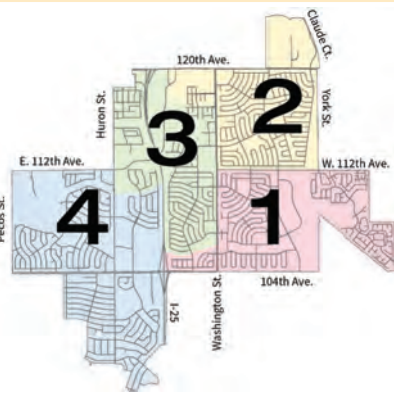

Ordinances: 2nd Reading

Budget Changes Approved

CB-1905 – Council unanimously approved on second reading the following changes to the 2018 Budget:

- Increase appropriations to the 2018 General Fund by \$347,435
- Increase appropriations to the 2018 Conservation Trust Fund by \$447,199
- Increase revenue to the 2018 Capital Projects Fund by \$2,040,000
- Increase appropriations to the 2018 Capital Projects Fund by \$6,897,610
- Increase appropriations to the 2018 Water and Wastewater Fund by \$1,321,482
- Decrease the appropriations to the 2018 Water and Wastewater Fund by \$45,171

Entertainment Districts Added to Municipal Code

CB-1907 – Council unanimously approved on second reading an ordinance adding Article 17 to Chapter 18 of the Municipal Code entitled “Entertainment Districts.”

Ordinances: 1st Reading

Initial Approval to Amend Municipal Code for Medians

CB-1908 – Council unanimously approved on first reading an ordinance amending the Municipal Code, which would add a new section, 9-4-15, concerning pedestrian access to medians, and repeal Article 7, Chapter 7, of the code.

Rezone to Allow for Church Initially Approved

CB-1909 – Council unanimously approved on first reading a rezoning of the property at 10700 Pecos St. from open space to residential. This would allow a church to utilize an existing 4,493-square-foot former child care center.

Initial Approval for Budget Addition for Justice Center

CB-1910 – Council unanimously approved on first reading a special ordinance amending the 2018 Budget, adding \$725,000 for the costs associated with the Northglenn Justice Center project.

Resolutions:

City Receives Grant for Click It or Ticket Overtime Costs

CR-73 – Council unanimously accepted an award of \$5,000 from the Colorado Department of Transportation for the grant application submitted by the Police Department due to personnel overtime for the Click It or Ticket seatbelt enforcement program.

OPEN SPACE GRANT



The city received a \$340,000 grant on May 22 from the Adams County Board of Commissioners through the Open Space Sales Tax. These funds will go toward Phase I of the Northwest Open Space Renovation.

RESERVOIR BRIDGE



The city replaced the bridge at Croke Reservoir that connects the sidewalk off of Naiad Drive with the inner loop of the nature area.

Evaluation for Local Gulch

CR-74 – Council unanimously approved an intergovernmental agreement between the City of Northglenn, the City of Thornton, Adams County and the Urban Drainage and Flood Control District to update the 1983 Master Drainage Plan and Flood Hazard Delineation of Brantner Gulch and Tributaries. Northglenn would contribute \$5,000 to the project. Brantner Gulch runs under Claude Court north of 120th Avenue in Northglenn into Thornton.

City Joins Adams County Transportation Forum

CR-75 – Council unanimously approved the Adams County Collaborative Transportation Planning Agreement to establish the Adams County Council of Governments (ADCOG) Subregional Forum Process. This creates an understanding among Adams County communities on how transportation planning efforts need to be coordinated and identifies a process for developing a list of the county's transportation priorities.

Downing Named as ADCOG Forum Representative

CR-76 – On a 5-4 vote, Council Member Joyce Downing was selected as the Adams County Council of Governments (ADCOG) Subregional Forum representative. Her

term will run until the organizational meeting following the November 2019 election. **YES:** Carol Dodge, Meredith Leighty, Joyce Downing, Becky Brown and Marci Whitman. **NO:** Jenny Willford, Julie Duran Mullica, Jordan Sauers and Antonio Esquibel.

CDBG Agreement with County Extended for Three Years

CR-77 – Council unanimously approved a resolution renewing the Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG) intergovernmental agreement between the Adams County Board of County Commissioners and the city for three years. The city receives an annual allocation of approximately \$205,000 from CDBG.

Council Approves Annual Financial Report Audit

CR-78 – Council unanimously accepted the audit of the Comprehensive Annual Financial Report for the year ended Dec. 31, 2017. To see the budgets and comprehensive financial annual reports for the city from the last few years, go to www.northglenn.org/finance.

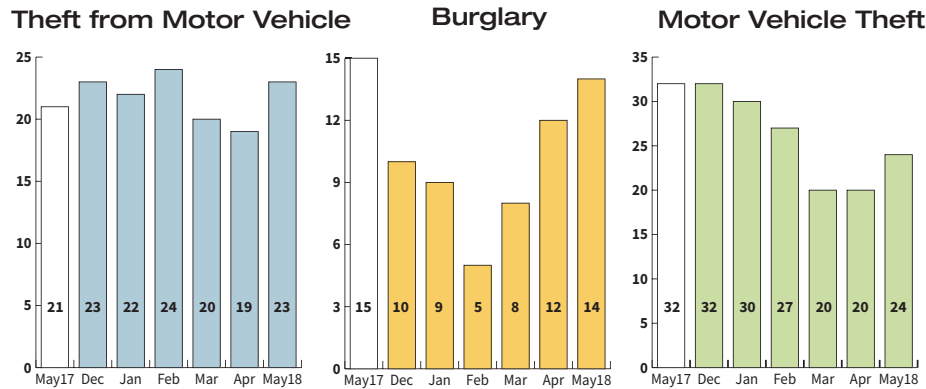

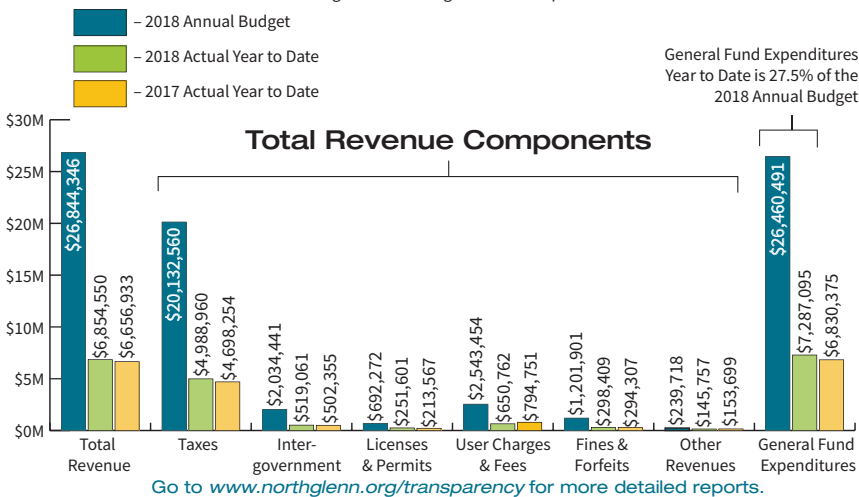
May 2018 Crime Statistics

LETTER OF THE LAW

The construction work on the Northglenn Justice Center is expected to be done by August. Workers are focused now on the exterior shell, finishing walls, landscaping and the traffic signal. CODE ENFORCEMENT IN THE CITY

Code enforcement in Northglenn is handled by the Neighborhood Services Division. They enforce sections of the Municipal Code that relate to health, safety, property maintenance and public nuisances on private property in the city.

But how does a case progress from being reported to resolved? This is the standard process:



1. A resident makes a complaint or the officer observes the violation.



2. Complaint is logged and given a case number.



3. The officer is assigned the case.



4. An inspection is typically conducted within 24 hours.



5. If a violation is found, the officer issues a Notice of Violation.



6. At the expiration of the Notice of Violation, the property is re-inspected.



7. If the violation remains, further enforcement may result in summons, show cause hearing, abatement or citation.



8. In the end, the results benefit the neighborhood.

The meeting will focus on special topics related to residential land uses in the new UDO, such as accessory dwelling units, home occupations, setbacks (distance from the property line to the building), fencing and updates to the residential zoning districts.

Public and Commercial Property

Thurs., Aug. 9, 6-8 p.m., Northglenn Senior Center

Topics for this meeting will include building design standards, landscaping, parking requirements and changes to zoning district names.

New Code Northglenn is the project to update the city's Zoning Ordinance and subdivision regulations into a modern, user-friendly document called a Unified Development Ordinance (UDO).

The UDO will consolidate all zoning and subdivision regulations while updating and modernizing the zoning districts, land uses, development quality standards and review procedures.

The city will be hosting two upcoming meetings: one geared for residents and residential property owners, while the other is more for non-residents and commercial property owners. Residents are invited to both meetings.

Make the Most of Your Summer Watering

With summer officially here, your lawn is probably showing signs of the heat and dry weather. For many, the first response to keeping a healthy lawn during the heat of summer is to water more – longer zone times, more times during the week.

While this may work in the short term to green up your grass, in the long term, it can do more harm than good for your lawn. To help you get the most of your summer watering, the city offers these suggestions:

- Water no more than three days per week. Two days is best.
- Increasing zone times during July and August when it's hottest is important; just keep the increases to five minutes or less per zone.
- Cycle water – split the time for each zone into two or three shorter cycles. This will allow water to soak into your yard instead of running off into the gutter.

- Use a water wetter, which helps soil maintain moisture more efficiently. These products are available at local garden centers.
- Water during the coolest part of the day. We recommend between 6 p.m. and 10 a.m.
- Set your mower height for longer grass. That will help keep water from evaporating from the soil.

Taking these steps will force your lawn to grow longer, more hardy roots. Over time, this will lead to a healthier, and more drought-tolerant lawn. In the short term, you may notice your lawn looks a little less green, but the next time our state is under drought conditions, your lawn will be ready to handle less water, even during the hottest parts of the summer.

To get the most from your home's irrigation system, and to grow a healthier, water-conserving lawn, consider a free irrigation system audit through the Slow the Flow program.

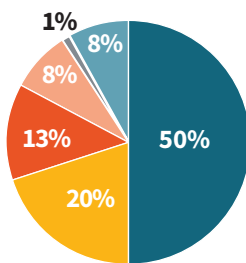

Ballots are available at the Northglenn Recreation Center or at www.northglennarts.org. Voting ends on Nov. 2.

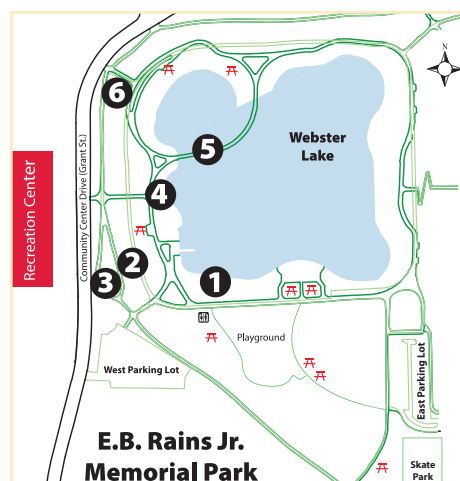

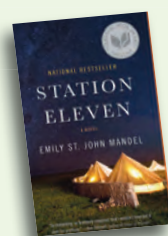
