Governing Body

The Lowell Area Fire Department is governed by the Lowell Area Fire and Emergency Services Authority Board. This board is made up of a elected member from Lowell Township, Vergennes Township and the City of Lowell, as well as a citizen from each of the three municipalities.

Facility Report

Over the course of 2022 our staff continued to build on the facility updates that were started in 2020. Through a donation from Lowell Area Schools we added 30 lockers to the building and three sitting benches outside the building. This donation saved the department \$15,000.00 in lockers alone.

In July, Next Level Coating applied the new flooring to the hallways of the front of the building and donated a \$800.00 patch of our logo that was placed in the flooring.

Though a donation by the City of Lowell a new electronic door locking system was installed in the building saving the Department \$18,000.00. These doors have added security and access control to areas of the building.

In August, Wittenbach tree services donated their services to remove the overgrown trees and shrubs from around the outside of the building and staff donated labor to place new stones around the outside of the building.

We upgraded the training room to accommodate for larger staff training by adding two large tv's and remove the old projector system.

We will be looking to update the kitchen area and meeting room in the coming year.

Equipment Report

In 2021 our team along with the Kent County Purchasing Department finalized the specifications for the purchase of the new LAFD Engine 1. Several Truck manufactures submitted bids for this project. After several weeks of reviewing the bids, a recommendation was made to the Kent County Fire Commission and the Lowell Area Fire and Emergency Services Authority Board to sign a purchase agreement with Spencer Manufacturing in South Haven, Michigan as well as Spartan Motors in Charlotte, Michigan to build the truck . This truck is being dedicated in the name of Chief Frank Martin for his 45 years of service to the Lowell Are Fire Department in a public ceremony.

A grant was awarded from the Lowell Area Community Fund for \$112,500.00. These funds were used to order the equipment to properly stock the incoming Engine 1, including new battery operated rescue tools.

All annual DOT inspections were performed on all of the Department's trucks with no major issues noted. Pump tests were also completed finding three valve replacements were needed.

This year, all the ladders passed their testing. In 2022 the Department purchased our own hose testing machine. This machine allows the department to test our own hoses annually or as needed during the dayshift. Purchasing this machine saves the department roughly \$3,000.00 per year in testing fees. We tested roughly 7,500 feet of hose in 2022.

Training Report

The Lowell Area Fire Department training division is responsible for all training related to medical and fire over the course of the year. This training will cover all requirements for new recruits aswell as current incumbent fire fighters. This training covers a wide range of topics for all levels of training from the fire fighter, to company officer, to Chief officer level of training. To accomplish all levels of training for the department, LAFD often times has to get creative and work with outside agencies to get the desired results.

During the first few months of the year LAFD will cover multiple topics that are annual fire training refreshers. These topics will range from building construction, electrical safety, incident command, hazardous materials, and small engine. The training department will also take this time to host medical blitz on weekends where multiple medical topics are covered and reviewed to sharpen up the skills. Over the course of the year as the department became an EMT response department the level of medical instruction was elevated to the EMT basic and increased in frequency.

Training with live fire and having qualified instructors can be a major challenge for any department. During the course of the year LAFD hosted a state sponsored instructor I course and 8 members participated and pass the course. The department also had a member pass the state instructor II course and NFPA live fire course. The department leveraged this training and participated in multiple live fire training scenarios at the Thornapple FD live fire burn complex. Live fire training wasn't limited to only fixed facilities either. The department worked with some local residents on preforming controlled live fire burns on large fields utilizing wildland training techniques.

Training Report

LAFD was offered the unique opportunity during the course of 2022 to train in a few local buildings as well. One of these buildings was the local JR high school. While part of the building was scheduled to be torn down the department utilized the building for a multitude of trainings. These trainings consisted of search and rescue, forcible entry, RIT, fire attack, ladder operation, and ventilation. The department was also offered the training opportunity to visit many local businesses as well. Visiting the local businesses provides the fire fighters with the opportunity to train on types of building construction and prepare for possible incidents and scenarios in case of emergencies.

One of the other areas that requires lots of training is in vehicle extrication. As vehicles continue to change and evolve the department again is thankful for local business to provide opportunities to sharpen their skills. The department participated in multiple vehicle extrications at junk yards that have been damaged from accidents that provide for real world simulations.

Not all training throughout the year is done in the area. The training department also sent some of the firefighters out to state sponsored Chief officers classes, national fire department instructors conference, and women in fire conference. These provide the fire fighters with a good perspective of the fire service and bring back exciting new ideas that will benefit the LAFD community.

Throughout the year LAFD training division looks to provide the best possible training they can to LAFD fire fighters. Each member will participate in roughly 10 hours of average training throughout a month. This level of dedication for training will help provide firefighters with the skills necessary to succeed at most scenario they may encounter. LAFD see the training division as the backbone of the department and will look to them in the future to provide the best education possible.






2022 Response Report

2022 was record breaking year with regards to call responses. Compared to 2021, we saw a 8% increase in requests for services. We saw an increase of 96 Medical/ Rescue. However we saw a decline of 6 fire related and a decline of 9 alarm related calls in 2022.


Also notable, apparatus response time in the 2022 during the 8:00 am to 4:00 pm have maintained a 5 minutes or less average.






In 2022, the City of Lowell had 429 calls for service up from 427 in 2021, Lowell Township had 449 calls, up from 386 in 2021; and Vergennes Township 235 requests for service, up from 223 in 2021.


In 2022, we were requested to provide aid to outside communities on 13 incidents including the first deployment of MABAS 3603 to Hemlock MI. At the Hemlock deployment, our crew worked 12 hours flowing over 400,000 gallon of waters.

Fire Prevention & Community Involvements

In 2022 our team was able to return to the class room and a more traditional fire prevention instruction. We were pleased to have been a part of Fire prevention in all for the elementary schools in October. We had the opportunity to speak with over 1500 children in the class room as well as several hundred more at our station during Fire Prevention week.

We also had the opportunity to connect with our community through multiple events throughout the year including; Safety Town at Impact, Sensory Showing of Paw Patrol, Meijer safety carnival, Fallasburg historical village celebration, Vergennes United Methodist - Wacky water night, Riverwalk, Harvest Festival and more.

Over the course of 2022 our team also provided EMT medical standby's for a large number of events throughout the area. The following is a sample of these event; Kent County Youth Fair, Pride on the Riverwalk, and the Riverwalk 5K.

In 2022, we were pleased to partner with State of Michigan Fire Marshalls Office and to provide no cost Smoke and CO Detectors to our residents. In 2022 we installed over 200 smoke detectors and 60 CO Alarms in private homes throughout the area.

Fire Prevention & Community Involvements

We had the opportunity to partner with Riding for Ryan in 2022. Riding for Ryan in a non-profit group formed by a Cascade TWP Firefighter after the loss of his son in a bicycle accident. The mission of the group is to prevent this happening to another family by increasing visibility of children on bikes by applying a bike flag to the bike. During the month of July our members changed our uniforms to the Riding for Ryan t-shirts as well as provided information on our social media. We also partnered with Ball's ice cream for a flag give away event. Over the year we handed out and installed over 300 bike flags.

Last winter we added Little Chief to our roster. Chief is a Golden Reviver puppy who's intended job will be a support animal for the staff. Research has shown a great deal of benefit for metal and physical health for first responders with access to therapy animals. In his short time with LAFD Chief has been on every local TV channel as well as in a national trade magazine. He is at the Station during the day and spends his nights and weekends home with Chief Witherell's family. Chief has completed his K9 good citizen training and will go on in late 2023 for his therapy dog training at West Michigan Therapy Dog.

CPR and First Aid Report

In 2022 6 members of LAFD received their American Heart BLS Instructor cards. Doing this allows for LAFD to annually recertify our members as well as offer CPR classes to members of our community. We aligned with Cascade TWP Fire Department as our training center and were able to provide life saving CPR training to serval citizens over the past year.

In 2023 we will be looking for the opportunity to provide a community CPR event to place this life saving skill in the hands of as many citizens as possible.

We also offered CPR First Aid Training to several scout and fair groups over the course of 2022.
