Wastewater Upgrades on Tap

Utility Increase to Pay for New Pumps, Sewer Pipeline

The city is beginning work to maintain and improve our aging wastewater system that takes sewage from the city to our wastewater treatment plant in Weld County. The project includes critical repairs and replacement of components that are over 30 years old. Planning and design for the project will begin in 2019, with construction slated to begin in late 2020, and an estimated completion in 2022.

Why is this Project Needed?

Updating the old infrastructure is nec-

essary to keep our sewer system running. The repairs will also reduce corrosive gases, which gives the infrastructure longer life while reducing odors in Northglenn and near the wastewater treatment plant.

What is Being Done?

One of our pump stations that collects wastewater and moves it through to a pipe system will be replaced. The new, more efficient pumps will improve the capacity and efficiency of the sewer system. In addition, a portion of the


pipeline that moves wastewater from the city to the wastewater treatment plant will be replaced.

Cost/Funding

The estimated cost of the five-year project is \$28.5 million. A utility rate fee increase averaging 6 percent per year over five years is funding the project. It went into effect on Jan. 1, 2018.



Ordinances - 2nd Reading:

Code Updated to Conform with State Statutes

CB-1913 - Council unanimously approved on second reading an ordinance that updates the Municipal Code to reflect changes in the location of statutes relating to beer, liquor and marijuana that were recently moved in the Colorado State Statutes.

Municipal Code Related to Marijuana Modified

CB-1914 - Council unanimously approved on second reading an ordinance that modifies Article 18-14 of the Municipal Code. Section 18-14-8(c) addresses the source of medical marijuana offered for sale and/ or distribution by licensed centers. It is amended so the amount of medical marijuana offered for sale that must be grown at the business' own facility drops from 70 percent to 50 percent immediately, and then to zero percent starting July 1, 2019. Section 18-14-26(c) is modified so a facility can sell more than two ounces of medical marijuana to an individual provided it has been recommended by the person's physician. It is also now illegal to sell, give, dispense or distribute more than six immature plants to an individual, unless it has been recommended by that person's physician. The proposed changes align with regulations adopted by the state.

Resolutions:

2019 Parks and Recreation Fee Schedule Approved

CR-110 - Council unanimously approved the 2019 Parks and Recreation User Fee Schedule. These are the fees that people pay for parks and recreation events, facilities, programs and activities, and are developed based on the cost to provide the service and how much surrounding cities charge for comparable items. The fees for 2019 are similar to 2018, with adjustments made for demand, cost, consistency and simplification. They were proposed by the Parks, Recreation and Cultural Services staff and recommended by the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board. They will go into effect on Jan. 1.

Sustainability Plan Approved

CR-111 – Council unanimously approved the final draft of the Northglenn Sustainability Plan, which works to make the city more livable, vibrant and environmentally sustainable. The plan includes the city's vision for sustainability as well as high level goals for the purpose of guiding new programs and policies. Upgrades for Wastewater Treatment Plant Equipment

CR-112 - Council unanimously approved the purchase of programmable logic controllers for the Wastewater Treatment

Plant from Howden Roots, LLC for an amount not to exceed \$74,519. These controllers are part of the aeration blower system, allowing the plant to better provide the necessary control range that is required by the biological nutrient removal process.

City Council Takes Position **Against Amendment 74**

CR-113 - Council unanimously passed a resolution that opposes Amendment 74 on the Nov. 6, 2018 ballot, and strongly urges voters to reject the measure. It would amend the state constitution to include just compensation for any government law or regulation deemed to reduce fair market value of private property.

Council Supports Adams 12 Mill Levy Increase

CR-114 - Council unanimously passed a resolution that supports Adams 12 Five Star Schools' Ballot Issue 5C on the Nov. 6, 2018 ballot and urges voters to support the measure. Issue 5C is a mill levy increase with funds going to operational priorities for the district, including teacher salaries, instructional programs and classroom resources. If passed, it would generate up to \$27 million annually.



Recreation Projects Kicking Off

Northwest Open Space, Kiwanis to Be Done by Summer

Northwest Open Space

Phase I of the Northwest Open Space Improvements is underway. This project includes an expanded south parking lot, a new restroom and concession building, trail replacement, shade shelters and improvements to the landscape, irrigation and drainage systems.

Construction is set to begin in early November and is expected to take approximately six months. Located south of West 112th Avenue, off of Ranch Drive, Northwest Open Space is home to a number of athletic fields, paths and a playground. The south parking lot will be closed during construction, but the north lots will still be open. Please excuse our mess during the construction as we work to complete these exciting improvements.

The city generously received \$2,040,000 in grant funding from Adams County Open Space for this project.

Kiwanis Pool

Kiwanis Pool is about to get an exciting facelift. The bath house will be replaced and a splash pad will be added.

The demolition of the bath house takes place in November, and will be followed by construction of the new building and splash pad in the spring. The 2,586-square-foot pad will be located east of the existing baby pool and have play areas for children of all ages. It will feature a nature theme, including a 9-foot-tall frog and a garden of 12-foot-tall flowers. The pool and splash pad are anticipated to open for the 2019 season.

Council Supports State School Funding Measure

CR-115 – Council unanimously passed a resolution that supports Amendment 73 on the Nov. 6, 2018 ballot. It would increase funding of public education in the state by \$1.6 billion annually.

Council Supports State Transportation Proposition

CR-116 – Council voted 7-1 to pass a resolution that supports Proposition 110 on the Nov. 6, 2018 ballot. This measure would raise the state sales tax by .62 percent, with funds going to transportation projects in the state. It is projected to raise \$767 million in the first year and allow for bonding of \$6 billion. Yes: Dodge, Leighty, Willford, Duran Mullica, Sauers, Downing and Brown. No: Esquibel.

Ordinances - 1st Reading:

Council Initially Approves Croke Initiative

CB-1915 — Council initially approved on first reading an initiated ordinance concerning the Croke Reservoir, which was submitted to the city in accordance with Article V of the City of Northglenn Home Rule Charter. The ordinance proposes actions the city can take, which include: continuing to preserve Croke Reservoir as a nature area, maintaining water quality, working with the Colorado Division of Parks and Wildlife to coordinate stocking the reservoir with fish, budgeting and tracking spending related to water quali-

ty, and creating a sub-committee of residents to advise the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board on Croke Reservoir. Croke Reservoir will continue to be used to store stormwater.

Resolutions:

Grant Award Corrected

CR-117 – Council unanimously approved a resolution correcting Section 1 of Resolution No. 18-91, regarding a grant award for the Police Department. The resolution was originally approved at the July 23, 2018 meeting. It stated that the city accepted \$12,000 from the Colorado Department of Transportation High Visibility Impaired Driving Enforcement 2018-19 Program for personnel services overtime for holiday DUI enforcement. It should have stated \$14,000.

Company Hired to Evaluate Storm Drainage Improvements

CR-118 – Council unanimously approved a professional services agreement with J&T Consulting for the 2018 Storm Drainage Improvements, Design and Construction Observation Services contract. J&T Consulting will develop construction documents, specifications and cost estimates for seven storm drainage areas that require repairs. The cost of this contract will not exceed \$80,870.







TAKE GREEN WASTE TO MULCHING

CENTER: You don't have to take up all the space in your trash cart with leaves and tree branches.

Instead, bring them to the city's Yard Waste Mulching Center.

Hours are 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. every Friday year-round and 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. every Saturday through November.

It's located at the south end of the Maintenance & Operations Facility, 12301 Claude Court. Just go right through the gate as you enter the parking lot.

Only Northglenn residents can drop off debris. Please bring proof of residency, such as a driver's license or utility bill with photo ID. The city will take most yard waste except dirt, sod and gravel.

The yard waste is chipped into mulch that anyone can have, including residents, non-residents and businesses. Please bring shovels, as the city does not provide tools to use. However, staff can help load the mulch into trailers and pickups if you sign a liability waiver.

New High School Cafeteria Has Good "Taste"


Hosts Second **Annual Adams 12** District Event

Adams 12 Five Star Schools

The second annual Taste of Adams 12 Five Star Schools held Sept. 20 at Northglenn High School not only gave district families and community members a chance to sample school food options, but also dine in the school's recently-renovated cafeteria.

The kitchen and cafeteria underwent more than \$1 million in renovations last summer as part of a first phase of planned school renovations promised as part of the 2016 Bond Program.

The improvements, which not only

and school administration to transition the school from a DECA-run program to the National School Lunch and Breakfast Programs.

"The new cafeteria has been a huge success," said Nutrition Services Operations Manager Sarah Blaida. "Over the past few months, we have been able to provide more students with healthy meal options for breakfast and lunch regardless of their meal benefit status — we served 702 lunches, more than half free for students based on their qualifying meal benefits, on the highest day alone."

This made the cafeteria the perfect spot to host the second annual Taste of Adams 12 Five Star Schools. More than 300 people attended. They taste-tested items, provided feedback on meals and learned more about offerings from Nutrition Services.

Street Snow Removal Routes


The city focuses on clearing snow from roads that receive the most traffic before moving on to other streets. If a major storm is in the forecast, the city may pretreat major streets, overpasses, hills and intersections to prevent ice build up.

First Priority: Main streets. All lanes are plowed in each direction. Examples: 104th Avenue, 120th Avenue, Huron Street and Washington Street

Second Priority: School zones and streets motorists typically use to reach main streets. One lane is plowed in each direction. Examples: Claude Court, Fox Run Parkway and Pecos Street.

Third Priority: Residential streets that connect with first priority or second priority roads. One lane is plowed in each direction.

Fourth Priority: Residential streets with the lightest traffic. They are plowed only if snow levels reach 8 inches, and then a single lane will be plowed down the middle of the street.
