PUBLIC NOTICE TO WATER SYSTEM CUSTOMERS OF THE CITY OF BOYNTON BEACH UTILITY

The City of Boynton Beach Water Utility will be temporarily changing its water treatment disinfection process to free chlorination beginning Thursday, July 6, 2023 through Thursday, July 27, 2023. This is a standard practice in which we switch to a stronger disinfection method in order to ensure that the potable water delivered to the customer remains of the highest quality. As a result, the customer may notice a slight change in odor and taste in their water; during this period, the City's Drinking Water Distribution System will continue to meet ALL Federal and State water quality standards.

Customers particularly sensitive to the taste and odor of chlorine may keep an open container of drinking water in their refrigerators for a few hours to allow the chlorine to dissipate. Because of this change, users of home dialysis machines, owners of tropical fish aquariums and managers of stores and restaurants with holding tanks for fish and shellfish are advised to seek professional guidance on how to operate their equipment. during this period as the method for removing chlorine residuals differs from removing chloramine residuals from tap water. Any changes will be eliminated when the Utility reverts to our normal disinfection method at the end of this chlorine flush period.

Please be assured that this is a preventive maintenance procedure to maintain our Water Distribution System. If you would like further information on this matter, please call our Water Quality Division at 561-742-6964 between 7 a.m. -4 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Subject: Town Manager's Report

Mayor, Commissioners & Residents of Ocean Ridge:

During the month of June, I announced the promotion of Acting Chief Scott McClure to Chief of Police. I am very excited to continue working with Scott in his new permanent position. Scott has been with the Town of Ocean Ridge since July of 2016 and has worked his way up from patrol officer to sergeant, lieutenant, and now chief.

We are well into the summer; hot temperatures and frequent rains are here to stay for a while. This combination brings certain risks to our residents, and it is important that we make sure that everyone stays safe and healthy.

Heat exhaustion and heat stroke are serious conditions caused by excessive heat exposure. Warning signs of heat exhaustion include excessive sweating, dizziness, nausea, headaches, muscle cramps, and fatigue. If untreated, it can escalate to heat stroke, characterized by high body temperature, confusion, rapid heartbeat, flushed skin, and loss of consciousness. Stay hydrated, avoid prolonged sun exposure, wear lightweight clothing, and take breaks in shaded areas to prevent these conditions. If symptoms arise, seek medical help immediately and move to a cooler environment.

Ensuring road safety during flooding following rains and king tides is of utmost importance. Never attempt to drive through flooded areas, as it is difficult to gauge the depth of the water and the condition of the road beneath. Even a few inches of water can sweep away a vehicle. Turning around and seeking an alternate route or waiting for the water to recede is crucial. Watch out for debris or potential hazards hidden beneath the water's surface, such as fallen trees or power lines. Remember, it's always better to err on the side of caution and prioritize your safety during storm-related road flooding situations.

The town is currently reviewing our use of CivicReady for emergency and non-emergency alerts. We would like community feedback and are encouraging residents to complete short six-question survey. It's also essential to be aware of your evacuation zone. To determine which zone you reside in, visit https://discover.pbcgov.org/publicsafety/dem/Pages/Know-Your-Zone.aspx. By knowing your zone, you'll have a clearer understanding of whether you may be required to evacuate when a hurricane threatens our area. This knowledge will enable you to plan your evacuation route in advance and ensure a timely and safe departure, if necessary.

When it comes to tracking storms and accessing forecasts, the National Hurricane Center (NHC) website is an invaluable resource. Visit https://www.nhc.noaa.gov/ to stay updated on the latest tropical weather systems, storm tracks, and forecasts. The NHC provides real-time information from meteorologists and experts, offering insights that can help you make informed decisions regarding your safety and preparedness.

Remember, staying informed is crucial throughout the hurricane season. Regularly check local news sources, listen to emergency alerts, and follow the guidance of local authorities. MESSAGES AND REMINDERS FROM YOUR POLICE DEPARTMENT

From Scott McClure, Chief of Police:

HURRICANE SEASON PREPARATION

June 1st will mark the start of another Hurricane Season! Although recent years have delivered mild storms, we should not let our guard down. In an effort to protect each resident and maintain utility services for as long as possible, the Town Commission has enacted an Ordinance requiring the trimming of vegetation and trees.

The enacted Ordinance (66-151 (b) (7)) speaks to the required trimming of vegetation and trees located near or under," ...power or other utility lines or facilities..." that are suspended above the ground. This includes the individual services lines directly attached to your home.

The enacted Ordinance (66-152 (a) (b)) speaks of the duty to trim coconut trees. In order to protect life and property during periods of high winds and hurricanes and to protect pedestrians and vehicular traffic where coconut trees overhang walkways and streets, all coconut trees in the town shall be required to be trimmed annually by July 1 of each year, so that on July 1 of each year all coconut trees in the town shall be free of coconuts, coconut blooms, and dead or dying fronds. Should any property owner fail to comply with this section, he/she shall be guilty of a violation of this Code. All property owners are required to trim coconut trees, as described in subsection (a) in the adjacent public right- of-way that is contiguous to the property.

Officers will begin to conduct an inspection of the Town to identify vegetation and trees that are in a position or condition to constitute a threat to our power and utility system. We respectfully request that you also conduct a survey of your own property and assist us by eliminating any trees or branches that are encroaching into or touching any utility lines. In addition, we ask that you maintain these areas throughout the entire storm season (June 1st thru November 30th).

We are asking for your voluntary cooperation as it makes the Town safer for all first responders and the citizens we serve.

Please remember to lock your doors and use your alarm system. The best defense against crime is a good offense. Please take the initiative to make sure you do not become the victim.

Though using your intuition and being aware of your surroundings is a great start, using other tools available is often necessary to assure you remain safe and do not become a victim.

The Town of Ocean Ridge has an excellent safety record, and through its Police Department, Town Hall, Maintenance Department, and code compliance/enforcement efforts, strives to maintain a safe and pleasant small town environment for our residents to enjoy.

That being said, I would like to remind everyone of some of the services that are available to help maintain the safe environment we all enjoy and desire.

- 1. The Town, through your Police Department, offers direct monitoring services for your burglar alarm system to enhance our response time in the event of an emergency. Stop by or call Town Hall for details!
- 2. The Town offers resident vehicle decals to help officers identify those vehicles that belong to our residents so we may better serve you. Stop by the Police Department lobby with your vehicle registration information and the on-duty dispatcher will be very happy to assist you!
- 3. The Police Department will be more than happy to meet with you and discuss or perform a security survey of your property to help you better protect yourself from becoming a crime victim. This may be done by appointment and at a time convenient for you!
- 4. The Police Department offers vacation watch for your home. We are more than happy to keep an eye on your home while you are away. To arrange for this service please call the desk at (561) 732-8331 any time of the day or night. WE ARE OPEN 24 HOURS EVERY DAY OF THE YEAR/ RAIN OR SHINE!
- 5. Finally, we are here to assist you! We will always try to help. If we do not have the answer to your question, we will try to assist you in locating the person or agency that does.
