Town Manager's Report - September Commission Meeting

Mayor, Commissioners & Residents of Ocean Ridge:

September has been a whirlwind month for me getting up to speed on the many different projects that are in process and will be carrying over into FY 23 as well as preparing for projects that are scheduled for FY 23. Ocean Ridge has several capital projects that will take careful coordination to ensure that their timing doesn't conflict with each other or with planned projects by other jurisdictions, such as FDOT and FP&L.



Tyler Tech has put the building department software implementation off again and are now saying that it will be some time after Feb. of 2023. With that in mind, Durrani and I have been researching other options if the Town were to seek to cancel the contract with Tyler and move in a different direction. We have identified a couple of different options for the building department and one of them includes an alternative option for the Town financial management software. The cost for implementation for that option including data scrubbing and conversion for all departments and systems is less than the total cost of the Tyler contract for the Building Department software alone. We will continue to do more research and hope to have final information to bring to you at the November meeting or sooner if a change in direction is recommended.

We are still waiting for FPL to put up the last light. We are putting pressure on them as they said the parts would be here by the end of September and that time has come and gone and now they will be using Hurricane Ian as an excuse for why they can't do the work soon. I recommend that we place "closed" signs at both entrances to the crosswalk until the necessary lighting upgrades are completed and the permit is finalized by FDOT.

The sidewalk assessment for the areas along N Ocean Blvd (A1A) has been completed and submitted to FDOT. It is in the hands of the FDOT department that handles ROW maintenance at this point. We will keep on them but I don't anticipate seeing it be a priority project for at least a couple of months until after assessments and clean-up from Ian are completed.

After attending the FLC Policy Committee meeting on Finance, Taxation, and Personnel, I want to let you know that it will be important to watch the bills coming out of Tallahassee this year. They are looking at introducing a new classification of non-homestead property exemptions to provide relief to second home/part-time residents with increasing home values.

MESSAGES AND REMINDERS FROM YOUR POLICE DE-PARTMENT

From Richard Jones, Chief of Police:

WORK AT HOME BUSINESS SCAMS

I am sure that many of you have seen and heard the ads that promise big earnings and a great life for those who choose to work from home. I would caution you to not simply take their word for it as many of these promises and job offers are scams or simply do not deliver on their promises.

Since a work from home setting may benefit your busy lifestyle and allow you to make the money that your lifestyle requires, you may find this tempting. Many people may think they have nothing to lose since the company offers a money back guarantee or refund if you don't succeed. The reality is that the majority of these offers are scams and you are not likely to get a refund.

These types of scams could cost you thousands of dollars. Not only do many people lose thousands of dollars trying these ventures, they also end up wasting a lot of their time and energy working towards their new business goals.

The most common types of Work-At-Home Scams include; Internet Business, Envelope Stuffing, Assembly or Craft Work, Rebate Processing, Medical Billing, Mystery Shopping and Multilevel Marketing. If you are confronted with one of these opportunities, please be very cautious.

One of the most common ways to know that the opportunity is actually a scam is by the promise of a big income and the fact that the process involves up-front money from you. Just because the ad appears legitimate and involved a website, newspaper or other trusted media source does not make the opportunity legitimate.

If you decide to move forward with an opportunity like this, do your homework! Research the company and/or the promoter. This can be as simple as contacting:

The Better Business Bureau http://www.bbb.org/central-florida/get-consumer-help/, and/or

The Florida Attorney General <u>http://myfloridalegal.com/pages.nsf/</u>

<u>Main/81bf89afaf04dbeb85256cc6006ff6bf</u>, or even conducting internet searches using the company name followed by "reviews", "scam" or "complaint".

These kinds of scams remind me of the old saying; "If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is". Continue to use your better judgement and your gut feeling, followed by good research and you will avoid being a victim to these types of crimes.

Keep Your Cool in Hot Weather

According to the <u>National Weather Service</u> (NWS), heat is one of the leading causes of weatherrelated deaths in the United States, resulting in hundreds of fatalities each year and even more heat-related illnesses such as heat stroke, heat cramps, and heat exhaustion.

The best line of defense against these illnesses is prevention. The *Ready* Campaign offers the following tips to stay safe when the mercury rises:

- Stay indoors as much as possible and limit exposure to the sun;
- Stay on the lowest level out of the sun if air conditioning is unavailable;
- Eat well-balanced, light, and regular meals;
- Dress in loose-fitting, lightweight, and light-colored clothes that cover as much skin as possible; and
- Avoid doing strenuous work outside during the warmest part of the day.

When necessary, NWS issues heat-related alerts to help you prepare for extreme weather conditions. To learn more about these alerts and how they impact you, visit: www.nws.noaa.gov/om/heat/ww.shtml

Know Your Alerts & Warnings

Receiving timely information about emergencies can make all the difference in knowing when to take action to protect yourself and your family. Local police and fire departments, emergency managers, the National Weather Service, the Federal Emergency Management Agency, the Federal Communications Commission, and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration work together to make sure you can receive alerts and warnings quickly through several different technologies no matter where you are.

If you've ever noticed a unique sound and vibration coming from your cell phone, you probably just received a <u>Wireless Emergency Alert</u> (WEA) - a nationwide emergency alert system notifying you of a pending emergency in your area. These messages provide information about extreme weather, local emergencies, AMBER AlertsTM, and Presidential Alerts during a national emergency.

WEAs look like a text message and show the type and time of the alert, any action you should take, and the agency issuing the alert. If you receive a WEA, follow the directions advised by the message and seek additional information from local media or authorities.

Carbon Monoxide Safety during Power Outages

According to the <u>National Weather Service</u>, carbon monoxide poisoning is a leading cause of death after storms in areas experiencing power outages. Using alternative sources of power can cause carbon monoxide to build up in your home and poison your family. Carbon monoxide is a colorless, odorless gas created by burning fuel when using portable generators, gas ranges, burning wood, or by running your car.

While deaths occur each year in the U.S. from accidental carbon monoxide poisoning, this tragedy is preventable. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention offers these <u>tips for staying safe</u> when the power goes out:

- Never us a generator inside your home or garage, even if the doors and windows are open;
- Keep generators at least 20 feet from your home;
- Install battery-operated or battery back-up carbon monoxide detectors near every sleeping area in your home; and
- Check detectors every six months to be sure they are working properly.

The most common symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning are headache, dizziness, nausea, and confusion. If you think you are experiencing carbon monoxide poisoning, get fresh air and seek immediate medical attention!

COMMUNITY STANDARDS REMINDER: PERMITS

Permits are required **BEFORE the START of most jobs**. Please contact Town Hall at (561) 732-2635 if you are not sure that the repair or project you are about to begin does not require a permit. It is much easier to know the answer and start your project properly than it is to be delayed, sometimes for up to several months, and have to pay additional fees that would not be necessary if things were done correctly in the beginning.

Permitting is required under both Town Codes and The Florida Building Code. These rules are in place to assure our safety as a community and to make sure structures and projects are completed in a safe and proper manner.

Section 105.1 of the Florida Building Code, as well as Town Code Section 67 are excellent places to begin checking for requirements. But, easier yet, call the staff at Town Hall during regular hours and they will be happy to guide you through the process. In addition, they will be happy to let you know about the restrictions on hours of work and parking regulations that will help you get through your project faster.

Please remember, both the Building Official and all Police Officers are charged with enforcement of Town Code, but our main goal is to prevent having to take enforcement action.
