ORDINANCE NO. 236

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 78 – TRAFFIC AND VEHICLES – ARTICLE I – IN GENERAL – SECTION 78-7 – SKATEBOARDS AND CHAPTER 2 – ADMINISTRATION – ARTICLE I – IN GENERAL – SECTION 2-8 - SCHEDULE OF CIVIL FINES RELATED TO CHAPTER 78 – TRAFFIC AND VEHICLES - SKATEBOARDS AND CHAPTER 14 – CEMETERIES – ARTICLE II – CITY CEMETERIES – SECTIONS 14-36 – HOURS OF OPERATION

June 7, 2021

THE CITY OF MASON ORDAINS:

Section 78-7, 2-8 AND 14-36 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Mason is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 78-7. Skateboards.

(a) *Use limited.* No person shall use a skateboard in the following places:

(1) On any roadway within the city, except while crossing a highway or street on a crosswalk, and then only in the manner specified by Section 28.1204 of the Uniform Traffic Code for Cities, Townships and Villages, as adopted and amended by the city.

(2) On any of the lands leased or owned by the public, including public easements and rights-of-way, or on the private property of another, within that area of the city bounded by the Michigan Central Railroad right-of-way, Oak Street, Barnes Street, and the alley located between Maple Street and Sycamore Street, including an extension of the lateral line of the alley west to the Michigan Central Railroad right-of-way on Monday through Saturday from the hours of 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. and at such other times as declared by the chief of police.

(3) On any of the paved or non-paved lands dedicated to the use of the Maple Grove Cemetery except for those lands dedicated to the Hayhoe Riverwalk Trail

(b) *Manner of use.* No person shall use a skateboard:

(1) Upon a sidewalk, walkway or other surface or facility used or intended for pedestrians without yielding at all times the right-of-way to pedestrians.

(2) Upon a public or private parking lot or facility open to the public without yielding the right-of-way at all times to pedestrians and vehicles and so as to not interfere with the parking of vehicles.

(3) In a reckless or careless manner, or in any manner likely to result in injury or damage to the person or property of another, including monuments and markers within Maple Grove Cemetery.

(4) At a speed greater than a walking speed when crossing within a crosswalk or crossing a roadway where no crosswalk is provided.

(5) By placing portable ramps or similar devices or structures upon public property.

(c) *Posting of signs.* The department of public works shall erect appropriate signs which designate where skateboards are prohibited by this section.

(d) *Penalty.* Any person who violates any provision of this section shall be responsible for a civil infraction and subject to a civil fine of not more than \$100.00. A police officer witnessing a violation of this section may stop

the person, detain the person temporarily for purposes of making a record and prepare and subscribe a complaint for a civil infraction in the manner provided by Section 28.1110a of the Uniform Traffic Code for Cities, Townships and Villages, as adopted and amended by the city.

Sec. 2-8. Schedule of civil fines.

(a) A schedule of civil fines, payable to the bureau for admissions of responsibility by persons served with municipal ordinance violation notices, is established. The municipal civil infraction fines for the violations listed below shall be as follows. Repeat violations are those violations that are committed within one year of a previous violation of the same provision and, if a property violation, on the same property. The violation notice shall specify whether the violation is charged as a repeat violation and the number of prior violations of the same provision within the previous year.

Sec. 14-36. Hours of operation.


(a) The city cemeteries shall be opened daily to the public between the hours of 8:00 a.m. to one-half hour after sunset, with the exception of the hours of operation for authorized traffic utilizing the designated route of the Hayhoe Riverwalk shall be from 6:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. It shall be unlawful for any person (other than city personnel conducting city business) to occupy or be present in any city cemetery during any hours in which the park is not open to the public.

(b) Any section or part of the city cemeteries may be declared closed to the public by the director of public works/superintendent at any time and for any interval of time, either temporarily or at regular or stated intervals.


(c) For the purpose of subsection (a), authorized traffic shall mean walkers, runners, bicyclers, skaters, skateboarders, and those required to use devices to assist the disabled.

Effective Date. This ordinance shall become effective 20 days after adoption and upon publication and shall expire 365 days after becoming effective.

The foregoing Ordinance was moved for adoption by Councilmember Clark and supported by Councilmember Ferris, with a vote thereon being: YES (6) NO (1), at a regular meeting of the City Council held pursuant to public notice in compliance with the Michigan Open Meetings Act, on the 21st day of June, 2021. Ordinance No. 236 declared adopted this 21st day of June, 2021.

Good morning Levi,

Here are a few types of trees that would do well as a street tree with a small space to grow in. While planting all of one type is appealing because of uniformity, it may be a good idea to plant 3-4 different species. That way if years down the road some new pest comes along that decimates one species you don't lose everything. Historic examples of this would be emerald ash borer, dutch elm disease, and chestnut blight.

Another thing that would be worth considering is to factor regularly scheduled trimming into the planning budget. The first decade or so of a trees life is probably the most important time for trimming, a little bit of pruning for structural development while young will greatly impact the overall long term structure of a tree. The majority of tree failures in storms, etc are the result of poor structure that could have been easily corrected while the tree was young. At 10 minutes of work per tree every other year or so it does not take a lot of time or add a terribly large cost, but will definitely pay for itself many time over in reduced long term maintenance as well as helping to maximize the healthy lifespan of a tree.

City Manager's Report: May 13, 2022

OPERATIONS

- **Councilmember Dates to Remember:**
 - **Thursday, May 26, 2022, at 4:00 p.m.** in the Sycamore Room in City Hall; Mark Wriggelsworth will be sworn in as Chief of Police for the City of Mason Police Department. This event is open to the public.
 - **Monday, June 13, 2022, at 5:30 p.m.** in the Sycamore Room in City Hall; the next Joint Recognition Ceremony with Mason Public Schools will be held. Councilmembers should plan to attend.
- **Staff Response to Councilmember questions:**
 - Consumer's Energy Streetlights Tracking:
 - City Councilmembers and public are encouraged to visit the streetlight outages map: <https://streetlights.consumersenergy.com/> use this website to report outages quickly.
 - Staff is tracking the lights on Cedar by Beacon Lakes and Oak/Lansing to seek a credit when repaired.
 - Staff is finalizing a draft of the Purchasing Policy and will be working with the attorney through some questions and will be presenting the policy in the next month.
 - Curtis Street Lift Station: To date we have incurred just over \$11,000 in contracted expenses. We are finalizing an insurance claim for submission related to this issue.
- **Master Plan Public Engagement:** The City has held 15 meetings and engaged nearly 1,500 individuals since the project kick-off in the fall of 2021. We are working through the data so far to determine if we need to do a target campaign to certain groups that we have not heard from.
- **Memorial Bench Donation:** The friends and family of Arek Gustafson (6 year old that passed away in 2021) have requested a bench they provide be placed in Mason in his memory. The bench will be orange as it was his favorite color and in his is favorite park, Rayner Park. They are aware of the changes anticipated in Rayner Park and that it will be placed where it will not be impacted. Staff has been working the family to make this request come to fruition and we have attached some details on the bench to this report.
- **Community Tree:** The County notified us that the replacement Concolor Fir tree on the courthouse lawn will be planted this weekend. We have been working closely with the County and the Chamber on this project and appreciate all their work to get it completed!

Staffing Updates:

 - Temporary Part-Time Seasonal Laborer (2)– Background and pre-employment screenings still being conducted.
 - Full-Time Laborer (1) – Applications have been reviewed and first round interviews will be scheduled for the week of May 16, 2022.
 - OPEN, EXTERNALLY:
 - Seasonal Part-time Crossing Guard (1)- Open until filled.
 - PREPARING/ EVALUATION POSTING:
 - Full-Time DPW Mechanic (1)- Evaluating position replacement.



<p>S Barnes St. E Ash St to Kipp Road</p>	<p>Work will include street reconstruction, concrete work, sidewalk replacement as needed, and ensuring sidewalk ramps are compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).</p> <p>Road construction of S. Barnes St. will be broken into two phases. However, work to curbs and sidewalks will occur along the length of Barnes (Ash to Kipp), beginning mid-May and continuing for the duration of the project.</p> <p>Phase 1 – S. Barnes St. (Ash to Bond): Anticipated to start mid-May. Includes utility and road work.</p> <p>Phase 2 – S. Barnes St. (Bond to Kipp): (Note milling will occur in mid-May) Anticipated to start late summer. Includes road work.</p>
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
IMPORTANT: If you have a desire to have additional work on private property performed (at your own expense), like having a wider driveway approach, replace a water or sewer lead on your private property, etc., please contact the City to obtain a list of approved contractors that can work in coordination with our contractor during this construction time. What to Expect During Construction

	<p>Work Hours: Work will take place from 7:00am to 7:00pm Monday – Saturday. Please note that work may extend past 7:00pm in special circumstances. Work will not take place on Holidays.</p>
	<p>Noise: You may experience intermittent noise and vibration during construction. We will do our best to keep the inconvenience of construction including noise and dust to a minimum.</p>
	<p>Road and Sidewalk: To complete the work in a safe manner, there will be road and sidewalk closures within the construction work area. Access for emergency vehicles will be maintained. Residents that require accommodation must contact Customer Servicer to arrange for access during the construction period (contact information is found below under resources).</p>
	<p>Property Access: Access on your property by the contractor is not anticipated to be needed. If access is required in special circumstances, you will be contacted directly by the contractor to arrange for that access. At times, the City may be working within the right of way.</p>
	<p>Mobility Access: If you or any household member has mobility provisions that need to be taken into consideration, please let us know in advance so we can make accommodations to minimize the impact.</p>
	<p>Water Service: There may be a water main shut-off for a portion of this work. Most disruptions take no more than 6 to 8 hours. A notice will be distributed 24-hours prior to the water shut-off unless an emergency occurs.</p>
	<p>Private Sprinkler Systems: Owners with sprinkler systems located within the right of way must have the sprinkler heads and lines marked by the homeowner, prior to the start of construction. Sprinkler systems that are not marked at the time of construction and are damaged during construction will not be repaired by the contractor. The repair or replacement of damaged unmarked sprinkler systems will be the responsibility of the property owner.</p>

	Private Water Service Lines: During the course of construction, if you haven't already been inspected the City will be confirming that lead is not present. If lead is discovered, the City will also be replacing those water service lines as required by state law. Letters will be sent to residents directly in the next few weeks regarding this process, if you are impacted.
	Recycling and Waste Removal: Please follow your normal routine. If required, your recycling and waste bins will be moved to an appropriate location for pick-up and returned to your home following pick-up. <i>Please ensure that you label your bins with your address.</i>
	Street Parking: Parking in the active work zone is not permitted due to space requirement for construction equipment and materials. Please be sure to park your vehicle off the road and away from the work area. Please be neighborly and allow others to share your driveway if needed.
	School Bus Pick-up/Drop-off/Routes: The City will be working with the Mason Public Schools to ensure changes to routes and pick-up/drop-off locations are communicated.
	Restoration: The construction work area will be restored with topsoil and seed and/or asphalt where required. This may not occur until the following season depending on weather conditions and will require the property owner to water the area for best results.
