Significant Project Update:

• The contract for renovations at the Volt Workforce Development Center has been awarded to Bruin Builders Inc. Preconstruction has been scheduled for early June. EDA requirements state the renovation project must begin by September 18, 2018 and be completed within 2 years.

Community and Economic Development:

CDBG –

18/19: The annual action plan was approved by the Board on May 22, 2018. The allocation for this program year is \$242,771.

17/18: The City's allotment is \$223,934. Income verification and homeowner eligibility for Minor Housing Rehabilitation Program is in progress. Total amount of funding set aside is \$123,000. Offsite monitoring for 3 public service agencies was conducted on June 15, 2018.

16/17: The City's allotment is \$250,955. Income verification and homeowner eligibility for Group 2 of Minor Housing Rehabilitation Program is in progress. Total amount of funding set aside is \$76,401.51.

15/16: The City's allotment is \$259,784. All funds have been expended.

- The Paint Your Heart Out committee conducted site visits for potential projects and selected homes for the event. The committee continues to fundraise and market the event. All materials for site work have been ordered. Volunteer solicitation is still being conducted.
- A May CDAC meeting was not held. Appointments for all wards were placed on the May 22, 2018 agenda. Appointments were made for Ward 1, Ward 2, and Ward 6. Appointments for Ward 3, Ward 4, and Ward 5 are still needed.

- Zoning Forty land use approvals were issued during the month.
- **GIS** Staff is taking inventory of City cemeteries; currently working on Cedar Grove. Field checks are being done on structures and properties in the CNI area to look at conditions and blighted areas.
- <u>HPC</u> Three Commissioners have completed 2 terms and may not be reappointed at this time; one Commissioner is eligible for reappointment. Provided staff support for the Historical Preservation Commission's regular meeting on May 16, 2018 for the following projects: New Applications:

High-Profile Projects:

• Advanced Metering Infrastructure Project - This involves installing a network of electric and water meters with the necessary infrastructure to remotely read, bill, and control the devices. We are currently reading 9,105 water meters, 19,547 electric meters with 6,372 disconnect meters and 4,411 two-way load management switches installed. We are well into the third and final phase of the project. We are establishing communication points around the City as required for communication back to the operation center. All of the initial project Gateways are up and running. This project is on track to be completed by December 2018.

• New Underground Developments

Bluewater Rise Subdivision - New underground residential subdivision. We will be extending our existing underground primary along Old Airport Road and into the new development. We are working on upgrading our underground line to feeder capacity for this new load.

Watercrest Subdivision - This is a new residential section in the Carolina Colours Subdivision. We are extending the three phase underground primary down Landscape Drive to a three phase junction box by the entrance to the subdivision. We will install the underground primary from the junction box to feed this subdivision along with transformers, underground secondary, secondary pedestals and street lights.

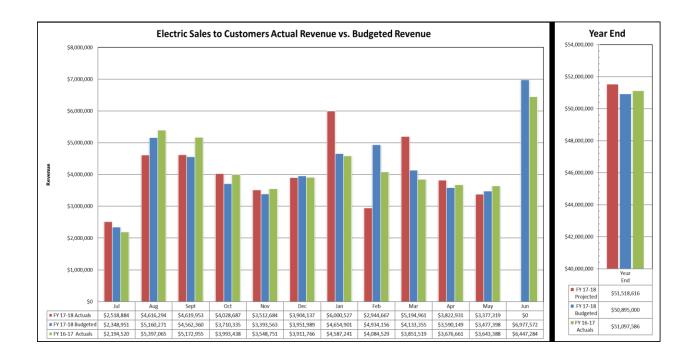
Croatan Crossing Subdivision - Extending single phase underground primary to feed the next phase of Croatan Crossing Subdivision. We will install underground secondary, secondary pedestals and transformers at this location.

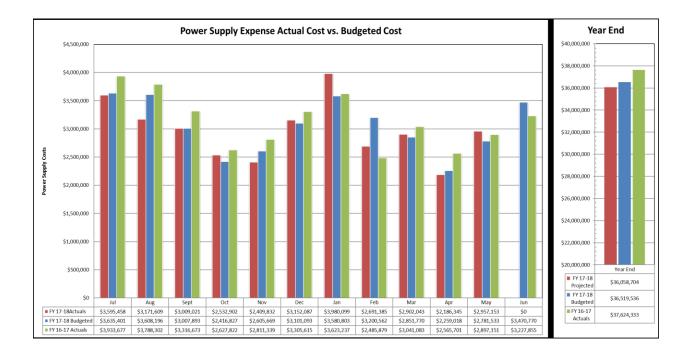
New Bern Market Place - This is a new underground commercial complex. We will be serving the parking lot lights and all of the out parcels including the gas station. The underground infrastructure is being installed at this time.

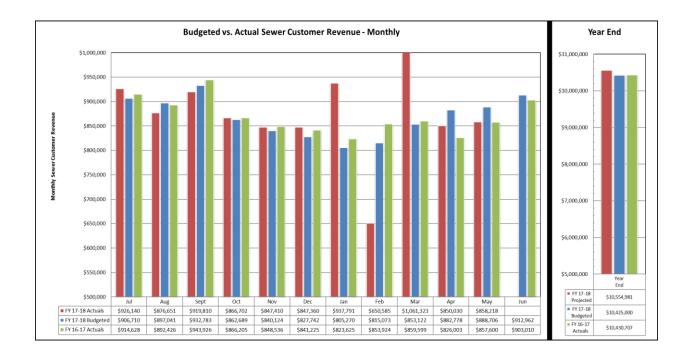
- Township No. 7 Sewer Improvements Phase III Sewer system infrastructure improvements for increasing transmission capacity. Staff is continuing to work with the property owners from whom the City will need a utility easement in order to construct the project and legal documents for the easements are being prepared.
- Water Resources Facility This involves the construction of a new facility adjacent to the City's existing water treatment plant to house the Water Resources operations and administration staff. The driveways and parking areas have been paved and striped, leaving the final seeding as the only remaining site work task. The interior up-fit for the office continues to progress on schedule, with all of the rough-in work and sheet rock installations complete. Finish work for all phases of the project will start in early June and the project is on schedule to have a Certificate of Occupancy by the first of July.
- West New Bern Water System Improvements Water system infrastructure improvements between the Highway 17 and 55 corridors increasing available domestic and fire flow supplies. Staff continues to work with the property owners from whom the City will need a utility easement in order to construct the project and legal documents for the easements are being prepared.
- Spencer & Park Water and Sewer Rehabilitation Project Replacement of existing water and sewer infrastructure along Spencer and Park Avenue ahead of planned resurfacing project. The contractor has completed the remaining drainage work along Park and has started improvements on the 1300 & 1400 blocks of Spencer. The contractor will continue to move along Spencer from east to west over the next few months.

• Johnson & King Water, Sewer, and Storm Drain Rehabilitation Project — Replacement of existing water, sewer, and storm drain infrastructure along Johnson and King Street. Bids for this project have been received and staff is working with the low bidder to execute contracts and establish a construction contract. At this point, construction is expected to start in late summer or early fall.
