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Introduction

The purpose of this assessment is to provide an understanding of the issues that Ogle County residents feel are important. This assessment is to help us answer the questions:

- 1. What is important to our community?
- 2. How is quality of life perceived in our community?
- 3. What assets do we have that can be used to improve community health?

Methodology

Survey Design

The survey selected was designed by North Central Health Advisory Board in Columbus, Ohio and was adapted to fit the needs of Ogle County. The survey contained questions on Ogle County's greatest strengths, important health concerns, risky behaviors, community and personal health, and where the community should focus its attention to improve the community. The survey collected respondent demographic information including zip code, age, sex, marital status, children living in the home, Ogle County residency, household income, level of education, race, ethnicity, where health care is obtained when needed and how respondents pay for health care. The survey was available in both English and Spanish (Appendix).

Survey Distribution

The strategies for collecting data including configuring the survey using an online research application called Survey Monkey. The survey was also available in paper form for respondents that may not have access to the internet or are uncomfortable with technology. Those paper forms then were manually uploaded into Survey Monkey. Community partners were encouraged to take the survey themselves, share with their employees and clients.

The survey opened October 1st, 2019 and closed February 20th, 2020. The survey results were then analyzed to be used in consideration when setting community health priorities.






Survey Results




Respondents said that the three greatest strengths of Ogle County were good schools at 37.63%, friendly community at 33.10% and police, fire, and rescue services at 30.66%.




Respondents were most concerned with alcohol/drug abuse at 47.74%, mental health problems (e.g. depression, anxiety) at 37.28%, and tobacco use/smoking/e-cigarettes at 20.21%.




Common risky behaviors in Ogle County were reported as alcohol/drug abuse at 71.78%, tobacco use/smoking/e-cigarettes at 45.64%, and poor nutrition/eating habits at 33.45%.




Respondents thought Ogle County to be somewhat unhealthy at 53.71% or healthy at 35.69%.




Over half of respondents thought themselves to be healthy at 55.09%. The next likely answer was somewhat unhealthy at 29.82%.




The respondents think the community should focus more on access to mental health treatment at 32.06%, access to alcohol/drug treatment at 29.27%, and good jobs and healthy economy to better Ogle County at 24.39%.




A majority of the respondents identified with females at 71.12%. Males reported at 28.88%.




A majority of respondents were 45-64 years old at 32.98% or 1-17 years old at 26.67%.




44.91% of respondents were married. 34.39% of respondents were single. 8.77% reported being partnered. 8.07% were reported as divorced and only 3.86% were widowed.




A majority of respondents reported being White/Caucasians at 87.86%. The other races mentioned included African American at 2.14%, Asian at 1.07%, Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander at 0.36%, American Indian/Alaska Native at 0.71%, multi-racial at 3.93% or other at 3.93%.




90.04 % of respondents reported that they were not of Hispanic or Latino origin with only 9.96% reporting they were.




23.98% of respondents make an annual household income over 100,000 dollars. 23.58% make in between 50,000-74,999 dollars per year. 20.73% of respondent households make 30,000-49,999 dollars annually. Next 11.38% of respondent households make \$10,000-\$29,999. 10.98% of respondent households make \$75,000-\$99,999. 9.35% of respondent households make less than \$9,999.




Most respondents had a high school diploma or GED accounting for 22.30%. 21.94% of respondents have earned less than a high school diploma or GED. Respondents with an Associates/technical degree account for 19.06%. 17.63% of respondents have a Bachelor's degree. 10.79% of respondents have some college. Respondents with a Graduate degree or higher account for 8.27%.




Most respondents live in Ogle County at 87.99% and 12.01% did not live in Ogle County.




Most respondents have lived in Ogle County 21 years or more accounting for 43.91%. The second most likely answer was 11-20 years at 26.94%. 0.74% of respondents have lived in Ogle County less than one year. Some respondents have lived in Ogle County 1-2 years at 2.21%. 7.38% have lived in the county for 3-5 years. Respondents living in Ogle County 6-10 years make up 9.96% of respondents.




The majority of respondents lived in Rochelle at 23.69%. Polo and Oregon were the next two zip codes identified with Polo being 14.63% of respondents and Oregon at 12.20%.




Most respondents work in Ogle County at 68.09% and 31.21% do not work in Ogle County.




85% of respondents reported they do have a primary care provider, whereas 15% do not.



76.34% of respondents have seen their primary care provider within the last year and 13.26% have not.



Most respondents usually go to their primary care provider at 76.33%. Urgent Care or Immediate Care Clinic was the next choice of the respondents accounting for 15.55%. Only 6.01% of respondents reported going to the Hospital Emergency Department.



Majority of the respondents use Private health insurance to pay for their healthcare at 64.60%. Medicare was the next highest response at 20.07%. 6.57% reported using Medicaid to pay for their healthcare. Only 2.19% pay cash or do not have insurance. 1.46% use the Veteran's Administration to pay and 1.09% use Student Health Services.

Key Findings

The profile of our respondents answering the survey was that they were married, middle aged (45-64) non-Hispanic, Caucasian, women, making more than 100,000 dollars a year, with at least a high school or GED, working in Ogle County and living in Ogle County for 21 years or more. Most respondents were living in Rochelle, have access to health care with private health insurance and have seen a primary care provider with in the last year.

The key findings from this perspective include:

Top 3 Strengths-

- 1. Good schools
- 2. Friendly community
- 3. Police, fire and rescue services

Top 3 Health Concerns-

- 1. Alcohol/drug abuse
- 2. Mental health problems (e.g. depression, anxiety)
- 3. Tobacco use/smoking/e-cigarettes

Top 3 Risky Behaviors-

- 1. Alcohol/drug abuse
- 2. Tobacco use/smoking/e-cigarettes
- 3. Poor nutrition/eating habits

Top 3 Areas to Focus-

- 1. Access to mental health treatment
- 2. Access to alcohol/drug treatment
- 3. Good jobs and healthy economy

According to the Community Health Status Assessment, the respondents compare to the demographics of Ogle County in only a few ways that are similar, and an over sampling has occurred in some categories. The demographic composition of Ogle County has the average income is \$57K per year, whereas the survey respondents reported \$100K+ income. The county is primarily White at 94.39%, 87.86% of survey respondents reported White as their race. The number of non-Hispanic residents matched the survey respondents with 90.16% of the county being non-Hispanic and 90.04% of the respondents being non-Hispanic. The age of respondents was close to correlating with the data of the county with the mean age for females being 43 and the mean age overall 41 for the county and the age of respondents were most likely to be 45-64. There were more women in the respondent group than the county, with the group being 71%, whereas the county is 50.12%. People who took the survey reported having less education compared to the county. The survey respondents reported 22.30% as have at least a high school diploma or GED. The county recorded that, of people 25 or older, 89% of them had at least a high school diploma or GED. Access to Primary Care Providers in Ogle County has a rate of 60.46 providers for every 100,000 people. Although 85% of survey respondents reported having a Primary Care Provider.
