ORDINANCE NO 359 – AMENDING THE BMC TO PROHIBIT SHORT-TERM RENTALS AND ADVERTISEMENTS IN THE CITY:

brought to the City's attention that a residence on Gardi Street was being rented on a short-term basis through an online rental service such as Airbnb. Neighbors complained about problems due to this activity, including loud parties, excessive parking on the street, illegal use of fireworks, and other inconveniences. The City Council discussed this matter and directed staff to develop a code amendment to address short-term rentals. After considering the options of either allowing short-term rentals with strict regulations, or prohibiting them completely, it was decided that due to the additional resources that would be required to regulate short-term rentals, it was proposed that they be prohibited completely to avoid the adverse effects on the City's neighborhoods.

City Manager Kearney stated that earlier this year, it was

PROPOSED AMENDMENT:

After researching short-term rental ordinances of other cities, the City Attorney drafted Ordinance No. 359 to amend the City's Municipal Code to add definitions of "Advertisement" and "Short-Term Rentals" and add "Short-Term Rentals" to the "Uses Expressly Prohibited" sections of each residential zone of the Development Code. The proposed Ordinance also prohibits the advertising of short-term rentals.

PLANNING COMMISSION REVIEW:

City Planner Kasama stated that the Planning Commission held a duly noticed public hearing for the proposed Development Code amendment to prohibit short-term rentals of residences at their August 22, 2018 meeting. Following the conclusion of the hearing and discussion, the Commission adopted Resolution No. PC 18-277 to recommend to the City Council the approval of a Development Code Amendment to prohibit short-term rentals of residences with an exception under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA).

SECTION E:

City Planner Kasama stated that the Planning Commission recommended in Section E of the Resolution that the City Council consider to allow short-term, house-sharing types of room rentals with limitations and regulations, such as requiring that the property owner be present during the short-term room rental, that the short-term renting of room be limited to a maximum number of days or occurrences in a year, and that the property may be subject to inspections.

**RECOMMENDATION:** 

It is recommended that the City Council close the public hearing and introduce Ordinance No. 359 as drafted with a determination that the ordinance is exempt under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA).

**PUBLIC HEARING OPENED:** 

Mayor Barakat opened the public hearing for public comment.

### **PUBLIC TESTIMONY:**

Gayle Jenkins, 2115 Gardi Street, stated that she does not agree with the Planning Commission's recommendation and said that she supports a full ban on short-term rentals.

Stella Tsai, 623 Fairlee Avenue, also supports a full ban.

Ann Rule, 2215 Gardi Street, stated that she was the recent victim of a burglary and supports a full ban.

Peter Javryd, 2107 Gardi Street, was also in favor of a full ban.

Roberta Schwartz, 2204 Gardi Street, spoke in favor of a full ban.

Robert Jones, 620 Spring Point Drive, stated that he was not in support of a full ban, but agreed that loud parties should be avoided.

Anne Absey, 44 Woodlyn Lane, inquired about the definition of short-term rental.

City Planner Kasama replied that short-term rental means the rental of a dwelling unit or a room in a dwelling unit, for compensation or consideration for less than thirty (30) consecutive days.

### PUBLIC COMMENT CLOSED:

Mayor Barakat closed the public hearing.

**DISCUSSION:** 

Councilmember Lewis agreed with Robert Jones to be careful about restricting property rights and stated that he is against a full ban.

Councilmember Lathrop stated that residents are affected now and supported an outright ban which should not be delayed.

Mayor Pro-Tem Hale and Councilmember Bruny also supported a complete ban.

Councilmember Lathrop made a motion to introduce Ordinance No. 359 as drafted with drafted with a determination that the ordinance is exempt under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). Mayor Pro-Tem Hale seconded the motion, wich was carried by the following roll call vote:

AWARD OF BID - LEMON TRAIL **REHABILIATION PROJECT:** 

City Engineer John Leveillee (RKA) stated that the Lemon Trail Rehabilitation Project was advertised on August 3, 2018 and bids were opened on August 28, 2018 with NoHo Construction being the lowest responsible bidder.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council award a contract to NoHo Constructors in the amount of \$57,475.00.

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### PROJECT DESCRIPTION:

John Leveillee stated the project consist of re-grading the Lemon Trail between Royal Oaks Drive North and Lemon Street. Water-bar steps will be installed to decease the grade of the trail at the steepest portions and repairs will be made to the existing drainage system. The trail will then receive a finished coating of crushed rock infused with polymers which will resist erosion better than the old decomposed granite material.

Councilmember Lewis made a motion to award the bid for the Lemon Trail Rehabilitation Project to NoHo Constructors in the amount of \$57,475.00. Mayor Pro-Tem Hale seconded the motion, which was carried by the following roll call vote:

ORDINANCE NO. 360 AND RESOLUTION NO. 18-25:

City Planner Kasama stated that a required update of the City's Housing Element of the General Plan was due October 15, 2017. However, before an update can be submitted to the State Department of Housing and Community Development, the City must adopt Development Code amendments and a General Plan amendment that the State required for the previous update in 2014.

**CONSULTANT KAREN WARNER:** 

The City has retained a consultant, Karen Warner (present) who prepared the 2014 Housing Element Update to prepare the current Housing Element Update. In preparing for the update, the consultant found that the policies of the 2014 Housing Element that called for various amendments had not been implemented.

**NECESSARY AMENDMENTS:** 

The necessary amendments are as follows:

- New definitions and regulations for allowing residential care facilities, and supportive and transitional housing
- A definition of multi-family dwelling, and amendment of the accessory living quarters regulations to include multi-family dwellings as a permitted use
- Addition of reasonable accommodation procedures for disable persons
- Amendment of the General Plan to appl the affordable housing overlay to the civic center site to enable the site to be developed with an emergency shelter by right

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS:

The proposed development code amendments are presented for review by the City Council in Planning Commission Resolution No. 18-275:

 Exhibit A: New definitions and regulations for residential care facilities and supportive & transitional housing

- Exhibit B: New definition of multi-family dwelling, and amendment of the accessory living quarters definition
- Exhibit C: Delete accessory living quarters regulations from the residential zones to avoid inconsistencies
- Exhibit D: Amend accessory living quarters regulations
- Exhibit E: Add reasonable accommodation procedures for disabled persons

City Planner Kasama stated that the Development Code amendments are to be adopted by ordinance, and have been transferred into draft Ordinance No. 360. The General Plan amendment is to be adopted by Resolution No. 18-25.

PLANNING COMMISSION REVIEW:

In adopting Resolution No. PC 18-27, the Planning Commission expanded the permitting of supportive and transitional housing to all zones. Staff had drafted the amendment to include these uses only in the R-7,500 and R-20,000 zones as these zones are more typical residential areas, and staff's opinion is that communal residential care facilities would not be compatible in the A-1, A-2, and A-5 zones where agricultural and equestrian uses are prevalent.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council introduce Ordinance No. 360 and adopt Resolution No. 18-25 as drafted with a determination that the ordinance and resolution are exempt under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA).

**PUBLIC HEARING OPENED:** 

Mayor Barakat opened the public hearing for public comment.

**PUBLIC HEARING CLOSED:** 

There being no public comment, Mayor Barakat declared the public hearing closed.

DISCUSSION:

Councilmember Lewis wanted to know what the City Council is absolutely required to do.

Consultant Karen Warner stated that the City has to allow supportive and transitional housing in all zones that allow residential uses.

Councilmember Lathrop inquired about second story SROs.

Councilmember Lewis stated that the Council does not understand the Resolution. The required update is already overdue. How long does the Council have to adopt the Resolution?

Mayor Pro-Tem Hale proposed to put off the discussion for 30 days.

Mayor Barakat stated that the City Council needs to have a study session on just this item.

**ACTING CITY ATTORNEY KRESS:** 

Acting City Attorney Kress suggested that the Council adopt Resolution No 18-25 and continue the public hearing for Ordinance No. 360.

MOTION TO CONTINUE THE PUBLIC HEARING OPEN AND TO ADOPT RESOLUTION NO. 18-25:

Councilmember Lathrop made a motion to continue open the public hearing for Ordinance No. 360 and to adopt Resolution No. 18-25: A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRADBURY AMENDING THE BRADBURY GENERAL PLAN TO ADD THE AFFORDABLE HOUSING OVERLAY TO THE CIVIC CENTER SITE AT 600 WINSTON AVENUE. Mayor Pro-Tem Hale seconded the motion, which was carried by the following roll call vote:

STUDY SESSION SCHEDULED:

The City Council scheduled a study session for Tuesday, October 9, 2018 at 6:00 p.m.

2018 CONFLICT OF INTEREST CODE UPDATE:

City Manager Kearney stated that the Political Reform Act requires every local agency to review its conflict of interest code biennially, in even-numbered years. It is time to update the City's conflict-of-interest code by updating the positions and titles of individuals required to file FPPC Form 700. Since the last update, there have been no substantial changes to the organizational structure, other than the addition of the recently appointed Community Services Officer as a designated position for filing.

**RECOMMENDATION:** 

It is recommended that the City Council accept the 2018 Local Agency Biennial Notice and adopt Resolution No. 18-24.

MOTION TO ADOPT RESOLUTION NO. 18-24: Councilmember Lewis made a motion to accept the 2018 Local Agency Biennial Notice and adopt Resolution No. 18-24, adding the Community Services Officer as a designated position for filing. Mayor Pro-Tem Hale seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

DISCUSSION REGARDING BRADBURY'S COMMUNITY SERVICES OFFICER:

City Manager Kearney stated that pursuant to the Council's request during the August meeting, this is a discussion regarding the City's Community Services Officer (CSO).

BACKGROUND:

In 2016, the City Council decided to utilize a portion of the City's COPS fund in developing a Community Services Officer program. The thought was that a CSO position in Bradbury could be helpful in the focusing of crime prevention, as well as taking on some of the non-law enforcement duties to assist the community. The idea was also that the CSO would be able to take fingerprints, write reports, and handle evidence. Ultimately, the City decided to move forward with sharing a Community Services Officer with the City of Monrovia.

In 2017, the CSO program launched, and the City has had very positive feedback from the community. The current CSO provides residents with a sense of comfort with the increased visibility, he is able to spend time with residents consulting them on video camera best practices, and he is able to educate residents on a wide variety of animal control measures.

There have been some challenges in integrating a CSO from Monrovia into the current County Sheriff's Department system. For example, the CSO is not able to be issued a Sheriff's radio to monitor any traffic occurring in the City. The CSO, to date, has not yet written a report for the Sheriff's Department or taken any fingerprints.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS: The City receives approximately \$100,000 a year in COPS

funding from the State of California. Of this amount, the City contracts with the City of Monrovia for \$37,000 for a part-time Community Services Officer that is shared with Monrovia.

**RECOMMENDATION:** It is recommended that the City Council discuss the Community

Services Officer Program and direct staff on how to proceed.

**DISCUSSION:** Lt. Jess Carracso, Temple Station, stated that a Sheriff's radio

would cost \$5,000. City Manager Kearney stated that the City Council would have to adopt a Resolution to buy radio equipment with COPS funds. Currently the CSO can listen in on a scanner, and use his cell phone to call the Sheriff's

Department to report a problem.

NO ACTION TAKEN: The City Council took no action on this discussion item.

MATTERS FROM THE CITY MANAGER: City Manager Kearney inquired if the City Council wished to revisit tree replacement of trees in the public right-of-way. The

City Council replied no.

City Manager Kearney inquired if the City Council would like to discuss expanding the responsibilities of the Emergency Response Committee to include Neighborhood Watch and public safety. The Council instructed staff to place the item on

the next agenda.

City Manager Kearney asked the Council if they wished to discuss policing services with the City of Monrovia. Mayor Barakat stated that the City Council's plate is full right now and

to revisit this discussion at a later time.

MATTERS FROM THE CITY ATTORNEY: Acting City Attorney Kress thanked the Council for having him back. Robert Kress was Bradbury's City Attorney 30 years ago.

MATTERS FROM THE CITY COUNCIL:

MAYOR BARAKAT: Mayor Barakat stated that the San Gabriel Valley Mosquito &

Vector Control District has identified the Manor as a huge

offender of standing water, which breeds mosquitoes.

MAYOR PRO-TEM HALE: Nothing to report

2018 regular meeting.



### INTRODUCTION

A required update of the City's Housing Element of the General Plan was due October 15, 2017. However, before an update can be submitted to the State Department of Housing and Community Development, the City must adopt Development Code amendments and a General Plan amendment that the State required for the previous update in 2014.

The City has retained a consultant, Karen Warner Associates that prepared the 2014 Housing Element Update to prepare the current Housing Element update. In preparing for the update, the consultant found that the policies of the 2014 Housing Element that called for various amendments had not been implemented. Attached is Chapter VI of the Housing Element – Housing Policies, Programs & Quantified Objectives. The Code amendments and General Plan amendment need to be in place before the City can submit the next update to the State. The necessary amendments are as follows:

- New definitions and regulations for allowing residential care facilities, and supportive and transitional housing – these are called for by policies no. 2 and no. 6 of the 2014 Housing Element.
- A definition of multi-family dwelling, and amendment of the accessory living quarters regulations to include multi-family dwellings as a permitted use – this is called for by policy no. 2.
- Addition of reasonable accommodation procedures for disabled persons this is called for by policy no. 4.
- Amendment of the General Plan to apply the affordable housing overlay to the civic center site to enable the site to be developed with an emergency shelter by right – this is called for by policy no. 6.

### PROPOSED AMENDMENTS

The proposed Development Code amendments are presented for review as follows as exhibits to the attached Planning Commission Resolution No. PC 18-275:

Exhibit 'A' - New Definitions & Regulations for Residential Care Facilities, and Supportive & Transitional Housing

Exhibit 'B' - New Definition of Multi-Family Dwelling, and Amend Accessory Living Quarters Definitions

Exhibit 'C' – Delete Accessory Living Quarters Regulations from the Residential Zones to Avoid Inconsistencies

Exhibit 'D' - Amend Accessory Living Quarters Regulations

Exhibit 'E' - Add Reasonable Accommodation Procedures for Disabled Persons

There is not an exhibit for the General Plan amendment to add the affordable housing overlay to the civic center site. The land use map of the General Plan will be revised to indicate that this overlay has been applied to the civic center site.

The Development Code amendments are to be adopted by ordinance, and have been transferred into the attached draft Ordinance No. 360. The General Plan amendment is to be adopted by resolution, and the attached Resolution No. 18-25 has been drafted for this amendment.

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### **ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENT**

It is recommended that the proposed Ordinance No. 360 and Resolution No. 18-25 are exempt under the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15061(b)(3) which states that the activity is covered by the general rule that CEQA applies only to projects which have the potential for causing a significant effect on the environment. Where it can be seen with certainty that there is no possibility that the activity in question may have a significant effect on the environment, the activity is not subject to review under CEQA.

### PLANNING COMMISSION REVIEW

In accordance with Chapter 13 of Title IX of the Bradbury Municipal Code and State planning law, the Planning Commission held a duly-noticed public hearing for the proposed Development Code amendments and General Plan amendment at their regular meetings on March 28, 2018, and April 25, 2018, and directed staff to draft the attached Resolution No. PC 18-275. Due to the absence of two Commissioners at the May 23, 2018 meeting, the adoption of the resolution was held over to the June 27, 2018, regular meeting at which the resolution was unanimously adopted with an exemption under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA).

In adopting Resolution No. PC 18-275, the Planning Commission expanded the permitting of supportive and transitional housing to all zones. Staff had drafted the amendment to include these uses only in the R-7,500 and R-20,000 zones as these zones are more typical residential areas, and staff's opinion is that communal residential care facilities would not be compatible in the A-1, A-2, and A-5 zones where agricultural and equestrian uses are prevalent.

### **CITY COUNCIL ALTERNATIVES**

The City Council is to open a public hearing and solicit testimony on the proposed ordinance. At that time, the City Council will have the following choice of actions:

**Option 1.** Close the public hearing and determine that the proposed ordinance and resolution are to be approved as drafted with an exemption under CEQA, and approve a motion to introduce the ordinance and adopt the resolution.

**Option 2.** Close the public hearing and determine that the proposed ordinance and/or resolution need minor modifications, and approve a motion to introduce the ordinance and adopt the resolution with the minor modifications as stated by the Council.

**Option 3.** If the City Council determines that the proposed ordinance or resolution need to be substantially modified in a manner that has not been previously considered by the Planning Commission, the Council should approve a motion to close the public hearing and refer the draft ordinance and/or resolution back to the Planning Commission for its review and recommendation on the changes. In accordance with Chapter 13 of Title IX of the Bradbury Municipal Code, the Planning Commission is to report back within 45 days.


### **RECOMMENDATION**

### INTRODUCTION

A required update of the City's Housing Element of the General Plan was due October 15, 2017. However, before an update can be submitted to the State Department of Housing and Community Development, the City must adopt Development Code amendments and a General Plan amendment that the State required for the previous update in 2014.

At the September 18, 2018, regular meeting, the City Council opened a public hearing for Ordinance No.360 for the various Development Code amendments, and Resolution No. 18-25 for a General Plan, Land Use Map amendment to apply the Affordable Housing Overlay to the civic center site to designate that the site can be used for an emergency shelter. The September 18, 2018, agenda report is attached. The City Council adopted Resolution No. 18-25 and called for a study session to review the code amendments presented in Ordinance No. 360.

Attachments for the proposed code amendments have been prepared to show the amendments in relation to the four Housing Element program directives. The attachments are for the following four subjects: Residential Care Facilities, Supportive & Transitional Housing, Multi-Family Residential, and Reasonable Accommodation Procedures for Disabled Persons. Also attached are reference documents that include most of the State codes related to the amendments called for in the Housing Element, and other documents that help explain the necessity for the amendments.

In preparing the attachments, it was found that corrections were needed for the Multi-Family Residential proposal. In particular, for paragraph (c) under, 'Sec. 9.85.010 – Permitted.' In addition to a couple of typographic changes, the beginning of the paragraph has been corrected to strikeout the limitation of only one attached single-room-occupancy (SRO) unit in the A-1, A-2 and A-5 zones. The corrections have been carried over into the attached draft Ordinance No. 360.

### RECOMMENDATION

The City Council is to discuss the proposed amendments, which are presented in the attachments base on the four subject areas. The amendments need not be discussed in any particular order. Following the discussion of the proposed amendments, it is recommended that the City Council direct staff to make any agreed upon changes to the proposed amendments and draft Ordinance No. 360, and schedule another public hearing on the Ordinance for the November 20, 2018, regular meeting.

City Attorney Reisman stated that staff was not aware of any.

**PUBLIC COMMENT:** 

Anne Absey, 44 Woodlyn Lane, addressed the Council on behalf of Brian Hamill, 728 Winston Avenue, regarding the fence at the corner of Winston and Royal Oaks Drive North. The fence has blown over during the recent windstorm. City Manager Kearney stated that staff has already notified the property owner to take care of the problem.

Ms. Absey also stated that the Royal Oaks Trail is not in great shape. There are flooded areas, some of the sprinklers don't work, mulch is missing, etc. Mayor Barakat replied that fixing these problems is included in the budget for this fiscal year. City Manager Kearney added that it was really hot during the last four months, and that plant replacement is scheduled in the next few weeks.

DISCUSSION ON MEASURE W AND POTENTIAL LETTER OF SUPPORT:

City Manager Kearney stated that the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors will place the Safe, Clean Water Program before the voters on the November 6, 2018 ballot. If approved by the voters, the program will provide local, dedicated funding to increase local water supply, improve water quality, and protect public health.

As part of the discussion, a representative from the County of Los Angeles was in attendance. Edel Vizcarra, Assistant Head, Community and Government Relations, Los Angeles County of Public Works, presented additional information on this ballot measure, entitled Measure W, to the Council.

**MEASURE W:** 

Mr. Vizcarra stated that if approved by 66.7% of voters, the Safe, Clean Water Program would generate approximately \$300 million per year by implementing a special parcel tax of 2.5 cents per square foot of impermeable surface area – paved/built areas where rainfall cannot be absorbed into the ground and instead runs off as stormwater – on private property in the Los Angeles County Flood Control District. Publicly owned parcels, including schools, are exempt under state law. Credits for property owners who have installed stormwater-capture improvements are included. Qualifying low-income seniors and non-profit organizations are eligible for exemption.

### FINANCIAL ANALYSIS:

Revenue from the Safe, Clean water Program will be divided into three different categories:

- 50% Regional Grants shall be allocated for the implementation, operations and maintenance, and administration of watershed-based projects and programs
- 40% Cities shall be allocated to cities, in the same proportion as the amount of revenues collected within the City for implementation, operation and maintenance, and administration of programs.
- 10% Flood Control District shall be allocated to the
  District for implementation and administration of
  projects and programs, and for the payment of the
  costs incurred in connection with the levy and collection
  of the Safe, Clean Water Program tax and the
  distribution of the fund generated by imposition of the
  program tax

INITIAL PROJECTION FOR BRADBURY:

Initial projection for the City of Bradbury suggests that the City might receive approximately \$60,000 annually for the portion directly allocated to municipalities.

**RECOMMENDATION:** 

Should the City Council decide to support the measure, it is recommended that the Council adopt Resolution No. 18-28.

PUBLIC INPUT AND DISCUSSION:

Anne Absey, 44 Woodlyn Lane, asked if this measure is what we've been waiting for. City Manager Kearney explained that the Measure may or may not help the City as there are still a lot of unknowns. This is the second attempt by the County. Mr. Vizcarra added that Measure W does not have a sunset clause.

MOTION:

Councilmember Lathrop made a motion adopt Resolution No. 18-28 to support the Safe, Clean Water Program. The motion died for a lack of second. The motion did not pass.

DISCUSSION ON THE RESTRUCTURING OF THE EMERGENCY RESPONSE COMMITTEE:

City Manager Kearney stated that pursuant to the Council's request at the September meeting, this discussion is to review the Emergency Response Committee's current roles and responsibilities, the possibility of expanding those roles, and compares the committee to other committees/commissions in comparable communities.

**RECOMMENDATION:** 

It is recommended that the City Council review this report and direct staff on how to proceed with the City's Emergency Response Committee (ERC). Should the City Council decide to alter the Committee, staff will work toward formalizing the revisions and will present them during the November meeting.

DISCUSSION:

Councilmember Lathrop stated that he would like to give the ERC more purpose and the he likes the scope of the City of San Dimas, which includes:

- Reviewing and developing crime prevention programs and projects;
- Reviewing the City's Code Enforcement program;

- Advising the City Council and City regarding law enforcement priorities;

DISCUSSION ON USE OF CAL RECYCLE FUNDS:

Management Analyst Santos Leon stated that the City currently has a surplus of \$7,400 in CalRecycle funds. In the past, there have been challenges expending these monies, as funds are restricted and may only be utilized to support activities related to beverage container recycling and litter abatement.

BACKGROUND:

The California Beverage Container Recycling and Litter Reduction Act provides funding to cities and counties for beverage container recycling programs. The funding source is the California Redemption Value (CRV) premium that is paid when consumers purchase beverages in glass bottles, cans, and plastic containers. Funding is distributed on an annual basis based on a per capita formula. Bradbury is entitled to receive \$5,000 each year, and receiving the funds is as easy as completing an online form. Currently, the City has a surplus of these restricted funds in the amount of \$7,400.

**RECOMMENDATION:** 

During Fiscal Year 2017-18, the City Council approved a grant program that facilitated the expenditure of the City's surplus CalRecycle funds. It is recommended that the City Council consider a similar grant program to expend the current surplus funds. Should be City Council desire to move forward with the grant program, staff recommends that the City Council review the Request for Grant Proposal and direct staff to move forward with soliciting grant proposals.

DISCUSSION:

Mayor Barakat stated that he would like to use some of the funds for National Night Out, if possible.

Councilmember Lewis wanted to know if the litter bags for the DOGIPOT waste stations are an eligible expense.
