### Stay By Cars When Engine Runs

### Thieves Target "Puffer" Vehicles

There's a thick layer of frost on your windshield. You start your car and then go back inside to give it time to heat up and defrost. Later, you walk out to find your car gone. You're a victim of a 'puffer' theft.

Puffers' are auto thieves' term for vehicles left unattended with the motor running, and is a huge problem in the metro area – including Northglenn. The Police Department spends hundreds of hours each year investigating motor vehicle thefts.

"Driving in a cold car can be uncomfortable, but it's much better than having to call 911 because your car has been stolen," said Police Chief Jim May.

Other serious consequences of having your car stolen include:

- It could be used in other criminal activity.
- It could be involved in a serious traffic accident, injuring innocent victims.
- The thieves could gain access to your home with the car keys and/or garage door opener.
- The thieves could commit identity fraud with documents left in the vehicle.
- Your car insurance rates could go up.
- Leaving your car running and unattended is illegal, and you could be subject to a fine.

One option is to have a remote starter, where the keys aren't in the car when it is warming up.

#### **PREVENT THEFT**

- Take keys out of your vehicle's ignition when you are not using it.
- Stay with your car when warming it up during cold weather.
- Bring your keys when running into a convenience store.
- Bring your keys when dropping your children off at day care.
- Never leave your keys in your car while refueling.



### Stay Safe When Temps Drop

Winter is upon us in Colorado, and North Metro Fire Rescue District wants to help residents stay safe amid freezing temperatures. Here are a few tips and resources to

help you during the winter months:



#### Homeowners

When temperatures are expected to freeze, homeowners should take precau-

tion to avoid having a water pipe burst in or around their home. Remember to:

- Disconnect exterior hoses and shut off water to them.
- Protect your interior water pipes that run along exterior walls from freezing by letting them drip.
- Don't set your heat too low.
- Open up cabinet doors to let heat in.

Homeowners should also be careful when using heaters inside the home. Keep anything that can burn at least three feet away from any heat sources such as fireplaces, space heaters and radiators. Also, don't overload your electrical outlets with heating appliances. Stick to one heating appliance per outlet.

Additionally, be sure to test your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors monthly to ensure they are working properly and can alert you to any dangers.



Now that Colorado has experienced several days of snow and freezing temperatures, area lakes and ponds have started icing over. While the ice may look solid and tempting to walk on, North Metro Fire Rescue District advises residents to stay off the ice. If you notice a person or pet that has fallen through the ice – do not try to rescue them – call 911 immediately. North Metro firefighters are specially trained for ice rescues, as shown above.

#### **Drivers**

The best way to stay safe in snowy or icy conditions is to remain off the roads. At least give the road crews enough time to plow and sand the roadways before venturing out. Drivers should also remember to:

- Decrease your speed while driving and leave plenty of room to stop.
- Brake gently to avoid skidding on ice

or wet road conditions.

- If you do start skidding, take your foot off the accelerator and steer in the direction you want your front wheels to go.
- If you get stuck, turn your wheels side to side to push the snow out of the way.
- Remember four-wheel drive may help you get going, but it won't help you stop.



### KEEP SNOW OUT OF STREET

The city requests that homeowners and businesses please DON'T shovel snow into the street when they are clearing sidewalks, driveways or parking lots. Snow that is piled into the street can lead to ice dams. This can create unsafe conditions on sidewalks and streets when the water overflows and freezes. A better solution is to put the snow onto grass or other landscaping that needs water. For commercial centers, pile the snow in one area of the parking lot.

### KEEP PROPERTIES SAFE IN COLD WEATHER

During freezes, properties with fire sprinkler systems are at risk of their pipes freezing or breaking, and usually this becomes evident once a thaw occurs after a freeze. To help avoid damage, owners/managers should make sure that:


The Northglenn Recreation Center has teamed up with the Food Bank of the Rockies to offer the Kids Café Program and Totes for Hope.
