Repairs for Community Center Drive Bridge ▶ Work to Start in August or September

Do you live near or travel often on the Community Center Drive bridge over I-25? Come join your fellow

community members to learn more about an upcoming project on the Community Center Drive Bridge at a public meeting. Representatives from the contractors responsible for the project, Collins Engineers, will do a presentation and answer questions.

The project will repair deficiencies identified by the Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT). Work should begin in August or September. During construction, bridge traffic will be reduced to one lane in each direction. The project is expected to last

between 90 and 120 days. Federal funds provided by CDOT's Off System Bridge Program are covering the costs.

Council Legislative Recap: Mar. 2023

Here is a recap of recent votes, a glance into the most discussed topics and a look ahead for City Council.

Council votes on two types of items: An ordinance (CB) is an enforceable law or regulation that requires two majority votes by council to pass; a resolution (CR) is a decision, opinion, policy or directive and only requires one majority vote to pass.

PROCEEDS FROM BRONCOS SALE GOING TO ARTS, REC PROGRAMS

The City received \$394,396 through the Metropolitan Football Stadium District (MFSD) from the recent sale of the Denver Broncos.

The MFSD collected a one-tenth of 1% sales tax in each of the municipalities within the seven-county metro Denver district between 2001 and 2011. This sales tax funded approximately 75% of the cost of the construction of Empower Field at Mile High. The terms in the MFSD Act identified a “sharing amount” that would be distributed to each of the jurisdictions within the district upon the sale of the franchise. These funds are required to be used for youth activity programs.

The Parks and Recreation Advisory Board provided recommendations to City Council on how to utilize

the funding. Council made a few adjustments, and the funding will be allocated as follows:

- \$30,000 to the **Northglenn Arts & Humanities Foundation** to distribute in the form of scholarships and/or added value to arts programming for youth.
- \$30,000 to be distributed in the form of **scholarships for active recreation programs**. Staff is working to identify a partner agency to accept and distribute these funds to Northglenn youth.
- \$200,000 for an **aquatic adventure course**; leveraging funding as grant match to secure additional funds.
- \$134,396 to the construction of **Odell Barry Park**, a project that is currently underfunded.

MULTI-YEAR APPROACH FOR OLD REC CENTER SITE PREPARATION

On March 6, council received an update on the Civic Center Phase 3 plans including site remediation, demolition of the old recreation center, and the implications these first two items have on developing the site.

Under current environmental guidelines, the site has soil contamination. Additionally,

it was discovered the old recreation center has contaminated materials. There is no risk to those in or around the building or grounds, but there are materials that need specialized abatement under today’s standards.

These issues increase the cost of building demolition and site

preparation necessary before redevelopment.

Staff recommended a multi-year approach to spread the cost out over three years and also allow time to pursue state and federal grant funding to offset those costs. There was council consensus to support the multi-year plan.

MEETINGS & STUDY SESSIONS

Council must have two meetings a month. They also typically have two study sessions monthly to learn about and discuss topics in-depth. Special meetings are scheduled if more time is needed to complete city business.

Time/Date: Council meetings and study sessions are both at 6 p.m. Meetings are on the second and fourth Monday of the month; study sessions are on the first and third Monday.



Tim Long



After 25 years of living in Ward 4, Tim Long now serves as a council member. Long resides with his wife Donna near Sperry Park where they oversee their home-based national K-8 teacher training program. Between them they've raised six offspring who have spread their wings into four states, which makes for interesting travel planning. Professionally, Long has worked in healthcare administration in both foreign and domestic venues for decades including four Denver-area hospitals.

Additionally, Long has a track record of several non-profit boards including seven years with the Northglenn Urban Renewal Authority and the North Metro Fire Rescue District for 12 as its treasurer.

• **What Community Issues Are You Most Interested in Addressing?** Ensuring safe neighborhoods is key. The No Need for Speed Program is a worthy approach to reduce speeding and racing. Car theft, catalytic converter stealing with an uptick in gangs filtering into Northglenn is a concern for our police officers. They seem busier than ever.

Infrastructure improvements in addition to city streets

that include drinking water, wastewater and stormwater projects may be in need of some creative financing in the near future.

Smart prioritization of city funds needs to keep pace with our first responder calls, inclusive of police, emergency medics and firefighters. These folks it seems more and more are going into harm's way arm-in-arm. Their latest training activities address these potential emergencies along with disaster planning.

• **What Regional Issues Are You Most Interested in Addressing?** Homelessness is a highly complex concern requiring appropriate responses and the coordination of many resources. Northglenn's Crisis Response Unit (CRU) has earned its place as a proven entity especially given increases in mental health emergencies and folks making poor habitual drug-use choices.

Above all, working with respectful approaches and attitudes, it is up to us to remain committed to positive actions with respect to the honor and trust of everyday Northglenn-Americans.

Public Works Dept. Earns Elite Honor

The city's Public Works Department will soon become the ninth in the state and 182nd in the nation to receive accreditation from the American Public Works Association (APWA).

This voluntary process has taken over two years and required intense evaluation of 561 specific areas – everything from the department's procedures to communication to culture.

This has led to improved operating procedures, more efficiency and increased preparedness in case of an emergency.

“This is a great accomplishment for our department and city,” said Public Works Director Kent Kisselman.



What's the best way to report an issue to the city? Access Northglenn!

You could use Access Northglenn for a variety of reasons:

- Let us know about a pothole or need for street repair
- Contact the Police Department about a variety of issues or services (**However, always use 911 in an emergency!**)
- Send in a code enforcement concern
- Request trash services – like receiving a new cart
- Send us a broken link or old information on www.northglenn.org
- And so much more!

When you fill out a report on Access Northglenn, staff who are trained to handle your issue or request are immediately notified. They can then respond to you if they have questions – or start work on correcting the item. The entire process is tracked, with oversight from city staff leadership, to make sure nothing falls through the cracks. (We even encourage council to utilize Access Northglenn.)

If you have a smartphone, the Access Northglenn app is available on the iPhone App Store or Google Play (search for 'Northglenn.'). No smartphone? No problem. You can submit your item directly at www.northglenn.org/accessnorthglenn or click the teal 'Report an Issue' button on the right hand side of www.northglenn.org when looking at it on a desktop.



Programs Assist With Water Savings

It's spring! It is wonderful to see spring flowers, hear the birds chirping, and feel the warm sunshine.

Now is the time many residents tackle lawn and garden projects. I want to make sure you are aware of some city programs that can help you save money, water and work.

To support our commitment to environmental sustainability, we designate funds for programs that encourage water conservation. Some are discounts or free services in partnership with Resource Central, and some are simply rebates.

irrigation system and provide suggested improvements. You can start making appointments now; evaluations begin in May. A 90-minute consultation is free for Northglenn residents!

Garden in a Box kits are now on sale. Get them quick, they always sell out! There are a variety of

sizes to choose from, and kits include plants that look great even though the whole garden uses very little water. There is a \$25 discount for Northglenn residents. This is an easy way to add some curb appeal with minimal upkeep.

Lawn Replacement Program applications are open now. This water conservation effort includes free low-water plants and lawn removal service discounts for Northglenn residents. A certain amount of lawn must be removed to qualify for the program. One of the participants in this program won a Yard of the Month award last year!

Water rebates are available on an ongoing basis. If you invest in a water-efficient toilet, water-efficient washing machine, rotary sprinkler head, irrigation timer or rain barrel, you may be eligible for a rebate.

Adams County residents can dispose of their electronic waste, such as old computers, tablets, cell phones and more. The recycling process is safe and responsible, ensuring a high level of data destruction.

The cost is as follows, which can be paid with cash or credit card:

- \$15 per vehicle for all electronics, including up to one television or computer monitor
- \$25 for each vehicle carrying up to three televisions and/or computer monitors (no more than three

televisions/monitors will be taken)

The following items are not accepted:

- Alkaline batteries
- Monitors and televisions with exposed tubes
- Trash
- Carbon monoxide and smoke detectors
- Thermostats
- Radioactive equipment
- Light bulbs
- Neon signs

- Anything that contains mercury, freon or other chemicals

Remember that throwing electronics in the trash is not allowed in Colorado.

Expanded Yard Waste Center Hours for Spring

Spring is upon us, which means taking care of some much-needed yard work after the long winter.

However, you don't need to fill up your precious trash cart space with old grass, leaves and branches. Northglenn residents can bring them to the city's Yard Waste Mulching Center.

Starting April 1 and going through November, the facility is open 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. every Saturday. It's located at the south end of the Maintenance & Operations Facility, 12301 Claude Court. Just go right through the gate as you enter the parking lot.

Only Northglenn residents can drop off debris. Please bring proof of residency, such as a driver's license or utility bill with a photo ID. The city will take most yard waste except for dirt, sod or gravel.

As a bonus – the yard waste is churned into mulch that is free and available to the entire community. That includes residents, non-residents and businesses. Please bring shovels, as the city does not provide any tools. However, staff can help load the mulch into trailers and pickups if you sign a liability waiver.






