#### Significant Issues and Projects:

**Days Hotel**: Pile of debris has been removed from the site. Staff continues to work through the issue of the presence of asbestos in the exterior beige paint on the north and south sides of the structure. Additional testing localized the presence of asbestos to the the north and south sides of the second floor only. Twelve additional tests of the beige paint on the second floor tested negative for any presence of asbestos. Conversations with state regulators offered no direction on how to proceed when conflicting data is found. Staff has located photographic evidence that display the precise locations of at least 4 areas that tested positive for asbestos on the second floor balcony. On 4/10/17 staff will take additional samples from the exact locations that tested positive for asbestos and have them tested for the presence of asbestos.

#### Community and Economic Development:

- **Brownfields:** MidAtlantic assisting with property owners and potential buyers in the Five Points Brownfield areas.
- **Revive Five:** Rebranding being lead by Craven Community College Marking Dept., and Greater Duffyfield Residents Council. Staff attended meeting on March 20.
- **First Street Corridor:** Awarded EDA-\$1,285,250 grant. Organizational meetings held March 16<sup>th</sup> and 30<sup>th</sup>. Golden Leaf draw of \$109,000 received March 30<sup>th</sup>. Food programs initiative funding underway in collaboration with Veteran's Organic Garden grant to USDA submitted. RFQ/RFP in process.
- Habitat for Humanity: Received release of funds notice from HUD on March 8<sup>th</sup>.
- The Entrepreneur Center: Staff met with Advisory Group. Engineers completing drainage issues. Utilizing CDBG Catalyst funds for drainage issue-scheduled for April 2017. Ben Eisner is lead fundraiser. \$50k needed to open center.

### **Development Services**

- **Electricities:** Staff is working with Electricities on a significant development project.
- **Site Development-Airport:** Analysis complete. Marketing materials available. Staff met with interested party for potential development.
- **CDBG:** 2016-2017 \$250,955 allocated. Community Development Advisory Committee working on 2017-2018 annual action plan. No meeting held in March.
- Paint Your Heart Out: 2017 event will be July 23-29. Partnered with NRCDC, Greater Duffyfield Residents Council, East Carolina Council and CNI to leverage funding opportunities. Applications are being accepted and reviewed. Staff met with planning group March 17<sup>th</sup>.
- **CNI: Recidivism efforts:** YouthBuild-collaborating with CCC, Reentry Council, County, ECC, and CCA in application for DOL grant \$700,000.
- Veteran's Organic Garden: The VEBCOG has applied for a grant through the USDA to expand their presence.

#### Other:

- Zoning Twent-six land-use approvals were issued during the month. Staff issued final c/o for McAlister's and Great Clips located in the River Place Shopping Center located on S. Glenburnie Road.
- **Department Review –** March 4, 17, & 31 2017 for the following projects;
  - Site Plan for Gaston Boulevard Senior Housing located at 731 3<sup>rd</sup> Avenue.
  - o Site Plan for Wave Wash Express Carwash located at 2600 MLK JR BLVD.
  - o Site Plan for CarolinaEast Comprehensive Cancer Center at 2000 Neuse Blvd.
  - Subdivision General Plan for Waterleaf Two in Carolina Colours on the south side of Landscape Drive.
- <u>Planning & Zoning Board</u>: The Planning & Zoning Board met on March 7<sup>th</sup> for the Final Plan Consideration of Craeberne Forest Phase II, Section IV; it was approved unanimously. Craven County appointed Don Black, who resides in the New Bern ETJ, to the City of New Bern Planning & Zoning Board. His term will end 06/30/2019.
- <u>Board of Adjustment</u> Staff attended the Board of Adjustment meeting on March 27, 2017 to Consider a Special Use Permit request to operate a boardinghouse at 702 Second Avenue. The application was denied.
- <u>HPC</u> The New Guidelines were approved March 28, 2017 by the Board of Alderman and are immediately in effect. The regularly scheduled meeting on March 15<sup>th</sup> was held to consider the following applications:
  - **A. 208 Pollock St.** include the installation of a handicap access and new doorway; reconstruction of a fence and dumpster screen; construction of a building addition to enclose a commercial grade refrigerator in the secondary and tertiary AVC's.
  - **B. 422 Broad St.** include the installation of a bell tower in the primary AVC.
  - **C. 214 Pollock St.** include the removal of non-contributing rear staircase in the tertiary AVC; to replace the second story doorway with a window; to remove a chimney in the tertiary AVC.
  - **D. 504 Craven St.** include the installation of an accessory structure in the tertiary AVC; the installation of a brick and wooden picket fence in the secondary and tertiary AVC's.
  - **E. 407 Queen St.** include reestablishment of 2, 6/6 first floor windows and a wooden front door with sidelights and transom window in the primary AVC.

### **Development Services**

- **F. 329-A Middle St.** include the removal of a swinging metal door and masonry and replacing with an overhead metal garage door and stucco in the tertiary AVC.
- **G.** 513 Middle St.— include a request to permit the removal of the second story on an accessory structure. This is an amendment to a previously issued COA for new construction.
- Minor COA's Issued: 208 Pollock Street—installation of a wooden fence in the tertiary AVC
- <u>GIS</u> Held a GIS Technical Users Group Meeting to discuss GIS projects, goals and issues in all City departments. Worked with Police Crime Analysis to setup and transfer ArcGIS Online maps/data. Created and updated a list of roads and addresses in the City for the Board of Elections. Created or reproduced 32 maps.
- <u>NBAMPO</u> Approved by Resolution Unified Planning Work program (UPWP) and Five Year Planning Program. Certified by Resolution NBAMPO 3C's Planning Process. Approved Amendment NO. 5 to the FY 2016-2025 Metropolitan Transportation Program.

#### **High-Profile Projects:**

- Advanced Metering Infrastructure Project This project involves installing a network of electric and water meters. We are currently reading 4,796 water meters and 11,364 electric meters with 2,264 disconnect meters; and 2,694 two-way load management switches having been installed. Phase II of the project is about 99% complete. We are establishing communication points around the City as required for communications back to the operations center. An additional gateway for Taberna was started this week. The Gateways for Trent Woods should begin in the next few weeks.
- Outage Management System This system takes inputs from AMI, Electric SCADA, CIS and GIS and plots the outage on a real time map. The system will allow for faster response time, real time outage reporting and more accurate cause determination. The system also includes an improved IVR (Integrated Voice Response) system, which will give the customers real time data about an outage. System is scheduled to go live in 6 to 8 weeks.

#### Overhead Line Rebuild

-Racetrack Road. We are working on upgrading the existing overhead line to feeder capacity. We have are setting poles and preparing to reconductor.

#### • New Underground Developments

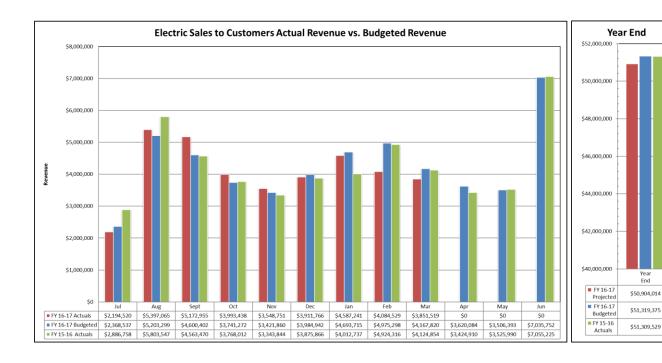
- -Pine Valley Apartments Underground Subdivision Extension. *Install underground primary, secondary, and area lights as needed to provide power within this new apartment complex.* Phases One, Two and Three are complete and we await the contractor's progress to finish our work.
- -State Employees Credit Union. This is a new commercial service on Howell Road. We will be installing power to the site once the contractor has the building and site ready. We have relocated one pole to accommodate the construction. Power to this site will be installed per City of New Bern's Electric Line Extension Policy. We have completed our work on this project. -Bluewater Rise. New underground residential subdivision. We will be extending our existing underground primary along Old Airport Road and into the new development. We are working

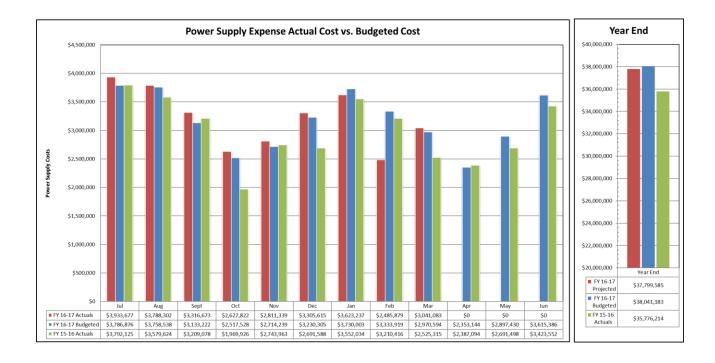
on a layout of the electrical system and streetlights. Power to this site will be installed per the

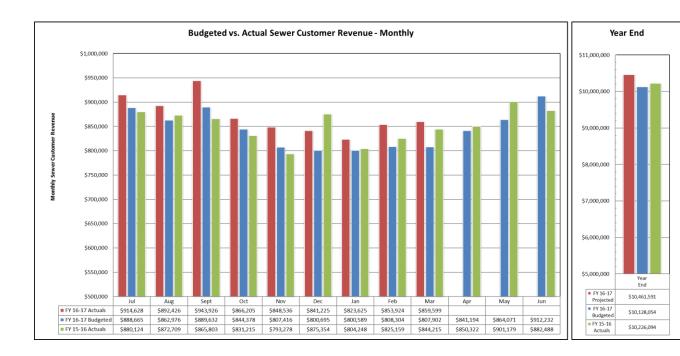
- <u>Downtown Improvements- Overhead to Underground Conversion.</u> Pollock Street from Middle Street to Hancock Street. Install underground conduit and cable and decorative street lighting. The north and south side is complete.
  - Hancock Street from Broad Street to South Front Street consists of converting a main feeder to underground, removing overhead facilities, installing switchgear, transformers, primary distribution circuits, house services, street lighting circuits and decorative street lighting. We have completed all of the feeder and switchgear work. We are currently installing the distribution loop for Hancock Street and will then begin adding load to the new circuit. We are also installing the lighting on one side so the wooden poles can be removed for the sidewalk and pavers.
- AMI Gateway and Fiber Optic Cable Extension. Install fiber optic cable from Thurman Road fire station to Taberna Way on Old Airport Road. Install pole and AMI gateway. We have installed all conduits necessary and will set two poles, install the gateway and pull both overhead and underground fiber optic cables.
- <u>Township No. 7 Sewer Improvements Phase III</u>. Sewer system infrastructure improvements for

- increasing transmission capacity. Geotechnical work and rivers sounding for the project are complete and staff is working with the engineering consultant to finalize the force main alignment and design plans required for permitting.
- Township No. 7 Sewer Improvements FY16 Sewer system infrastructure improvements for increasing transmission capacity. Project goals include transferring a portion of the S.T.E.P. system loading to the City's conventional sewer system, increasing system capacity, as well as increasing system efficiency and lowering operating costs by reducing overall operating pressures. The contractor has completed installing all of the piping for the project and testing is currently underway.
- Water Resources Operations Building Improvements This involves modifications to the existing operations facility to provide for needed administrative space and shower facilities. Staff and Board representatives are continuing to evaluate the options for this project. Staff is currently working to prepare more detailed plans and cost estimates for relocation of the Water Resources staff to 521 Highway 55 and repurposing the Neuse Boulevard site to accommodate the City Garage and a portion of the Parks and Recreation staff.
- West New Bern Water System Improvements Water system infrastructure improvements
  between the Highways 17 and 55 corridors increasing available domestic and fire flow supplies.
  Aerial and ground survey work for the project are complete and staff is working with the
  engineering consultant to finalize the force main alignment and design plans required for
  permitting. Staff has begun to make contact with the property owner from whom the City will
  need a utility easement in order to construct the project.
- FY-17 Water and Sewer System Improvements Replacement of existing water and sewer infrastructure in the areas that will be included in the FY-17 repaving project. Public Utilities staff has worked closely with the Public Works staff to develop a list of water and sewer infrastructure items that are in need of repair/replacement prior to beginning the FY-17 repaving project. The work on Oaks Road and in the South Gate community is complete and the work on Helen and Hazel Avenue is 60% complete.
