Nena Downing, 30645 Bruce Lane

- She stated she has two public announcements.
 1. The first was she received a call from a representative from Bingham Farms, extending a warm welcome to all Franklin’s residents and an invitation to attend Bingham Farms’ Family Fest on Saturday. It would be from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. They were going to have a petting farm, a climbing wall, and all sort of fun activities.
 2. Secondly, if you're pre planning in September, they are going to have a special presentation from the police department called humorous tales of crime and punishment. The library will be hosting it for the September meeting, and it is at seven o'clock, September 29th.

Michelle Saulson, 26410 Irving Road

- She wanted some consideration to be made for the people that live on Drummond Court, Scenic Lane, and Irving Road. They are very concerned that this proposed dog park will greatly decrease the property value of all their homes. She really loves her house and she have been here for 22 years. In a quick examination of the few dog parks that are in existence in Oakland County, not one of them is in a neighborhood they are all located on parklands. When she moved in when the

park was used as a dog park unofficially. And is aware that there was an incident with someone that wasn't a resident of Franklin bringing their dog to the park that injured a woman.

- She hopes that during this process, the Village can take some serious examination of other possibilities that might enhance that because there's parking issues, obviously all the issues that you could potentially see.

Adam Scheinfield, 26480 Irving Road

- Just heard about the proposed dog park as well. Not only is it proposed, but it's the fact that the neighbors on the street weren't notified. And the neighbors were the park with about two on the top of the street were notified either not only from a safety standpoint, for the cars coming up and down the street during baseball season, which they do speed park into the street, which would cause issues with a fire truck or other emergency vehicles getting through. That was one of the issues with a fire truck being able to go around the circle, but the amount of traffic that we already have due to baseball, due to other events that are in the park. And to add a dog park to that would not only take away his safety net with his young children, because he does have a seven-year-old and a 11-year-old, they are always playing not only the driveway but up and down the street. But the proposed dog park would have a huge impact on the house values.
- His concern isn't just much the dog park and the house value, but the safety of his children with more cars and more foot traffic, especially with strangers. He doesn't think there's one person on this panel that had young children that would allow a public park to be set right across from their house that wasn't there initially. And suddenly have all these people that are not normally around, their personal safety would feel threatened. He would do is sell his house.
- Also, he commented about the baseball fields. He states it could be an amazing draw. It could be used to draw new people to the Village. The problem is the state of the fields. He is wondering if the Village would do some improvements to the park and the baseball fields.

Richard Herman, Drummond Court

- He doesn't know a lot about this proposed new dog park. This is the first he has heard about it.

Council Comments:

Seltzer stated that don't jump the gun, this item was just a discussion last month. The Village has not made any commitments. The Village is nowhere near kind of plan or decision.

Hansen stated it was a public comment. Maybe a better option is to allow a couple hours on a weekend where they could let their dogs run loose.

Hanke recommended that Mr. Sheinfield work with the Franklin baseball league.

Dan Roberts, Police Chief

- Dan Roberts, Police Chief reviewed with Village Council the submitted report.
 - I have two quick personal items are personnel items. Today we started a brand new part time officer that we've been talking about for a while and he finally came on today and we swore him in and being in firearms and hope to swear him in and Franklin real soon he started working as name is Greg Hughes and he comes to us after almost 25 years of service at Farmington Hills police department where he retired just recently as a sergeant over there so a lot of great experience and we're thrilled to have him here part time to help fill the gaps that we've for quite a while. When his shift lineup with a Council meeting, I will bring him in so you can meet him.
 - Second personnel item is we are losing one of our reserve officers. reserve officer by the name of Al Neiman we just call them big owl. He is a retiring from the Reserve Program. He has been with that about 10,11 or 12 years, volunteering his time, to our department on mostly on special events and things. But because of health concerns and family concerns, it's time for him to retire. So, he just let us know that last week, so we're going to have a little coffee in the office for him one day coming up in the next week or so when that happens.

- ❖ Mark Hanke questioned Chief Roberts about the fleet going electric. Because of the amount spent on gasoline. Have you ever thought about your next generation of vehicles being electric?
 - Dan Roberts replied, he has, there isn't a lot of widespread support in the police community.

Tony Averbuch, Fire Chief

- Tony Averbuch, Fire Chief reviewed with Village Council the submitted report. The department had a structure fire on Saturday about 12:30. Thanks to cooperation with the police department and surrounding communities. They were able to get the homeowner out. Farmington Hills and Beverly Hills sent personnel and apparatus that is part of our box alarm system. It is a mutual component. He asked the residents, if you live in the Village have an alarm system; one that covers the occupied and unoccupied areas of your house like attics or your garages.

IX. SPECIAL REPORTS

A. President's Report

1. Franklin is part of a group of surrounding cities, looking at the deer population. We spent the last year or so working with the DNR and other communities and in September, October timeframe, we will have a questionnaire that will be to send out the people in town asking what's is there an issue if there's not an issue? Just trying to figure out exactly what's going on? It's a common question air for a lot of communities around us so. And based on what we get the feedback we get from that questionnaire; we'll figure is there something else to do or not?
2. Secondly, about a week ago, the consultant looking at wireless phone service in Franklin did a drive thru survey and they've concluded analysis, they haven't given us a formal report yet. But again, we will have something quickly here to discuss in terms of analysis

of the current service in recommendations for improving it. So just wanted to let you know that that's moving on. So that's all I have any council members have any comments?

B. Council Report

C. Administrator Report

Roger Fraser wanted to mention those last week working on analysis of the effects of the two millage proposals that we considered several weeks ago. Peter Gojcaj, Village Attorney, and I talked about the fact that the adjustment to our charter millage, which is three and a half mills was supposed to take that up to five years as a second part of the two-piece proposal, the first of which was to override Headley and bring our actual annual millage rate back up to three and a half minutes. It's currently just over two and a half minutes. What you have in the packet and the material, is a revised resolution and a revised ballot question that deals only with the Headlee override the movement to increase the charter language from three and a half to five Mills needs to go through the elaborate process of a charter amendment.

D. Planning Commission Report

Chairman Peter Halick

We continue to work on our light ordinance at our last Planning Commission meeting. We're finding that hopefully we'll have something soon because it is a straightforward ordinance. But it will be more up to date. We have also had discussions on the pathways behind the Derwich property the museum and we should have something for you soon, I think a recommendation to put some walking pathways in there, we must consider. We must consider ADEA related issues. We are going to look at that make sure that we don't have to include any special provisions for that. Then we are continuing our review of the master plan.

E. Main Street Accreditation Report

John Bri, Program Coordinator for Main Street

1. I do have a couple of resources; I want to throw out to you that can be available through Main Street to assist one on the pathway connection. If you haven't been in touch with Kristin Wilfredo, from our office at the county. She's the trails coordinator for the county. She works with communities on all types of issues relate to parks, trails, pathways, she's been doing this work at the County for over 20 years. She's a great resource and contact that could help you kind of think through the planning process, and even potentially identify some funding resources if it gets to that.

2. About the baseball diamonds, Main Street is having a conversation with DTE and the DTE Foundation, about doing a sustainable main effort. That would include all the main street communities around the county. And what we're focusing on is doing some type of program around enhancing public spaces. So, in the downtowns, that could be the ball fields, as well as the village green, which to me, this is all the municipal complex for Franklin for everything from here to the ball diamonds to the village green all the municipal center. That's something that I'll keep you guys apprised on those conversations just started here in the last month. And I'm also talking to our new sustainability coordinator at the county about that as well.
3. And we're having some initial conversations with the county leadership of how this could maybe be an ARPA related funding piece to support public spaces. We're doing that through Main Street, and that would trickle to all the main street community. So that was the second thing and relate to the baseball diamonds as well. Or the public green or anything else.
4. We have a relationship with Patronus city, which is a crowdfunding platform that some of the other main street communities around the county have utilized. In fact, we helped Holly launch a crowdfunding campaign in the wake of their downtown fire that happened at the end of June. They set a goal of 25,000 to help rebuild battle alley, which is their sort of iconic public space and their downtown that was affected by the fire.
5. The real reason I'm here tonight is to present something we haven't done a while in Franklin. And that's your national mainstream accreditation. We took a pause from that for a couple years as everything was transitioning and kind of getting settled. And then of course, COVID on top of that, but a lot of progress had been made in the last year, with makes assistance that there hadn't really been a work plan in a long time and Main Street and everything was kind of fell into place. No Main Street Community in Oakland County is perfect, let me tell you that. But there had been marked improvement and along the 10 point criteria that we evaluate accreditation standards on provided by the National mainstream center, you guys hit on, you hit him up at the base levels, and you achieve that. So, you joined 12 Other Main Street communities around the county that also achieved that.

F. Main Street Update

Pam Hansen, Trustee

Mike Seltzer and I are the two Council liaisons to the Main Street board. There's a couple of things that Lisa Dunn asked us to comment on. A facade grant is a pile of money and it's in their account. Physical plants and businesses in the downtown area apply, because they want to check for some of these funds because they want to make some improvements in their building. Five businesses received grants from Main Street, Franklin, the gas station, the village Plaza, she's going to replace some facia, with a call that would the trim on top of her building. Dam Costello's building, he's going to do some repair and some parking event bliss, I think they're going to do a stereo or some other improvements on the entrance to the building. And Deja vu got a grant to put a new front door in because it's breezy. There. So those are all good news.

The coffee shop barn behind the Village Dental, they're waiting on a drainage plan and an approval from the health department. So, we should see something there, hopefully this season. And the other thing we wanted to make sure that to mention to the community particularly is on August 24th. The block party is going to happen from 530 to nine. This is the second block party, the street will be closed. They're waiting on a drainage plan and an approval from the health department. So, we

Her interest in applying to the planning commission is to further expand her network and to meet new people and have more exposure to just a larger network and planning in the future of Franklin to you know to ensure that it remains vibrant and unique, which is what draw which is what drew her and her husband to Franklin in the first place. So, they are hoping to stay here and enjoy a vibrant community.

**VILLAGE OF FRANKLIN, OAKLAND COUNTY, MICHIGAN
RESOLUTION TO PLACE ON THE NOVEMBER 8, 2022
BALLOT FOR THE VILLAGE OF FRANKLIN**

WHEREAS, the Village of Franklin (“Village”) Charter established 3.5 mills (\$3.50 per \$1,000 of taxable value), which has been reduced to 2.5639 mills (\$2.5639 per \$1,000 of taxable value) by the “Headlee rollback.”

WHEREAS, the Village of Franklin desires to restore the original Charter authorized millage rate of 3.5 mills.

WHEREAS, the Village Council believes the millage should be raised for operating purposes consisting of police, maintenance and repair of public grounds and facilities, daily operations and maintaining services to the community.

WHEREAS, a ballot question shall be placed on the November 8, 2022, ballot for the Village of Franklin consistent with the aforementioned.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the question to be placed on the November 8, 2022, ballot for the Village of Franklin millage shall state:

Shall the authorized charter millage of the Village of Franklin, established at 3.5 mills (\$3.50 per \$1,000 of taxable value) and reduced to 2.5639 mills (\$2.5639 per \$1,000 of taxable value) by the “Headlee” required millage rollbacks, be increased in an amount not to exceed .9361 mills (\$.9361 per \$1,000 of taxable value) to restore the original charter authorized millage rate of 3.5 mills, 2023 to 2032, inclusive; and shall the Village levy such new additional millage? The estimate of the increased revenue the Village will collect in the 2023 calendar year is approximately \$346,637 to be used for general operating purposes consisting of police, maintenance and repair of public grounds and facilities, daily operations and maintaining services to the community.



Past 18 Months Response Trends:






Incidents Calls by Hour for the Month (1010)

Regarding the designation of an official representative of the member to the annual meeting, please note the following section of the League Bylaws:

“Section 4.4 - Votes of Members. Each member shall be equally privileged with all other members in its voice and vote in the election of officers and upon any proposition presented for discussion or decision at any meeting of the members. Honorary members shall be entitled to participate in the discussion of any question, but such members shall not be entitled to vote. The vote of each member shall be cast by its official representative attending the meeting at which an election of officers or a decision on any proposition shall take place. Each member shall, by action of its governing body prior to the annual meeting or any special meeting, appoint one official of such member as its principal official representative to cast the vote of the member at such meeting, and may appoint one official as its alternate official representative to serve in the absence or inability to act of the principal representative.”

1. Statements of Policy and Resolutions

Regarding consideration of resolutions and statements of policy, under Section 4.5 of the League Bylaws, the Board of Trustees acts as the Resolutions Committee, and “no resolution or motion, except procedural and incidental matters having to do with business properly before the annual meeting or pertaining to the conduct of the meeting, shall be considered at the annual meeting unless it is either (1) submitted to the meeting by the Board of Trustees, or (2) submitted in writing to the Board of Trustees by resolution of the governing body of a member at least thirty (30) days preceding the date of the annual meeting.” Thus, the deadline this year for the League to receive resolutions is September 18, 2022. Please submit resolutions to the attention of Daniel P. Gilmartin, Executive Director/CEO at 1675 Green Rd., Ann Arbor, MI 48105. Any resolution submitted by a member municipality will go to the League Board of Trustees, serving as the resolutions committee under the Bylaws, which may present it to the membership at the Annual Meeting or refer it to the appropriate policy committee for additional action.

Further, “Every proposed resolution submitted by a member shall be stated in clear and concise language and shall be accompanied by a statement setting forth the reasons for recommending the proposed resolution. The Board shall consider the proposal at a Board meeting prior to the next annual meeting and, after consideration, shall make a recommendation as to the advisability of adopting each such resolution or modification thereof.”



- WHEREAS,** according to the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), in 2020, 40.3 million people aged 12 or older (14.5 percent) had an Substance Use Disorder (SUD) in the past year, including 28.3 million who had alcohol use disorder; 18.4 million who had an illicit drug use disorder and 6.5 million people who had both alcohol use disorder and an illicit drug use disorder; and
- WHEREAS,** according to SAMHSA, in 2020, 22.2 percent of Americans (or 61.6 million people) 12 years or older, were binge alcohol users in the past month. The percentage was highest among young adults aged 18 to 25; and
- WHEREAS,** according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) nearly 92,000 overdose deaths occurred in the United States in 2020, which was a 31% increase from 2019; and
- WHEREAS,** substance use recovery is important for individual well-being and vitality, as well as for families, friends, communities, and businesses; and
- WHEREAS,** OCHN continues to educate and raise awareness of the risks and potential harm associated with prescription drug misuse; and
- WHEREAS,** stigma and stereotypes associated with substance use disorders often keep people from seeking treatment that could improve their quality of life; and
- WHEREAS,** substance use disorders occur when the re-current use of alcohol and/or other drugs cause clinically or functionally significant impairment, such as health problems, disability, and failure to meet major responsibilities at work, school, or home; and
