► Council Begins Work on New Strategic Plan; Public Input Sought

It has begun! Our next five-year strategic plan for Northglenn is starting to take shape.

City Council and the staff Leadership Team met Saturday, March 16, to dive into this task.



Council and the staff Leadership Team attended a workshop on March 16 to begin the new strategic plan process.

Our strategic plan guides where we focus resources, how we budget, what special projects we take on and more. This plan clarifies our purpose and values, which helps us make the best decisions for our city.

We began with a look back at city history. It was crucial to reflect on decisions that previous councils made based on the economic climate of the time. We reviewed our most recent plan and celebrated the large body of work that our staff completed between 2019 and 2023. Finally, we began the process of reimagining our framework.

We trimmed down to seven priority categories (*the last plan had eight*). Ranging from Public Safety to Housing to Infrastructure, the priority categories encompass all of the services we provide to our residents.

I look forward to working with you, council and staff in designing a strategic plan that provides residents and businesses with better services, new opportunities, and a secure future.

STATE PLANNING TO OPEN TRANSITIONAL HOME IN CITY

The State of Colorado Office of Civil & Forensic Mental Health plans to establish a Mental Health Transitional Living (MHTL) Home at 11255 and 11275 Grant Drive.

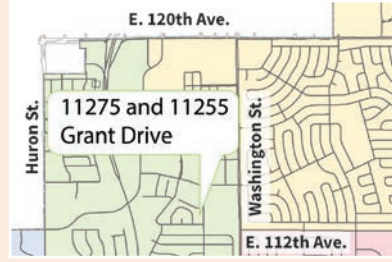
This facility is for individuals leaving state mental health hospitals who have been evaluated and cleared for release into the community. The state has advised that there will be supervision and assigned case workers. Those eligible for transitional living are not considered a threat to others or themselves. The facility will house persons managing

severe mental illness, substance use disorders and more, and will include registered sex offenders.

Since this is a state facility, the city has no authority over the use of the location. The city is hosting a community meeting to answer questions and provide information:

Council must have two meetings a month. They also typically have two study sessions monthly to learn about and discuss topics in-depth. Special meetings are scheduled if more time is needed to complete city business.

Local Legislative Recap: March 2024

Here is a recap of recent votes, a glance into the most discussed topics and a look ahead for City Council.

Council votes on two types of items: An ordinance (CB) is an enforceable law or regulation that requires two majority votes by council to pass; a resolution (CR) is a decision, opinion, policy or directive and only requires one majority vote to pass.

ORDINANCE ADDRESSES STOLEN, ABANDONED SHOPPING CARTS

Based on City Council direction, CB-2018 was drafted to address abandoned shopping carts and those removed from businesses.

This is based on the findings that shopping carts in the public right-of-way create hazards to the health and safety of the public, interfere with pedestrian and vehicular traffic, promote blight and deterioration, and create a public nuisance.

Additionally, the ordinance is intended to ensure that measures are taken to prevent obstructions to the city's public rights-of-way and facilitate the retrieval of abandoned or removed shopping carts and storage of personal property found within abandoned or removed shopping carts in a manner consistent with federal and state law.

As written, CB-2018 would make it unlawful for any person to:

- Leave an abandoned shopping cart in the public right-of-way
- Remove a shopping cart from a business premises, either temporarily or permanently, without the written consent of the owner
- Be in possession of a shopping cart that has been removed from a business premises without the written consent of the owner
- Detach the sign or deface the name or address marked on a sign, which is marked on a shopping cart.

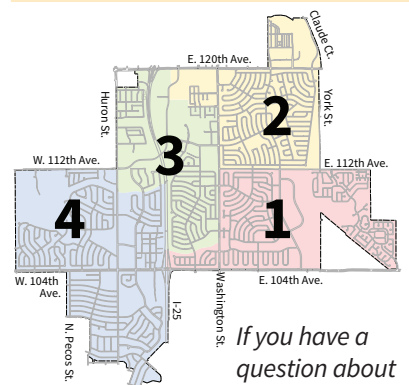

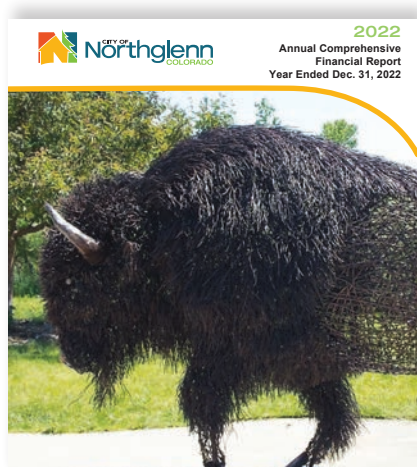

The certificate is the highest recognition in government accounting and financial reporting. The ACFR is the audited year-end financial statement for the city.

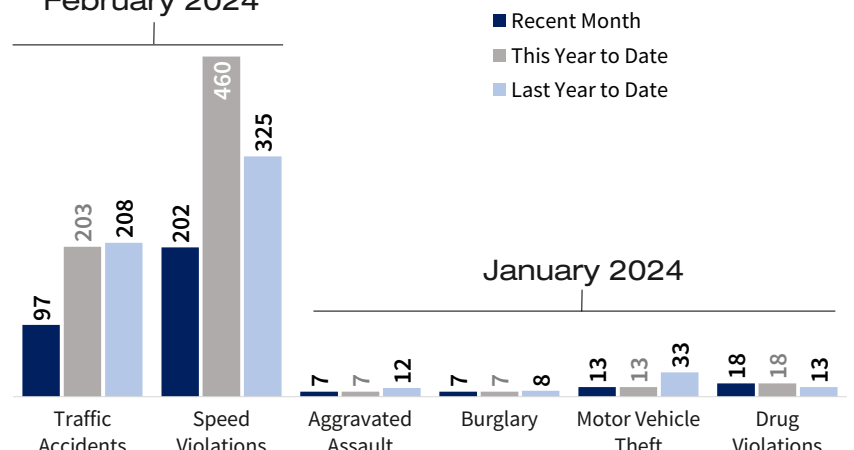

City Manager's Column: A Letter from Heather Geyer

March in Washington

► City Delegation Meets With Elected Officials, Seeks Project Support, Learns From Other Municipalities

I accompanied several council members and some staff to Washington, D.C. for the National League of Cities Congressional City Conference in March. This annual event is an opportunity for municipalities to bring their questions, issues and concerns to the federal level; a chance to learn about federal priorities and programs (*and funding opportunities!*); and a lot of interaction with cities from across the U.S.

Three Northglenn Youth Commission members also attended, and our elected officials commented positively on their interactions via social media and in person.

We met with Sen. Michael Bennet, Sen. John Hickenlooper and Rep. Yadira Caraveo (CO-8) to discuss congressional funding requests and other priorities.

As to our funding requests – one is for \$11.84M to support E. 112th Avenue Flooding Damage

Reduction & Mitigation. Improvements to the East 112th Avenue ditch will address capacity limitations that led to overtopping of the road and ditch, and flooding of residential properties on the south side of the street. The second request is for \$1.74M for a Wastewater Treatment Plant solar project that would include installation of a 1.5-megawatt photovoltaic system of solar panels and grid integration systems. The project should generate over 2.8M kWh annually, which would meet the facility's needs.

Though advocating for our community to our federal-level elected officials is important, I believe the

HELP BACK TO HEALTH SMALL BUSINESS DENVER RECOVERY GROUP HONORED

Denver Recovery Group, winner of the 2023 Small Business of the Year award, is a medication assisted treatment facility for those with opiate use disorder. They prescribe medications to help overcome withdrawal symptoms and cravings for illicit substances such as fentanyl, heroin, or other opioids.

The process starts with a long intake day. Patients see a counselor, complete an assessment, go through a medical examination from a doctor, and then visit a nurse who dispenses medication for the patient. There is also a behavioral component to their treatment, with individual and group counseling, peer services, and case management.

"We try to be a one-stop-shop," said Jessica Zehm, Manager of Administrative Operations and Coordinator of Program Services. "We have our own laboratory for blood draws and TB tests. Everything is in-house.

Patients do not receive outside bills or outside referrals."

They primarily see patients with Medicaid, which covers all treatment costs with no co-pays, but also accept patients with Medicare or self-pay all-inclusive rate.

"We really want to work with patients and meet them where they are at. We never want fees to be a reason why a patient can't get into treatment with us," said Zehm. "We've even seen a big movement with private insurance companies covering opiate use disorder treatment."

Denver Recovery Group identified the north area as an underserved community within the treatment realm and decided to open its ninth clinic here.

"There is nothing more exciting or more rewarding than when a patient chooses to come here because it is voluntary treatment," said Zehm. "Our patients really appreciate this place and become protective of it. They share their success stories with our staff members. We become a safe space or a home for them."

Denver Recovery Group understands that things happen in life and their patients are always welcome back, whether they have been gone for one day or many, because they exist to help patients.

The city offers rebates on a number of water-saving purchases, listed below. You must be city water customers, as rebates are applied as credits on water bills. Rebates are given out on a first-come, first-served basis until funding runs out for the year. Water-Efficient Toilet Rebate

- Up to \$75, limit two per address
- Residential customers must own the residence where the toilet is being replaced.
- To qualify, toilets must use 1.28 gallons of water per flush or less
- Dual-flush toilets with flush functions that use more than 1.28 gallons per flush are not eligible for this rebate.

Rain Barrel Rebate

- Up to \$50, limit one per address every five years
- **Note:** Per state law, residents can store up to 110 gallons of rainwater for use in their yards in one or two rain barrels.

Water-Efficient Washing Machine Rebate

- Up to \$100 for a new, high-efficiency washing machine
- Limited to one per address every 10 years
- Residential customers must own the residence where the washer is being installed.
- The washing machine must be an EPA-certified Energy Star product.

Rotary Sprinkler Head Rebate

- \$3 per sprinkler head, limit 25 per address

Irrigation Timer Rebate

- Up to \$100 per timer, limit one per address every 10 years
- The timer must be WaterSense labeled.

Aquifer Project Progressing



The city's Aquifer Storage and Recovery continues to progress as both wells are now finished and test pumping has begun to determine their pumping rate.

The wells are located on the grounds of the Water Treatment Facility, 2350 W. 112th Ave.

ASR injects water into deep bedrock aquifers for long-term storage. The water is then available for future recovery during droughts or seasonal high-demand periods. If successful, ASR will provide additional drought resilience and sustainability to the city's water supplies.

Bring Green Waste to Mulching Center

Trash cart space can be precious. Thankfully, Northglenn residents can drop branches, leaves and cut grass at the Yard Waste Mulching Center instead of throwing it away.

The center is located at the south end of the Maintenance & Operations Facility, 12301 Claude Court. Beginning April 1 and running through November, it is open from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. every Saturday.

Only Northglenn residents can drop off debris. You must bring proof of residency, such as a driver's license or utility bill with

accompanying photo ID. The city accepts branches, tree stumps, leaves and grass clippings. (*Other items such as sod are NOT accepted.*)

The city grinds most of the accepted green waste into mulch that is free and available to anyone – residents, non-residents and businesses. You must bring a shovel as the city does not provide tools, but staff can help load the mulch if you sign a waiver.

In March, drywall, piping and ductwork were installed while roofing was placed on top. And thankfully, the building was almost entirely enclosed during the

mid-month snowstorm, so it didn't affect construction progress. April is scheduled to have the placement of wall paneling inside and out of the facility.

When it opens in the third quarter of 2024 next to the current City Hall, this 32,600-square-foot facility will be Net Zero and have a CORE Green Building Rating – the

first municipal building in Colorado with that certification. The \$33.8M facility is being funded completely through reserves.

Dismount Zone Added to E.B. Rains

► Patrons Asked to Walk - Not Ride - at Entry of Park

As our trail users and diversity of transportation modes increase, more and more potential collision conflicts arise. The city is committed to seeing our park and trail patrons enjoy traversing Northglenn and our natural spaces, safely.

Thus, we are introducing our very first pilot program for a local dismount zone at E.B. Rains, Jr. Memorial Park. The dismount zone is simply that – in this area, we ask that you get off your bicycle, scooter or skateboard and walk it through the designated dismount zone.

The zone is near the front entrance at the southwest corner of the park (see the area highlighted in yellow below, right). This is a major intersection for the park, adjacent to the parking lot, park entry, Civic Center and Farmers' Highline Canal.

Look for new signs and painted sidewalk markings. Park Rangers will provide educational signage and information on how this dismount zone affects users.

Just remember: "It's a decision to avoid a collision."

**Dismount zones will not apply to any EPDMDs or OPDMDs for individuals with mobility disabilities as applicable to the Americans with Disabilities Act guidelines.*

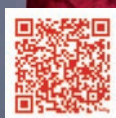

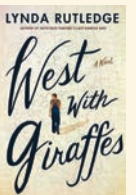
