Rev. Wm. Turnage died Wednesday morning at his home the Woodbine Baptist parsonage, St. Joseph, Mo., at the age of 46 years.

Rev. Turnage was a graduate of Wm. Jewell College coming to Liberty from Rayville, Mo., near which place he was born. He not only took his College work at Wm Jewell, but also made up his high schooling there. During practically all of the eight years he was a student at Jewell he had a pastorate at one or more churches preaching every Sunday in addition to carrying on his regular school work. He has been a successful pastor on every field he has labored, among them being churches near Odessa, Mo., Union Star, Mo., as well as Chariton, Clay and Ray County churches, Hiawatha Kansas, Highland Kansas and at the time of his death was pastor of Woodbine church St. Joseph, Mo.

Funeral services will be held at Woodbine church, at two o'clock today (Thursday), and at Rayville church Friday morning at 11 o'clock. Services to be conducted by a former classmate at Wm. Jewell. Burial in the Crowley Cemetary near Rayville.

Rev Turnage is survived by his wife Mrs. Lizzie (Cox) Turnage, a daughter, Lenora, three sons, Errol, Noland, and Wm. Erwin all of the home. He is also survived by his aged father, Rev J. C. Turnage, Armstrong, Mo.

In view of the repealed statements
of Franklin D. Roosevelt that he is
opposed to inflation of our currency
the recent bill passed by the House of
Representatives which virtually place
control of the National Banks under
the President, for a period not longer
than one year, may mean much to the
country, not perhaps that the incoming
president will be forced to exercise
that power to any marked degree but
in view of the record of both houses of
our federal government during the past
administration one can be pardoned for
the feeling of relief that the manipu-
lation of federal banking policies are
removed from their hands and placed
in the hands of a man that has
expressed so sound a principal rather
than left where the temptation to ma-
nipulate the laws so as to embarrass
and hinder the president if they so
desire.

The president the past four years
has been hampered and shorn of his
rightful leadership on almost every
question that has come up for his con-
sideration, the patronage system has
been worked to death by the enact-
ment of laws and the appointments
of various officials until the cost of our
government has been multiplied several
times to what it should be. Knowing
this President Hoover probably is as
well pleased with this piece of legis-
lation as any that has been enacted
during his tenure of office, because it
places an efficient whip into the hands
of the next president to hold over them
rather than into the hands of Congress
to hold over him.

The patronage system likewise is
likely to be due for a shakeup after
March, 4th as Mr. Roosevelt is said
to be planning to hold off good many
appointments until after he has gotten
certain legislation that he desires out
of the special session that is almost

sure to be called. If all senators and
congressmen are to be judged by the
actions and reported activities of those
from Missouri, Mr. Roosevelt may
have a big time trying to hold all the
political plums in his hands, yet if he
can prove to the nation that he can trade
for what he wants in the way of legis-
lation by doling out the patronage that
these same senators want to distribute
he may prove himself the leader that
this nation needs and will restore to
the presidency the leadership that right-
fully belongs to it.

This should go a long way toward re-
storing confidence to the people of the
U. S. and we believe Mr. Hoover should
be praised for his aid in giving the con-
trol of the National Banking policy in-
to his hands.

Editor Wing of the Gower Enterprise
according to the Holt Rustler is calling
for an expression or statement of the
attitude of all Editors in the state on
their views of the repeal of the 18th
amendment. We believe that those
who have been reading the Courier can
have little doubt that we are absolute-
ly opposed to its being repealed.

We are not any more satisfied with
the way the laws are being enforced
on this problem than many who want
the law repealed and firmly believe that
some changes should be made but more
teeth should be placed in the law rather
than have what few teeth there are
now in it pulled.
