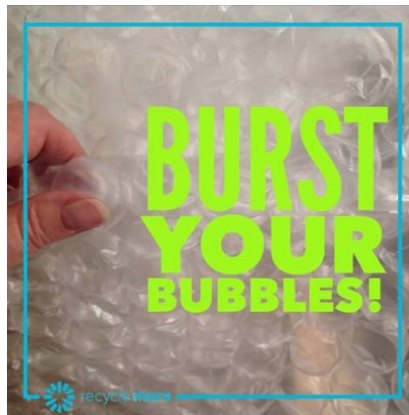
Every little bit counts.
