2024 was another good year for the North Royalton Police Department. The Department made great strides in improving the aging facilities by upgrading our evidence storage and processing areas. A new records management system was also implemented and the department has a goal in becoming paperless. New graphics were added to the School Resource Officer vehicles to display more school pride.

Recertification with the Ohio Collaborative was also accomplished. Each officer received extensive training this year. Several agreements were made with local cities to house their prisoners in the jail. These agreements provided guaranteed bed space for a prisoner from those cities and the guaranteed revenue helped offset jail expenses.

Two officers were hired in 2024 and sent to the Ohio State Highway Patrol Basic Police Academy. They will complete their training in 2025. North Royalton PD is continuously trying to recruit officers due to retirements that will occur within the next three years.

North Royalton was ranked number 13 in the top 25 Safest Small Cities in the U.S. by MoneyGeek. MoneyGeek, a finance site, analyzed crime statistics and quantified the cost of those crimes to identify and rank the safest small towns across the nation, looking at close to 1,000 cities with populations between 30,000 and 100,000.

Administrative Review-Biased Based Policing & Racial Profiling 2024

Review

A review of patrol operations and complaints for the calendar year 2024 shows that no NRPD officers were subject to a complaint of biased based policing.

All current department personnel continue to complete monthly Daily Training Bulletins (DTB's) related to Biased Based Profiling through the Lexipol system. The policy, updated in September of 2024, has been read, and acknowledged by all of our officers, also through the Lexipol system.

All Patrol officers, Sergeants, and Traffic Unit officers continue to use their assigned Body Worn and In Car Cameras per Policy 422 and are recording their traffic stops and public interactions with them. Sergeants and OICs are also using the cameras to record interactions with citizens making formal complaints against officers.

The Department's Written Warning slips were updated in 2020 to include information related to Biased Based Policing.

Synopsis of Data

In calendar year 2024, the North Royalton Police Department issued 834 traffic citations compared with 1,270 traffic citations in 2023, 1,359 traffic citations in 2022, 1,324 citations in 2021, 769 citations in 2020, and 973 citations in 2019. Officers issued 2,974 written warnings in 2024, compared to 4,506 written warnings in 2023, 4,196 written warnings in 2022, 3,801 written warnings in 2021, 1,782 written warnings in 2020 and 2,188 in 2019. The number of citations issued decreased markedly by 436 (-34.3%), the number of written warnings issued was down 1,222 (-34.0%), and the number of traffic stops and citizen interactions decreased in 2024 by 1,968 (-34.07%) less encounters. The only explanation for the significant decline in stops, citations and warnings in 2024 is that the Department was subject to a deliberate slow down by union members upset over a change in scheduling for 2024 and drawn-out contract negotiations. The numbers continue to show no indication of bias toward any one group, as the percentages fairly will mimic the percentages of each group's representation in the population of the City of North Royalton. The percentages have remained relatively stable for several years.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Historically, the North Royalton Police Department has been diligent about strict enforcement of motor vehicle and traffic violations, and continues to do so. Officers should continue to carry out this Mission with continued thorough documentation, utilizing the technology and training that has been provided to them. Further recommendations that will allow this Mission to move forward include:

- Continued monitoring of the officers by the Sergeants for any indication of a pattern or practice of Biased-Based Policing and immediate corrective measures such as counseling and/or discipline if warranted.

- Continued use and monitoring of the in-car and mobile camera systems for indications of a pattern or practice of Biased—Based policing, including review of any allegations of improper Policing.

-Continued Bias Awareness training as needed, particularly for the newly appointed officers.

-Continued proper documentation of traffic stops by both the officer, dispatch, and the clerks. Proper review of such documentation by the Sergeant/OIC, and second party checker in the Clerk's Office to reduce the number of unknown parties.

-Continued education of the public, through bulletins, social media posts, and through the North Royalton City Schools to educate the public on what actions we are taking, or to fill the immediate need for information in the event of a serious situation.

-Review of this report by the officers of the Department to see not only where things stand, but where they are headed, as well as to address the results and recommendations.

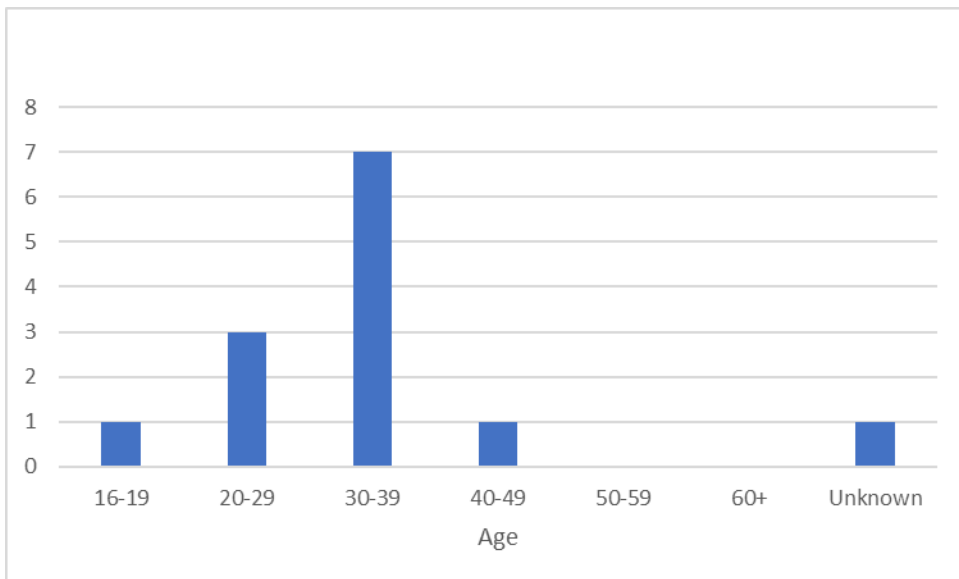
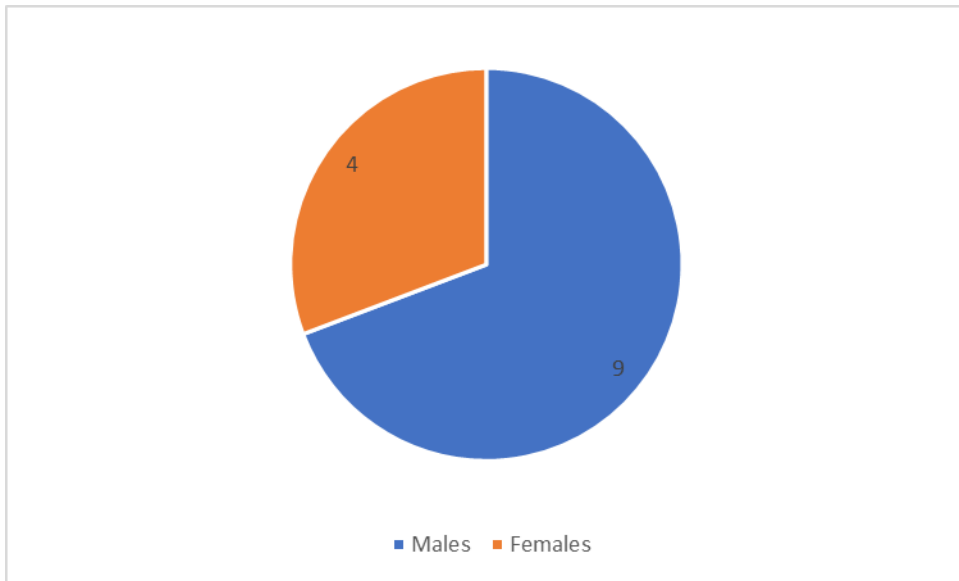
CONCLUSIONS

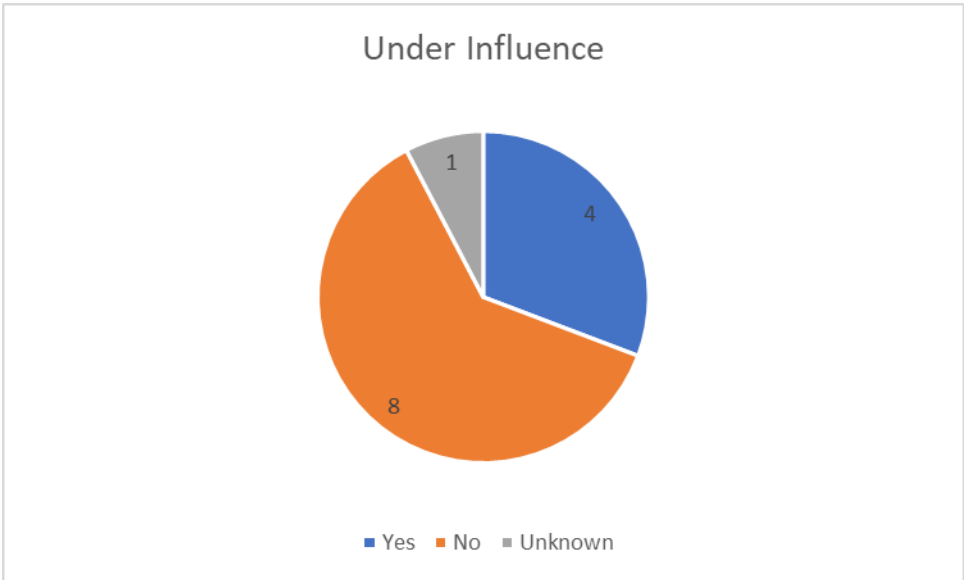
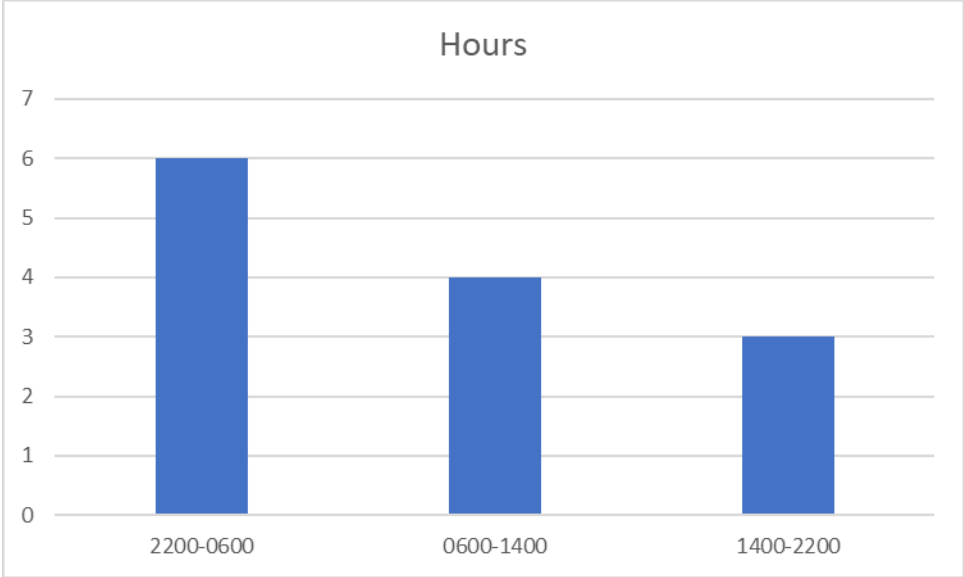
As noted previously in this report, the officers of the North Royalton Police Department are diligent regarding strict enforcement of traffic and motor vehicle violations within the City of North Royalton regardless of a person's demographics. Although traffic stops were down considerably in 2024, there were no complaints of biased based policing filed against NRPD officers during the year, indeed, only four total complaints were filed, three of which were unfounded and one of which was resolved by other means. With the implementation of 12-hour shifts, it is expected that there will be an "adjustment period." Officers should continue to diligently enforce traffic and motor vehicle violations in general in a courteous, ethical, and professional manner.

In 2024, the North Royalton Police Department had 13 Use of Force Reports. There were 12 arrests. Two offenders had skin irritation from O/C spray. One officer was injured (broken ankle).





TRAINING SUMMARY

Here are the training highlights from 2024:

All 34 full-time officers and 1 part-time SRO completed 24 hours or more of state mandated Continuing Professional Training (CPT) in mandatory topics such as: Legal Updates (2 hours), Responding to Mental Health Issues (2 hours), Crisis Mitigation and De-escalation (2 hours), Marsy's Law/Victim' Rights (1 hour), and NIBIN (National Integrated Ballistic Information Network) (1 hour). Officers completed the other sixteen hours through a variety of online classes/seminars or in-person classes such as Report Writing, Responding to Sexual Assault, Use of Body Worn Cameras, Use of Deadly Force and Legal Guidelines, Officer Wellness Seminar, Crisis Intervention, Community Diversity and Procedural Justice, Communication Disabilities, Ethics and Professionalism, and Vicarious Trauma.

All sworn officers are current on Heartsaver First Aid, CPR, and AED through the North Royalton Fire Department.

All sworn officers have completed the County's Crisis Intervention Training (CIT).

JAIL SUMMARY





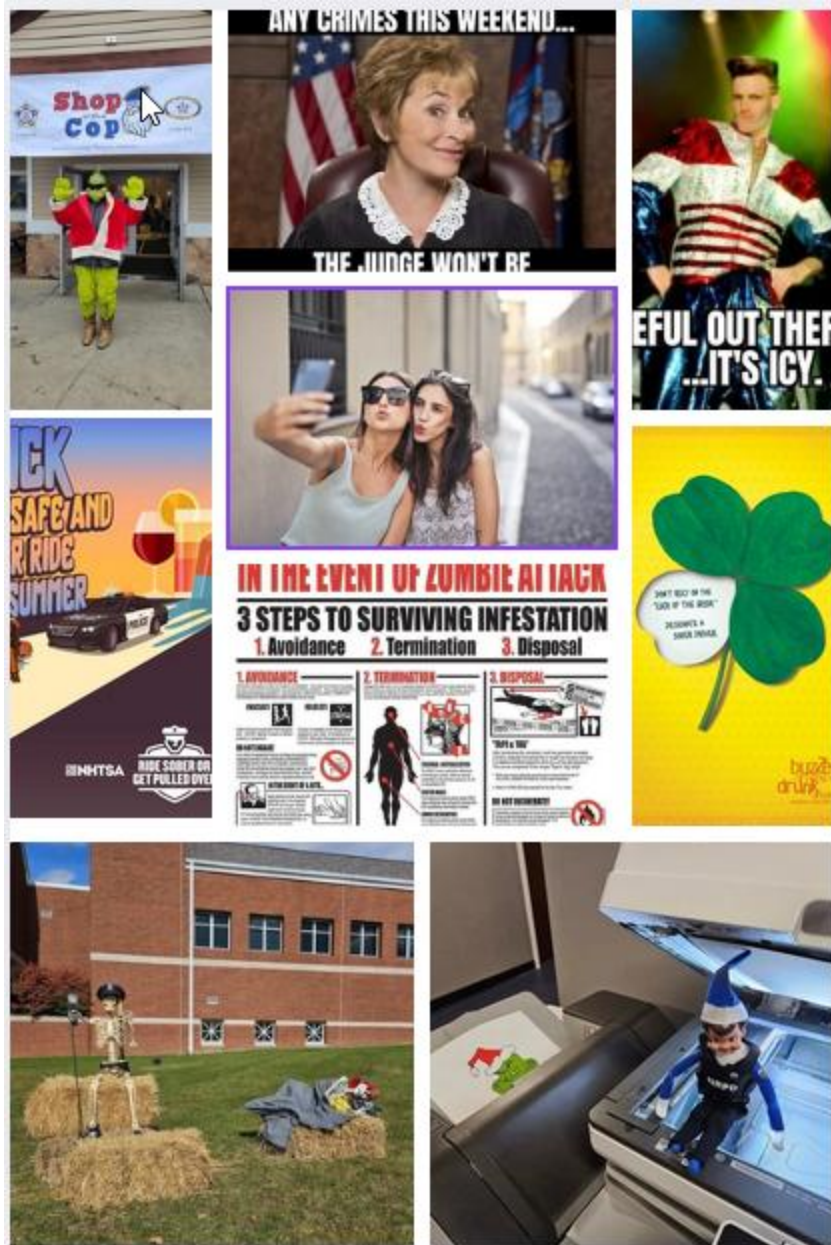


- 627 adults were arrested by the North Royalton Police Department
- A total of 642 prisoners were housed in the jail that were the responsibility of the City of North Royalton. These subjects spent a total of 1101 days in custody.
- The 642 North Royalton prisoners accounted for 41.33% of the overall jail population in 2024. Their average length of stay was 28.65 hours.
- The jail housed a total of 1553 prisoners. 1118 were adult male prisoners, 428 were adult female prisoners, and there were 7 juvenile prisoners.
- The average daily population was 6.62 prisoners per day.
- The jail served 7257 meals in 2024. The average cost per meal was \$6.14.

- The average medical cost per each North Royalton prisoner was \$18.32 in 2024. The average medical cost per each outside agency prisoner was \$1.84. Outside agencies paid an additional \$5,300 in medical fees to the City of North Royalton for use of the Jail Physician. The overall cost per prisoner in 2024 was \$5.24.
- The Jail had annual bed leasing agreements with Berea, Brecksville, Broadview Heights, Brook Park, and Parma Heights. Those five communities accounted for 789 prisoners that were housed 1650 prisoner days in 2024.
- The Self-Pay Program offers defendants from other jurisdictions the opportunity to serve their sentence at the North Royalton Jail. The program housed 87 individuals from five different courts. They stayed a total of 577 days, generating an additional \$132,470.
- 56.42% of jail operational costs were offset through jail billings in 2024

SOCIAL MEDIA

In 2024 we continued to use our social media sites to reach our community. We had in excess of 12K followers on Facebook and 3.9K on X. Posts included memes related to current events, public information and warnings, community events, and an insider' look at the operations at NRPD. Lt. Redrup continued to poke fun at our brothers in the fire department, and we got to see more antics from Cobalt the Elf.
