

Spotted Lanternfly

Pike County is in the quarantine area. If you have spotted this insect, please call our hotline at 1-888-422-3359 or visit our website to immediately to report a sighting. Please contact your local Penn State Extension office with questions on spotted lanternfly management.

Newly hatched nymphs are small (\sim 1/8 inch) and can be hard to find, often being mistaken for small ticks or spiders. With each molt to the next instar, the nymphs roughly double in size. The first three instars are black with white spots.

To learn more about the Spotted Lanternfly (SLF) and what action you can take to stop the spread of this invasive insect, visit our website, https://extension.psu.edu/spotted-lanternfly.

Remember, every adult stomped out can prevent 30-50 eggs being laid!

Commissioner Waldron read Resolution No. 23-37 aloud.

Commissioner Osterberg said there are representatives here today from VIP (Victims' Intervention Program), thank you for all you do. This is an important topic, unfortunately, that we have to face as do many communities as we have here in Pike County, and we appreciate all you do to take care of the needs of those individuals.

Chelsea Falotico of VIP said thank you, and you guys see us here all the time. Sadly, we're still here, our moms are here, our grandmothers are here and, I fear that we will continue to be here until you are long away from us, but every year when we come, we always bring something educational for the community and you. I thought we would change it up a little bit and talk about what you guys you do and the importance of your work. Every year we talk about how important our work is, and what we do, but I want you to understand the impact that you have by reading these Proclamations. We know that Proclamations don't change the law. You're not writing anything into law today, but what they do is help us spread awareness about certain topics that are important to us and our community. They give us the opportunity to educate you and the public on these topics and it's your opportunity to show support for the public that you serve. More importantly, Proclamations, by reading and signing a Proclamation, you're setting a very clear message to survivors who are affected by these issues that you care. Whether it be domestic violence, trafficking, rape, hate crimes or any other form of violence by reading and acknowledging Proclamations that come across your desk, you are telling the people who live in your community that you care about them - you unconditionally care about them. You care about their happiness and their safety and their quality of life. You are there to stand up against violence, hatred and bullies and you're telling people, your people who voted you into office, that you care about them unconditionally. You're telling people who have visually gone unseen, unheard, and unrecognized that you in fact do see them, you hear them, and you recognize what they're going through and the unfairness of it. Whether they think, act, vote or love like you, you believe that they deserve respect and safety, because they do, we are all humans. Can you imagine the message you'd be sending if you didn't sign these Proclamations? Thank you for caring about our community and the people that we serve and our agency as a whole. Thank you for acknowledging these survivors, we hope you continue to do this for us and for all other

agencies that come seeking your help and support.

The Commissioners thanked Chelsea Falotico and Commissioner Schmalzle added to keep up the good and hard work. Commissioner Waldron added that they will never get tired of you coming here, it would be great if there was a day where you didn't have to, but I also think it's important for you to point out all the communities being affected by this. The other thing we've come to realize is the increase of attitude of hate against certain communities has poisoned the area because it makes it almost okay to do hate crimes and possibly worse. Obviously, you focus on intimate relationships being also a danger and that's unfortunate, but particularly for the community to be aware of the fact that it's not okay to hate. We're all in the same boat together and the more we work together, the more we can accomplish, but if we're at odds and just don't like you because who you are with or what you do, then that's really destructive in our community and we don't want that to happen.

Reporter Preston Ehrler asked where you're (VIP) located? Chelsea Falotico replied we have an office in Pike County and Honesdale, Wayne County.

MOTION: by Commissioner Waldron and seconded by Commissioner Schmalzle, to adopt Resolution No. 23-38 Mental Illness Awareness Week, October 1-7, 2023.

VOTE: Commissioners Osterberg, Schmalzle and Waldron voted 'aye'. Motion carried.

Commissioner Schmalzle read Resolution No. 23-38 aloud.

Commissioner Osterberg said this is important, another reason to bring awareness to this is because as I was at the walk (Suicide Prevention Walk) a couple of weeks ago when they made the statement that suicide is preventable and we need to work as a community to make sure if we have friends and neighbors that are suffering through this, that there is help out there. There shouldn't be a stigma, they're suffering from mental illness. It's a major crisis in our Nation. We don't have enough services. We ask that all the time of our State officials and our Federal officials to bring more. They're getting better at it with the 9-8-8 number now for crisis intervention and for all of those things. Before that it was very difficult for people to reach out and get the assistance that they needed. It's important that we, as a community, always make sure that individuals in our community are being helped.

MOTION: by Commissioner Waldron and seconded by Commissioner Schmalzle, to adopt Resolution No. 23-39 Breast Cancer Awareness Month, October 2023.

VOTE: Commissioners Osterberg, Schmalzle and Waldron voted 'aye'. Motion carried.

Commissioner Osterberg read Resolution No. 23-39 aloud.

Commissioner Osterberg said we've been notified to put this on the Agenda. Cancer is a scary thing in the world. Having been a cancer survivor myself, there's nothing scarier in the world when the doctor tells you that you have cancer. Again, a lot of the cancers out there, as long as we go to the doctor and make sure we're treated when we don't feel right, are somewhat preventable, I'm not saying all of them, but some of them such as breast cancer. If they're caught early it can make a difference in some of these lives. In my case, it happened to be bladder cancer and it was detected early on, but it was also life-changing for me, and it still is to this day. It's important that we make sure to tell our friends and neighbors that they're being treated correctly and they're going to the doctor and being aware of how their health is. This can affect your life and within one day your life is turned upside down for the rest of your life.

Commissioner Osterberg said just back to item 14, those are continued funds for the County Commissioners to fund the local ambulance services as you can see this continues year after year and that is what's allowing most of all of our Townships to provide adequate ambulance services to every resident in this County. Just so you know that's what actually (Items) 13 and 14 were that. There was different quarter of payments, but you can see monthly every Municipality in this County is funded through County tax dollars to help the ambulances run in this County as efficient as they're running right now as opposed to what they were doing three years ago when they were out of money. I think it's important that the residents understand – that's where some of your tax dollars are going. I think it's really well spent money to make sure that there's an ambulance ready no matter where you are in this County.

MISCELLANEOUS:

- PennState Extension Calendar of Events
- Aging Master Plan Listening Session, October 11, 2023, at 11:30 AM at Eastern Pike Senior Center in Matamoras- Lana Romeo - Lana Romeo of Pike County Area Agency on Aging was introduced. Lana Romeo said she is here to talk about the Master Plan. The purpose of the listening session is to have a conversation on a wide range of topics. These are important and interesting issues that face older people and people with disability every day. Your experience will help guide the Pennsylvania Department of Aging as it works toward developing a new Master Plan for older adults. The words Master Plan sounds like a really big deal. All it means is that there will be a public document that anyone can read that will help guide the Department of Aging along with other State agencies over the next ten years. The plan will help set priorities for new programs and improve existing programs. It may also be used to frame discussions with legislators about funding. Your participation in this process is critical so we can truly understand what older adults in Pennsylvania want and need. The situation is we all have a voice and it's extremely important that we use it. To sit next to a person and say, 'the State should do more'. If you're not going to open your mouth about it, how's the State supposed to know what you need. This is for caregivers as well, our seniors, your parents - come to this meeting on October 11th. Voice your opinion - it's extremely important. The whole State of Pennsylvania is working on this Area of Aging, they're even doing senior center groups and having meetings about it. The State really wants to know what we want to help make a senior's life better. Thank you.

Reporter Preston Ehrler asked where is that going to be? Lana said she has flyers (Matamoras Fire House) on October 11, 2023. We advise you to make a reservation because it's a free lunch! It starts at 11:30AM. Commissioner Osterberg said it is important that caregivers go and even if you think you don't need this discussion now, I can tell you that in a short amount of years, you will need this or somebody in your life will, or your parents will, and you will be that caregiver or you'll be a caregiver to a sibling. These things can occur overnight and to be a part of this is really important. You can at least hear if you don't have any suggestions of what should be done, you can hear what is being proposed and it may make you aware of what you may need in the future — it can happen overnight.

• Greater Pike Community Foundation and Human Services Office Presentation-Victims of Domestic Violence Grant – Director of Human Services, Robb Ruiz introduced himself and said he is here with Jess (Zufall) from the Greater Pike Community Foundation and we have been working together to create a program for permanent housing that's a spin off that came from Safe Haven that was an agency here in the community that decided to no longer be in existence, but gave all of their donations of money to Greater Pike Community Foundation to grow. With that came the caveat of a couple different things. Jess came to me, and we talked about what we could do together to create a program. What we (Pike County Human Services) do best is rental assistance and housing and I have a great team. We created a program to assist individuals of survivors of domestic violence to create some permanent housing. Our goal is to create a housing program and solution for survivors of domestic violence by offering assistance, rental assistance, security deposit, first month's rent and utilities. All of our information can be found on our website –www.pikeforward.com. Our application is right online as well. Individuals can go online, fill out the application and make an appointment with our office and we can walk them through it. If you have any questions, please let me know, we are going live today.

Reporter Preston Ehrler asked about more detail as to housing, where is the housing, how are people getting into the housing? Give us more granularity. Robb Ruiz answered the housing is a rental program. We don't find the housing unless they need housing location services. We can assist and try to point them in the right direction, that's another part of my office. The assistance is the rental assistance – first month security deposit, that is an opportunity for individuals to get out of the situation they might be in or create or start a brand-new life. However, they decide on what they want to do. We're just creating an opportunity for a specific population that needs assistance - another funding bucket, another tool in our toolbox, another opportunity.

Reporter Prest Ehrler asked Safe Haven offered 24/7 place for people to come, are you going to evolve into something like that, can you see that happening? Robb Ruiz replied that's not our department, that's not our issue. Commissioner Osterberg added that VIP came into place after Safe Haven went out. I don't think they have what Safe Haven had over on 8th Street. That hasn't been in existence for a long time. After they moved to over here, they closed that. Commissioner Waldron said I think it's a great program. Obviously, one of the things that came up in the reading of the Proclamation is being economically disadvantaged, I've got to get out of this situation, but how am I going to make that work? The idea that you can front money to get them into a location until they can get more established is really good. Robb Ruiz said that is one of the things we see all the time in our office, this exact issue. We're just having some money to address it. Another point I want to make is that there is absolutely no administration money coming out of this program with our office. We partnership with the Greater Pike Foundation, my office and the Commissioners' approval and support on this. We're not taking any administration money, we're just here to help the community and do the best that we can. Jessica Zufall added that from the Foundation's perspective, when I came on and learned about Safe Haven's Legacy Fund that was in place and money just sitting there, I reached out to Stephanie (Everson) and I presented at one of her meetings and opened it up that anybody working with this and looking for funds to reach out and people did. Human Services, VIP and Family Promise are all recipients of the micro grants. We put in place a way to collect data and information so that I can, in turn, write more grants to get more funding for what they're doing. That's the goal. Commissioner Waldron added that making lawyers that deal with domestic relations matters aware of this, sometimes somebody contacts them and says I need help, but I don't really have money. That makes it hard to say 'I'm just going to solve your problem for you'. If they knew there was a resource there, obviously VIP can pass that word on, but I think it might be helpful. It's easy for us to get that out, and I think we should.
