TITLE: Proposed 2024 Parks & Recreation Department Budget Highlights

SUBMITTING: Eric Brendlinger- Parks & Recreation Director Hollis Sutherland-Chair Parks & Recreation Commission

BACKGROUND:

The Parks and Recreation proposed budget supports the Town Trustee's mission, goals and objectives including service delivery in the following areas:

- Parks Maintenance and Recreation Programming
- Communications
- Park Master Planning
- Capital Improvements
- Climate Action Plan & Path to Net Zero for New Construction and Existing Buildings

DISCUSSION:

The Parks & Recreation Department service offerings will align with our mission: The Town of Carbondale Parks & Recreation Department is dedicated to providing and maintaining parks, trails and recreational amenities. Through innovation and community cooperation, we will develop leisure services, programs and facilities that improve the quality of life for all citizens and benefit the economic vitality of our community.

2024 Parks & Recreation Budget priorities will touch on a combination of these goals and objectives and will highlight the larger projects and expenditures that match the goals with explanations of the action plans the budget will fund. The Parks & Recreation Department utilizes funds to reach these goals out of the following budget locations:

- 01 General Fund- for parks maintenance and outdoor recreation programming
- 74 Capital Construction Fund -for park improvement equipment and fleet replacement
- 75 Recreation Sales and Use Tax Fund- for recreation center and aquatics facility operations, grant matching, and pool bond repayment
- 10 Conservation Trust Fund- for some parks staff and parks maintenance

For FY-2024 budget Parks & Recreation programming requests are centered on continuing our successful year-round programming for all ages and working to maintain our parks and facilities to the highest standards possible. The documents directing this programming and maintenance include the following:

- Integrated Weed Management Plan
- Special Events Task Force

- Crystal River Restoration Plan
- 2015 10 Year Parks, Recreation & Trails Master Plan.
- Gateway River Park & Gateway RV Park Master Plan
- Carbondale Aquatics Facility Master Plan

Parks Maintenance and Recreation Programming:

- <u>North Face Bike Park</u> Fund 01: \$20,000 We have contracted with *The Jump Doctors INC.*, to maintain our North Face Bike Park and to do a spring rebuild in 2024 and a mid-season maintenance visit.
- <u>Playgrounds</u> Fund 75: \$35,000 Closing out the Youth Art Park GOCO Mini-Grant with Carbondale Arts for phase one of this new playground-art park. This was a collaboration with Carbondale Arts to receive the GOCO grant. A GOCO Board grant extension has been granted for a closeout in the Spring of 2024. Fund 75: \$8,000 Swing Wear mats
- <u>Park Improvements-</u>Fund 74 : \$38,000 ADA frost free drinking fountains for Gianinetti Park, Hendricks Dog Park, Miners Park, 2 aluminum bleachers for Hendricks Soccer Field.
- <u>Cemetery Improvements</u>- Fund 01: \$19,500 Purchased *CemSites* software and staff is being trained presently. After initial mapping and software set-up there is an ongoing annual fee of up to \$1,500.00 to host the data with different levels of services. Increase in topsoil needs and river coble removal from each burial. Additional funding will be needed in the cemetery budget to cover these costs. \$18,000 Informational Kiosks for Hillcrest and Evergreen. \$6,000
- <u>Red Hill Trails</u>- Fund 01: \$15,000 Trail maintenance needs will utilize Aspen Valley Land Trust (AVLT) endowment maintenance fund to hire Roaring Fork Outdoor Volunteers (RFOV) trial crew for two weeks of trail work. Also continuing the Adopt-A-Trail with local groups through RFOV of Ruthies, B-Line, Lower Three Gulch and C-line trails.
- Integrated Weed Management -Fund 01 & 10: \$23,000 Temp Services for manual weed mitigation. In 2023 we utilized a Natural Land Managers techniques at the Nature Park. The product stemmed the growth and partially worked on the Canada Thistle and the Yellow Toadflax, both Type B noxious weeds. Our manual extraction will need to continue of the Type B and C noxious weeds to mitigate their spread (i.e.- Houndstounge, Burdock, Absinth Wormwood, Plume less and Scotch thistle) so we are asking for additional temp labor allocations in the budget. We are also asking for funds to conduct additional training session and treatments from Bee Happy Lands with their natural techniques to control noxious weeds. We are also using a biological mite from the Palisades Insectary to stem the growth of bindweed in the Promenade Park Picnic Shade Shelter.
- <u>Gateway RV Park-</u>Fund 01: \$30,000 Bathhouse roof replacement with metal seam material
- <u>Recreation Center Building Maintenance</u> -Fund 75: \$22,000 Skylight replacement installation costs and roof membrane micro tears repair.

- <u>Youth Programming</u>- Fund 01 & 75: Continue to provide a variety of programming for all ages. Bring back "Schools Out" programming options and the "Wednesday early release" programming. The goal is the growth of youth league play for 2024 with our indoor youth basketball programs and to bring back the overnight "Learn to Backpack" trips, which is part of the Trails & Tents program.
- <u>Self-produced Special Events</u> -Fund 01: \$40,000 Easter 5K Scavenger Hunt and egg hunt, First Friday Events, Pump Track Time Trials and Bike Safety Rodeo, 4th of July Parade and concert, Spring into Fun Family Block Party, the Turkey Trot 5K Running Race, Light-Up Carbondale. We will maintain our managerial role for both Our Town, One Table and Potato Day. Events that will continue in 2024, some concert and dance series taking place at Thompson Park and potential use of the stage for benefit concerts. Arturo Marban, will conduct 2 Mexican rodeos at the Gus Darien Rodeo Arena in 2024.

Communications

 <u>Dog Park Signage</u>-Fund 01: \$5,000 The Parks & Recreation Commission has received public input on dogs in park issues, and other rules of use of Town parks. The goal is for the department and the commission to develop a multi-pronged approach to convey the existing rules and regulations in Town Parks. This will be accomplished with a public information campaign to include education, signage, mapping, public outreach, social media posts and enforcement. Graphic artist hired for Dog Park signage design and content. This branding and design style could be duplicated for other park regulatory signs for 2024.

Park Master Planning

<u>Chacos Park Master Plan- Fund 01:</u> \$75,000 RE: Land has been contracted to conduct a
master plan utilizing funds out of the 2023 budget. The 2024 budget has a placeholder for
implementation of a phase 1 of the project, which will be the initial build out of the infrastructure
needs to match the master plan findings.

Capital Improvements

<u>Crystal River Restoration and Weaver Ditch Efficiency Project-</u> Fund 75 : \$405,000 being held in grant funded budget for landscaping and irrigation work. Parks & Recreation staff is managing a Federal *Fishing is Fun* Grant from 2020 offered by Colorado Parks & Wildlife for \$30,000. This grant will partially fund ADA access from the road to the property. A secondary *Fishing is Fun* grant for 2021 was applied for and \$50,000 is earmarked for instream fish habitat improvements. A Colorado River District grant will also be used for the project along with the Pitkin County Healthy Rivers fund. Additional funding is being provided by Colorado Water Conservation Board and the Bureau of Reclamation. The Town has requested a grant extension from the GOCO Board for the Aspen Valley Land Trust grant of \$55,000 awarded from the 2020 *GOCO Resilient Communities* grant cycle. The Town has entered as a grant partner and will be fiscally responsible for this reimbursable grant expenditures and contractual relationship of these grants. <u>Pool budget for 2024- Fund 75</u>-\$155,000 Expenditures include ½ pool manager salary, office supplies and printing supplies for Capital Campaign, Red Cross certifications and continuing education and \$95,000 for new pool Furniture, Fixtures and Equipment.

<u>Aquatics Facility Design and Construction needs</u>- Fund 74 & 75: \$5,000,000 in 2024 budget from Bond proceeds which total \$8,587,508 minus the bond closing costs of \$228,815. The recent costing exercises conducted during conceptual design work, by the architectural and construction team, revealed the budget needs would be greater than the bonded amount for the project. The value engineering exercises have created a delay in the original schedule which had construction ending in June of 2025. The new goal and challenge for the design and construction team is the ability to design and build a pool that is energy efficient using renewables as the main source of power without losing the functionality a public aquatic facility must adhere to. We re-created the budget using additional money from the General Fund reserves to provide an additional \$1,600,000 and an analysis of the potential additional funding from a capital campaign and grant writing efforts would be able to potentially increase the budget another \$1,600,000. That provides the project with an overall budget with contingencies of \$11,693,692. The design team conducted some costing exercises and this amount, that has been put into the 2024 budget numbers, was enough for a gas building and gas pool heating systems.

The design and construction team was challenged with the following parameters to try and fit the project within this budget.

- Staff, backed up by survey data from the public outreach during the master plan process, want the simultaneous programming options that three bodies of water provide. Those three bodies would include a 5 lane lap pool, an entertainment pool with a 12 foot deep end and a therapy spa.
- Systems and buildings designed for year-round use and/or extended season for the operations of the spa and lap pool. Entertainment pool would operate for a 4 month summer season. This has been changed to a 6 month operating season with the entertainment pool operational for 4 months only.
- Net zero building using renewables with 25% energy use coming from renewables and on site solar.
- Conducting a Return on Investment analysis for the different electrification systems presented.
- Electrification of pool pump room with an analysis of air sourced heat pumps, initial costs, operating costs and greenhouse gas emissions of the different systems.

There are four options that have come out of this analytical work conducted by the teams at Branch Pattern, the MEP design team, Group 16, the energy efficiency engineers, Counsilman Hunsaker, our pool equipment consultants and AD Miller our General Contractor.

- 1. All electric building with a gas burning system to heat the pools. This is being priced presently.
- 2. Design the building to be as close to net zero as possible and use a hybrid electric source with a gas equipment backup to heat the pools. This presents an operating cost challenge and the necessity for new electric service capabilities upgrades. This was deemed too expensive.
- 3. Look at the air sourced heat pumps with the electric backup systems to heat and cool the building and the three pools. This did bring the budget to 14 million and space consideration for the speculated 2 air sourced heat pump units which are 28'x9'x8' each and the need for electric service upgrades. This was deemed too expensive.

Some items for discussion:

- Conduct some value engineering on existing square footage of pools and building. Does this create an opportunity to down size equipment and drop operating costs significantly. Remove diving board allowing entertainment pool to be shallower with less water volume and initial construction costs with the square footage diminished. (\$500,000) Remove Trellis which would cause offsite solar purchases to be required. (\$400,000 plus cost of credits) Remove the spa. (\$318,500) This value engineering will take place when cost estimates are finalized.
- Explore grant sources that might help make electrification and air sourced heat pumps affordable. Still have the operating costs to consider. Electrification of pool heating has been taken off the table due to operating costs. Air sourced Het pumps are still being looked at for the building and pool.
- Adjust operating parameters to a shorter season to see if this saves a substantial amount on construction costs, without losing the ability to extend the season into the fall and spring. This exercise is being conducted at this time and will be presented to the Bot on November 14th.
- Design facility and mechanical systems for seasonal use only. This is also being studied for the presentation on November 14th.

The budget shortfall has produced the need to hire a Capital Campaign Manager to help conduct the Capital Campaign and the need for a grant writer for a timely delivery of potential grants. Additional granting options will be researched including GOCO, FMLD, Colorado Parks & Wildlife Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF), DOLA and potential health and energy efficiency grant opportunities through the Colorado Energy Office for implementation of the Aquatics Facility Master Plan needs.

Climate Action Plan & Path to Net Zero for New Construction and Existing Buildings

- <u>Electrification of mow crew equipment- Fund 74 & 01:</u> \$50,000 Continue with the replacement
 of gas mowers, blowers and weed whackers with electric units is a multi-year strategy to
 switch the fleet to electric. We will be replacing the diesel Toro sit on top, zero turn mower with
 a compatible Toro electric mower.
- <u>Miners Park Irrigation domestic to ditch H20 project-</u> -Fund 01: \$4,000 Retrofit Miners park irrigation system to ditch water vs. domestic water source.
- Aquatics Facility Energy Efficiency - Fund 75: see above
