Old Recreation Center May Be Used For Seasonal Housing

Would Run December '21 to March '22

On Dec. 6, Council will consider allowing the old recreation center, 11801 Community Center Drive, to be used as temporary seasonal housing for 20 to 25 people from December 2021 to March 2022. This would be for night stay only.

Adams County has approved funding for this temporary program and Denver Rescue Mission is on board to operate.

In Adams County, homelessness has rapidly increased by at least 40 to 45% since the pandemic and during the 2020-2021 cold-weather season, there were at least 800 unsheltered.

This year one of the major Adams County cold weather care programs will not operate, leaving a big gap in services for some of the most vulnerable in the city.

The old rec center is slated for a public-private development

project. There is no planned use of the facility this winter.

The proposed program has a very limited capacity. Twenty users could apply for short-term residence with a referral from community partners (the 20 would be the same participants for the season, not different people each night); five spots would be open to individuals referred by the Police Department.

Individuals would only be allowed in the building during evening/night hours; no loitering during the day would be permitted. This use would be one-time only and temporary through March 2022.

DOWNING COMPLETING THREE DECADES ON COUNCIL

After more than three decades, Joyce Downing will be included on the City Council roll call for the last time on Dec. 13.

The current Ward 2 council member and former mayor has decided to end her distinguished service as an elected official in Northglenn.

Downing was initially appointed to fill a vacancy as Ward 2 council member in October 1990. Since then, she served over four terms as a council member for Ward 2 and two terms as mayor, from November 2009 to 2016. Her one break from council over the last 30-plus years was forced due to term limits.

Although she served the entire community, her passions were for local and regional transportation, assisting workers at the old Rocky Flats complex, and especially historic preservation.

During her involvement, the Stonehocker Farmhouse was transformed from a weathered National League of Cities, and worn-out structure to a historically-recognized home that hosts events and activities throughout the year. Both Stonehocker and St. Stephen's Lutheran Church were added to the National Register of Historic Places.

Also, Downing served on numerous regional and national committees with organizations such as Colorado Municipal League, North Area Transportation Alliance, Smart Commute Metro North and RTD.

Thank you, Council Member Joyce Downing, for your dedicated service to our community. Your work has touched Northglenn and surrounding areas in too many ways to count. You will be missed.



City Manager's Column: A Letter from Heather Geyer Justium Seyer

Vision Building for New City Hall

The October 2021 opening of the new Northglenn Recreation Center, Senior Center and Theatre marks the completion of Phase 1 of the 2017 Civic Center Master Plan. Use of our new facility is off

to a strong start based on visitor numbers and programming. We continue to work out the kinks (so to speak) in operating our brand-new facility and appreciate your patience as we do so.

Momentum from opening the new building is driving energy and excitement around Phase 2 of the Civic Center Plan, which includes design and construction of a new city hall. In May, the City engaged Anderson Mason Dale Architects (AMD) to design and construct the new facility. The first phase of the design process is to pinpoint what activities and amenities will take place in the building, then determine the space needed.

City Council members and staff have toured several public buildings over the last few weeks to see how space is used differently. Staff and resident surveys, City Council interviews, and public input have been gathered by the architectural firm to help guide the space needs assessment and future design of the building.

On Nov. 15, AMD debriefed City Council on key themes/input that has been heard up to this point in the process. Residents who responded to the online survey identified these top 10 adjectives that best described the collective experience and identity of the new City Hall:

- 1. Accessible/welcoming
- 2. Efficient
- 6. Innovative
- 3. Practical
- 7. Collaborative
- 4. Sustainable (environment)
- 8. Secure9. Professional
- 5. High tech
- 10. Social

Design of the new facility will take approximately 10 months and is slated to wrap up by the end of second quarter 2022. We hope to break ground on construction of the facility by third quarter of 2022 with the opening by the fall of 2023.

Designing a building to serve and meet the needs of the community for the next 50 to 100 years is no small task. This is why customer service excellence is a core organizational value that will be honored in the design.

As a side note, the City already has the funds in place to construct the new facility.

As for the old rec center, work continues in partnership with Continuum Partners on the public-private portion of the plan. Staff plans to bring forward a Redevelopment Agreement with Continuum by the end of February 2022 for the remainder of the site. Stay tuned for more details!

As our work continues in bringing the Civic Center to life, I encourage you to join us for Noel Northglenn and visit the Festival Lawn this holiday season. As you can see on Page 7, the Antique Fire Truck is there and is a great backdrop for a fun family holiday photo!

We have much to be thankful for this holiday season. Thank you for calling Northglenn home!



September 2021 General Fund Financial Report



Few things take the joy out of the holidays, but having your packages snatched from your doorstep is certainly one! Here are a few tips to prevent porch piracy:

- Require signatures for your deliveries.
- · Ask a friend or neighbor to pick up your package.
- If available, have the package delivered to a store. Amazon has its own lockers where you can pick up your orders.
- If allowed, have packages sent to your workplace - or to a friend or family member you know will be home.

Costs Money

- Rent a post office box.
- · Purchase a door camera. Like a guard dog, it helps dissuade thieves just by its presence, and if someone is brazen enough to steal your package, they'll be caught on camera. (And the police will be very interested in the video!)

If you believe your package has been stolen, first contact the shipping company and/or seller, as the package may still be en route.

If you've confirmed that the package was delivered, report the theft at 303.288.1535 or at www.northglenn.org/reportonline. Police may respond with an increased presence in your area and alert the community.

Free Vaccines Available

- Anyone 12 and older can get a free COVID-19 vaccine at a pharmacy, doctor's office, pop-up or local clinic, or mobile vaccine bus near you. No ID or insurance needed. Most providers take walk-ins and same-day appointments. You are entitled to paid time off from your job to get vaccinated and recover from any side effects.
- Vaccines for youth ages 5 to 11 are also available, but appointments are likely necessary. Check with your child's medical provider or go to https://covid19.colorado.gov/kidsvaccines for clinics available.

Moderna booster shots for COVID-19 are available on a first-come, firstserved basis.

Your booster doesn't have to be the same type/brand as the doses you already received. Bringing your vaccination card is helpful.

The Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment recommends everyone over 18 get a booster shot.

If you got Pfizer or Moderna for your first two doses, you should get a booster approximately six months or more after your initial dose. For Johnson & Johnson, it's two months.

First-time vaccinations will also be available on a walk-in basis for people ages 12 and up. For youth ages 5 to 11, please sign up in advance at www. northglenn.org/dec8covid.


Residents can drop off Christmas trees at these three spots from Dec. 27 through Jan. 7.


