Always contact your trash hauler first to see if they offer curbside pickup. Otherwise, many communities in the metro area offer drop-off locations, most of which are free. Now that the holidays are over, what can you do with the decorations you no longer want? Most decorations are not recyclable because they are typically made with mixed materials. If they're still in good shape you can donate them or give them to friends or family. Find donation locations at RecycleSpot.org.
