H.E.W., Solid Waste & Veterans Committee Tentative Minutes September 12, 2023

- 1. Call Meeting to Order: Chairman Fox called the meeting to order at 3:00 p.m. Present: Asp, Finfrock, Huber, Ramsey, Simms, Williams and Fox. Others: County Clerk and Recorder Laura Cook, Animal Control Administrator Tom Champley, Health Dept. Administrator Melissa Spangler, Solid Waste Director Paul Cooney, HR Director Amanda Jacinto, Regional Office of Education Superintendent Chris Tennyson, Director of Court Services Cindy Bergstrom, VAC VSO Luz Gilkey, Village of Progress Executive Director Brion Brooks, Arlene Sangmeister and Lloyd Droege. Absent: None.
- 2. Approval of Minutes August 8, 2023: Motion by Asp to approve the minutes as presented, 2nd by Williams. Motion carried.
- 3. Public Comment: Executive Director Brion Brooks addressed the committee about the allocation of the Senior Tax Levy to the Mental Health 708 Board. Brooks is concerned about the HEW Committee wanting to allocate funds to each of the Mental Health 708 Board Agencies instead of the 708 Board as a whole. Since 1969, the Mental Health 708 Board has been entrusted with the funding determinations of the 708 Board agencies. The 708 Board holds funding hearings with each agency under their umbrella. Brooks stated the 708 Board was appointed by the county and they should be trusted by the county.
- 4. Regional Office of Education:
 - Monthly Bills: \$3,550.07. Motion by Williams to approve, 2nd by Ramsey. Motion carried.
 - ROE Superintendent Chris Tennyson reviewed highlights from his monthly ROE report and report of official acts sent to the committee members.
- 5. Health Department: Health Department Administrator Melissa Spangler stated a couple of birds were sent out for testing for West Niles Virus and they came back positive. Spangler stated there was a media blitz sent out to the newspapers and social media alerting the community. It was suggested that Spangler contact the Sheriff about sending a notice out through the Ogle Safe app. Spangler stated they are still accepting donations for the community baby shower until September 22nd. They are in the process of hiring a new health inspector due to a resignation. The medication drop box is going well, there was about 75 lbs of medications that were incinerated by the Sheriff.

6. Solid Waste Department

- Department Claims: \$10,984.44. Motion by Finfrock to approve as presented, 2nd by Huber. Motion carried. Solid Waste Director Paul Cooney informed the committee that the bills are more than usual due to invoices for our August 12 recycling event and an electronics recycling invoice, service charges for the new drop off recycle program (10 hauls for the 2 locations). A grant payment to the Soil & Water Conservation District for the Outdoor Stewardship Days educational event which will be held this October, first time since 2019, as well as some attorney's fees, and training registrations and memberships for 2024.
- Cooney updated the committee on the following:
 - i. Drop-off Recycling Locations: Cooney reported the drop-off recycling program in Oregon and Byron is going well so far.

- ii. Orchard Hills Landfill: Cooney stated the auditor should be receiving the information to begin the landfill audit.
- iii. Recycling Events:
 - Friday, September 29, 2023 Residential Electronics, 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., permit is required.
 - Saturday, October 14, 2023 Residential Electronics and Shredding Event.

7. Animal Control

- Monthly Bills:
 - a. Animal Control Fund \$4,857.84. Motion by Williams to approve, 2nd by Huber. Motion carried.
 - b. Pet Population Control Fund \$1,234.00. Motion by Ramsey to approve, 2nd by Asp. Motion carried.
 - c. Animal Control Administrator Tom Champley stated you can see where the postage has increased. The department is looking to send a notice electronically, but their software vendor does not have that capability. They are still looking for a replacement for the Animal Control Warden and working with HR on this. There was a bat that tested positive for rabies and there is an adult undergoing rabies treatment. Dr. Champley stated he is working with the State's Attorney to deem a dog vicious. The dog attacked a 4-year-old and this was an unprovoked attack.

8. Veterans Assistance Commission:

- VAC VSO Luz Gilkey distributed information about the next Veteran's Breakfast to be held at the Rochelle VFW on Saturday, September 23rd. Gilkey asked about how to sign up for the health insurance and IMRF. Fox stated there is a process where we could extend similar benefits that the county has for health and dental insurance to the VAC employees. The HR Director is currently evaluating the costs and exactly how that process works. We'll get those numbers to you as soon as she has them. Then obviously, those costs would be covered by the VAC budget. It has been determined that the ADP system will not be able to handle payroll for the VAC employees. Fox stated he does not have an update on IMRF at this time. They have reached out to other counties for guidance and they have not received any responses. Finfrock asked if the VAC has a letter from IMRF that the VAC can be setup through the county. Gilkey does not. Finfrock stated they have been told they cannot sign up the VAC employees as they are not county employees. You can sign up for IMRF yourselves and use the money received by the county for the contributions.
- 9. L.O.T.S. (Lee-Ogle Transportation System): Fox stated he received communication that they L.O.T.S. would not be in attendance today. This committee will continue to have a relationship with L.O.T.S. as they transition to Reagan Mass Transit District.

10. Old Business:

• Mental Health 708 Board Funding Request: Fox said the Mental Health 708 Board funding request was carried over until the committee could gather more information. Finfrock gave a little history on this. Up until about four years ago, the committee was given the information as it is broken down on this sheet, by entity. The Chairman of the committee at that time asked that the funding be given in all as one. The problem being that the funding is not be used for "brick and mortar" it is to be used for programs. There is an entity that wants to open a location in Byron so they can get more people from Winnebago and Stephenson Counties. The

question is, will Winnebago and Stephenson Counties pitch in any funds? This is what we do not know. There were other comments made that did not sit well with the committee. Ramsey stated she did cross check what was given to the committee in the packets. There was discussion on where the cuts were being made and where the numbers are coming from. Fox stated he will ask for the reports that they received today as the HEW Committee has critical oversight on these funding's as they do with other departments and budgets. This is the standard practice. The committee will continue this policy and the Senior Social Services Funding Levy is not to be used for brick and mortar. Fox stated we need to get this on record. Motion by Finfrock to hold over until October and receive more information from 708 Board Agencies – is this for bricks and mortar and is the 3% increase based on needs that have not been addressed to the HEW Committee or the 708 Board, 2nd by Asp. Fox stated they would also like to know if the other counties will be participating with funding for the expansion request of one of the agencies. Motion carried.

- 13. Adjournment: With no further business, Chairman Fox adjourned the meeting. Time: 3:44 p.m.

Regional Office of Education Health Life Safety

We have begun our health life safety inspections last week. We will be inspecting all 24 school districts and 73 buildings in total. The state requires that each of the 4000 public school buildings and school related buildings in the state is inspected annually to assure compliance with the minimum standards necessary to ensure the health and safety of public school students in Illinois, according to Building Specifications for Health and Safety in Public Schools. By law, school districts must maintain public schools to the minimum standard. Annual inspection results from each building are available at the Regional Office of Education. A summary report is filed annually with the Illinois State Board of Education as required by law.

Every 10 years all public school buildings must be resurveyed by an architect licensed by the State of Illinois. All work necessary to bring the building into compliance with minimum standards is noted. Upon completion of outlined work, compliance is verified by the district and architect in a report filed with the Regional Office of Education.

The Regional Office of Education is also responsible, through the Regional Superintendent of Schools, for statutory compliance with established standards in the construction and remodeling of public school buildings. The Regional Superintendent assures school board approval by resolution of construction plans, review of construction plans for code compliance, issuance of the building permit, and upon review, issuance of school occupancy permits. Further, the Regional Superintendent assures code compliance for temporary/mobile classroom units throughout the region.



Office of Professional Learning & Ed Services: NEXUS

Our Nexus team has been working with our participating school districts to prepare the new and returning staff for the next school year to support our families. We have been presenting in front of some teachers and staff at some of our districts to educate our teachers on the support we are offering. Even though we haven't hit Labor Day just yet, we are already planning on the support and the logistics of supporting our families over the Thanksgiving and Christmas Holiday seasons. It may seem early, but it takes a lot of planning and preparation to support families in this way over three counties, but we are blessed to be a part of their time. We always seek food and holiday gift donations to bless our families who work so hard with us throughout the school year.

Office of Professional Learning & Ed Services: Student Attendance Support

Our Attendance Team is now fully assembled. We are meeting with individual school districts and did a three-county training in August. We have also met with one of our three counties Assistant State's Attorney's Office to talk about the court process and how we can work more effectively. We hope to get meetings scheduled with the remaining two counties within the next month. Our Attendance Support Program is gathering research on evidence-based practices to help our students reach attendance goals in a non-punitive and trauma-informed approach. We ask our communities to unite to support students' attendance needs and struggles. Chronic absenteeism is not just a school issue or an ROE issue. It is a more significant systemic issue that requires all hands to support our children in understanding the importance of attending school and how it can impact their learning. We know students miss school for various reasons, and it will take our community to support it.

Parents as Teachers First Years

It's only the end of August and we are already almost fully enrolled! What a change from a from the COVID years when we we had a hard time finding families who wanted to participate. The marketing and recruitment efforts of the last several years have paid off with more community agencies aware of our program and making referrals to us.

We have settled into our new space and are planning an open house in September for our families to show them our offices and our newly organized lending library. If you have not seen our space yet, feel free to stop in for a tour. We want it to feel welcoming and friendly and tried to set up a space that families would feel comfortable visiting.

Early in 2023, the Sauk Valley STARS Early Chilhdood Education Coaltion/ROE team finished up our Community-Based Planning for Expansion project with Illnois Action for Children and as a final wrap-up, some of the planning committee met with a video team from Illinois Action for Children to record our thoughts on the process.
