Good Afternoon Mayor Fiers:

We hope that you've been able to stay safe during these trying times.

OneBlood is working alongside representatives of Operation Warp Speed which is a USG effort lead by the Department of Health and Human Services, Department of Defense and Department of Veteran Affairs and guided by the local coordinator Major Santino Torres (copied). We wanted to reach out to ask for your assistance in our Mission of Saving Lives by hosting a blood drive at any city location. I understand that almost all of the activities have ceased but bringing potential donors and their friends and family living in the surrounding areas together to "Give the Gift of Life" would be a true blessing. We will like to conduct a drive (at your site) sometime in October or November 2020 and are open to hosting it during a date that is most convenient to you and the team.

As you may know, we are still experiencing many cancellations in the business sector, colleges, universities and public schools due to the Pandemic and are having challenges securing blood drive locations. Hosting a blood drive with OneBlood can profoundly impact the lives of the ill and injured patients of our community. Your generous act will literally give someone else a second chance at life.

OneBlood has been abiding by the CDC recommendation and guidelines of social distancing. In order to ensure that this happens, we are scheduling appointments allowing only 4 donors on the mobile at one time. A link would be provided once dates and times are confirmed so that the potential donors can make their appointments to donate. Care is taken in the cleaning of the mobile each time a donor is present throughout the donation process. The safety of the donors is our utmost priority.

As a service to the community, OneBlood will be testing for COVID-19 Antibodies at all blood drives for the people donating. #### **Social Distancing Protocol:**

- Appointments made with interval time to decrease number of people on mobile
- All donors will have temperature taken and will be asked to hand sanitize on arrival
- Masks are required and one will be supplied if donor does not have one
- Blood drive set up with additional precautions for disinfecting
  - Wiping down beds after each use
  - Cleaning high-touch surfaces, tablet and pens
- All registration stations set up within social distancing guidelines
- All donor stations set up within social distancing guidelines
- Interested donors should arrive alone for the donation as someone who is not donating will not be allowed on the mobile.

I'm not sure if you remember but we met at your home during your campaign and I enjoyed our discussion about our own consistent political views and the need for change in Palm Beach Shores. Being Canadian and a seasonal resident, I could not vote in the election but I knew your leadership was something that we could count on to ensure the long-term viability of "The Best Little Town In Florida".

The reason why I am writing this letter is consistent with that vision. You see, my mother in law is a resident at the Romaine. As you know, the Romaine is a proud monument that represents a constant reminder of the origins of our town since its construction in 1957. Preserving these types of buildings is something that we need to consider so future generations can see the accomplishments of those that were here before us.

There is a movement a foot by some at the Romaine to dismantle the corporation in an attempt to put profit before preservation. I feel that they have been plotting, for some time, to sell the Romaine to developers. They are using financial obligations in support of building maintenance as an onerous liability instead of developing a viable capital plan that could include strategic assessment to address these maintenance requirements over time in an effort to save the building. If this type of sale proceeds, the likelihood of having the Romaine demolished becomes a real possibility. There are a number of members that are trying to impede this process but there is a dangerously close number of members that wish to put their own financial gain ahead of something that is so important to our history. To that end, I would respectfully request your input on the possibility of obtaining Historical Landmark Status for the Romaine so we can ensure that one of the islands oldest buildings will remain a constant reminder of "what once was" for generations to come.

#### Hi Alan!!!!

Thank you so much for getting back to me about what's going on at the Romaine! I know that you have a lot on your plate and the fact that you contacted me so quickly is very much appreciated.

Per our conversation, I did some quick digging and did find out a couple of things...

Here is the requirement for Florida Landmark Status:

#### Florida Heritage Landmark

- To qualify as a Florida Heritage Landmark a building, structure or site must be at least 50 years old and have regional or statewide significance in the areas of architecture, archaeology, Florida history or traditional culture, or be associated with an event of statewide or national significance that took place at least 50 years ago.
- Resources associated with persons of regional or statewide historical significance may be recognized with Florida Heritage Landmark status 50 after the death of the individual or 50 years after the historical event with which the person is associated.
- In certain cases, resources that are less than 50 years old but are significant at the statewide or national level also may qualify as a Florida Heritage Landmark.
- The resource should visibly retain those physical characteristics that were present during the period for which it or the associated person is significant. A moved building or structure may still qualify as a Florida Heritage Landmark if the move was made 50 or more years ago, or the move was made to preserve the resource from demolition and reasonable attempts were made to ensure that the new setting is similar to the historical setting.

I'm thinking we meet the requirements given the buildings age. Between Tom and I, I know we can come up with the significance of the building given the fact it was one of the Island's first.

I also found out that there is something we can do at the municipal level...

#### Local Registers

Communities may choose to put greater protections in place for their historic resources by enacting a <u>preservation ordinance</u>. The ordinance creates a process by which

properties may be designated as individual landmarks or as contributing structures within a historic district.

Local ordinances have two significant strengths:

- They are tailored to the local community, and
- They offer the most protection for privately owned buildings due to review requirements.

Those review requirements are what people most often notice (and complain) about regarding preservation at a local level. However, before you panic, remember the benefits that local registers deliver:

- They help preserve the character and quality of the community over time,
- They give property owners more confidence in the long-term stability of the neighborhood -- which means they're more likely to make investments in their property to the benefit of the entire community,
- They promote pride and appreciation of the character and history of the community, and
- They help property owners begin to see themselves not only as owners but stewards of history.

It looks as if we may able to use both State designation and Local level legislation to help meet our end goal. I'm thinking, if we can obtain Florida State Heritage Site designation for the Romaine and then couple that with a town By Law that makes it more difficult for these types of sites to be developed, it could help protect the Romaine and any other Heritage Landmarks from being destroyed in the name of profit.

I have just started to investigate but wanted to give you something to think about as we develop a strategy.

# Golf Cart Proposal and signed Petition to PBS Commission

- 1. Allow Golf Cart parking at inlet (Helipad)
  - a. Identify and mark out cart parking spaces
  - b. Post sign stating allowed time limits (1-hour limit) and park hours (sunrise to sunset)
- 2. Put up very visible signs at all City walkways stating "No Golf Carts, Allowed on PBS Walkways". (\$250 fine - suggested so people take note)
- 3. All Carts must be properly registered through Motor Vehicle Department and follow same rule and regulations as all other motor vehicles when driving on town roads.
  - a. PBS should create and sell an annual sticker (\$10 or \$20) to all Cart Owners for Police to clearly see with ease that the vehicle registration is current and easy to identify.

# Mr. Mayor,

It is known that one particular household cart owner has been seen driving on walkways and dangerously throughout PBS. The actions of one Cart owner have ruined it for all owners. To control this type of activity, the cart owners in town agree to the above proposed discussion points. We also request the reopening of certain areas currently restricted due to the action of one homeowner who doesn't care. We are primarily referring to the Helipad area on the inlet and we do care! The majority should not be penalized for the actions of one.

It seems that since the COVID-19 virus has hit we are seeing more and more Golf Carts in the town. As existing Cart owners we feel the rules for State Registered Street Legal Carts should be modified to better serve the Palm Beach Shores property owners. The above suggestions/proposals are listed above on how to achieve. The Helipad has never in its' lifetime been utilized once, and with the development of the Marriott and new Condo buildings surrounding the concrete area, it never will be used. We propose it be made into a beautiful inlet sitting and gathering area for resistance to enjoy. A designated gated pump house emergency vehicle and service access road has to remain. However an ungated access for walkers, bicycles and Golf Carts, should be incorporated in the design. More benches, and maybe a gazebo on inlet, along with a golf cart parking area, at either inlet or main road of access. We are lucky to have such an attraction like the inlet open area to enjoy so why keep it so restricted. It belongs to the town not the Marriott and we should be able to use at will.

Why not just make it an extension of the beautiful walk paths we currently enjoy so much? Properly placed signage, with posted fines, set up at all walkway entrances restricting Golf Carts from all pathways and transform the Heliport area into our walkway system.
