Watching the iconic Rose Parade is an annual New Year tradition. Here are a few interesting facts to keep in mind the next time you watch the floral floats, marching bands, and equestrians travel down Colorado Boulevard.

- More than 18 million flowers are used for the floats that travel through the streets of Pasadena, California.
- Roses are not the only flowers used on the floats. Float designers are permitted to decorate with pretty much any natural material, though, so you may notice leaves, seeds, bark, and even fruits and veggies being put to creative use.
- The Tournament of Roses demands about **80,000 hours** of manpower from over **900 volunteers** every year.
- Float decorating takes place indoors in "float barns" around Pasadena, kept at chilly temperatures to preserve the cut flowers. You can spot volunteers decorating floats with jackets and scarves!
- Most of the flowers are composted after the parade. The flowers themselves (and other natural materials) usually start to wilt after a few days on display, so most are composted or recycled into mulch to help new plants grow.

There are so many fun, family friendly activities taking place in the surrounding communities. Try something new this year and enjoy the lovely events in the neighborhood!

Join Monrovia Public Library on January 25th at 6:30 pm for Novel T's Book Club, a lively book discussion of different genres, featuring a new facilitator each month.


ARCADIA

TIPS FOR HARDENING A CHICKEN COOP

Here in Bradbury, wild animals are our neighbors! It is a treat to see all kinds of wildlife right outside our front door. However, it is important to stay aware and take precautions when it comes to pets, especially ones that live outside. Chickens are most vulnerable to attacks when they are free-ranging about in the yard and gardens. Supervising them when they are out and about can help to deter attacks. However, sometimes predators can even attack chickens in the safety of their own home. Here are some ideas to consider to keep your chickens safe.

- Avoid chicken wire. Surprisingly, chicken wire was designed to keep chickens in but not predators out. Some predators, like fisher cats, raccoons and snakes, can easily access your chickens through the larger links in the wiring. Instead of chicken wire opt for 1/2 inch hardware cloth instead.
- **Consider diggers.** Some predators, such as coyotes, can access the coop in minutes by easily digging underneath the enclosed outside portion of their housing (chicken run). To help combat this type of behavior, simply surround the chicken's run with a 2 foot wide apron of hardware cloth. Bury it a few inches below the ground's surface. Or you can bury the hardware cloth straight down 12-18 inches deep into the ground.



- **Put a roof on it.** Predators that fly or climb can access the coop through an uncovered "ceiling" in the outdoor run. Placing a roof over the run is the best way to keep predators from landing or climbing into the chicken run.
- **Batten down the hatches.** Every day, be sure the chickens are safely locked into their coop from nightfall until morning. Also inspect the coop and repair any small holes. These are access points for sneaky predators such as rats and snakes.
- Use quality locks. Replace easy open latches with predator proof ones. Many of them have a two-step locking and unlocking mechanism. Keep in mind that raccoons can figure out locks that 2-year-old children can!
