\$1.54M in Open Space Grants for City

► Funds Going Toward Justice Center West Park, Croke Reservoir

On Dec. 7, the Adams County Board of Commissioners (BOCC) awarded the city \$1.54 million in open space grants for the city's planned Justice Center West Park and improvements to Croke Reservoir. Funds for the grants came from the voter-approved Open Space Sales Tax.

Justice Center West Park: \$1.5M

The city envisions Justice Center West Park as a water-wise and ADA-compliant neighborhood park. Planned amenities include playgrounds, an adventure course, trails, public art, signage, lighting, furnishings, and landscaping that are all

designed to fit in with the natural contours of the site and take advantage of the Front Range views. The area for the proposed park is just west of the Northglenn Justice Center, 50 W. Community Center Drive.

The city will be working to secure the remaining \$3.5 million for the project in 2022. Funding must be secured before breaking ground on the project.

Croke Reservoir Improvements: \$40K

The Croke Reservoir Improvements project comprises a comprehensive education/regulations sign package. This will include:



- A consolidated theme
- Reduced sign clutter
- Ground surface signs at major entrances
- 3-foot post signs to deter social trail entrances
- Approximately 360 feet of post-and-cable fencing at the western trail edge to further deter wetland degradation, bank destabilization, and box

• ADA-compliant fishing area at the southeast corner of the site where anglers already congregate.

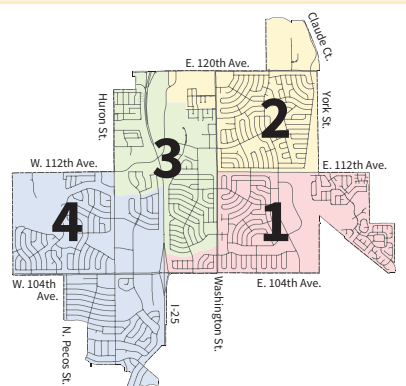

TEMPORARY WINTER HOUSING USE FOR OLD REC CENTER

On Dec. 6, City Council approved the temporary use of the old recreation center located at 11801 Community Center Drive for winter housing from December 2021 through March 2022.

The old recreation center will serve as a temporary housing option for up to 25 individuals. Twenty users may apply for short-term overnight stay with a referral from community partners (the 20 would be the same participants for the season, not different people each night); five spots would be open to individuals referred by the Police Department.

Individuals are only allowed in the building during evening/night hours; no loitering during the day is allowed. This use is one-time only and temporary through March 2022 due to planned development of the site. The program opened Dec. 15; Adams County is funding the program and the Denver Rescue Mission operates it.

New Rec Center a Hit So Far!

In December, I attended the Motones & Jerseys show at the new Parsons Theatre. All I could think was "Wow!"



It was a blast! This was a quality show in a fantastic new venue for a reasonable price – right here in our city. I am happy to discover I am not the only person with this reaction. We have had many people give positive feedback on the programs at our newest facility.

The new Northglenn Recreation Center, Senior Center & Theatre has had a

successful opening – record numbers of drop-in visits and memberships, sold-out shows in the theatre, a full preschool classroom, well-attended SilverSneakers classes and so much more! Overall, visits to the facility are about 20% above fall 2019 attendance. I fully expect that to grow as word about the quality of the center and programs spreads.

There are also new, affordable ways to experience the center. The recreation side has changed up memberships and passes to save users money and have more flexibility (see Page 7). Thanks to a new rehearsal space, the theatre is now able to partner with other arts nonprofits to offer more and different performances.

With the addition of a pool, now our classes and lessons have more room (as long as we stay fully staffed). The number of spaces available for rent has increased as well. From kid parties to social gatherings to work meetings – we have a space that will fit the need.

Finally, if you know someone looking for a fun job, send them our way. The workforce shortage is affecting everyone, including the city. We are trying our best to recruit and retain employees so it doesn't impact programming and services. ▶ Go to www.northglenn.org/jobs to see openings and apply.

Mayor's Memo: A Message from Mayor Meredith Leighty

Top 5 Highlights for 2021

Happy New Year, Northglenn! I am looking forward to 2022 and will soon meet with City Council as a team to talk about what we want to accomplish this year. It will be exciting to hear from and work with our newest elected officials.



This month let's take a glance back at a few of the big accomplishments of 2021. Here are my Top 5 for Northglenn:

5. Roads & Streets. The city invested millions in infrastructure and finished up a five-year plan of street improvements in three years! That included big projects like repaving Irma Drive after sewer replacement and refinishing Washington Street. There were many smaller projects too, like restriping, gutter upgrades and traffic calming measures in conjunction with our No Need for Speed neighborhood program.

4. Inclusivity. Our commitment to diversity, inclusivity, and equity became more visible in 2021. In June we held the first government-sponsored Pride event in Adams County. Council, staff and boards and commissions had the opportunity to participate in training on how to be more culturally aware and inclusive. We also hosted a Hate Crimes Forum to have authentic dialogue about this community concern.

3. Supporting Vulnerable Populations. We used federal COVID funds for a position to support those in need in 2020. It became clear this type of service helped immensely in coordinating with our Police Department, Adams County programs and other community partners. In 2021, we again used federal funds to establish CRU – our Crisis Response Unit. CRU helps those in need find resources. For example, those with financial challenges that struggle with home upkeep, persons experiencing homelessness or are at risk of homelessness, and support to

individuals that qualify to use the old rec center as winter housing (a program we approved in December).

2. COVID-19 Efforts. The pandemic is still with us, and Northglenn perseveres. We continued to focus on what we CAN accomplish, a trait that makes me proud of our community. Events, programs and services resumed to near-normal levels with added safety precautions. We also offered numerous vaccine clinics in city facilities.

1. Our New Recreation Center, Senior Center and Parsons Theatre. This was by far our biggest achievement in 2021! Bigger, better and beautiful – this new facility is a huge point of pride in our community, and I am pleased to see so many people using the facility.

A new rec center may be hard to beat, however, I'm confident 2022 will bring even more points of pride.

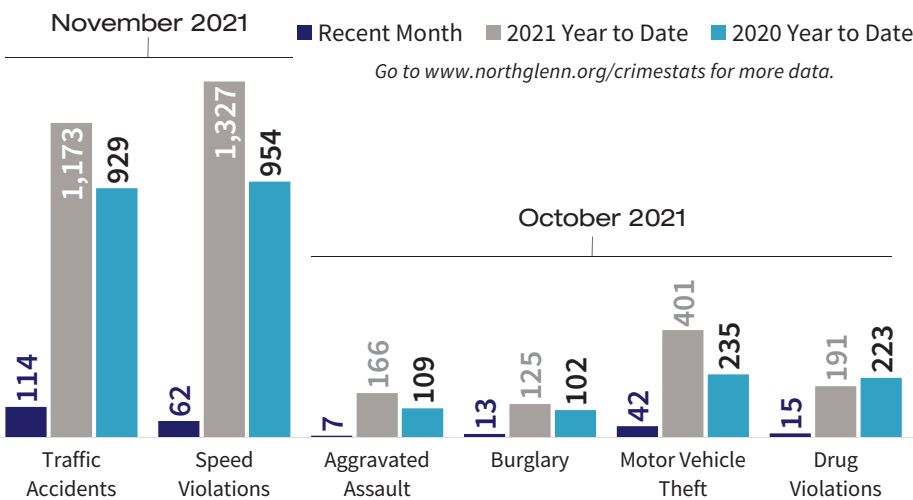

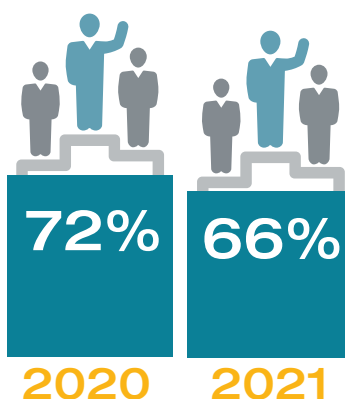

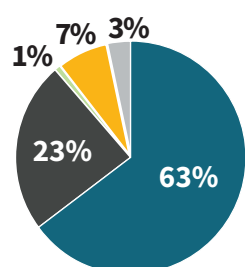

"Puffers" Often Fall Prey to Car Thieves

These crooks roam around neighborhoods, parking lots, gas stations and convenience stores looking for these vehi-

cles, commonly known as 'puffers.' It just takes a few seconds, and your car is gone.

Unfortunately, when a car is stolen, the harm goes beyond the hassle, anger and financial loss of reporting and possibly replacing the

vehicle. Criminals often use stolen vehicles to commit more misdeeds. They may also use any documents, keys or garage door openers in the vehicle to wreak havoc on your identity, security and peace of mind.

Thankfully – the solution is simple. Do not leave your car running unattended. If you want to make sure your car is warm in the morning, consider a remote starter. The keys aren't in the vehicle, making it harder for thieves to steal.

Free Vaccines Open to Youth, Adults

- Anyone 12 and older can get a free COVID-19 vaccine at a pharmacy, doctor's office, pop-up or local clinic, or mobile vaccine bus near you. No ID or insurance needed. Most providers take walk-ins and same-day appointments. You are entitled to paid time off from your job to get vaccinated and recover from side effects.
- Vaccines for youth ages 5 to 11 are also available, but appointments are likely necessary. Check with your child's medical provider or go to <https://covid19.colorado.gov/kids-vaccines> for clinics available.
- Boosters are now available for all adults; 16- and 17-year-olds can receive a Pfizer booster.
- Another way to find a vaccine clinic is by calling the state's vaccine hotline at 877-CO VAX CO (877.268.2926). The hotline is available weekdays, 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.; and Saturday and Sunday, 9 a.m. to 6 p.m.
- You can also schedule a vaccine appointment by calling Tri-County Health at 303.220.9200. Their nurses are currently administering adult and child routine vaccines, COVID-19 vaccines, and the flu shot.
- The Westminster Office, 1401 W. 122nd Ave. #200, offers walk-ins and appointments every week on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 8:30 to 11:30 a.m., and 1 to 3:30 p.m. Individuals younger than 18 years of age require parent/legal guardian consent; a note or phone call is acceptable. Call 303.451.0123 for details.

Test Sites Open

It's easy to get a free, convenient, and safe COVID-19 test. Pre-registration speeds up the process, but is not required. No insurance or ID needed. Find a full list of testing sites at www.tchd.org/COVIDtesting. CDC recommends getting tested if you have any signs or symptoms of COVID-19, regardless of vaccination status or prior infection. Hours are subject to change due to weather and holidays, so check the testing site's website before you go. Results from your COVID-19 test can take between two and three days.

Free Testing at FRCC

Free testing is available at Front Range Community College, West 112th Avenue and Stuart Street in Westminster. They are open daily from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.

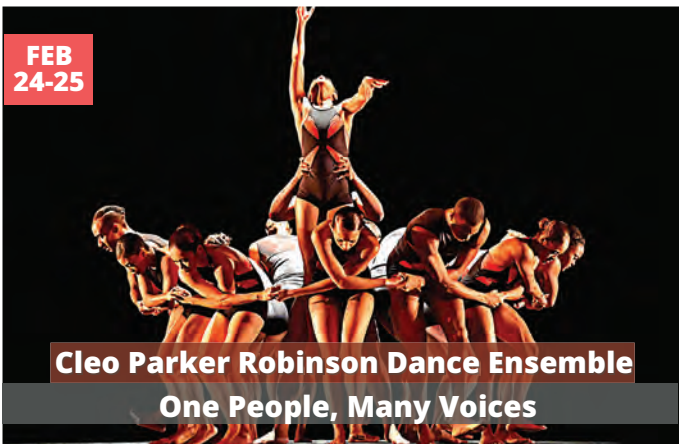

Traffic Signal Upgrade
New traffic signals are coming! These will be the first upgrades:

- 104th Avenue from Irma Drive to Ura Lane
- Huron Street and Kennedy Drive

- 117th Avenue and Washington Street
 - Irma Drive and 120th Avenue
 - Claude Court and 120th Avenue
- This will be followed by Washington Street from 104th Avenue

to Sylvia Drive, then Huron Street from 104th Avenue to 116th Avenue. The remaining signals will be upgraded based on need and traffic volumes.

Traffic Calming
Spurred by resident input via the No Need for Speed program, three neighborhoods will have new temporary traffic calming measures in place:

- Quivas Street from 104th Avenue to Roseanna Drive now

- has two traffic circles (roundabouts) and one traffic island.
- 112th Place from Claude Court to Malley Drive will receive five traffic islands by the end of January.
- Marion Drive from 104th Avenue to 105th Place will receive one temporary traffic island by the end of January.

Additional traffic calming measures are under design and will be installed in the near future.

HOME STRETCH

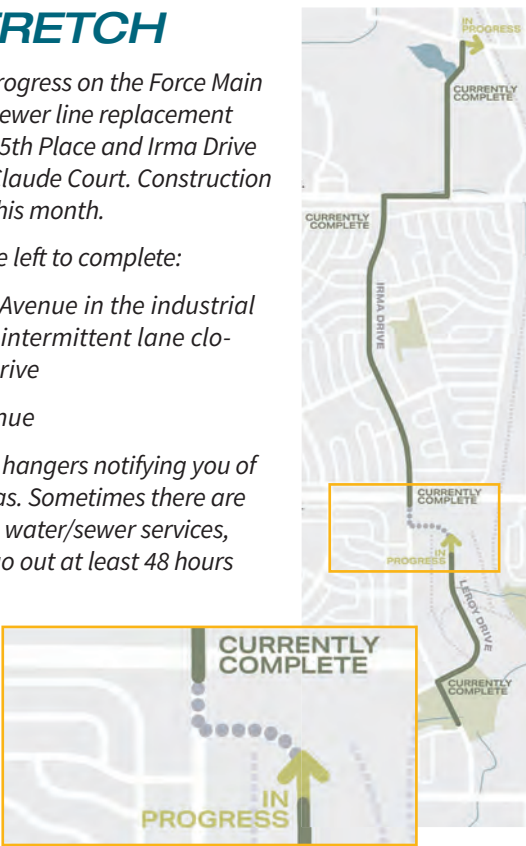

Two small portions are left to complete:

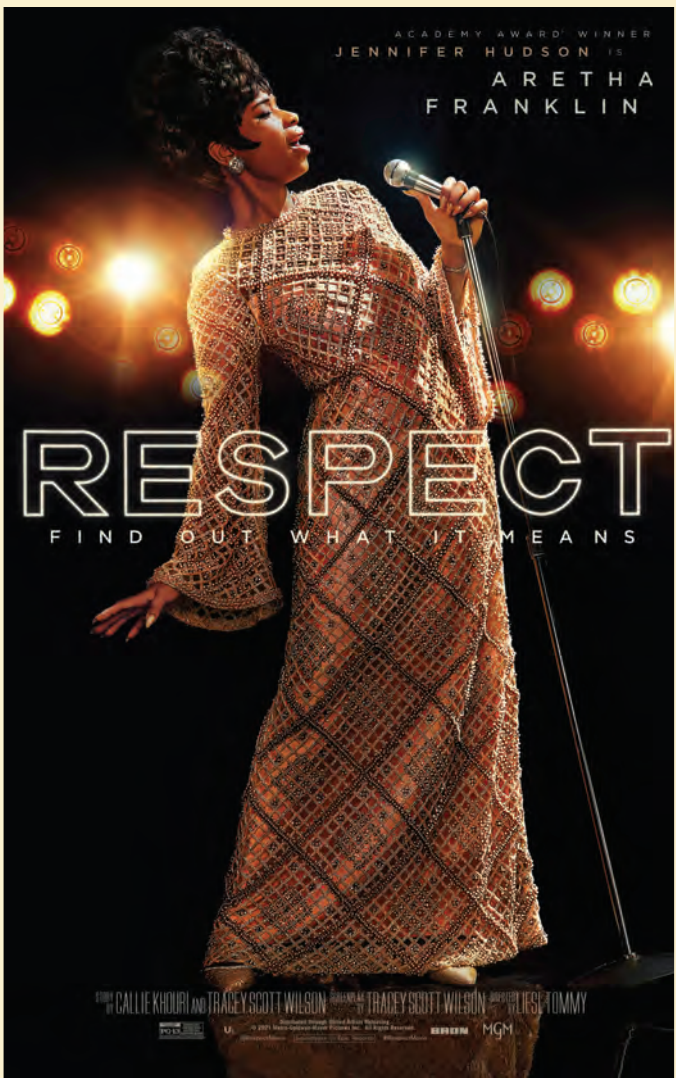
- Just south of 112th Avenue in the industrial park; watch out for intermittent lane closures along Leroy Drive
