The meeting was called to order by President Bill Lamott, at 7:02 P.M.

II. ROLL CALL

Jeff Weinger, 25866 Balsam

• He has an ongoing issue and was trying to work through it with the Village Administrator and Attorney. He stated that he has sent two correspondences to the Village Attorney and has not received a response. He would be willing to send a packet of information to the Council. His issue is that his house is being inundated with water since the construction of his neighbor's pool. He has a video and pictures. He has issues with the Building Official's actions, and the fact the Village Administrator will not speak with him. He has also tried to reach out to HRC.

The Village Attorney stated he forwarded the emails to the appropriate authority. He also stated that the Council has a policy that the Village Attorney can only be engaged on their approval or that of the Village Administrator.

Lamott asked Mr. Weinger to get his information to the Village Administrator, as he is the point of contact for the Village Council.

• She stated she started an online petition to improve service and stop outages, call dropping, and the loss of internet service by establishing a Utilities and Technology Committee. She stated that these things are a regular occurrence in Franklin and are harming residents and creating life threatening hazards.

• She provided the Council with an update on the two wires hanging from the February storms. She has been in contact with Comcast with no luck.

• Lamott stated there were a couple of meetings with T-Mobile and AT&T and that they were productive. Both companies are planning to add more cells to the distributed antenna system. T-Mobile is further along with their plan. But AT&T has been open, honest, and listened to the Village. One of the issues the committee raised was the issue of fiber optics. But if the Village wants that it will have to find grant opportunities.

Discussion followed including discussion on nodes, the conservations with the different carrier, and small cells vs towers.

B. Council Report

Goldberg asked Fraser, who is responsible for the trash that is in the Telegraph Road right of way? Fraser stated he would investigate that problem.

Sahli brought up the fact DTE that had scheduled an outage and hadn't notified the police department. He said this is why the Village needs a Public Utility Commission.

Hanke was concerned about the lack of communication and the lack of responsiveness between the Village offices and the residents. He would like to see a complaint log from the residents.

Discussion followed.

Action Item: Sahli would like to see this item added to the administrative report.

Fraser added that Jerry Johnson and his crew were out on the road from 8:30 in the morning and worked throughout the night as well.

Erlich questioned the tree removal service the Village employed not showing up. Fraser explained they did not have any staff on hand.

Hanke recommended the Village publicly recognize the effort of Chief Tony Averbuch and Chief Dan Roberts. Hansen stated maybe with a letter from the Council.

B. Discuss Request to Amend the Zoning Map.

WHEREAS, the PI Public Institutional District has recently been created as Section 1259.01 of the Zoning Code of the Village of Franklin in accordance with the Village Land Use Master Plan, and

WHEREAS, no properties within the Village are zoned PI, and

WHEREAS, there are numerous properties in the Village where the current use meets the standards of the PI Public Institutional District, including the following:

- Franklin Village Offices, including related buildings
- Franklin/Bingham Farms Police Department
- Franklin Library
- FCA Owned Recreation Fields and Related Facilities
- Franklin Village Green
- Franklin Sledding Hill
- Franklin Community Church
- Franklin/Bingham Farms Fire Department
- Franklin Museum and adjoining property
- Huda School
- Franklin Branch U.S. Post Office

WHEREAS, the Planning Commission is authorized to initiate the rezoning process pursuant to Chapter 1246 of the Village Code and the Michigan Zoning Enabling Act, Public Act 110 of 2006, as amended.

NOW THEREFORE IT IS RESOLVED that the Franklin Village Board of Trustees hereby requests the Franklin Village Planning Commission to examine the properties listed above and any other eligible properties within the Village to prepare recommendations to change the Zoning Map for those eligible properties to PI Public Institutional District.

It was moved by Goldberg, seconded by Hanke to approve authorizing the Planning Commission to initiate the rezoning process and to amend it to include eligible and appropriate properties.

D. Consider Proclamation for Arbor Day 2023.

PROCLAMATION Arbor Day 2023

WHEREAS, in 1872, J. Sterling Morton proposed to the Nebraska Board of Agriculture that a special day be set aside for the planting of trees, and

WHEREAS, this holiday, called Arbor Day, was first observed with the planting of more than a million trees in Nebraska, and

WHEREAS, Arbor Day is now observed throughout the nation and the world, and

WHEREAS, trees can reduce the erosion of our precious topsoil by wind and water, cut heating and cooling costs, moderate the temperature, clean the air, produce life-giving oxygen, and provide habitat for wildlife, and

WHEREAS, trees are a renewable resource giving us paper, wood for our homes, fuel for our fires and countless other wood products, and

WHEREAS, trees in our city increase property values, enhance the economic vitality of business areas, and beautify our community, and

WHEREAS, trees, wherever they are planted, are a source of joy and spiritual renewal.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED I, Bill Lamott, Council President of the Village of Franklin, do hereby proclaim, Friday, April 28, 2023, as Arbor Day in the Village of Franklin, and further, I urge all citizens to celebrate Arbor Day to support efforts to protect our trees and woodlands, and to plant trees to gladden the heart and promote the well-being of this and future generations.

It was moved by Hanke, seconded by Hansen to approve the resolution for the Proclamation for Arbor Day 2023.

E. Consider Resolution for West Nile Fund Program 2023.

West Nile Virus Fund Program 2023 Resolution

WHEREAS, the Oakland County Board of Commissioners has established a West Nile Virus Fund Program to assist Oakland County cities, villages, and townships in addressing mosquito control activities; and

WHEREAS, Oakland County's West Nile Virus Fund Program authorizes Oakland County cities, villages, and townships to apply for reimbursement of eligible expenses incurred in connection with personal mosquito protection measures and mosquito larvicide distribution; and

WHEREAS, Oakland County has allotment of \$493.33 in funds for the Village of Franklin to spend on West Nile Virus prevention; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Franklin, Oakland County, Michigan plans to incur expenses in connection with mosquito control activities believed to be eligible for reimbursement under Oakland County's West Nile Virus Fund Program; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Franklin intends to implement a program for individual-sized, personal insect repellent distribution to residents; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: that the Village of Franklin authorizes and directs its Administrator, Roger Fraser, as agent for the Village of Franklin, in the manner and to the extent provided under an Oakland County Board of Commissioners Resolution, to purchase and request reimbursement for eligible mosquito control activity under Oakland County's West Nile Virus Fund Program for 2023.

It was moved by Erlich, seconded by Hanke to approve the resolution for the West Nile Fund Program 2023.

Subject: Regulations Governing Horses and Other Equine

Dear Council Members:

At your April 2023 meeting, during your review of the proposed regulations dealing with horses and other equine, questions were raised about where paddock fences could be constructed. There is a clear desire to allow horses to be kept in the required front yard, which means that a paddock fence should be allowed within the front setback. This topic is dealt with in Section 612.22(c).

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Before providing a recommendation, I would like to provide you with some background information. The existing ordinance currently contains the following regulation:

The fences constructed after enactment of this section shall be set back a minimum of ten feet from the property line.

My interpretation of this regulation is that such fences must be set back at least ten feet from the front, side, and rear property lines. Upon review of this regulation, the Planning Commission decided that horses should be allowed to be kept in the front yard, with no setback restrictions. Consequently, the regulation was amended to be more specific, addressing only the side and rear property lines, as follows:

The fences constructed after enactment of this section shall be set back a minimum of ten feet from the side and rear property lines.

These regulations are inconsistent with regulations dealing with Section 1268.28(b)(5)(A), which addresses the permitted locations of fences in general throughout the Village as follows:

Except as specifically provided below, fences are permitted only in rear yards and side yards. No fence shall be permitted to extend into a front yard, except as specifically provided herein. For side and rear yards abutting a street, no fence shall be constructed or maintained within any required setback from the street.

There are no exceptions in Section 1268.28 for fences enclosing horses and other equine.

RECOMMENDATION

I recommend that the Village retain the *existing* ten-foot side and rear yard setback for paddock fences. It is reasonable to expect that horses would be set back a minimal distance from their residential neighbors. However, for clarity, I recommend adding a sentence that notes that there is a zero front yard setback for such fences. Language must also be added acknowledging that these regulations are inconsistent with the regulations in Section 1268.28(b)(5)(A).



I have incorporated these recommendations into the revised regulations, which are attached to this letter. If you have any questions or concerns regarding these recommendations, please feel free to contact me. Thank you.

REGULATIONS DEALING WITH HORSES AND OTHER EQUINE Village of Franklin, Michigan

INTRODUCTION

Section 612.22 of the Village Code sets forth regulations governing the keeping of horses and other large animals in the Village of Franklin. Provisions in subsections (b) and (i) imply that the keeping of large animals, including horses, should be phased out. The Planning Commission believes that residents should be allowed to keep horses and other equine in the Village, subject to certain conditions.

Section 612.22 - HORSES AND OTHER EQUINE

- (a) This section shall be known as the Village of Franklin Horses and Other Equine ordinance and shall apply to the keeping of horses and other equine that are not normally kept within a residential structure.
- (b) No large animals other than horses and other equine shall be kept or maintained upon any property within the Village of Franklin. In order to maintain a horse or other equine upon any property within the Village of Franklin there shall be a minimum of one (1) acre of pasture or unobstructed land for each such animal. Such pasture shall be exclusive of any buildings or structures, including driveways, sheds, utility facilities, or other types of structures with the sole exception of stables. Not more than two (2) such animals, including offspring kept for more than ninety (90) days, shall be kept per dwelling unit irrespective of acreage.
- (c) The acreage that is provided for the keeping of a horse or other equine shall be enclosed by a wooden fence. The fence shall comply with the ordinances of the Village of Franklin, except that it shall be a minimum of four (4) feet in height and shall not exceed six (6) feet in height. Notwithstanding the regulations in Section 1268.28(b)(5)(A) dealing with permitted locations of fences in the Village, the fences constructed after enactment of this section shall comply with the following minimum setbacks:

Rear Yard	10 ft.

- (d) No person owning, keeping, or maintaining any horse or other equine shall permit such loud and unreasonable noises or noxious and constant odors to emanate from the property where such animal is kept in such a manner so as to cause an unreasonable interference with the rights, enjoyment, and quietude of surrounding properties.
- (e) No person keeping such horse or other equine shall:

- 1. Cause the conditions of keeping such animal to lead to the deterioration of the health and well-being of any such animal,
- 2. Abandon such animal or keep it without adequate care,
- 3. Permit an aged, diseased, maimed, sick or disabled animal to suffer unnecessary torture or pain, or
- 4. Fail to provide sufficient food, water, shelter, and medical attention to maintain such animal in a state of good health.
- (f) No person keeping or maintaining a horse or other equine within the Village of Franklin shall permit such animal to enter upon the property of another without the consent of such property owner. The person keeping or maintaining a horse or other equine shall be responsible for promptly removing the excrement left on public property or on the private property of another.
- (g) The Village of Franklin may employ an Animal Control Officer or designate such other person to enforce and administer the provisions of this section, who shall be invested with such powers by approval of the Village Administrator and Village Council as are necessary for the purpose of enforcing the provisions of this section.
- (h) All horses or other equine shall be confined as provided in subsection (c) hereof unless they are being led or ridden on public lands.

ORDINANCE NO. 2023-03

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE LARGE ANIMALS OF SECTION 612.22 OF PART SIX OF THE GENERAL OFFENSES CODE, OF THE CODIFIED OF THE VILLAGE OF FRANKLIN, OAKLAND COUNTY, MICHIGAN, TO REGULATE CHICKEN AND DUCKS AND TO PROTECT THE PUBLIC HEALTH, SAFETY AND WELFARE.

THE VILLAGE OF FRANKLIN ORDAINS:

<u>Section 1.</u> <u>Amendment.</u> That Part 6 – General Offences Code; Chapter 612, Animals; Section 612.22, Large Animals, of the Codified Ordinances, Village of Franklin, Oakland County, Michigan, is hereby amended in its entirety to include the following:

612.22 HORSES AND OTHER EQUINE

- (a) This section shall be known as the Village of Franklin Horses and Other Equine ordinance and shall apply to the keeping of horses and other equine that are not normally kept within a residential structure.
- (b) No large animals other than horses and other equine shall be kept or maintained upon any property within the Village of Franklin. In order to maintain a horse or other equine upon any property within the Village of Franklin there shall be a minimum of one (1) acre of pasture or unobstructed land for each such animal. Such pasture shall be exclusive of any buildings or structures, including driveways, sheds, utility facilities or other types of structures with the sole exception of stables. Not more than two such animals, including offspring kept for more than ninety days, shall be kept per dwelling unit irrespective of acreage.
- (c) The acreage that is provided for the keeping of a horse or other equine shall be enclosed by a wooden fence. The fence shall comply with the ordinances of the Village of Franklin, except that it shall be a minimum of four (4) feet in height and shall not exceed six (6) feet in height. Notwithstanding the regulations in Section 1268.28(b)(5)(A)dealing with permitted locations of fences in the Village, the fences constructed after enactment of this section shall comply with the following setbacks:

- (d) No person owning, keeping or maintaining any horse or other equine shall permit such loud and unreasonable noises or noxious and constant odors to emanate from the property where such animal is kept in such a manner so as to cause an unreasonable interference with the rights, enjoyment and quietude of surrounding properties.
- (e) No person keeping such horse or other equine shall:

- 1. Cause the conditions of keeping such animal to lead to the deterioration of the health and well-being of any such animal,
- 2. Abandon such animal or keep it without adequate care
- 3. Permit an aged, diseased, maimed, sick or disabled animal to suffer unnecessary torture or pain;
- 4. Fail to provide sufficient food, water, shelter and medical attention to maintain such animal in a state of good health.
- (f) No person keeping or maintaining a horse or other equine within the Village of Franklin shall permit such animal to enter upon the property of another without the consent of such property owner. The person keeping or maintaining a horse or other equine shall be responsible for promptly removing the excrement left on public property or on the private property of another.
- (g) The Village of Franklin may employ an Animal Control Officer or designate such other person to enforce and administer the provisions of this section, who shall be invested with such powers by approval of the Village Administrator and Village Council as are necessary for the purpose of enforcing the provisions of this section.
- (h) All horses or other equine shall be confined as provided in subsection (c) hereof unless they are being led or ridden on public lands.
- <u>Section 2.</u> <u>Severability.</u> This ordinance and each Chapter, section, subsection, paragraph, subparagraph, part, provision, sentence, word and portion thereof are hereby declared to be severable; and if they or any of them are declared to be invalid or unenforceable for any reason by a court of competent jurisdiction, it is hereby provided that the remainder of this ordinance shall not be affected thereby.
- <u>Section 3</u>. <u>Penalty</u>. All violations of this ordinance shall be municipal civil infractions and upon a determination of responsibility therefore shall be punishable by a civil fine of not more than \$500 and such other sanctions as may be ordered pursuant to Village Code Section 202.99.
- <u>Section 4</u>. <u>Savings</u>. All proceedings pending and all rights and liabilities existing, acquired or incurred the time this ordinance takes effect, are saved and may be consummated according to the law in force when they were commenced.

Section 5. Repeal, Effective Date, Adoption.

- (1) <u>Repeal</u>. All regulatory provisions contained in other Village ordinances which conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.
- (2) <u>Effective Date</u>. This ordinance shall become effective on May 8, 2023, twenty (20) days following its adoption, and shall be published prior to its effective date as mandated by charter and statute.
- (3) <u>Adoption</u>. This ordinance was adopted by the Village Council of the Village of Franklin at a meeting thereof held on May 8, 2023.

Power outages, call drops, and loss of internet service is a regular occurrence in Franklin harming residents and creating life-threatening hazards that can be avoided. The frequency at which residents are losing cell service, internet, power, and by effect, heat and water, is preventable if the Village prioritizes these issues. The administration needs to partner with utility companies, municipalities, and commissions and leverage its resources to improve Village services and reliability. One immediate no-cost solution is to establish a Village Utility and Technology Commission to recommend actions and oversee investments that improve service and enhance reliability in the Village. The Administration needs to act upon these recommendations to benefit residents.

The Village's trend of inaction and false starts in the areas of utilities and technology create a growing and preventable danger to Franklin residents. We are demanding immediate and concrete action to prevent further danger to Franklin residents.

Continued improvements to technology, infrastructure, and utilities across the state are available and accessible to Franklin. We recognize that the occasional power outage and dropped call is inevitable; some risks are outside of Village control. However, there are many improvements and changes the Village government can make to reduce the number of outages and improve service within its boundaries. We implore the Village government to engage, communicate, and serve its residents by working tirelessly to address the technology and utility gaps within our village. The Village administration has a duty to keep us safe, healthy, and connected to basic essentials like power and water. We now call upon you to fulfill that duty.

Goals and Scope of Committee and Requested Action:

To provide policy direction, oversight and to deliberate, drive, and make recommendations on matters related to:

- 1. Village technology planning, implementation, and organization including the Village's digital presence, technology priorities and initiatives, utilities infrastructure, strategy, and decisions;
- 2. Identify and pursue technology and energy grants;
- 3. Coordinate and communicate with utilities, service providers, public entities and other stakeholders on efforts and remediation approaches related to power outages, improved service, mitigation, and emerging technologies and trends
- 4. Share and leverage resources, best practices, data, and trainings to improved Franklin residents' experience with technology and utilities.

Example of lack of focused effort and committee to drive initiatives related to technology and utilities:

- 1. Value and ROI on Water Survey launched in 2021
- 2. Strategy to improve cell service for Franklin residents
- 3. Opportunity for residents to remotely participate in council, planning, and zoning board meetings
- 4. Emergency Communications Plan: Ability to send emergency text alerts to notify residents when lights at intersections are out, when planned maintenance is scheduled that will cut off power and water. Notification to residents when power is out and expected restoration time.
- 5. Funding for outage prevention and grid resilience, Michigan will award up to \$7,485,575 each year for 5 years to regrant to eligible entities for projects that improve the reliability and resilience of the electric grid. Shelby Township submitted a response to the RFP requesting money for EV charging stations. Did Franklin submit a response to the RFP?

Request from Council: Establish a utilities & technology commission with council representatives and resident members to serve on this commission.

RESOLUTION DIRECTING PLANNING COMMISSION TO ADDRESS ADDITIONAL CONCERNS INVOLVING THE RECENTLY ADOPTED/ENACTED CHCKEN AND DUCK ORDINANCE

WHEREAS, on or about April 10, 2023, the Village Council of the Village of Franklin adopted and enacted its chicken and duck ordinance, as further described in Ordinance 1268.26, et. seq., and

WHEREAS, concerns have arisen involving the sexes of the chickens and ducks, permit expiration and renewal, enclosure and location of coop and pen in connection with water wells, enforcement, compliance with Generally Accepted Agricultural Management Practices (GAAMPs) or MDARD regulations and other issues, and

WHEREAS, the Village Council of the Village of Franklin believes the Chicken and Duck Ordinance as approved on second reading on April 10, 2023, was not ready for implementation and needs additional review by the Planning Commission,

THEREFORE, the Village Council of Franklin Village resolves:

- 1. Ordinance 1268.26, et. seq., the Chicken and Duck Ordinance as adopted April 10, 2023, is hereby repealed.
- 2. The Planning Commission is directed to address the following issues with the Chicken and Duck Ordinance as previously presented and to return the ordinance with recommendations not later than July 31, 2023:
 - a. Section 612.24(e) of the Village Code of Ordinances addresses the requirements of a zoning permit. Does Section 1242.03 address issues specific to the chicken and duck ordinance, such as: should there be an expiration date on an approved permit, how is a renewal obtained, permit fees, condition and cleanliness of coops and grounds, health/safety of animals, inspections. Should the renewal of such a permit be conditioned upon inspections related to health/safety of the animals, cleanliness/condition of the animals and structure?
 - b. Section 612.24(g)(2): Number of Birds. Roosters are not permitted. There are a number of factors in determining the sex of young chickens including age. This section addresses the number of birds permitted per ½ acre; however, this does not address the age of the birds at which enforcement begins.
 - c. Proximity of animal housing to water wells. Should the coops and pens have a minimum location setback from water wells that are used for human consumption? Address manure and the storage of manure in connection with well locations.

- d. How will enforcement be accomplished when this Village ordinance conflicts with Southfield Township ordinance banning the keeping of chickens? Present Animal Control Services are provided by Southfield Township.
- e. Section 612.24(g)(5)(ii) doesn't address enforcement for unsupervised birds and birds at large.
- f. Type of site plan required for permitting. No reference concerning the *maximum* height and *maximum* square footage of an enclosure.
- g. No reference concerning adherence to Generally Accepted Agricultural Management Practices (GAAMPs) or MDARD regulations.
- h. Appeal process concerning denial of permits or renewals thereof.
- i. Any other issues that the Planning Commission may consider relevant.

2023 CITY PROCLAMATION DECLARING THE FIRST FRIDAY IN JUNE TO BE NATIONAL GUN VIOLENCE AWARENESS DAY

This proclamation declares the first Friday in June to be National Gun Violence Awareness Day in the City of ______ to honor and remember all victims and survivors of gun violence and to declare that we as a country must do more to end this public health crisis. WHEREAS, every day, more than 120 Americans are killed by gun violence and more than 200 are shot and wounded, with an average of more than 17,000 gun homicides every year; and **WHEREAS**, Americans are 26 times more likely to die by gun homicide than people in other high-income countries; and WHEREAS, Michigan has 1,382 gun deaths every year, with a rate of 13.7 deaths per 100,000 people, a crisis that costs the state \$16.8 billion each year, of which \$380.5 million is paid by taxpayers. Michigan has the 25th highest rate of gun deaths in the US; and WHEREAS, gun homicides and assaults are concentrated in cities, with more than half of all firearm related gun deaths in the nation occurring in 127 cities; and **WHEREAS,** cities across the nation, including in ______ are working to end the senseless violence with evidence-based solutions; and

WHEREAS, protecting public safety in the communities they serve is mayors' highest responsibility; and

WHEREAS, support for the Second Amendment rights of law-abiding citizens goes hand-in-hand with keeping guns away from people with dangerous histories; and

WHEREAS, mayors and law enforcement officers —in partnership with local violence intervention activists and resources —know their communities best, are the most familiar with local criminal activity and how to address it, and are best positioned to understand how to keep their citizens safe; and

WHEREAS, gun violence prevention is more important than ever as we see an increase in firearm homicides, and nonfatal shootings across the country, increased calls to domestic violence hotlines, and an increase in city gun violence;

WHEREAS, in January 2013, Hadiya Pendleton was tragically shot and killed at age 15; and on June 2, 2023 to recognize the 26th birthday of Hadiya Pendleton (born: June 2, 1997), people across the United States will recognize National Gun Violence Awareness Day and wear orange in tribute to -

- (1) Hadiya Pendleton and other victims of gun violence; and
- (2) the loved ones of those victims; and

WHEREAS, the idea was inspired by a group of Hadiya's friends, who asked their classmates to commemorate her life by wearing orange; they chose this color because hunters wear orange to announce themselves to other hunters when out in the woods, and orange is a color that symbolizes the value of human life; and

WHEREAS, anyone can join this campaign by pledging to wear orange on June 2nd, the first Friday in June in 2023, to help raise awareness about gun violence; and

WHEREAS, by wearing orange on June 2, 2023 Americans will raise awareness about gun violence and honor the lives of gun violence victims and survivors; and

WHEREAS, we renew our commitment to reduce gun violence and pledge to do all we can to keep firearms out of the hands of people who should not have access to them, and encourage responsible gun ownership to help keep our families and communities safe.
