

NEW TRAFFIC SAFETY ZONE **CONSIDERED**

When the February Connection was sent to print (prior to the Jan. 30 meeting), City Council was scheduled to consider designating certain neighborhood streets as Safety Sensitive Zones.

If a consensus is reached at the study session, the ordinance will be set for a vote in February and begin rolling out in March.

The current draft proposal includes posting signs on the streets that are considered Safety Sensitive Zones (some possibilities include near parks, school or public bus stops, and main pedestrian crossings). Once the signs are posted, the areas would be under the same type of traffic enforcement as school and construction zones. Fines for speeding would be higher in those areas.

MEETINGS & STUDY SESSIONS

Council must have two meetings a month. They also typically have two study sessions monthly to learn about and discuss topics in-depth. Special meetings are scheduled if more time is needed to complete city business.

Time/Date: Council meetings and study sessions are both at 6 p.m. Meetings are on the second and fourth Monday of the month; study sessions are on the first and third Monday.

• The 120th Avenue Improvements is the largest road project the city has started in recent years. The project will widen 120th Avenue to a three-lane road from Sylvia Drive to the east city limit, add a traffic signal at Race Street and replace the traffic signal at Claude Court. The cost will be around \$17.8 million. Thanks to federal and other local sources, Northglenn will be paying \$5.5 million of that.

Work on the project started on Jan. 9; the contractor removed the concrete median, installed the temporary lanes and moved traffic. The contractor is now working on the storm drain system on both sides of the road. Go to www.northglenn. org/120thavenue for more details.

- Traffic calming measures are being installed on 112th Place, Quivas Street and Marion Street. They involve the installation of raised crosswalks, traffic circles, and speed humps. Work is scheduled to be completed in March.
- **Note:** All street work is dependent on weather.




Total Revenue Components

City Manager's Column: A Letter from Heather Geyer

Clear View Revealed for New City Hall

Groundbreaking Scheduled for June 8 With Opening in Early Fall 2024

On Jan. 9, Anderson Mason Dale Architects (AMD) presented the final design of the new Northglenn City Hall at the City Council Meeting. What an exciting evening! Council reviewed final renderings, studied the building layout, and saw building materials first-hand.

AMD has met with staff, worked with elected officials, and gathered public input over the last year. Their design captures the project vision: "The Northglenn City Hall will be a healthy, safe, and progressive place of work for city staff; and an inspiring civic resource for residents, serving as a gathering place and anchor of the Civic Center Campus that fosters a sense of pride, camaraderie, and community."

The design encourages engagement and sets an example of sustainability. City Hall will be Net Zero (generating as much energy as it uses) and aligned with the CORE Green Building Rating system. This includes efficient energy and water use, ecological regeneration, using responsible building materials, creating a healthy indoor environment, universal facility access and an inclusive design process. I feel the designs truly enhance community identity with the creation of a welcoming and functional civic gathering place.

The new City Hall will not only house staff and council chambers; it has two large public lobbies and two community rooms. This space makes it easy for our residents and businesses to access city services, give input on city endeavors and engage with elected officials and each other. The building also flows into the surrounding areas – the recreation center, Parsons Theatre, senior center, festival lawn, veterans memorial and E.B. Rains Jr. Memorial Park. It will anchor the southern portion of the Northglenn Civic Campus.

The total cost for this project is \$33.78 million, and will be paid for completely with reserve funds - no new debt will be issued. Also, staff is working to secure grant funding.

Council will be presented next steps for Phase 3 development opportunities for the remainder of the site in the coming months.

For now, next is creating the formal structural documents to guide construction of the new City Hall. The groundbreaking celebration is tentatively set for the evening of Thursday, June 8, and all are welcome. We hope to open the doors to the public in early fall 2024!

Staff spent much of 2022 seeking public input and then putting together Looking Up! - the city's new comprehensive plan.

A comprehensive plan is a long-range document that reflects the community's vision, values, and goals for the city's future. The plan will include policy, programming, and land use recommendations that will guide the city for years to come. Looking into a wide range of topics through the lenses of equity and resiliency, the goal for the plan is that it drives Northglenn toward a future that benefits all residents while celebrating its values.

PUBLIC SAFETY



County Health Department, the city adjusted its operating procedures and precautions in reaction to the COVID-19 pandemic. By March, council resumed in-person meetings. Still, the city continued to provide updated testing and vaccine information and support through most of 2022.

The Police Department joined the Colorado **Metropolitan Auto Theft Task Force (CMATT)** to combat the ever-increasing motor vehicle thefts in the Denver metro area. This group of law enforcement agencies, investigators and prosecutors work together to build solid cases against thieves and their criminal groups.

Police Chief Jim May and Council Member Becky Brown are members of the Adams County Regional Opioid Council that will decide how funds received through opioid legal settlements will be used. These funds are intended for prevention, education and treatment.

Old Rec Center Turned Into Temporary Shelter

Working with Adams County and the Denver Rescue Mission, Northglenn temporarily transformed its old rec center into a shortterm housing facility for persons experiencing homelessness that were referred by community partners. Not only did they have a place to stay the night, the people also received consultation and case management from Denver Rescue Mission and Crisis Response Unit staff. The program ran from December 2021 to August 2022.

INFRASTRUCTURE

Force Main and Lift Station A Replacement Complete

The replacement of **Force Main A and Lift Station A was** completed in late 2022 after nearly a year and a half of work. Lift Station A is a four-pump system that collects wastewater and pushes it up through Force Main A, the city's biggest sewer line, on its way to the Wastewater Treatment Plant.

This required a significant amount of construction on the east side of town, and the city would like to thank everyone for their patience. This was a necessary project that increased the efficiency and lifespan of the city's wastewater system.



Plans were set in place for a new city hall to be placed just east of the current facility, off Community Center Drive. Groundbreaking is set for June 8, 2023, and the new facility will include the latest in sustainable design. This includes Net Zero energy use and CORE Green Building Rating certification. ► Read more in City Manager Heather Geyer's column on Page 4.






