police Department, for example, has approximately 135 sworn Police Officers, and the Bloomfield Township Police Department has approximately 80 sworn Police Officers.

Based on the size of the residential population we serve (< 5,000), the department generally has enough personnel resources to handle crime and traffic threats within our jurisdiction.

If we have a major incident, we will normally request assistance from the Oakland County Sheriff's Department. For example, the Sheriff's Department has been very helpful in providing crime scene evidence processing and laboratory analysis when we have a burglary or some other felony crime.

All of the departments in our

area work as a team, and the officers will assist each other at major incidents, when necessary. It is not uncommon for officers from our department to assist other police agencies on major criminal investigations, and vice versa.

How many of your calls are joint with fire department?

This is an easy answer. By policy, our police officers will respond to EVERY fire department call, to assist them in any way possible. Our officers have first responder medical training and can provide great assistance to firefighter/EMT personnel on the scene of a medical emergency. Additionally, fire calls usually create traffic concerns, so our officers will assist the FD in making sure all firefighters are able to complete their job, safe from interference from traffic or other individuals at the scene.

Sometimes the police department will call the fire department for assistance with things such as traffic control, if we have a major accident and need additional personnel and/or equipment. Both the PD and the FD work closely as a team on many different types of calls for service.

How much of the total budget and services are Bingham Farms? Do we pay an allocated share for the police station?

Last year (2016), the police department responded to 6,374 calls for service, which includes traffic stops conduct-

ed by the officers. If you remove traffic stops from that number, the department handled 3,457 calls for service. 42% of the calls for service were in Bingham Farms, and the remainder of the calls were in Franklin.

However, of the traffic tickets written by officers last year, 1662 of them (79%) were written in Bingham Farms (due to Telegraph Rd which is Bingham Farms' jurisdiction), with the other 21% in Franklin. Fines received from traffic tickets are a revenue source for both villages, which normally amounts to several thousands of dollars annually.

The Village of Franklin and the Village of Bingham Farms have a long-standing cost reimbursement agreement that is based largely on the percentage of police activity observed in the villages, as well as the population of each community.

In addition, the Special Assessment District (SAD). funds two police officers (these costs paid totally by Bingham Farms), due to the fact that each business day the population of the Village of Bingham Farms multiplies by at least a factor of four as a result of workers and visitors in those commercial properties along Telegraph Road.

The total police department budget for the Fiscal Year 2017 - 2018 is about \$1.7 million. Bingham Farms share is \$692,220 or roughly 41%.

Reminders

For new residents, there's a substantial learning curve as to the do's and don'ts per Village ordinance. The following gives a sneak peek of what you should know.

Home Renovations - any change to the outside of the house usually requires approval from the Design Review Board.

Permits - required for electrical and plumbing as well as roofing. The City of Southfield Building Department issues these permits. This is per an agreement between the Village and the City of Southfield.

Driveways - any driveway work requires a permit from the Village. This is for new driveways, repair work and sealcoating. If you are putting in a new driveway or extending an existing one, please remember driveway widths (in most cases) cannot exceed 12-feet.

It is always best to check in with the Village office to avoid delays in

projects. A simple call can save you time and money.

SIGNS

Contractor signs ARE NOT ALLOWED.

Political/Non Profit Signs are allowed on residential properties. They must be removed within 5 days after an event or election.

RUBBISH PICK UP

Rubbish pick up is on Thursdays. Have trash cans at the road by 7:00 a.m. Trash cans cannot stay at the street for more than 24 hours.

RECYCLING

The Village contracts with **SOCRRA** to handle the Village's Recycling materials and Household Hazardous Waste. The facility is located on Coolidge Rd. in Royal Oak. It is between 14 Mile & Maple Rd. across from Meijer's.

Simple Recycling is a forprofit company which takes items bound for the landfill and finds alternate sources to dispose of the items.

EMAIL BLAST

Do You have a Knox Box for Your Home

Awhile back, I stopped by the home of a new resident to introduce myself and the Fire Department. While talking about our services, I mentioned they had a Knox box mounted to their home. The homeowner had no idea what it was.

The Knox box is an important element to the emergency response needs of both our police and fire departments as it allows for the secured safe-keeping of an entry key just in case we need to get in during an emergency.

While the purchase and or use of the Knox box is not required, it is highly recommended. If we are called to your home and you are not able to let us in, our options become limited to breaking down the door, or use your key stored in the Knox box.

With this in mind, I am sending out this message to our residents that if you have moved into the Village and have a Knox box mounted to your house, please give us a call at 248.626.9862 and have us come out to verify the key contained is still current for your house. If you have changed your locks, please have a copy of your key available so we can switch out the stored key.

If you do not have a Knox box

on your home, please consider the purchase of one so that you are able to secure your house key just in case we need to get in, in an emergency. Please note the use of your key will

only be during an emergency.

Have you ever thought about what it takes to run an election? Who are those folks sitting in the precinct taking down your information and processing your ballot?

Well, they are ordinary citizens just like you.

They are trained on the process, election law and the technology used in the voting process. The training takes less than a day.

Any registered voter, age of 18 and over, can become an election inspector.

It's a paid position. The hours are long (basically from 6:00 a.m. to

around 9:00 p.m). There is the possibility to work a split shift.

Election inspectors are needed to make sure our electoral process works. There are the national, state and local elections held every two years. So it's not a whole lot of time that needs to be devoted to this important process.

Think about it. See elections from the inside.

Be Prepared

It seems Bingham Farms and some of our surrounding areas are the target areas for power outages. Parts of Bingham Farms have lost power four times since April.

It is imperative for every person to call in to DTE and report their outage. The more calls they receive, the better idea they have of the extent of the outage. Do not assume your neighbor has called it in. Everyone should. The number is **800-477-4747** or via computer at **dteenergy.com** and click on Report Power Outage.

Here are some helpful hints to make sure you are ready for the next outage.

- Check the batteries in all your flashlights to make sure they work.
- If you have portable generators, make sure they are in good condition and ready to be fired up. Place them in an open area so no carbon monoxide enters your home.
- Have at least a 3-day supply of water in case there is an interruption.
- Disconnect your major appliances so they won't succumb to a power surge when the power returns.

This last storm created many dangerous situations in several areas of the Village. The weather folks say a lot of the damage was caused by a microburst, a downdraft in a thunderstorm.

Several Rouge Friendly Activities on Tap

Throughout the years, the Bingham Farms Post has had articles about Friends of the Rouge, its mission and its projects.

Here's a more detailed picture of this organization which has offered programs to the residents of Bingham Farms and assisted the Village in meeting some of its state required stormwater regulations.

Friends of the Rouge (FOTR) is a nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization that was founded in 1986 to raise awareness about the need to clean up the Rouge River in southeastern Michigan. The Rouge is fed from rivers and tributaries in Oakland and Macomb counties.

Its mission is to promote restoration and stewardship of the Rouge River ecosystem through education, citizen involvement and other collaborative efforts, for the purpose of improving the quality of life for the people, plants, and animals of the watershed.

FOTR is currently working with local partners to develop a water

trail on 25 miles of the Lower Rouge from Canton to the Detroit River. Much of the river corridor is protected within Wayne County Parks, making it ideal for the development of launches and other amenities.



The River Restoration program teaches residents of the watershed how to manage their land to improve water quality and to provide wildlife habitat through hands-on projects and educational events.



The Friends of the Rouge has 58,252 volunteers and 881 work sites throughout the watershed. The watershed includes waterways in Oakland County, even Bingham Farms.

Through the years, they have had 94,434 students participate in a myriad of programs.

Another of their main projects is to monitor the growth of fish species in a number of the waterways. Currently they have surveyed 38,530 fish and have seen an increase in these numbers as the waterways are cleaned up.

Did you know that CFL & LED Light Bulbs contain hazardous materials? Did you know those burned out bulbs can be returned to mega stores such as Lowe's and Home Depot?

And it's free disposal.

While the Village participates in a Household Hazardous Waste Program with SOCRRA (South O

with SOCRRA (South Oakland Resource Recovery Authority) on Coolidge Highway, it costs the Village \$30 per car. Recently, a resident dropped off 3 of these bulbs. That's it. The cost to the Village was \$30.

For economic reasons, please wait until you have a number of other products before dropping off light bulbs to SOCRRA.

Better yet, just bring them to a local Lowe's or Home Depot store and drop them in the recycling bins at any time at no charge.

People are complaining about all of them. The deer have favorite foods, such as hostas, flowers and certain vegetables. Do not feed the deer.

There's not much that can be

done to stop them from eating everything in sight. Hunting is not allowed in the Village; that includes having professionals come in.



Log on to the Village website for a comprehensive list of plants and trees that deer are less prone to eat.

Coyotes have become a con-

cern as their population has increased. They rarely attack humans, but small animals are another matter.



*Never approach or touch a coyote

*Never intentionally feed a coyote

*Eliminate all outside food sources, especially pet foods

*Put garbage out the morning of pickup day

*Do not allow pets to roam free when coyotes are present.

cleaning out their home prior to moving. Car Trucking has sole discretion as to the quantity they will take.

LATEX PAINT IS NOT A HAZARDOUS WASTE PRODUCT.

Simply dry out the paint or use kitty litter to soak up the paint. Then place the open can beside your trash can for regular disposal.

- Please note that every time a resident brings Hazardous Waste Material to the SOCRRA site, the Village pays \$30 per visit.
- Make sure you have a number of items to drop off and just not one or two. This will not only cut down on the number of trips made to the SOCRRA site, but will reduce the costs to the Village.
- You must have proper ID when dropping off Hazardous Waste.
- Of course, using the recycling drop-off facilities at SOCRRA is free. The cost just applies to Hazardous Waste Materials.

BURNING LEAVES IS ALLOWED IN THE VILLAGE

Regulations (Chapter 50.02)

- 1. Do not burn leaves, grass or rubbish on any paved or bituminous surfaced street;
- 2. Do not burn any type of refuse where smoke, ashes or odor will create a nuisance, public or private:
- 3. Do not burn rubbish closer than 15 feet to a building;
- 4. Do not leave a fire unattended.

LARGE ITEM PICK UP REGULATIONS

Date: Thursday, October 5, 2017

Time: All items at street by 7:00 a.m.

ACCEPTABLE ITEMS

- Large appliances, furniture and hot water heaters (Refrigerators & freezers must have Freon removed prior to placement at the street)
- Only small tree stumps
- Brush and tree branches must be bundled and the length should not exceed four feet
- Rolls of carpet and linoleum must be tied together with the length not to exceed four feet
- Disposal of construction materials is limited to one 32-gallon trash container

UNACCEPTABLE ITEMS

- Large tree stumps
- Hazardous waste
- Tires
- Automotive parts
- Loose gravel
- Large amounts of construction material & loose items

Large items such as appliances and furniture may be placed at the street the weekend before the pick up.

Car Trucking has the right to refuse to pick up excessive amounts of materials. If you have a large quantity of items, please call Car Trucking at 586-791-8480 and make special arrangements to rent a dumpster.





Change Your Clocks! Change Your Batteries!

Spring forward and fall back. This time of year is when we can garner an extra hour of sleep.

Turn your clocks back one hour on **November 5th**. Or as many do, turn them back before you go to bed on Saturday night. Eastern Standard Time begins at **2:00 a.m. November 5th.**

Unfortunately, it also means that shorter days are coming and another Michigan winter is not far away.

While changing your clocks, remember to change the batteries in your smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors.

Be proactive. Take a few minutes to make sure all your detectors are working. It might not just save your house, it may also save YOU.

Will Your Mailbox Hold Up This Winter?

There's an easy test. If your mailbox is on a post, just shake the mailbox. If the mailbox or post is loose, take the time now to tighten screws and secure the posts.

Every winter there are a few residents who complain that the snowplow knocked over their mailbox. Eric Wilson, Chairman of the Road Commission says

"In most cases, the snowplow doesn't actually hit the mailbox. The force of snow thrown from the roadway is enough to knock down a loose mailbox".

So, if you're putting up a new roadside mailbox, it should be 36 to 42 inches off the ground and the post should be 8 to 12 inches behind the shoulder or curb. The mailbox should not protrude into the road.
