AN ORDINANCE DECLARING THE IMPROVEMENT OF CERTAIN REAL PROPERTY TO BE A PUBLIC PURPOSE PURSUANT TO REVISED CODE SECTION 5709.40(B); DECLARING SUCH IMPROVEMENT TO BE EXEMPT FROM REAL PROPERTY TAXATION; DESIGNATING PUBLIC INFRASTRUCTURE IMPROVEMENTS TO BE MADE THAT WILL DIRECTLY BENEFIT SUCH PROPERTY; REQUIRING ANNUAL SERVICE PAYMENTS IN LIEU OF TAXES; DESIGNATING A MUNICIPAL PUBLIC IMPROVEMENT TAX INCREMENT EQUIVALENT FUND FOR THE DEPOSIT OF SUCH SERVICE PAYMENTS; AND AUTHORIZING COMPENSATION PAYMENTS TO THE NORTH ROYALTON CITY SCHOOL DISTRICT AND THE CUYAHOGA VALLEY CAREER CENTER, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

<u>WHEREAS</u>: The development of commercial properties in the City of North Royalton, Ohio (the "City")

will benefit the City and its residents by creating jobs, enlarging the property tax base, enhancing income tax revenues and stimulating collateral development in the City; and

<u>WHEREAS</u>: Pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Section 5709.40, .42, and .43 (together with related provisions

of the Ohio Revised Code, the "TIF Act"), the City may, among other things, (i) declare the increase in assessed value of real property located in the City to be a public purpose, thereby exempting such increase from real property taxation for a period of time; (ii) specify public infrastructure improvements, made, to be made, or in the process of being made, that directly benefit such real property; (iii) provide for the making of service payments in lieu of taxes by the owners of such real property; (iv) establish a public improvement tax increment equivalent fund into which such service payments shall be deposited; (v) provide for the use of such service payments to pay the costs of such public infrastructure improvements (which costs may include, without limitation, the payment for or reimbursement of costs of the public infrastructure improvements incurred by the City, or any other public or private party in cooperation with the City); and (vi) provide for compensation payments to the affected school

districts out of such service payments in lieu of taxes; and

WHEREAS: Tri Norwood Holdings, LLC has acquired and is developing parcels of real property (as

depicted and described in Exhibit A attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference, the "Site"), and the City has determined that certain public infrastructure improvements, as that term is defined in Ohio Revised Code Sections 5709.40(A)(7) (as more fully described on Exhibit B attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference, the "Public Infrastructure Improvements"), made, to be made, or in the process of being made, that will directly benefit

the Site; and

WHEREAS: The development of the Site will benefit the City and its residents by creating economic

opportunities, enlarging the property tax base, stimulating collateral development in the City;

and

WHEREAS: The City desires to grant a one hundred percent (100%) exemption from real property taxation

for a period of thirty (30) years (the "TIF Exemption") for each improvement to the Site (as

defined herein, the "Improvement"); and

<u>WHEREAS</u>: The City has determined that it is necessary and appropriate and in the best interests of the

City to require the owners of the Site and their successors and assigns (collectively, with their successors and assigns, as owners of the Site, the "Owners") to make service payments in lieu of taxes with respect to the Improvement pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Section 5709.42; and

WHEREAS: The City has delivered notice of the proposed TIF Exemption to the Board of Education of the

North Royalton City School District (the "School District") and to the Cuyahoga Valley

Career Center (the "Career Center").

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NORTH ROYALTON, COUNTY OF CUYAHOGA AND STATE OF OHIO, THAT:

<u>Section 1</u>. Parcels of Real Property. The parcel of real property subject to the exemption granted by this Ordinance is identified and depicted in Exhibit A attached hereto and made a part hereof (the "Site," with each parcel comprising the Site, as currently or subsequently configured, including any lot splits or consolidations, being referred to individually as a "Parcel"). In the event of a conflict between the outline of the Site shown in the map set forth in such exhibit and the legal description of the Site, the outline of the Site shown in the map shall control.

Section 2. Tax Exemption. Pursuant to and in accordance with the TIF Act, this Council hereby finds and determines that 100% of the increase in assessed value of each Parcel comprising of the Site (which increase in assessed value is also hereinafter referred to as the "Improvement" as defined in the TIF Act) is hereby declared to be a public purpose and shall be exempt from taxation (the "TIF Exemption") for a period commencing for each Parcel with the first tax year that begins after the effective date of this Ordinance and in which an Improvement attributable to a new structure on that Parcel would first appear on the tax list and duplicate of real and public utility property were it not for the exemption granted by this Ordinance and ending on the earlier of (A) thirty (30) years after such commencement or (B) the date on which the City can no longer require service payments in lieu of taxes (the "Exemption Period"), all in accordance with the requirements of the TIF Act.

<u>Section 3</u>. Designation of Public Infrastructure Improvements. This Council hereby designates the public infrastructure improvements described in Exhibit B attached hereto (the "Public Infrastructure Improvements") and any other public infrastructure improvements hereafter designated by ordinance as public infrastructure improvements made, to be made, or in the process of being made that directly benefit, or that once made will directly benefit, the Site.

Section 4. Payment of Service Payments. As provided in Ohio Revised Code Section 5709.42, but only after the TIF Exemption is effective, the Owner of a Parcel shall be required to, and shall make, service payments in lieu of taxes with respect to the Improvement allocable thereto to the County Treasurer on or before the final due dates for payment of real property taxes. Each service payment in lieu of taxes shall be charged and collected in the same manner and in the same amount as the real property taxes that would have been charged and payable against such Parcel as if it were not exempt from taxation pursuant to Section 1 hereof. If any reduction in the levies otherwise applicable to such Parcel is made by the county budget commission under Ohio Revised Code Section 5705.31, the amount of the service payment in lieu of taxes shall be calculated as if the reduction in levies had not been made. Any late payments of service payments in lieu of taxes shall be subject to penalty and bear interest at the then current rate established under Ohio Revised Code Sections 323.121(B)(1) and 5703.47, as the same may be amended from time to time, or any successor provisions thereto (the "Penalties and Interest"). Each Owner shall make any other payments in respect of such Parcel which are received by the County Treasurer in connection with any reduction required by Ohio Revised Code Section 319.302, as the same may be amended from time to time, or any successor provisions thereto (the "Property Tax Rollback Payments," together with the service payments in lieu of taxes and the "Penalties and Interest," are collectively referred to herein as the "Service Payments").

Section 5. TIF Fund. The City hereby establishes, pursuant to and in accordance with the provisions of Ohio Revised Code Section 5709.43, within the City Treasury a municipal public improvement tax increment equivalent fund (the "Tax Increment Fund"), which may, at the option of the Director of Finance, be established as an account within an existing tax increment equivalent fund of the City, into which shall be deposited the Service Payments distributed to the City by the County Treasurer. Such Fund may be combined with other funds created by ordinances of this Council authorizing other such projects. Money in the Tax Increment Fund shall be used to finance the Public Infrastructure Improvements, and shall, to the extent provided in further ordinances of this Council, be pledged to the payment of debt service on any bonds, notes or other obligations issued to finance such Public Infrastructure Improvements as well as any reimbursement payments for reimbursement of any costs of the Public Infrastructure Improvements. The Tax Increment Fund shall be maintained in the custody of the City and shall receive all distributions of Service Payments required to be made to the City. Those Service Payments received by the City with respect to the Site, shall be used solely for the purposes authorized in the TIF Act, including, but not limited to, paying any costs of the Public Infrastructure Improvements, in a manner that is consistent with this Ordinance. For purposes of this Ordinance, "costs" of the Public Infrastructure Improvements payable from the Tax Increment Fund shall also include the items of "costs of permanent improvements" set forth in Ohio Revised Code Section 133.15(B), and incurred with respect to the Public Infrastructure Improvements, which "costs" specifically include any reimbursement payments for the reimbursement of the costs of the Public Infrastructure Improvements, and debt service on, and any administrative or other expenses relating to the issuance of, any bonds, notes, or other obligations issued to finance the Public Infrastructure Improvements. The Tax Increment Fund shall remain in existence so long as such Service Payments are collected and used for the aforesaid purposes, after which time the Tax Increment Fund shall be dissolved and any surplus funds remaining therein shall be transferred to the City's General Fund, all in accordance with Ohio Revised Code Section 5709.43.

<u>Section 6</u>. Notices. The City hereby finds and determines that notice of this proposed Ordinance has been delivered to the School District and Career Center in accordance with Ohio Revised Code Sections 5709.40, 5709.83 and 5715.27, and hereby ratifies the giving of that notice.

<u>Section 7</u>. Compensation to School District and Career Center. Pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Sections 5709.40, 5709.42, 5709.43 and 5709.82, the City shall cause the County Treasurer to distribute a portion of the Service Payments to the School District and the Career Center in an amount equal to 100% of the real property taxes that the School District and Career Center, respectively, would have received, but for the TIF Exemption.

<u>Section 8</u>. Application for Real Property Tax Exemption and Remission; Further Authorizations. The City further hereby authorizes and directs the Mayor, the Director of Finance, or other appropriate officers of the

City, to sign and execute all documents and make such arrangements as are necessary and proper for collection of said Service Payments from the Owners of real property located in the Site, which are to be deposited into the Tax Increment Fund.

This Council further hereby authorizes and directs the Mayor or his designee to take such action and to execute and deliver, on behalf of the Council, such additional instruments, agreements, certificates, and other documents as may be in their discretion necessary or appropriate in order to carry out the intent of this Ordinance. Such documents shall be in the form not substantially inconsistent with the terms of this Ordinance, as the Mayor or his designee in their discretion shall deem necessary or appropriate.

Section 9. Notification of Adoption. The Director of Finance is hereby directed to deliver, not later than fifteen (15) days after the effective date of this Ordinance, a copy thereof to the Director of the Ohio Department of Development and to further deliver to such Director, not later than March 31 of each year during which the TIF Exemption remains in effect, a status report outlining the progress of the project herein described.

<u>Section 10</u>. Further Authorizations. The Mayor, Director of Finance, and the Law Director are hereby authorized to take all actions, including the execution of all documents or amendments, necessary to establish the TIF Exemption and to implement and administer the TIF Fund, and not substantially inconsistent with this Ordinance.

<u>Section 11</u>. Non-Discriminatory Hiring Policy. In accordance with Ohio Revised Code Section 5709.832, the City hereby determines that no employer located in the Site shall deny any individual employment based on considerations of race, religion, sex, disability, color, national origin or ancestry.

<u>Section 12</u>. Open Meeting. It is found and determined that all formal actions of this Council concerning and relating to the adoption of this Ordinance were adopted in an open meeting of this Council and that all deliberations of this Council and any of its committees that resulted in such formal action were in meetings open to the public in compliance with all legal requirements.

Section 13. Effective Date. This Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, safety and welfare of the city, and for the further reason that it is immediately necessary to implement the TIF Exemption authorized by this Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure as it pertains to the health, safety and welfare of the residents of the City of North Royalton

THEREFORE, provided this Ordinance receives the affirmative vote of two-thirds of all members elected to Council, it shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage and approval by the Mayor; otherwise, from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

## **EXHIBIT B**

## DESCRIPTION OF PUBLIC INFRASTRUCTURE IMPROVEMENTS

The Public Infrastructure Improvements that shall directly benefit all or a portion of the Site, include any and all "public infrastructure improvements," as that term is defined in R.C. Section 5709.40(A)(8), and any and all "costs of permanent improvements," as that term is defined in R.C. Section 133.15(B), including, but not limited to, payment of debt service payments on obligations issued to finance the costs of the Public Infrastructure Improvements. Without limiting the generality of the preceding sentence, the Public Infrastructure Improvements specifically may include the following:

- 1. Constructing, reconstructing, extending, opening, improving, widening, grading, draining, curbing and changing of the lines and traffic patterns of roads, highways (including the continued maintenance of those public roads and highways), streets, railways, bridges (including roadway, railway, and pedestrian), existing roadways adjacent to and providing access to property, sidewalks, bikeways, medians and viaducts, constructing and improving surface parking lots or parking structures and related improvements, providing lighting systems, together with all appurtenances therefore, and the continued maintenance of those improvements.
- 2. Constructing and reconstructing municipal facilities, including safety and service facilities, public fountains, public parks or public greenspaces, including grading, trees, park plantings, park accessories and related improvements, together with all appurtenances thereto.
- 3. Constructing, reconstructing and installing of public utility improvements, water distribution lines (including necessary site grading therefore), storm and sanitary sewers (including necessary site grading therefore, and the continued maintenance of those water and sewer lines), water and fire protection systems, and all appurtenances thereto, and the continued maintenance of those improvements.
- 4. Constructing and installing streetscape improvements including trees, tree grates, curbs, sidewalks, street and sidewalk lighting, trash receptacles, benches, newspaper racks, burial of overhead utility lines and related improvements, together with all appurtenances thereto; design and traffic studies preliminary to the foregoing.
- 5. Constructing and installing communications service facilities, including but not limited to cable and broadband service infrastructure improvements.
- 6. Stormwater and flood remediation projects including such projects on private property when determined to be necessary for public health, safety, and welfare.
- 7. Designing, engineering, constructing, and improving the new infrastructure for electric, gas, telephone, and cable service (including fiber optics), including aid to construction fees for gas, aid to construction fees for electric, including the provision of gas or electric service facilities owned by nongovernmental entities when such improvements are determined to be necessary for economic development purposes, with related site improvements and appurtenances thereto.
- 8. Acquisition and development of property, including acquisition in aid of industry, commerce, distribution, or research, demolition of blighted, dilapidated, or functionally obsolete structures for redevelopment opportunities, including demolition on private property when determined to be necessary for economic development purposes.
- 9. Enhancement of public waterways through improvements that allow for greater public access.
- 10. Environmental studies and remediation.
- 11. Acquiring real estate or interests in real estate, including related right-of ways, necessary to accomplish the improvements enumerated in clauses 1 through 9.
- 12. Any on-going administrative expenses relating to the Public Infrastructure Improvements and maintaining the service payments in lieu of taxes, including but not limited to engineering, architectural, legal, and other consulting and professional services.
- 13. All inspection fees and other governmental fees related to the foregoing.
- 14. Any other costs of public infrastructure improvements as permitted by law.

WHEREAS: Pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Section 5705.281, the Cuyahoga County Budget Commission

has waived the requirement that the City of North Royalton adopt a tax budget as provided under Ohio Revised Code Section 5705.28, and has required the City of North Royalton to provide Alternative Tax Budget Information in order for the Commission to perform its duties

under law; and

WHEREAS: The Director of Finance has prepared the Alternative Tax Budget Information for the City of

North Royalton, Ohio for the fiscal year beginning January 1, 2023 including a Division of Taxes Levied, Statement of Fund Activity, Unvoted General Obligation Debt, and Voted Debt Outside the 10 Mill Limit; all of which will be submitted to the Auditor of Cuyahoga County.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NORTH ROYALTON, COUNTY OF CUYAHOGA AND STATE OF OHIO, THAT:

<u>Section 1</u>. The Alternative Tax Budget Information of the City of North Royalton for the fiscal year 2022 has been prepared and submitted to Council, and the same is adopted and confirmed as the Alternative Tax Budget Information of the City of North Royalton for the fiscal year beginning January 1, 2023, a copy of said Alternative Tax Budget is attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated herein as if fully rewritten.

<u>Section 2</u>. The Director of Finance is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of the said Alternative Tax Budget Information and a copy of this Resolution to the Auditor of Cuyahoga County, Ohio.

<u>Section 3</u>. It is found and determined that all formal actions of this Council concerning and relating to the adoption of this Resolution were adopted in an open meeting of this Council and that all deliberations of this Council and any of its committees that resulted in such formal action were in meetings open to the public in compliance with all legal requirements.

<u>Section 4</u>. This Resolution is hereby declared to be an emergency measure immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, safety and welfare of the city, and for the further reason that it is immediately necessary to file the Alternative Tax Budget Information with the County Fiscal Officer on or before the 20<sup>th</sup> day of July according to law.

THEREFORE, provided this Resolution receives the affirmative vote of two-thirds of all members elected to Council, it shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage and approval by the Mayor; otherwise, from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

Re: 2023 Tax Budget

The 2023 Tax Budget is being presented to City Council for review and approval.

The Cuyahoga County Budget Commission requires an Alternative Format for the Annual Tax Budget to be approved by City Council by July 15, 2022. It must be filed with the Cuyahoga County Budget Commission by July 20, 2022.

The purpose of the Annual Tax Budget is to demonstrate the need for Cuyahoga County to assess Real Estate (Property Taxes) on behalf of the City of North Royalton. Please note that the Tax Budget <u>does not</u> need to match the 2023 Permanent Appropriations Budget that will be discussed/approved by City Council later in 2022 (for Calendar Year 2023). The tax budget details a projected financial plan for the next calendar year, and shows that the City of North Royalton has "need" for the property tax revenues received (property taxes to be used to pay for known/projected expenditures).

Following is detail regarding the required various schedules of the 2023 Annual Tax Budget:

- Schedule 1 includes the estimated Tax Levies to be collected in 2023, which are based on 1st Half 2022 Collections (for tax year 2021). Please note that I contacted the Cuyahoga County Budget Commission and they will not provide a Schedule A (Estimated Tax Receipts based on 1st and 2nd Half Collections) until December 2022, so these figures being presented are estimates, which the county understands will most likely not match the Schedule A to be distributed later this year (December).
- Schedule 2 includes a detail of all funds with estimated beginning 2023 unencumbered balances, estimated 2023 property and local government revenues (if applicable), estimated other 2023 revenues, estimated 2023 expenditures and encumbrances, and the estimated ending 2023 unencumbered balances. The 2023 estimated expenditures and encumbrances are based on the 2022 Permanent Appropriations Budget, while removing one-time expenditures included in the 2022 budget (Ex Splash Pad) and including the estimated wage increases approved by City Council. Please note that since the other figures included in the tax budget were based on the 2022 Annual Appropriations Budget, the 2023 Proposed Annual Appropriations will most likely change/update when being presented later this year for review/approval.
- Schedule 3 details the outstanding bonds the City of North Royalton currently has.
- Schedule 4 relates to Voted Debt, which the City of North Royalton does not have. (The City of North Royalton has bonds, but none of those bonds were specifically voted on by the residents as Voted Debt).
- Schedule 5 is for schools only, which is why this is blank.

I look forward to our discussion at the June 21, 2022 Finance Committee Meeting. Please let me know if you have any questions ahead of the meeting that you would like to discuss.

## **Background**

Substitute House Bill No. 129 (HB129) effective June 3, 2002, was enacted by the 124th General Assembly in part to allow a county budget commission to waive the requirement that a taxing authority adopt a tax budget for a political subdivision or other taxing unit, pursuant to Ohio Revised Code (ORC) Section 5705.281.

Under the law in effect prior to June 3, 2002, the budget commission could only waive the tax budget for a subdivision or other taxing unit that was receiving a share of the county undivided local government fund or the county undivided local government revenue assistance fund under an alternative method or formula pursuant to ORC Sections 5747.53 and 5747.63. Thus, tax budgets could be waived only for counties, municipalities, townships, and park districts. This restriction is now removed.

## Ohio Revised Code Section 5705.281

Under the amended version of this section pursuant to HB 129, a county budget commission, by an affirmative vote of a majority of the commission, including an affirmative vote by the county auditor, may waive the tax budget for any subdivision or other taxing unit. However, the commission may require the taxing authority to provide any information needed by the commission to perform its duties, including the division of the tax rates as provided under ORC Section 5705.04.

## **County Budget Commission Duties**

The county budget commission must still certify tax rates to each subdivision or other taxing unit, by March 1 for school districts and by September 1 for all other taxing authorities under ORC Section 5705.35, even when a tax budget is waived. Also, the commission is still required to issue an official certificate of estimated resources under ORC Section 5705.35 and amended official certificates of estimated resources under ORC Section 5705.36.

Therefore, when a budget commission is setting tax rates based on a taxing unit's need, for purposes of ORC Sections 5705.32, 5705.34, and 5705.341, its determination must be based on that other information the commission asked the taxing authority to provide under ORC Section 5705.281, when the tax budget was waived. Also, an official certificate must be based on that other information the commission asked the taxing authority to provide.

## **County Budget Commission Action**

On October 11, 2002, during the Cuyahoga County Budget Commission meeting, the commission with an affirmative vote of all members waived the requirement for taxing authorities of subdivisions or other taxing units (Including Schools) to adopt a tax budget as provided under ORC Section 5705.281, but shall require the filing of this Alternative Tax Budget Information document on an annual basis.

## **Alternative Tax Budget Information Filing Deadline**

For all political subdivisions excluding school districts, the fiscal officer must file one copy of this document with the County Fiscal Officer on or before July 20th. For school districts the fiscal officer must file one copy of this document with the County Fiscal Officer on or before January 20th.

<u>Section 3</u>. As used herein, "retail establishment," "disposable plastic bag" and "non-permitted paper bag" shall have the same meanings as set forth in CC 02019-0005.

<u>Section 4</u>. It is found and determined that all formal actions of this Council concerning and relating to the adoption of this Ordinance were adopted in an open meeting of this Council and that all deliberations of this Council and any of its committees that resulted in such formal action were in meetings open to the public in compliance with all legal requirements.



<u>Section 2</u>. This Ordinance shall supersede all previously adopted Ordinances in direct conflict herewith.



### OUR MISSION

The Cuyahoga County Planning Commission's mission is to inform and provide services in support of the short and long term comprehensive planning, quality of life, environment, and economic development of Cuyahoga County and its cities, villages and townships.

### Introduction:

The Cuyahoga County Planning Commission (CCPC) has completed an analysis of population in each of the City's six Council Wards to determine if changes are required per the City Charter (provided in 2010):

Not later than February 28, 1979, the then incumbent Council shall by ordinance establish six (6) wards for election purposes, each of which shall be as nearly equal in population to each of the others as shall be practicable. Each ward shall be composed of contiguous and compact territory within the Municipality bounded by street lines and natural boundaries. Such equality of population shall be maintained by the Council by an adjustment of such boundaries as follows: Each four (4) years, commencing in the year of 1978, the Council shall make or cause to be made a survey of the population changes in the respective wards and enter a written report thereof upon its journal. In the event such survey discloses a decrease or an increase of population amounting to fifteen percent (15%) or more in any ward, an equalizing adjustment of boundaries shall be made by an ordinance of Council. Equalizing adjustments of boundaries may be made at more frequent intervals, if desired by Council, but no adjustment shall be effective with respect to any Municipal election unless the ordinance providing for such adjustment has been passed and publication or posting thereof has been completed at least ninety (90) days prior to the last date for filing nominating petitions for candidates in such election.

### Methodology:

To establish accurate ward population estimates, County Planning started with the U.S. Census Bureau's population figures from the 2020 decennial census.

Using the census geography as a base, we are able to divide the city and its wards into 177 "block" units generally bounded by street centerlines and other physical features.

As with previous redistricting estimates, updates to the current year were estimated by using residential building occupancy and demolition permits provided by the city, covering the period from April, 2020 through April, 2022. The Census Bureau estimates average single-family household size in North Royalton at 2.26 persons. From that, each demolition is then estimated at -2.26 personans, and each occupancy permit is estimated at +2.26 persons.

### **Findings:**

### 2022 Population Estimates by Ward:

Table 1, below, lays out the components of the 2022 population estimates by Ward. Using the above techniques, the City's overall population was found to be relatively stable since the last estimate, increasing from an estimated 30,985 in 2017 to approximately 31,453 in 2022, an increase of 468 persons, or 0.52%.

In total, 71 new residential occupancy permits were issued across the city during the two-year period for an estimated added population of 160 persons. Demolitions led to an estimated loss of 27 persons.

On a per-ward basis, population changes ranged from -4.6% in Ward 2 to +6.3% in Ward 3.

Since the population change in any one ward does not exceed 15%, an "equalizing adjustment of boundaries," as stated in the charter is not required. Some changes may, however, be desired to achieve a more balanced representation among the wards, since wards can gradually grow out of balance from one another.






A more detailed review of the City's estimated 2022 population estimates by individual ward shows a range in population shares from a low 13.8% (Ward 2) to a high of 19.35 (Ward 5), a range of 5.5%.

Figure 1 (following page) shows the City's existing ward boundaries, together with locations of residential occupancy and demolition permits since the 2020 census. In addition, the map indicates 2022 population estimates within each of the city's 177 census blocks. At the bottom of the map is a bar graph showing population by ward, with a reference line for an "ideal population" per ward (1/6th of the city's total population). This map style will be repeated for the various alternatives presented later in this report.

### **Comparison to Other Communities:**

The city charter's requirement for adjustments to ward boundaries relies on a large population change (15%) from the previous period in any one ward. As such, the charter does not consider more gradual population changes that might accumulate over several years. Theoretically, one or more wards could grow steadily, other wards may lose population, and an adjustment might never be mandated by the charter.

To understand how reasonable North Royalton's population distribution is among its wards, North Royalton was compared with other communities in Cuyahoga County. For comparability, we tabulated population from the 2020 Census for the 33 communities in Cuyahoga County that have ward-based representation (the remaining 26 communities in the county have only "at-large" representation). For this comparative analysis, we did not include other population sources such as building permits for the other communities, as we do for North Royalton's 2022 estimated population.

One measure for comparing communities' ward representation is the spread, or "range", between ward's with the highest and lowest proportion of population. As noted earlier, North Royalton's lowest proportion is 13.8% (Ward 2) and its highest is 19.3% (Ward 5), a range of 5.5%. By this measure, North Royalton ranks in the top third (10th highest) among the 33 communities in terms of range. The difference among many of those communities, however, is very small. See Table 2.

In conclusion, we find that the distribution of population among North Royalton's six wards is not unreasonable in comparison with other communities in Cuyahoga County, however there is room for improvement.

### **Alternatives**

The city charter provides several guidelines in determining ward boundaries. Wards shall be:

- As nearly equal in population to each of the others as shall be practicable
- Contiguous
- Compact
- Bounded by street lines and natural boundaries

**Nearly equal in population** is the primary concern. See the earlier section of this report on "Comparison to Other Communities" for guidance on reasonable levels of equality among wards within Cuyahoga County. In addition, a generally acceptable range for population proportion in local districts is 10% (see Hulme v. Madison County, US District Court for the Southern District of Illinois).

**Contiguous** boundaries mean that wards must not be separated into parts that are divided by other wards.

**Compact** boundaries would ideally be represented as a geometric circle – which is not likely. A compact shape requirement is generally a check against "gerrymandering" (manipulating the boundaries of and electoral constituency to favor one party or class). While the size of wards in North Royalton varies with population density, their current shapes appear to be relatively compact. Proposed alternatives presented here are not substantially different.

**Bounded by street lines and natural boundaries** is a requirement that puts some of the greatest restriction on developing alternatives. For instance, wards cannot be divided using power lines, rear lot lines or other features.

Perhaps the largest limitation is that there are several large and populous sections of the City that cannot be divided by streets or natural boundaries, including:

- Ward 3: A large census block south of Albion Road, between Abbey and York Roads contains 1,827 people. This section has several "islands" within it, which cannot be separated out.
- Ward 4: A block north of Royalton Road, between York and Ridge Roads contains 1,734 people.
- Ward 5: A block generally bounded by Akins/Edgerton Roads, north of Royalton Road and west of York contains almost 1,097 people.

Some of these large areas, especially those along boundaries with adjoining wards, make simple adjustments difficult. Other adjustments might require splitting along interior neighborhood streets instead of current major arterials.

The following sections of this report provide a series of three alternatives (A, B, and C), each building upon on another to achieve more and more equitable distributions of population among the City's six wards.

### **Alternative A**




Alternative "A" is the least disruptive and seeks to equalize two adjacent wards with among the lowest and highest proportions of population. Ward 1 (2nd lowest) and Ward 5 (highest) have a common boundary along Albion Road. Transferring two census blocks located between I-80 and Albion Road from Ward 5 to Ward 1 would bring each of those two wards' population to within about one percentage point of the ideal share of 16.7%. A total of 471 persons would change wards.


By reducing the Ward 5 population share from 19.3% to 17.8%, Alternative "A" results in a range of population from a low of 13.8% (Ward 2) to a high of 17.8% (Ward 5), a range of 4.0%. This compares to an "Existing" range of 5.5%.


A result of this change is that Ward 2 remains the lowest population ward among the six, with 13.8%

### **Alternative B**

Alternative "A" changes:

From Ward 5 to Ward 1: two blocks south of Albion Road and west of Abbey Road (471 persons).


Alternative "A" still leaves Ward 2 with only a 13.8% share of the City total and Ward 6 with an 17.9% share. Since those two wards are not adjacent to each other, a simple transfer of blocks between the two is not possible.


Alternative "B" proposes to add to the change presented in "A" by also transferring:

- From Ward 6 to Ward 4: the large block bounded by Royalton, Akins, Ridge, and State Roads (577 persons), and
- From Ward 4 to Ward 2: three "nested" blocks bounded by Royalwood, Wallings, Ridge, and State Roads (455 persons). The three blocks would have to be moved together since two inner blocks are surrounded by the much larger 3rd block.


Overall, Alternative "B" results in a range of population from a low of 15.2% (Ward 2) to a high of 18.0% (Ward 3), a range of 1.8%, This compares to an "Existing" 2017 range of 5.5%.

### **Alternative C**

Alternative "A" changes:

• From Ward 5 to Ward 1: two blocks south of Albion Road and west of Abbey Road (471 persons).

Alternative "B" changes:


- From Ward 6 to Ward 4: the large block bounded by Royalton, Akins, Ridge, and State Roads (577 persons), and
- From Ward 4 to Ward 2: three "nested" blocks bounded by Royalwood, Wallings, Ridge, and State Roads (455 persons). The three blocks would have to be moved together since two inner blocks are surrounded by the much larger 3rd block.


Alternative "C", adding to the proposed changes in Alternative "B", addresses imbalances between adjacent Wards 1 and 3, and between Wards 5 and 6:


- From Ward 3 to Ward 1: The census block at the easternmost end of Ward 3, bounded by Castle Drive, State Road, Wallings Road, Parliament Drive, Devonshire Drive, and Queen's Way (213 persons), and
- From Ward 5 to Ward 6: Two blocks bounded by Akins, York, and Bennet Roads (139 persons).


Overall, Alternative "C" results in a range of population from a low of 16.4% (Ward 1) to a high of 17.3% (Ward 5), a range of only 0.9%. This compares to an "Existing" 2017 range of 5.5%.

### Conclusion

The City of North Royalton's current ward boundaries provide a reasonable range of estimated population among its six wards. Several data points support this conclusion:

- Per the city charter, there has not been an increase in population in any ward exceeding 15%. The largest increase was 6.30% in Ward 3.
- Ward population proportions ranged from a low 13.8% (Ward 2) to a high of 19.3% (Ward5), or about 5.5%. This spread is well within a generally acceptable range of 10% for local districts.
- Alternatives A, B, and C provide several scenarios to consider for current or future redistricting efforts, should the City wish to consider them.

### AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE 10-103, STAFFING AND CLASSIFICATION PLAN FOR THE VARIOUS DEPARTMENTS OF THE CITY OF NORTH ROYALTON, SECTION 9 RECREATION DEPARTMENT, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

<u>WHEREAS</u>: In an effort to better serve the community, the Administration has proposed the restructuring

of various departments to ensure that they are functioning as efficiently as possible; and

WHEREAS: It is therefore necessary to amend Ordinance 10-103 to allow for these changes; and

WHEREAS: Council desires to provide for this amendment.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NORTH ROYALTON, COUNTY OF CUYAHOGA AND STATE OF OHIO, THAT:

<u>Section 1</u>. Council hereby amends Ordinance No. 10-103, Staffing and Classification Plan, Section 9 Recreation Department, which shall hereinafter read as follows:

<u>Section 9</u>. The **Recreation Department** may employ and be staffed by employees classified in the following classifications providing that there shall be no greater number of employees employed in any one classification than specified herein.

### **CLASSIFICATION** (Job Title)

### MAXIMUM NO. OF EMPLOYEES

- Recreation Director/Parks, Cemetery, 1) One (1) and Recreation Foreman 2) Tractor/Truck Operator (part time) Three (3) Laborer 3) Two-(2) Three (3) 4) Laborer (part time) Five (5) Summer Help Laborer (part time) Eight (8) Laborer I (part time) Two (2)
- <u>Section 2</u>. Ordinance No. 10-103 is amended as provided for herein and all other provisions of Ordinance No. 10-103 shall remain in full force and effect.
- <u>Section 3</u>. This Ordinance shall supersede all previously adopted ordinances in direct conflict herewith.

<u>Section 4</u>. It is found and determined that all formal actions of this Council concerning and relating to the adoption of this Ordinance were adopted in an open meeting of this Council and that all deliberations of this Council and any of its committees that resulted in such formal action were in meetings open to the public in compliance with all legal requirements.

<u>Section 5</u>. This Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, safety and welfare of the city, and for the further reason that Council and the Administration have determined that it is immediately necessary to provide for these staffing changes in the various departments of the City of North Royalton.

THEREFORE, provided this Ordinance receives the affirmative vote of two-thirds of all members elected to Council, it shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage and approval by the Mayor; otherwise, from and after the earliest period allowed by law.
