Justice Center Opening

City Invited to **Ribbon Cutting** Event on Sept. 11

The city will open the new state-of-theart Northglenn Justice Center on Tuesday, Sept. 11, at 5:30 p.m. The public is invited to join the celebration of the facility at 50 W. Community Center Drive which will house the Police Department and Municipal Court.

The grand opening offers an opportunity for residents to tour the 45,000-square-foot building, in particular rooms that will not otherwise be seen by the public, such as

evidence lockers and crime labs. Some of Northglenn's first police officers will be among the visitors at the celebration. Northglenn Police commemorative challenge coins will be available for sale. Food trucks will be on site for refreshments.

The new building features SMART technology such as light sensors, set points for temperature, solar panels and more than 16,000 feet of glass for natural lighting. It also contains a police training center and a display of historical items, including a jail door dating back to 1940 that was used in the city's first jail.

Ordinances: 2nd Reading

Council Approves Addition to Citizens' Board Functions

CB-1912 – Council unanimously approved on second reading an ordinance that amends Chapter 2, Article 12, of the Municipal Code regarding the function of the Citizens' Affairs Board (CAB). The amendment allows City Council to authorize the board to perform additional tasks as council deems appropriate. Their previous function of receiving and considering complaints and proposals from residents concerning the city and its government remains in place.

Resolutions: Furnishings for New Wastewater Building

CR-81 – Council unanimously approved an agreement with HPM, Inc. for the furnishing of the new wastewater operations building and laboratory for an amount of \$499,300.

Donnici Appointed to Youth Commission

CR-87 - Council unanimously appointed Elizabeth Donnici to the Northglenn Youth Commission for a term to run July 23, 2018, to July 23, 2019.

Police Receive Grants for Training, Equipment

CR-88 – Council unanimously accepted a grant for \$8,010 from the Colorado Peace Officer Standards Training (POST) for the grant application submitted by the Police Department for arrest control training equipment and training ammunition.

Council Supports Wyco Park Grant Application

CR-89 - Council unanimously supported a grant application from the city to Adams County Open Space for funding for the Wyco Park Tennis Court Improvements Project. The city plans to install a new asphalt and acrylic surface, new fencing and lighting. Already, \$250,000 has been identified in the 2019 Capital Improvement Program Fund for the project.

Police Earn Grants for DUI Enforcement, Bulletproof Vests

CR-92 – Council unanimously accepted the following grant awards on behalf of the Police Department:

• \$2,000 from the Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT) High Visibility Impaired Driving Enforcement (HVE) 2017-18 Program for overtime for holiday DUI enforcement

CR-93 – Council unanimously approved the hiring of a new full-time custodian for the Northglenn Justice Center.

Health Department Gives City Grant for Employee Wellness

CR-94 – Council unanimously accepted a \$1,100 grant from the Tri-County Health Department for the Worksite Wellness Initiative Program, which supports wellness activities by city employees.

Business Kiosk Program Expanded By Two



One of the kiosks that the city currently has up near 104th Avenue and Melody Drive.

Currently, the city maintains a kiosk on Melody Drive that includes of names of Northglenn businesses nearby. Two new kiosks will be located at 106th Avenue and Leroy Drive and near 115th Avenue and Huron Street. The businesses will pay \$200 per sign, which will cover the costs for the city.

City Purchases Tank Mixers

CR-99 – Council unanimously approved the purchase of three submersible tank mixers from PAX Water Technologies, Inc., for an amount not to exceed \$105,735.

Agreement for Karl's Farm Lift Station Design Costs

CR-100 – Council unanimously approved an agreement between the city and Karl's Farm Investors, LLC, regarding the design of the Karl's Farm Lift Station. The redevelopment of Karl's Farm will require upsizing the existing lift station. This agreement would obligate the development team to pay for 72 percent for the design, which is the prorated share for the additional lift station capacity. The budget estimate for the design is \$180,000 to \$200,000, so the city's cost may range from \$50,000 to \$56,000.

Dear Five Star Families and Guardians,

Welcome back! I hope you have had a great summer with family and friends and are ready for a new school year to start! On behalf of the nearly 5,000 teachers, school office staff, bus drivers, principals, and counselors, we look forward to making your child's 2018-2019 school year their best one yet.

FIVE STAR PROUD

We have much to celebrate in Adams 12 Five Star Schools. Our students and staff are demonstrating amazing growth and success:

• The Five Star District has been accredited as a performance district for two consecutive years and early indicators are that this designation will continue into 2018-2019.

• The district's graduation rate of 84.4 percent significantly exceeds the state average, and the Hispanic graduation rate

has jumped from 50.8 percent in 2010 to 80.4 percent in 2017.

• The principals of Northglenn High and Riverdale Elementary (Thornton) earned the Colorado Principal of the Year award for their respective levels.

Additionally, thanks to our com-

munity's generous support of the 2016 Bond Program, we are investing more than \$350 million in every student, every school and every community through improvements to our buildings.

• This summer in Northglenn, Stukey Elementary received over \$2 million in critical building system and infrastructure improvements, and Northglenn High School received improvements to their gym, theater, outside space and a new cafeteria.

• STEM Lab reconstruction continues on schedule. Phase 1 is complete of the reconstruction and renovation of STEM Lab, which serves students from across the entire Five Star District. Phase 2 is underway and when complete for the 2019-2020 school year, it will allow enrollment to grow from 475 current students to an anticipated 720 students.

High Marks for City's Preschool Program

The city's Preschool Program recently completed a three-year evaluation process through the Colorado Shines Quality Early Childhood Program.

Colorado Shines is a rating and improvement system for all of Colorado's licensed early learning programs. Operated by the Colorado Department of Education, it encourages and supports programs to improve and connect with families looking for quality child care.

Programs are rated on categories such as:

- Workforce qualifications
- Professional development
- Family partnerships
- Leadership, management and administration
- Learning environment
- Child health

After a three-year evaluation, the program received four out of five stars - missing out on the highest rating by only .16 percent. Some of the issues stem from the layout and amenities at the current recreation center. When the new recreation center opens in a few years, staff is confident the program will achieve a five-star rating.

Over the past three years, the program has gone through a metamorphosis in order to meet the standards. The environments are designed for 'purposeful' play. Children receive materials carefully chosen for the educational growth and learning styles. The city has moved toward a staff that meets the highest standards of education in the industry and training is ongoing.

The city's preschool program operates weekdays from 8:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and is open to youth ages 3 to 5.







DEZA ESTATES SHOWCASE



Due to changes in costs at the landfill, starting Oct. 1 the city will no longer accept bed springs, box springs and mattresses for free as part of special pickups.

Some other options are still available:

• If you've purchased a new bed, the store may take your old mattress items.

Pickup:

• Contact Spring Back Colorado at 720.515.1328. They will come to your home for a \$25 pickup fee, and then each mattress item they take is an additional \$20. Spring Back will recycle the mattress items, keeping them out of the landfill. Go to www.springbackco.org for more details.

• Schedule a special pickup through the city by calling 303.450.4004. The fee will

be \$65 for the first two mattress items and \$20 for any additional pieces.

Drop-Off:

• You can drop off your items at Spring Back Colorado, which is located at 3875 Steele St., Unit B, in Denver. Although there is no pickup fee, each item you drop off is still \$20. They are open weekdays, 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. and Saturday 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

• Drop off the items for \$25 each at the Yard Waste Mulching Center, 12301 Claude Court. You must set an appointment, with openings only on Saturdays. Valid ID and utility bill needed.

• Pay \$30 for each mattress item at free landfill day in October. Go to www. northglenn.org/freelandfillday for more details.

Draft for New Zoning Code Nearly Ready

The Planning and Development staff continue to work on the Unified Development Ordinance (UDO), which is an update of the city's Zoning Ordinance and subdivision regulations.

The UDO will be a more modern and user-friendly document. It will eliminate inconsistencies from years of piece-meal amendments and better accommodate future development. Many of the residential standards that exist in the code today will remain, which will help to preserve the character of Northglenn neighborhoods. In September, a consolidated draft of the UDO will be released for public review and comment. This draft pulls together the entire UDO into one document. Up to this point, staff has been working on different parts of the code.

Two public open house meetings will be held on the consolidated draft at dates and times still to be determined. We'll gather input on the draft prior to moving



Yards Still Need Care When Temps Drop

Water At Least Once Per Month During Dry Spells

Even though fall and winter lead to a drop in temperatures, you shouldn't give your lawn the cold shoulder.

With dry air, low precipitation and little soil moisture, your trees, shrubs, perennials and lawns may be damaged without periodic watering. This is especially true for newly-established plants (less than two years old.)

During extended periods without snow cover, water one to two times a month.

In stark contrast to warm-weather watering, where it should be limited to the evening and early morning, water in the middle of the day when there's a chance it may freeze overnight. (If the temperature drops below 40 degrees, don't water until the weather heats up.) Another good idea is to apply mulch around your trees and shrubs. This is crucial for new plantings. A 3-to-4-inch depth of mulch should suffice.

Mulch reduces surface evaporation, conserves precious soil moisture and allows water to better penetrate the ground. The mulch also helps keep the ground from freezing, which allows the roots more time to develop.

A benefit of organic mulch, such as wood or bark chips, is they improve the soil structure and the nutrients in the ground.

PICK UP FREE MULCH

The Yard Waste Mulching Center has free mulch available to the general public and businesses, no I.D. required.

Bring your own shovels, as the city does not provide tools for use. City staff can help load mulch into trailers and pickups if a liability waiver is signed.

The center is inside the Maintenance & Operations Facility, 12301 Claude Court. Through November, the center is open every Friday, 11 a.m. to 2 p.m., and every Saturday, 8 a.m. to 3 p.m.
