






What is a Municipal Service District (MSD)?

A municipal service district is a special tax district.

Governing boards designate this area & levy an additional tax to be used for specific projects or services.

The New Bern Board of Aldermen considers all budgetary requests for MSD spending & votes to approve/deny projects or services.



NC State Statute

The State of North Carolina authorized use of Municipal Tax Districts in 1973 with the adoption of General Statute 160A-535.

- City councils may define a district(s) to finance, provide, or maintain one or more of the following services, facilities, or functions:
 - Beach erosion
 - Any service, facility, or function which the municipality may provide in the city, including/not limited to placement of underground utility wiring, street lighting, street signs, street furniture, landscaping, specialized street & sidewalk paving, & improvements to rights-of-way that preserve the character of an historic district.



NC State Statute


- Downtown revitalization projects
- Urban area revitalization projects
- Transit-oriented development projects
- Drainage projects
- Sewage collection & disposal systems of all types
- On/Off-street parking facilities
- Watershed improvement projects
- Conversion of private residential streets to public streets



New Bern's Municipal Service District (MSD)

History

- Late 1970s, businesses began moving out of downtown.
- 1978: at the request of many residents, businesses & organizations, the Board of Aldermen passed a resolution creating a Municipal Service District.
- Original footprint was just north of Broad St., to the west side of Hancock St., extending south & east to both rivers.





MSD Committee

1985

- Initial MSD Advisory Committee was appointed by the Board of Aldermen.
- Tasked with studying issues and potential projects within the MSD and to make recommendations.

1986

 After presenting their findings, the Advisory/Executive Committee was never reconstituted.

Since 1986

 A small group of property owners and other interested parties have continued to meet with the Ward 1 Alderman and to occasionally make recommendations to the Board of Aldermen.



Current footprint


- Additional properties were added to the original footprint in 2014.

Current footprint

- 30% residential
- 70% commercial
 - (Includes nonprofit & governmental entities)
- Nonprofit & governmental entities do not contribute to the tax revenue

Finances

- Anticipated revenues for FY2024: \$421,200
 - MSD tax
 - Property lease (Farmer's Market)
 - Parking lease
- Expenses: \$421,200
 - Transfer to Fund Balance \$242,152
 - Debt service \$107, 548
 - Parking control \$42,000
 - Miscellaneous other services \$29,500
 (cleaning & maintenance of the Cub House, James Reed Lane fountain, etc.)



Impact of Revaluation

- Current tax rate: .1375%
- Valuation (as of 4/6/23): \$183.5 million
- Revenue Neutral Tax Rate Calculation of .1122%
 - Calculation basis includes .61% average growth of assessed values since last revaluation in 2016
 - \$1,247 increase in tax revenue
- \$18,350 for every additional 1-cent increase in tax rate



MSD Committee

Current interest:

- Early 2023: Board of Aldermen Work Session
 - Alderman Prill voiced interest in establishing an MSD Advisory Committee
- 74 MSDs in NC
- 3 management styles (by statute): advisory boards, no advisory boards, contract out to Main Street programs or downtown development entities.
- Committee representation (examples): residents, large property owners, developers, hospitality, retail, professional services, night-life, Downtown Business Alliance/Council, at-large, city manager (Ex-Officio), county liaison, downtown development corporation



MSD Committee

Proposed representation:

- 30% residential property owners
- 70% commercial property owners (retail, restaurant, lodging & entertainment)
- Largest property owners
- Ex-Officio members (city manager, finance director, Ward 1 Alderman, Swiss Bear executive director)



Lighting

- Sidewalks, public parking lots
- LED enhanced crosswalks

Safety

- Security cameras
 (for example: traffic circle,
 inner core parking area,
 James Reed Lane, Bear
 Plaza, Middle & Pollock
 streets)
- Dedicated police officers
- Trash pickup (4 hrs. daily)
- Crosswalk upgrades (thermoplastic brick pattern)
- Larger street signs on traffic signals







Proposed Projects


- Amenities
 - Bike racks
 - Pickleball courts
 - Exercise trail
 - Union Point Park bench swings
