Helmets Save Lives!

Did you know that 80% of bicycle-related injuries could be prevented by proper use of a helmet? That's what studies show. So remember, everyone should—and children must—wear helmets when riding bicycles, scooters, and skateboards.

Camarillo police officers want you and your children to be safe, so please follow the following guidelines:

- Always wear a helmet. Serious brain injury can result even from falls that don't seem very bad at the time.
- Children under age 18 must wear helmets when riding bicycles, scooters, and skateboards. Otherwise a fine of \$150 may be imposed under California Vehicle Code 21212.
- Obey all street signs, use hand signals, and avoid hazards on the roadway—and teach your children to do the same. A bicycle is considered a "vehicle" and riders must follow the rules of the road.
- If you or your children are riding at night or at dusk, wear light-colored (reflective) clothing to make yourself visible. Anyone biking at night is also required to have a working headlight.

No budget for safety gear? The Camarillo Police Department has a limited number of helmets and other safety items available free to families dealing with financial hardships.

Free Electronic Waste Collection Event

If you're like most of us, you probably have a few old electrical gadgets accumulating in your closet or garage, right? If so, here's your chance to discard them properly. **Saturday, October 5**, PC Recycle and the *Cats Cradle Rescue* are teaming up with the Pleasant Valley Recreation and Park District to host a free e-waste collection event. This event will be held rain or shine, **8:30 a.m. to 12 p.m.**, at the Camarillo Community Center, **1605 Burnley Street**; open to all City residents and businesses, no appointment needed.



What to bring: computers and computer components, fax machines, VCR/DVD/CD players, keyboards, LCD monitors, power supplies, server cabinets, stereo equipment, TVs, Walkmans, pagers, speakers, telephone equipment, wireless devices, monitors, scanners, video game systems, audio/visual equipment, cellular phones, copiers, corrupted flash drives, and digital cameras.

What NOT to bring: Household/commercial appliances such as refrigerators, washers, and dryers, or any hazardous material waste such as paint and household batteries.

Funds from selling the collected e-waste after the event will benefit *Cats Cradle Rescue*. For more information about this event, please call PC Recycle at (805) 499-0050.



Do you Have Medical Needs During a Public Safety Power Shutoff?

A PSPS is a Public Safety Power Shutoff issued due to a possible fire threat to the electrical grid from high winds, dry vegetation, low humidity, or other conditions. A PSPS helps avoid fire damage to the power infrastructure and reduces the possibility of electrical lines either igniting, or expanding a fire.

During a PSPS, Southern California Edison (SCE) will turnoff electricity to portions of, or to entire communities. SCE will notify the public 24 or 48 hours prior to a PSPS.

SCE recognizes that some residents need continuous power for certain medical needs. If you, or a loved one are in this situation, please call 800-655-4555.



Coastal Cleanup Day: Save the Date, Sat. Sept. 21, 9 a.m.



During last year's Cleanup, 2900 volunteers removed nearly 12,500 pounds of trash and recyclables from 43 miles of Ventura County beaches and inland waterways. In Camarillo alone, 260 volunteers collected 930 pounds of debris from two sites: the **barranca off Mission Oaks Park and Calleguas Creek at Paseo Del Campo** and **Creekside**.

In addition to collecting trash from waterways and beaches, volunteers collect data during the cleanup that provides important clues as to the nature and source of the trash. Data collection from past cleanups have shown that over 60 percent of the trash picked up on Coastal Cleanup Day probably originated from an inland source—a city, a storm drain, or another non-coastal location—and was washed onto the beach through a creek or river.

Cleaning inland sites, like those in Camarillo, helps to stop trash where it starts, before it hits our coast and ocean. Please put your trash where it belongs—in the garbage or recycle can!

Kids and Bicycle Safety

Bicycle riding is fun, healthy, and a great way to feel independent. But it is important to remember that a bicycle is not a toy it's a vehicle! According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, the safest place for bicycle riding is on the street riding in the same direction as car traffic and obeying the same rules of the road as motorists.

However, children under 10 years old are not mature enough to make the decisions necessary to safely ride in the street. Therefore, children under 10 are better off riding on the sidewalk. Be sure they know that anyone riding on a sidewalk should follow these guidelines:

- Watch for vehicles coming out of or turning into driveways.
- Stop at street corners to look for cars and to make sure that drivers see you before crossing.
- Enter a street at a corner and not between parked cars.
- Alert nearby pedestrians by saying "Excuse me" or "Passing on your left," or use a bell or horn.

- Only visit homes that have the porch light on.
- Accept treats at the door and never go into a stranger's house.
- Have an adult inspect all treats before eating and never eat treats if the package is already open.



CITY COUNCIL ADOPTS FISCAL YEAR 2019/20 SPENDING PLAN GENERAL FUND \$43.0 MILLION – CITYWIDE \$179.7 MILLION


On June 12, 2019, the City Council adopted a structurally balanced \$179.7 million annual budget for Fiscal Year 2019/20, to provide services and fund projects that are important for the well-being of Camarillo residents. The City's financial position remains in excellent condition and the City is committed to sound and conservative financial practices that ensure the City's fiscal sustainability. Did You Know?

Home-generated medical waste includes home-generated pharmaceutical waste and home-generated sharps waste. Home-generated sharps waste includes hypodermic needles, pen needles, intravenous needles, lancets and other devices that are used to penetrate the skin for the delivery of medications derived from a household, including a multifamily residence or household. Additionally, home-generated sharps waste includes sharps used to deliver medication to pets.

The California Medical Waste Management Act prohibits the disposal of home-generated sharps into any container used for the collection of regular trash, recycling or green waste.

The City's household hazardous waste program, which is available by appointment only, accepts home-generated sharps as long as they are in a secured container. To make an appointment, please call (805) 987-0717 or www.cityofcamarillo.org.

Money for Home Repairs Available

Does your home need repairs? The city's *Owner-Occupied Housing Rehabilitation Program*, funded by the federal Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), provides assistance to lower-income residents with needed home repairs to improve living conditions and to attain compliance with minimum property standards. Examples of eligible repairs include roofing, heating, cooling, plumbing, electrical systems, walls, floors, doors, windows, countertops, cabinets, painting, and American with Disabilities Act (ADA) improvements, including handicapped access.

Rehabilitation assistance comes in the form of a zero- or lowinterest loan for qualifying households, with no repayment for 50 years, or until the property is sold or the owner no longer lives in the home. The homeowner must qualify as a "low-income household." **The maximum rehabilitation loan** is **\$25,000**.

You can receive audio or text alerts, instant messaging, an email, or fax. **VC Alert** can also provide messages to the hearing impaired.


