Hit the Brakes for New **Safety Sensitive Zones**

Fines for Speeding Will Be Doubled in Certain Areas

City Council was set to adopt a new ordinance in late February allowing for the designation of Safety Sensitive Zones. This ordinance is intended to encourage adhering to posted speed limits on residential streets where there is significant vehicle, pedestrian and bicycle traffic such as around parks.

Like school and construction zones.

fines for speeding tickets will be doubled in these areas.

The new zones will roll out in stages. The law takes effect in that area as soon as signs are posted. Postcards about new zones will be mailed to residents in the nearby vicinity when signs are placed.

This ordinance is a response to

numerous concerns expressed by residents to City Council. "What can we do to reduce speeding in neighborhoods and make it safer?" is a common question. In addition to the Police Department's Traffic Unit, the city has a Traffic Calming policy and the No Need for Speed program to help address this issue. The Safety Sensitive Zones will be an additional option for residential streets with speeding concerns.



• **120th Avenue Improvements Project:** The contractor has removed the median to accommodate two lanes of traffic while the expansion of 120th Avenue starts on the north side of the road. Portions of the road and sidewalk have been removed on the north side to begin the installation of underground utilities.

When complete, 120th Avenue will be widened from two lanes to three in each direction from Sylvia Drive, just east of Washington Street, to the N Line overpass. Completion should be sometime in 2024.





City Manager's Column: A Letter from Heather Geyer

When Snow Falls, City Springs to Work

Street Snow Plows Activated When Accumulation Reaches 4 Inches

Snow plowing and shoveling for the season is not quite over yet - March is typically our snowiest



month. In December and January we had more snow and colder temps than usual, but our city, residents and businesses stepped up to meet the snow removal challenge.

The city's level of service regarding snow removal is above and

beyond our neighboring communities and other municipalities in the metro area. This is the result of resident input and policy changes by City Council in 2021. All residential streets receive one pass by a plow any time there are 4 inches of snow or more. Many cities have a higher threshold for residential plowing (such as 7 to 10 inches depending on weather forecast). For the public areas we oversee, we prioritize by traffic volume and safety. ► More details are available at www.northglenn.org/snowplow.

Snow Shoveling Help Sought

We receive many calls requesting assistance for homes, especially for our elderly residents who are unable to clear their sidewalks.

The city coordinates a Snow Stormers program, linking community volunteers with residents that are physically unable to shovel their own walks and cannot afford to hire someone to do so. This program is great except we have many more requests for help than we have volunteers, so the waitlist is long.

If you could shovel an extra walk or two to help a neighbor, please let us know! Contact Jenni Murphy at jmurphy@northglenn.org. ice we do our best to respond – but some areas are private property and some streets do not have space for big equipment to move snow around. Sometimes we have to wait for Mother Nature to do the job.

Property owners (or tenants) are responsible for their properties and city ordinance states snow from sidewalks should be cleared within 48 hours after a snowstorm ends. If a sidewalk is not cleared within 48 hours, you may report it at *www.northglenn.org/ accessnorthglenn* and staff will notify the resident or business about the ordinance.

I realize some people feel the city should do more and I assure you we are utilizing our staffing and budget to its utmost effectiveness. We will continue to monitor the impacts we are seeing with each storm and adjust accordingly.

Please remember -

- The city manages snow plowing and shoveling in public areas, not private property nor sidewalks adjacent to private property.
- Some of our major streets are plowed by other entities (neighboring cities, i.e., Westminster, Thornton or CDOT).
- The goal is to clear streets enough for vehicles to get through and public park trails/sidewalks for pedestrian use. The snow has to go somewhere, and sometimes where it has to be piled is an inconvenience.
- When residents report an unsafe area or excessive

Snow plowing is a big city issue, and we continually look for ways to improve services. Balancing resources with requests is an ongoing process. Thank you for your input, Northglenn, we hear you and respond as best we can.
