#### I. CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order by President Bill Lamott, at 7:00 P.M.

#### II. ROLL CALL

#### III. ADOPTION OF AGENDA

Goldberg thought at the legal committee meeting that an informational item would be added to the agenda regarding the distribution of information on the Headlee Override and what is means. #### IV. MINUTES

#### A. Regular Meeting of August 8, 2022

Erlich stated there were a few typos.

- 1. Page (2) two, first paragraph add the word "fountain" after drinking.
- 2. Page (3) three, replace the following sentence "And the neighbors were the park with about two on the top of the street were notified either not only from a safety standpoint, for the cars coming up and down the street during baseball season, which they do speed park into the street, which would cause issues with a fire truck or other

emergency vehicles getting through." with "From a safety standpoint, for the cars are coming up and down the street during baseball season, which they do speed and park on the street, which would cause issues with a fire truck or other emergency vehicles getting through."

- 3. And the neighbors were the park with about two on the top of the street were notified either not only", capitalize "From", after standpoint remove ", for" and add "are" after cars and add "and" between speed and park.
- 4. Page (4) four, Chief Dan Roberts' second bullet point change "them big owl" to "him Big Al".
- 5. Page (6) six, replace all occurrence of "minutes" with "millages"; change "mils" to "mills".
- 6. Page (7) seven, under bullet point (5) change all occurrence of "mainstream" with "main street".
- 7. Page (8) eight, deleted last three sentences beginning on the bottom of page (7) seven.

Hansen stated on Page (6) John Bry's name was misspelled.

## V. PUBLIC REQUESTS AND COMMENTS

Public Comments were opened by President Bill Lamott at 7:06 PM.

#### Nena Downing, 30645 Bruce Lane

- She invited the community of Franklin to come to the library on September 29<sup>th</sup> at 7 p.m. for a special presentation by Chief Dan Roberts called "Humorous Tales of Crime and Punishment".
- She has initiated a group of concerned people in the community to start a food coop. They have a location and the people. When she gets more information, she will share with the community.

#### Joan Miller, 31010 Oakleaf Lane

• She was concern about a raise in the village tax and the November ballot. Residents need to know what is going on. She would recommend that hard copies be mailed to the residents, explaining why the Village needs the millage increase. She was not happy with the reason that the Village put in the new sidewalks. It was against the Charter.

Seltzer explained the Village has been having several meetings about the budget. He also explained the sidewalks were placed for connectivity. The sidewalks will bring people to the Village's beautiful grounds, tennis courts, baseball fields, the downtown and the cider mill.

#### Brain Kutinski, 26480 Normandy

• He bought up the letter he received from the Village President. The letter that states the Village Council Trustees had spent huge amount of money reducing the historic rural character of the Village. Also, the letter asked for money. He doesn't think it was an appropriate letter, to come from the President. He also asked if there is going to be a forum for the people running for Trustees can speak on the issues.

Saenz stated to the resident if he could set something up if he like or an organization like League of Women Voters. Clerk Hughes added the League of Women Voters will have a forum on October 11<sup>th</sup> at the Franklin Community Church at 7 p.m.

#### David Sahli, 26172 Meadow Drive

- He was there to discuss when the candidates were provided notice that the Village would begin enforcing the Village's sign ordinance. He informed the Village that it should take the time to establish enforcement procedures to ensure that the ordinance is objectively and fairly enforced. The Village opted not to develop the enforcement procedures. Less than a week later, the code enforcement officer was removing two of his signs. He asked on what grounds was he removing the signs, Sahli stated, they met the requirements of the new ordinance. The code enforcement officer stated he pulled them because they were in the village right away. When asked to cite the law or ordinance that prohibits the signs, he was unable to answer but refused to allow the signs to remain up. Additionally, he also informed him that a notice of violation was issued to the resident because the sign was too close to the sidewalk.
- Sahli informed him that the signs were measured to ensure they were five feet for the hard surface, in fact, he measured them himself. When asked if the code enforcement officer measured and was told he did not. He emailed the Village Administrator requesting guidance as to which ordinance did the code enforcement officer relied on to pull the signs and why were non-political signs not pulled. It has been 10 days and seven emails, and the Village has not responded to give guidance in this matter.
- The residents have been given the impression that we need this millage to be financially viable. If the Village don't get the millage increase, which means that it's the burden of the Village to inform the voters to give them a reason to approve it. During the sidewalk vote, there was a lot of distrust that was created. The rumors are that the money from that millage will be diverted into building further sidewalks. The more information the Village can get out, the better chance the millage will have to pass.

#### Natalya Shub, 32334 Franklin Road

- She was here to address President Lamott. When he became a village president, he has divided the residents. At one of the council meetings, she asked him to resign as he was not fit to be Village President because he violated the oath. He has abused the power that was given to him. Throughout her public comments. Trustee Erlich was laughing even though, the attorney reminded everyone at the meeting to not interrupt, react or make any comments while a resident was speaking. In a different meeting, Trustee Erlich interrupted her throughout her public comments again. At that time, Trustee Erlich was never condemned for her inappropriate behavior. Nor did the President try to stop Trustee Erlich's father when he berated harassed Trustee Seltzer.
- After the President and his supporters lost their fight regarding sidewalks, he started retaliating
  against families who were vocal for the sidewalks. By using his position and power, he started
  blocking candidates from those families, when they apply to various village positions. He started

helping his friends and supporters by interfering with the code enforcement ordinances, interfering with property line disputes between the neighbors. There's a police report, police officer witnessed that President Lamott arrived because his friend supporter called him for help. His friend and supporter verbally attacked and harassed her and her three-and-a-half-year-old son because she was for the sidewalks and Jewish at the council meeting. She and another resident ask him to address his friends and supporters to stop those attacks.

- At the block party a month later, President Lamott was on the porch with the person who attacked her and her son. He was enjoying time with the attacker. Last year he made sure that the fire department decorated large Christmas tree, even made sure to send flyers to the residents regarding that event. But that year, he did not instruct and made sure the Menorah is not out. Trustee Seltzer managed to get the Menorah out and lit.
- There are other discriminatory harassing actions he used against Shub and her family. She states
  if President Lamott does not resign, her family will address in this matter soon. The council
  should all be aware that one of those friends was already prosecuted, and the mother of those
  friends was almost prosecuted. Another of those friends is a waiting to be prosecuted. Village
  is possibly facing a lawsuit.

#### Angelina Sulaka, 26172 Meadow Drive

- She is confused about what the millage is for. The lack of communication is a signal to the voters that, the millage is because of the cost overrun of the sidewalks. So that lack of communication is not an oversight. It's intentional because they're trying to confuse the Franklin residents and what this message is for, and then if the millage doesn't pass, he's going to say see, the residents don't want this millage.
- Let's remember President Lamont is president, Roger is the administrator, and they let a millage lapse, because he couldn't track the millage and so he let a millage lapse under his leadership. They don't have any formal process because we've asked to see formal processes to track millages code citations enforcement. And so now when this millage, they're going to say, look, the voters don't want it.
- President Lamott used his public title to solicit donations, but don't want residents to come to a public forum to ask about it. He can't have it both ways. If you want to use your public title to solicit donations, you must accept the responsibility. The letter could have been signed the letter Bill Lamott, private citizen, Bill Lamott, Franklin resident or Bill Lamott, dog owner but instead it was signed President of the Council. He did that because he knew it would give it more weight. He knew that he would use his position of power in a public trust and the oath that he took to solicit private PAC donations. This is a conflict of interest. The solicitation letters were intentionally sent to people who would be confused by it. It was sent to people that supported him in the past and would open their checkbooks.
- There are residents hesitant to put up political signs because they're scared about getting a notice. Because they know that the code enforcement officer is following his lead and following Roger lead and selectively enforcing the ordinance against candidates that he doesn't support. So now he is suppressing people's political speech because they know that he will retaliate against them. We have had our signs ripped; we have had our lights vandalized. They have been harassed by people that he supports. People that are his running mates, and people that are funding his campaign.

#### VI. REPORTS OF VILLAGE OFFICERS AND AGENT

#### REPORTS OF VILLAGE OFFICERS AND AGENT

#### A. Police Report

#### **Dan Roberts, Police Chief**

- Dan Roberts, Police Chief reviewed with Village Council the submitted report.
- Roberts stated Labor Day in terms of police complaints went very well There were the usual amount of parking complaints. There is an uptick in larceny from autos, including the one that happened over the weekend at the Franklin Grill where a vehicle was targeted for theft of the catalytic converter part of the exhaust system. These crimes are mostly seen over on the commercial properties along Telegraph Road, but they are starting to be seen here in Franklin. Please if anyone sees suspicious activity with people underneath cars give the police department a call at 911.
- Lieutenant Mike Bastianelli had surgery on his right shoulder last week. He will be out for two to three months; this will create staffing issues for the department. There will be an uptick in the amount of overtime over the next couple of months.
- The current roof situation, a large section of the roof shingles (a five- or six-foot square) have blown off and now the tar paper is exposed. There haven't any leaking inside the station yet. Working with Roger to come up with the cost to replace the roof. The current quote for cedar shake roof is \$208,000. Susan is working on a request for proposals.

#### **Discussion:**

- ❖ Hansen thanked the police for their work at the Labor Day Round Up. And asked the Chief if he is working with Gary Roberts, from the Historic District Commission or SHPO.
  - ➤ He stated that the police building is not an historic building.

## **B.** Fire Report

#### **Tony Averbuch, Fire Chief**

- Tony Averbuch, Fire Chief reviewed with Village Council the submitted report.
- He stated that the of the storm the fire department had close to 30 runs. That storm was epic, in terms, of the damage caused, the interruption to services and the lack of notice. In one case, a resident who was having an issue with durable medical equipment and have no ability to contract with a medical provider. This problem is caused by our reliance on Bluetooth, Wi-Fi, and cellular communications. Also, radio communications are already affected be Franklin's foliage. He is asking for the residents have a disaster preparedness plan in place in the future. There is a website promoted by the U.S. government called ready.gov. There are groups like the Red Cross, that detail steps people can do to prepare. It is important to have a backup plan.

#### **Discussion:**

- ❖ Seltzer asked if the Village should include this information in the weekly newsletter.
- ❖ Hansen mentioned working with Bloomfield Township Cable TV to do video interview that could be rebroadcast.

➤ Chief Averbuch liked the idea of doing a sit-down question and answer session with Bloomfield Township.

#### C. Treasurer Report

#### Lance Vainik, Village Treasurer

• Lance Vainik, Village Treasurer reviewed with the Village Council the treasurer's report. There was a large entry of \$18,787.35 for landscaping services paid to Johnson Landscaping and one for \$27,121.79 infrastructure services paid to PipeTek.

#### VIII. SPECIAL REPORTS

#### A. President's Report

Lamott recognize Susan Goldstrom for her hard work on the last few weeks while the Village was dealing have a lot of vacations and sickness. His next topic was the deer management issue affecting

the surrounding communities. The Southeast Michigan Council of Government (SEMCOG) will make available a questionnaire to everyone in the six-county area. The information is available on its website, hard copies are available here at Village Hall and it will be in the weekly newsletter. Working with the Department of Natural Resources (DNR), who is responsible for the deer population, will help the Village figure out what we do or don't need.

The Village has been working with a consultant about wireless phone service. They have completed a drive through the Village to measure service levels. The result show the Village service ranges from good to poor. But there are some areas around the distributed antenna system with very good service. The next step will be for the committee to meet with one of the carriers and show them the data and come up with a plan to improve cell service.

#### **B.** Council Report

Seltzer discussed the personal letter sent to residents by the Village President. He doesn't understand a President who endorses while denigrating the very Council he serves to oversee. He has heard the numbers of comments about this letter, that some people found insulting and denigrating and inappropriate. He agrees because not only is it a letter from the President of the Council, denigrating and questioning the efficiency of the council, but there are examples of what he calls waste. Then there is the website with his home address, criticizing this council, our fiscal irresponsibility and he is running this very Council. But he is criticizing the Council as being fiscally irresponsible.

As for the criticism of Main Street, the block party that we had, over 550 people came to the community to celebrate. And one of the reasons we don't have a main street director is because the director was made to feel so uncomfortable and unwelcomed that she took another offer and here we are months later with a budget and a salary that we had indicated we were going to be probusiness and to take advantage of the momentum that we built during this whole Streetscape. The Streetscape created to provide connectivity, lighting, landscaping, beautification to the downtown, and encourage people to shop downtown. With a majority in our community supporting the Streetscape and sidewalks improvements.

Seltzer has heard nothing but embarrassment in terms of people from outside the community. He has painted the picture through his letter, his mailings, and through his website that suggests that we're spending wantonly and recklessly and not being efficient in how we operate this community? That's it is impossible for us to be trusted. He wrote a letter, accusing us of financial irresponsibility, then suggested replacing some of the people with people who will work more as a team, but there are five of us that are pretty much in agreement on everything. We listened to the voters. The voters said, we want beautification, we want sidewalks, we want a better downtown, and we gave it to them. He suggested we need an ice cream store, and we need a market? Well, where are we going to get that? We have almost full occupancy now. Thanks to the administrator that was in place that's no longer with us. But the Council is being called wasteful. Wasteful is the half a million dollars that we had to spend to restart the sidewalks because we were stuck in litigation. We got some bad legal advice. We stopped everything for a year and had to go back and retool and everything went up a half a million dollars.

Saenz asked Peter to give the Council any legal perspective on the idea of using a forum like this to dispose campaign rhetoric.

➤ Peter stated this is not the forum. all of you are entitled to your own opinion. It would be helpful if you did send a letter say, this is my opinion, not the opinion of the Council or the opinion of Franklin. Council is certainly entitled to its opinion, without the use of village resources, without people thinking that this is the official capacity of a Trustee or the President.

Saenz stated that this is not the forum for where we should be talking about campaign goals. He, also, recommended that the administration of this meeting, instruct the Village Clerk to run a public comment clock to keep these meeting efficient.

Hansen stated that she doesn't care it as Bill Lamott, private citizen, but she does when it is signed the Village President. It is a material difference, and it is confusing. Residents are asking if the Village is soliciting money, because the letter came from the President of the Village. She is requesting that his not to us ethe title of Village President, because it becomes Village business. Her next issue was the solicitation of funds because it has a different meaning as President than as resident.

Hansen also stated that she is looking forward to the recommendation from the cellular service committee. So that it can be dealt with at an upcoming Council meeting with actual plans to address the problem.

Hansen would like a more thorough discussion about the drain project. She sat in on a trail and drain meeting and thinks that would be good to have a presentation and discussion at an upcoming Council meeting.

#### **Public Comment:**

#### Nena Downing

As part of the discussion on the cellular service in the Village, she has as a former planning commission Commissioner worked on this problem and the planning commission through a resolution for the cellular service providers to work with the Village. But never even acknowledged it.

Erlich asked if we all could work together and be kinder. Just asking that person to be the role model, be the change you wish to have happen in the community. Also, she wanted to say thank you for this year's Round Up.

Erlich has issues regarding house across the street from her residence that has have more than 100 trees removed from that property. Some of the trees removed were over 200 years old. There is a plan to restore the removed trees but any of those smalls are never going compensate for those 200 years old trees. She would like to send the tree ordinance to the planning commission and them review the ordinance so that more can be don to preserve the Village's heritage trees.

#### **Discussion:**

Fraser stated all the record keeping with respect to the trees on this property have a tree agreement that was worked out with the original developer and the subsequent developer has bought off on that agreement with some modifications. We have an inventory of the nature and type of all the trees on the site. Evaluations have been done on the trees. Kay Sicheneder, the Village Arborist, has been involved also in labeling and understanding what

trees have gone. He has looked at the reports and feel as though they are in compliance. But as she said, we can't recover those trees that are gone. The reports show what they've done is within the scope of the overall treatment.

➤ Hansen stated she support Erlich. But thinks that some residents have trees taken out on Sunday nights and thinks more aggressive enforcement or oversight is needed.

#### **Public Comment:**

#### Ross Macbeth

Question for the Village Administrator, as part of the streetscape project, half of my fence was removed. He was told that it would be replaced after onsite conversations with the contractors. They told him, they would probably just replace the whole thing. Either way, none of it has been replaced. And he has left multiple messages with Roger, he has called the contractor Craig multiple times tried to get an answer from him. No one is getting back to me one way or the other.

#### C. Administrator Report

First thing, there has been talk about community forum. We have three dates that the church is available that we would like to use for community forum. We would like you to choose one of those. It's Wednesday, October12th or a Monday, October 17th, or Thursday, October. 18th. These are the three dates that are available that are within a reasonable time to get that meeting held.

- > Seltzer asked if it possible to hold the community forum sooner because absentee ballots go at the end of September.
  - The earliest date available is October 12<sup>th</sup>.
- Saenz asked if he was aware of the League of Women Rights forum on October 11<sup>th</sup>.
- ➤ Lamott stated the Village will use the date October 12<sup>th</sup> unless a better date comes up.

#### **Public Comments:**

#### Angelina Sulaka

The elections are literally set five years in advance. We had a neighbor, volunteer run initiative, with a pop-up election last May. Franklin was able to put on forums, events, send out voter education, knock doors, get the public notice. He is a professional administrator making six figures and he can't figure out what day the absentee ballots go out. Now you want to tell people to not vote when they get their absentee ballots to wait for your education campaign. Then you're doing a league of women voters event on the 11th. You want to go back-to-back like Saenz said, so all of us that have families must hire babysitters to participate in the political process? Are you going to have onsite childcare for us?

- ➤ Hansen asked about the communication plan meeting with the communication person to inform residents about the Headlee Rollback.
  - o Fraser stated has several other pieces that he is currently working on like the video, prepared examples of what the increase cost would be for a whole range of property values, and what the increased cost would look like. The visuals that the Village will use to help residents understand what it is we get in and what activities that it goes to support. Our revenues have been going up but not as fast as our expenditures have in terms of cost increases, and the percentages each year, small. It is putting all those demonstrations together that we're working on this week.

➤ Other items discussed included information to give to residents in simple to understand language, how to reach the residents and if a review of the information is needed.

Fraser shared with information about the Michigan Municipal League conference. It is an excellent information piece for elected leaders in terms of the resources that are available through the league, and what the conferences provide.

Fraser talked with the regional manager for DTE about someone to coming in and talk with us about this latest storm and outage. Proposing a either six o'clock or 630 meeting with a rep from DTE on October 10<sup>th</sup>. You would have an opportunity to have a conversation with DTE about things the Village is concerned about and hear from them about what their process is.

#### D. Main Street Franklin Report

#### Mike Seltzer, Trustee

A brief recap of the last event, which was the main street Block Party, summer block party. This event was well attended event, had over 650 attendees. It was a mini Round-Up, it really was very impressive. All the retailers participated. 3500 People were reached through Facebook postings. The weather cooperated. There were lots of kids and pets. The new pet store had a nice day introducing herself to the community. The Franklin Library participated, the FCA and the Historical Society all set up booths and had activities that attracted a healthy amount of attention and interest. Main Street provided free advertising, graphic design, support, and social media support.

There is an interviewing process right now to replace the director of left in the spring. We will be interviewing a candidate next week. Franklinstein Frenzy is scheduled for Saturday, October 22<sup>nd</sup> at noon. Roger and Susan are working with the new owners of the Van Avery building to help with locating grant money through Main Street, Oakland County.

## E. Planning Commission Report

#### Pete Halick

The Lighting Ordinance is in place and the public hearing is scheduled for our next meeting. He wants to recognize Nick Bevins and Stuart Wooters who went out with Nick's light meter, and did a little study for our foot candle, did an excellent job of giving us a good overview and what lights are like in the neighborhoods at night. And it helped us understand our lighting ordinance and the requirements. Work on our connectivity and use of village properties continues. Should have a recommendation for the council soon, which will include gemstone nature preserve. Looking at a couple of other spots where we think we have a real good chance for getting a connection between the neighborhoods. The Commission agrees with the desirability of having these connections and these pathways. Continuing to review at our Master Plan, we have one more chapter to do. Then will do a final review of the whole package. Not a major rewrite, but there's some additions and some updates. We're also looking at a chicken ordinance for the keeping of chickens.

C. Resolution for Proclamation Supporting September as National Recovery Month; Resolution for Proclamation Supporting September as National Suicide Prevention Month; Resolution for Proclamation Supporting September 17<sup>th</sup> through the 23<sup>rd</sup> as Constitution Week.

## **National Recovery Month - September 2022**

WHEREAS, according to the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), in 2020, 40.3 million people aged 12 or older (14.5 percent) had an Substance Use Disorder (SUD) in the past year, including 28.3 million who had alcohol use disorder; 18.4 million who had an illicit drug use disorder and 6.5 million people who had both alcohol use disorder and an illicit drug use disorder; and

WHEREAS, according to SAMHSA, in 2020, 22.2 percent of Americans (or 61.6 million people) 12 years or older, were binge alcohol users in the past month. The percentage was highest among young adults aged 18 to 25; and

WHEREAS, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) nearly 92,000 overdose deaths occurred in the United States in 2020, which was a 31% increase from 2019; and

WHEREAS, substance use recovery is important for individual well-being and vitality, as well as for families, friends, communities, and businesses; and

WHEREAS, OCHN continues to educate and raise awareness of the risks and potential harm associated with prescription drug misuse; and

**WHEREAS**, stigma and stereotypes associated with substance use disorders often keep people from seeking treatment that could improve their quality of life; and

WHEREAS, substance use disorders occur when the re-current use of alcohol and/or other drugs cause clinically or functionally significant impairment, such as health problems, disability, and failure to meet major responsibilities at work, school, or home; and

**WHEREAS**, substance use disorder recovery is a journey of healing and transformation, enabling people to live in a community of their choice while striving to achieve his/her full potential; and

**WHEREAS**, substance use disorder recovery, benefits individuals with substance use disorders by focusing on their abilities to live, work, learn, and fully participate and contribute to society and also enriches the community culture; and

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that, Oakland Community Health Network hereby recognize September 2022 as National Recovery Month. OCHN calls upon our citizens, government agencies, public and private institutions, businesses, and schools to re-commit our state to increasing awareness and understanding of substance use, and the need for appropriate and accessible services to promote recovery.

## National Suicide Prevention Month – September 2022

WHEREAS, September is known as National Suicide Prevention Month and is intended to help raise awareness surrounding suicide prevention resources available in the community; and

WHEREAS, world Suicide Prevention Day is observed each year on September 10; and

WHEREAS, suicidal thoughts can affect anyone regardless of age, gender, race, orientation, income level, religion, or background; and

WHEREAS, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), 45,979 people died by suicide in the United States in 2020 - one death every 11 minutes; and

WHEREAS, according to the CDC, 12.2 million adults across the U.S. seriously thought about suicide; 3.2 million adults made a suicide plan; 1.2 million adults attempted suicide; and

**WHEREAS,** according to the 2020 Michigan Suicide Prevention Commission Annual Report, 1,389 people in the state died by suicide during the COVID-19 pandemic, with 1,099 of those deaths relating to men; and

**WHEREAS**, every year, thousands of individuals die by suicide, leaving behind friends and family members to navigate the tragedy of loss. Often feelings of shame and stigma prevent them from talking openly; and

WHEREAS, 988 has been designated as the new three-digit dialing code that will route callers to the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline and is now active across the United States; and

WHEREAS, The National Action Alliance for Suicide Prevention is using #BeThere to educate social media followers about the many actions one can take to support a person who is struggling; and

WHEREAS, Oakland Community Health Network (OCHN) has been an active and engaged member of the Oakland County Suicide Prevention Task Force since 2011; and

**WHEREAS,** OCHN is committed to being a Zero Suicide organization and cultivating a network of providers who are engaged in the Zero Suicide philosophy.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that, Oakland Community Health Network hereby recognizes September 2022 as National Suicide Prevention Month. OCHN calls upon our citizens, government agencies, public and private institutions, businesses, and schools to recommit our state to increasing awareness and understanding of suicide prevention, and the need for appropriate and accessible services to assist individuals in crisis.

#### **Proclamation for Constitution Week**

**WHEREAS**: The Constitution of the United States of America embodies the principles of our constitutional republic and the liberties it proclaims; and

**WHEREAS**: September 17, 2022, marks the two hundred and thirty-fifth anniversary of the drafting of the Constitution of the United States of America by the Constitutional Convention; and

**WHEREAS**: It is fitting and proper to accord official recognition to this most important document and its memorable anniversary, and to the civic celebrations which will commemorate the occasion; and

**WHEREAS**: Public Law 915 guarantees the issuing of a proclamation each year by the President of the United States designating September · 17<sup>th</sup> through September 23<sup>rd</sup> as Constitution Week,

**SUBJECT:** As – Needed Construction Services

DATE: October 6, 2022

Earlier this summer, Jamie Burton and I discussed the types of services the Village would likely be using in the months to come. It seemed likely that our future service needs would not be for large projects such as the road resurfacing or the streetscape, but rather smaller maintenance and repair types of jobs. Out of that conversation came the strategy to solicit bids for contractors who would be pre-screened and available for "As-Needed Construction Services". The attached HRC letter dated October 3, 2022, provides a more complete explanation of how this is intended to work and how HRC came to the recommendation now before the Council.

Using Bid Net Direct, HRC advertised for bids on this contract and received Statements of Qualifications from three firms interested in all or a portion of the requested services. Also attached to this memo is a document summarizing the statements received, the services for which each firm wished to be considered, and a detailed memo from HRC explaining the process for considering each of these firms.

I recommend that the Village Board of Trustees authorize and direct the Village Administrator to work with HRC to negotiate "As-Needed Contracts for Construction Services" with D'Angelo Brothers, Inc., Superior Excavating, Inc., and Inliner Solutions, LLC., to provide flexibility to the Village in addressing future needs for contracted construction services in the Village.

If approved by the Council, these contracts would be negotiated in the near term so as to make the firms available to be considered for tasks presented later on the October 10 agenda.

Recommendation for Contract Awards

Dear Mr. Fraser & Ms. Hughes:

As you have requested, HRC has obtained Statements of Qualifications for As-Needed Construction Services. We publicly advertised for this contract on Bid Net Direct, a well-known website where local projects are advertised. Three (3) contractors submitted statements for some or all of the services requested. These companies are D'Angelo Brothers Inc., Superior Excavating, Inc., and Inliner Solutions, LLC. Of these companies, only Superior Excavating, Inc. submitted for all services. D'Angelo Brothers Inc. submitted for all services except three (3), storm sewer inspection and televising, storm sewer internal maintenance, and storm sewer lining which are also the only services Inliner Solutions, LLC submitted for. Per the stated selection criteria in the RFQ, we recommend entering into as-needed contracts with all three (3) contractors. This will provide the Village with the most scheduling flexibility for the diverse range of construction and repair projects anticipated to be completed under this program. Additionally, this will enable the Village to compare cost estimates for each particular project in the program between two (2) qualified contractors.

## **Background and Project Necessity**

Over the past several years, the Village has taken a very proactive role in establishing and maintaining the road systems through capital improvement programs. These projects had the scale and complexity that warranted and supported repeated public bidding processes. With the completion of these projects, it is not anticipated that projects of a similar scale will be necessary for some time. However, maintenance and repair work on a smaller scale is still anticipated that will not likely warrant and support repeated public bidding. To accomplish the Village's, need more efficiently for construction services, a Request for Statements of Qualifications was issued to identify multiple contractors who could be pre-qualified to accomplish these projects as they arise. By selecting qualified contractors to enter into As-Needed Construction Services Contracts, the Village will be able to call upon these qualified contractors for various road maintenance and drainage improvement work that cannot be done with DPW forces but can be administered by Village Staff and/or our office.

#### **Submittal and Review Process**

HRC developed statement review criteria based on the specific needs of the anticipated types of maintenance and repair work the Village will need. Three (3) Contractors submitted Statements of Qualifications for consideration in accordance with the requirements of the RFQ. A review of these submittals found that all companies are capable of performing the work that they included in their statements. The selection criteria outlined in the Request for Statements of Qualifications were used as the initial review criteria. The five (5) key criteria in the RFQ are summarized into two (2) general criteria as outlined below:

Ability to meet the needs of the Village – One of the most important characteristics a qualified contractor must have is
the ability to address the residents of the Village in a professional and courteous manner. While all of the work is
anticipated to be performed in the public road rights-of-way or public easements, they are still in the front or rear yards

of residential or commercial properties. Therefore, it is critical to have a well-prepared and consistent resident notification program, and on-site personnel that are attentive to resident questions, concerns, and needs.

2. Overall management and technical competence – For obvious reasons, a qualified contractor must have the management, personal, equipment, and technical expertise to successfully perform the required services. This includes: local operations and contacts, comprehensive back office operations such as invoicing, reporting, and scheduling, available and technologically current equipment, and the local experience to perform the work. Finally, keeping with the intent for the selected qualified contractors to become a contracted extension of the Village's services, the applicant must demonstrate their capability and responsibility to work under the direction of Village Management as required.

#### Recommendation

Based on a review of the submitted Statement of Qualifications and the stated selection criteria in the Request for Qualifications, we believe the Village should enter into a contract with all three (3) companies for the following reasons:

- 1. All applicants have the equipment and expertise to perform the services that were submitted for. Furthermore, all companies have completed work in a satisfactory manner for the Village or similar communities in the recent past.
- 2. All companies have completed work in the Village's vicinity. Considering the Village's needs, anticipated work volume, and timing, the Village may be able to sequence and release work to the qualified contractor(s) in a manner to gain synergies with work in adjacent communities.
- 3. By entering into contracts with all three (3) Contractors, the Village will be able to get at least two (2) quotes from the qualified contractors to receive the most competitive project price possible. If a qualified contractor is consistently lower than the others, the Village can elect to offer more work to that qualified contractor.
- 4. The use of several qualified contractors will help to assure that the Village's timelines for repair are met. If a Qualified Contractor is engaged on another job and unable to respond to the Village's request within the necessary timeframe, the Village will possess the flexibility necessary to utilize another qualified contractor to complete the work.

## **Description of the Contract**

It is recommended that the Village enter into contract negotiations with D'Angelo Brothers Inc., Superior Excavating, Inc., and Inliner Solutions, LLC. The general form of the Contract was included in the Request for Qualifications. The final contract will include the Contract, the entire Request for Statements of Qualifications, and the Statement of Qualifications provided by the Contractor.

## **Project Process**

This type of contract has been successfully employed by other nearby communities with similar project needs over the last several years. Following is a brief description of how this work will progress once the Contracts are approved. Through information provided by the Village Manager, areas in need of repair or maintenance will be identified, and HRC will assist in developing the scope and design of the repair. The qualified contractors will provide the Village with quotes to complete the work identified within the timeframe stipulated. The submitted quotes will be compared to each other, the Statements of Qualifications, and any applicable recent industry prices to verify price competitiveness. The prices should be reflective of the type of work, the constraints of the work area, the volume of work, the timeframe required for completion, and any other relevant variables. Once reviewed and approved, a work order will be issued and the contractor will perform their



services in the area. Once the services are complete, the Village Management and/or HRC will review and accept the final project after which final payment for that work order will be made.

## **Summary**

Due to the cost and schedule savings that the Village can realize by not having to always bid out these types of projects publicly on an individual project basis, it is in the best interest of the Village to have these contractors ready. By entering into contracts as spelled out herein, the Village is not committed to completing a certain amount of work per year. However, the Village will be prepared to complete ongoing and/or as-needed projects.

During the stormwater drainage assessment conducted this summer, open storm sewers in various locations were identified as needing repair/rehabilitation and/or improvement. The attached HRC report identifies the scope of work in six different locations. Project plans for each site are included with the HRC report.

Subject to the completion and execution of the As-Needed Construction Contract with D'Angelo Brothers, Inc., Council is asked to authorize an award of contract to D'Angelo Brothers, Inc. of Livonia, Michigan in the amount of \$67,350.00 for the work as specified in the attached D'Angelo Brothers estimate dated September 28, 2022, and also subject to the submission of the necessary bonds and insurance, in compliance with the contract specifications. Given that the D'Angelo proposal specifically excludes the cleaning of driveway and roadway culverts, Council is also asked to authorize an additional \$5,000 in the budget for this project for the cleaning of road and driveway culverts by a contractor to be determined at a later date.

The contractor also noted that they have the ability to perform the work in Fall 2022 or Spring 2023. Work in the Fall would have to be completed before asphalt plants shut down for the year (typically mid-November), and work in the Spring 2023 would not begin until frost laws are lifted, typically mid-April).

As you have requested, HRC has obtained quotes from the Village's pre-approved contractors for the rehabilitation of open storm sewers at various locations throughout the Village that were identified as in need of rehabilitation/replacement/improvement during the stormwater drainage assessment study performed earlier this year. The projects identified for this quotation include the replacement of road culverts crossing Fairgrove Ave, Wellington Rd, and Birchway Dr; the re-establishment and re-grading of ditches, cleaning of driveway culverts, and replacement of select driveway culverts along Normandy Rd and Evelyn Ct; and the re-grading of ditches along S Greenbriar Rd. The table below is a summary of the proposed scope of work indicated in the project plans (attached for reference).

We have received a quote from D'Angelo Brothers, Inc. in the amount of **\$67,350.00** for the work outlined above. D'Angelo Brothers, Inc. has also submitted satisfactory references and supporting documents and has demonstrated ample experience with the proposed work. A copy of the contractor's proposal and quote has been enclosed with this letter.

Based on the above, HRC recommends award of the contract to D'Angelo Brothers, Inc. of Livonia, Michigan, in the amount of \$67,350.00, subject to the submission of the necessary bonds and insurance, which comply with the contract specifications. However, D'Angelo's proposal specifically excluded the cleaning of driveway and roadway culverts. As such, we also recommend that a contingency of \$5,000.00 be included in the project budget for the cleaning of road and driveway culverts, to be performed by a contractor determined at a later time.

The contractor has indicated that they have the availability to perform the work in Fall 2022 or Spring 2023. Work in Fall 2022 would have to be completed before asphalt plants shut down for the year (typically mid-November), and work in Spring 2023 would not be able to begin until frost laws are lifted (typically mid-April).

**SUBJECT: SEMCOG PASER Study Funding**

The Southeast Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG) is responsible for the collection of roadway surface data on non-federal aid (local) roads using the Pavement Surface Evaluation and Rating (PASER) system. At my request, HRC filed the request for funding from the Fiscal Year 2023 Local Road Surface Condition Data Collection Program to rate the local roads in the Village. The Village has been awarded funding from SEMCOG for HRC to perform a PASER survey on our local roads at no cost to the Village.

The benefits of our participation in the PASER survey are detailed in the attached HRC memo. It is interesting to note that among the benefits is the fact that the survey work done as part of the PASER survey can be done simultaneously with significant portions of our storm water survey, potentially saving us time and money. I encourage you to peruse the HRC memo to learn more about this effort at systematic infrastructure maintenance and how it may benefit our future roadway maintenance planning.

Council is requested to authorize HRC to use the PASER funds from SEMCOG to evaluate the condition of pavement on our local streets and submit that inventory to SEMCOG upon completion.

Local Road Surface Condition Data Collection Program

HRC Job No. 20220768

The Southeast Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG) manages the collection of roadway surface data on non-federal aid (local) roads using the Pavement Surface Evaluation and Rating (PASER) system. SEMCOG sets aside a portion of the annual Michigan Transportation Asset Management Council (TAMC) data collection budget to reimburse communities for collecting PASER data on local roads. The purpose of this program is to expand the practice of asset management to promote effective public services.

At your request, Hubbell, Roth & Clark, Inc. (HRC) worked with the Village Administrator, Roger Fraser, to request funding from the Fiscal Year 2023 Local Road Surface Condition Data Collection Program to rate the local roads in the Village of Franklin. The Village has been awarded funding from SEMCOG for HRC to perform a PASER survey on the local roads at no cost to the village. If the Village desires, they are eligible to re-apply for funding every three years.

### Road Inventory and Asset Management Plan Requirements

The Michigan TAMC was established to expand the practice of asset management statewide to enhance the productivity of investing in Michigan's roads. Public Act 325 (formerly Public Act 51) requires communities with 100 or more certified centerline road miles of public roads to complete a road inventory and submit an asset management plan to the Michigan TAMC. Communities with less than 100 centerline miles are required to perform the inventory but do not have to submit an asset management plan. Since the Village has approximately 33 centerline miles of road, they are not required to submit an asset management plan. However, it is highly encouraged for the Village to utilize asset management practices to help improve their infrastructure.

### **PASER System Description**

The Michigan TAMC and Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) have adopted the PASER system as the statewide standard for evaluating pavement conditions. HRC will be using the PASER system to evaluate the pavement conditions of the local roads in the spring of 2023. The PASER system uses visual inspection conducted by two trained engineers and assigns a rating number based on the pavement type (asphalt or concrete) and magnitude of deterioration present. The rating system utilizes a 10-point scale with 10 indicating the pavement is in excellent condition (new construction) and 1 meaning the pavement has failed. Ratings of 8 to 10 are considered good, 5 to 7 are fair, and 1 to 4 are poor. A detailed description of the asphalt and concrete PASER ratings is provided in **Attachment A**.

### **PASER System Benefits**

One of the asset management elements is obtaining the existing pavement condition (good, fair, poor) for the local road network using the PASER system. Performing PASER ratings every three years has the following benefits for the Village:

- Provides a current inventory of the pavement condition that allows for digital mapping. The PASER Map from the
  previous collection in 2015 is provided in **Attachment B**.
- Enables a performance goal of a desired road rating for the network to be set (e.g., Average PASER Rating of a
- Monitors progress of road network before and after rehabilitation and reconstruction projects.
- Estimates the remaining service life for each segment of roadway.
- Helps determine which road segments should be considered for upcoming maintenance and construction projects.
- Evaluates the 2017-2019 road improvement program status.

The PASER survey can also be performed in conjunction with the Storm Sewer System Evaluation Project to save time and money. As part of the Storm Sewer System Evaluation Project, the Village wants to have the roadway drainage reviewed to have a complete and comprehensive condition assessment of the system. Since the PASER survey and roadway drainage review are both performed while driving the streets, HRC can make the following drainage observations during the PASER survey at limited additional cost to the Village:

- Locations where road ditches have been enclosed with and without inlets
- Locations where road ditches do not exist (i.e., filled in with sediment over time)
- Locations of standing water or poor drainage
- Locations where additional investigations are needed

These locations where drainage issues occur will be shown on a map and evaluated as part of the overall drainage program for recommendations for further maintenance, investigations, etc. An overlay map showing both the PASER ratings and drainage issues can also be developed for a holistic approach to help determine upcoming roadway rehabilitation and reconstruction projects. Additional efforts related to drainage issues will be primarily invoiced as part of the village-wide storm sewer and drainage investigation. However, some of the time and costs can be shared with the PASER survey.

**Do not ignore reflective cracks.** Rate by assessing the type of crack (e.g. transverse, longitudinal, alligator).

Rate the current surface condition. If construction is in progress (i.e., work is active) but you are driving on the old surface, rate the new surface. Some barrels by the roadside is *not* construction in progress.

Rate the lane with the worst condition when lanes have differing conditions. For variable surface types, rate the worst lane and select it as the *Surface Subtype*.

Rate what you see, not what distresses you think might happen in the future.

Rate roads with the same scrutiny regardless of their use, ownership, or functional class.

Rutting often has visual cues like plow scars. Get out and measure using a straight edge and tape measure. Use caution! Rutting measurement changes are detailed in the TAMC Data Collection Training Manual's "Michigan-specific Asphalt Road Rating Guide" section, page 7.

Composite Pavement consists of a concrete pavement overlaid with asphalt; rate it based on the uppermost surface (e.g. asphalt); and note the *Surface Subtype* as composite. A repaired concrete pavement's highest rating is a 9. While it may have had concrete joint repairs, no other defects can be present and the condition is "like new". Note, this is *not* likely to occur.

Sealcoat pavements are sealcoat over gravel whereas sealcoat treatment is sealcoat applied over asphalt. See pages 6-7 of the TAMC Data Collection Manual for rating sealcoat pavements. \*With proactive sealcoat treatments, do not downgrade an asphalt PASER 9 or 10 (no defects) to an asphalt PASER 8 because of the treatment. Rate it based on the distresses that are visible (see *TAMC Data Collection Training Manual*'s "Proactive Sealcoat Treatments on Asphalt PASER 9" section, page 8).
