

Ward 3 Vote Set for May 9

Council Member Duran Mullica Left Office Due To Move

City Council is scheduled to fill its open Ward 3 position by May 9.

- Council will interview applicants on May 2 starting at 6 p.m.
- A week later, council is set to select a new member at its regular meeting, which

starts at 7 p.m.

• This person will serve until the regularly scheduled general municipal election in November 2023.

Both meetings will be in Council Chambers in City Hall, 11701 Community Center Drive. They will be broadcast live on Channel 8 and at www.youtube.com/ cityofnorthglenn.

The application period for the position ran April 4 to 22 and was promoted through last month's Connection, online, over social media, and through a postcard that was sent to every household in Ward 3.

Former council member Julie Duran Mullica resigned her position effective April 21, as she is moving out of the city.





New City Hall Work Underway

No Debt; Funds Already in Place

Work is underway to ensure the new City Hall facility is a source of pride for the community and meets the needs of all employees, residents, businesses and visitors involved with municipal services and operations.

The current City Hall is nearly 40 years old, and lacks the resources, safety infrastructure and proper space for employees to efficiently provide services to the community or host the multitude of public engagement opportunities the city offers.

The new building will sit at the corner of Community Center Drive and Memorial Parkway, right next to where City Hall now sits. Architects Anderson Mason Dale (AMD) have already reached out to the public, City Council and staff for feedback on the vision and needs of the building. Right now, AMD is using all the input for the schematic design process. Once plans solidify, there will be more opportunities to give feedback.

The cost for the new City Hall is estimated at \$28.6 million - and the city already has the money to pay for it. No new taxes will be necessary. The funds were generated by the 1/2% sales tax and the 4% Special Marijuana Tax, both of which can only be used for capital projects.

Construction on the new building is scheduled to start in the first half of 2023, with the opening tentatively set for the first half of 2024.



our most recent resident survey. This is the second survey we have conducted since I became city manager and I intend to keep

recently reviewed

Northglenn on a two-year cycle.

The survey is one of many tools we use at the city to gather insight and feedback from residents. It provides valuable data to guide our efforts in ways that best serve residents. The information helps inform our strategic planning, address areas of concern, and give us a broad perspective of what residents think of our city.

This survey is based on perception. Obviously, all the respondents did not utilize every single service the city provides. We can guess, but not truly know, how COVID or recent headlines or things happening in surrounding cities affect the feedback we received. The value of the survey is to measure views on what is happening in our city at that point in time, discover what is most important to residents, and hear

how they are served by and interact with the city. The tool is meant to provide a baseline to see our trends over time and also compare ourselves to other cities.

On the next page is a summary of the results, and the full report is available now online at www.northglenn. org/residentsurvey. There were enough responses to achieve statistically reliable results, yet I was surprised we did not have more participation given the amount of outreach. I hope that means most of you are content in our city!

I see that most community characteristics were stable, priorities were ranked, and there are areas of praise and areas for improvement. We will use that information in combination with other measures to hone city services and processes and plan ahead. We are always looking to move the needle through continuous improvement.

Low-Income Homes Eligible for Internet **Discount**

The federal Affordable **Connectivity Program** (ACP) provides eligible low-income households a credit up to \$30 a month toward the cost of Internet service (\$75 per month for households on qualifying Tribal lands). Participants can apply the ACP credit toward the cost of participating

plans from a variety

of Internet service providers, including Comcast, as well as mobile services. Households that choose plans that cost \$30/ month or less will essentially receive their service for free.

Feedback on Services, Community

The 2021 Resident Survey was sent to 7,000 Northglenn residential addresses in October 2021. Residents were asked what they thought about the quality of city services and their view of the community. The survey received 654 responses, a 10% response rate. The results are statistically significant and can be considered a valid representation. 







CITY SERVICES BY QUALITY AND IMPORTANCE

the several years the Police Department has paid increasing attention to the role law enforceplays victim support and recovery.

As first responders, we recognize officers are often a victim's first point of contact with the criminal justice system. As such, these interactions can have a long-lasting impact, specifically for victims of a traumatic-natured

By refining internal victim-related policies and implementing a trauma-informed, victim-centered approach, our agency empowers victims to tell their stories in a meaningful way, while respecting their dignity.

Detectives are trained to have a greater

understanding of the effects of human trauma, and how that translates into the investigation, as well as the need to engage Victim Services in the initial stages of the investigation. Victim Services is the essential component connecting victims to appropriate community services and support and providing guidance to navigate through the criminal justice system.

Victimization does not end when the crime or criminal proceedings end. The journey to healing and recovery often requires a continuum of services and support beyond the capacity of law enforcement.

Prepare Your Home For Fires

Includes Yard, Structure, Family

Wildfires may not seem like a huge threat to Northglenn, but the evacuation area for the recent Marshall Fire in **Boulder County was less than** 7 miles from the city's borders!

With that in mind, here are • Do not store flammable tips to help prevent the spread of fire around your home and stay safe if one breaks out:

- Trim tree branches at least 6 to 10 feet from the ground and from the edge of your home, porch or deck.
- Use crushed stone or gravel instead of flammable mulch within 5 feet your home.
- Remove dead vegetation and debris around your home's perimeter and from under decks and between deck board joints.

- materials under decks or porches.
- · Make sure shingles or roof tiles aren't loose or missing; this will help keep embers from penetrating walls and
- If you are replacing the siding or roof of your home, use fire-resistant materials.
- Screen roof and attic vents to prevent embers from entering the home.
- Ensure your home has a

legible and clearly-marked street number.

- Develop, discuss practice an emergency action plan with everyone in your home, including details for handling pets.
- Have a 'go bag' ready with essential items and supplies you can take with you in case you must evacuate.
- Make sure your home insurance policy is up to date.
- Have a home inventory available; this will help settle

claims faster if necessary.

 Never leave a fire unattended and make sure any fire or smoking materials are extinguished and cool to the touch before going inside.

Fire is a risk, whether it's a large-scale emergency or an isolated burn in the kitchen. If you ever feel unsafe in your home because of a fire, get out, get clear, and call 911!

A quick roundup of roadwork activities in your city.

Huron Street Waterline Project

Construction is scheduled to begin in June on the Huron Street Waterline Replacement project. The main running along Huron Street between 104th Avenue and Fred Drive will be replaced. This encompasses the replacement of one mile of water main, 3,900 tons of asphalt, 2,000 linear feet of concrete, 123 linear feet of storm sewer, and four hydrants.

Force Main A

Force Main A, a new major sewer line, has been completely installed. The new pipe runs through the east side of Northglenn, from Lift Station A, near East 105th Place and Irma Drive, to the Maintenance & Operations Facility.

Crews are cleaning up and moving out of the area. This includes the sod replacement at Jaycee Park. After this, the only work left is to connect the pipe to the line that leads to the Wastewater Treatment Plant in Weld County and to turn on the soon-to-be-completed Lift Station A. Both are scheduled to occur in late spring/early summer. There will also be some additional milling and paving.

A STREET SWEEPING MAP

The map shows areas labeled 1-7. Each area requires two days to complete. Your address determines your sweeping day.

If your address ends in 1, 3, 5, 7 or 9, you are on the odd schedule. If the number of your address ends with 0, 2, 4, 6 or 8, you are on the even schedule.

• The first date is the odd-numbered side

• The second date is the even-numbered side of the street.

You must keep the sweeping side of the street clear from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. for both days of the cycle. You may still drive on the street, but not park.

This process will continue throughout the schedule.

Street Sweeping in May

To keep our roads clean, the city's Street Services Division sweeps all Northglenn streets twice a year.

This spring, sweeping begins May 3 and runs through the end of the month.

However, we need some help from residents. Review the map above to see when your street is scheduled. Then please make sure any vehicles, trailers, carts or other large items are off or on the opposite side of the street on your scheduled day. If something is in the way, the city will NOT sweep that area. Thank you for doing your part!

Signs will be put up on the Monday before an area is swept.



To reduce confusion and disruption, the city will stick diligently to the schedule, weather permitting. If weather or some other emergency causes us to miss any street(s), they will be rescheduled for the end of the month and into early June. If needed, a new schedule will be posted online at www.northglenn.org/streetsweeping.

- People bringing a pickup truck or trailer face a gate charge plus taxes and fees if they have more than five cubic yards of materials.
- A safety vest will be provided at the entrance and must be worn when unloading.

Face masks are not necessary, but you are welcome to wear them if it makes you more comfortable. Visitors are still asked to maintain 6-foot social distancing.






