

Spotted Lanternfly

Pike County is in the quarantine area. If you have spotted this insect, please call our hotline at 1-888-422-3359 or visit our website to immediately to report a sighting. Please contact your local Penn State Extension office with questions on spotted lanternfly management.

Newly hatched nymphs are small (\sim 1/8 inch) and can be hard to find, often being mistaken for small ticks or spiders. With each molt to the next instar, the nymphs roughly double in size. The first three instars are black with white spots.

To learn more about the Spotted Lanternfly (SLF) and what action you can take to stop the spread of this invasive insect, visit our website, https://extension.psu.edu/spotted-lanternfly.

Remember, every adult stomped out can prevent 30-50 eggs being laid!



The webinar will delve into the application process and the qualifications necessary to become a certified TSP. Additionally, participants will gain insights into NRCS private lands financial assistance programs supported by the TSP program.

PRESS AND PUBLIC COMMENTS/QUESTIONS

Meeting attendee, Kevin Houlihan of Dingman Township, said he had two comments regarding the Reorganization Meeting. In early December we had a Commissioners' meeting in which several groups of individuals talked about concerns with respect to their protective rights categories. I'd like to applaud the Commissioners in this Reorganization, appointing Commissioner Caceres to the Reentry Coalition. I think Pike County has to be applauded when it comes to corrections and the Correctional Facility, we call it recidivism which is the amount of people going back into prisons. The National average is about 43% - 44% according to the Department of Justice statistics. Pike County, the last two to three years, is 19%. That's something to really be proud of for a County this size and the demographic of a County of this type. Meeting attendee, Kevin Houlihan continued the second item is with respect to item #35, Shannon Devuyst. When we talk about hate and negativity, a lot of that is derived from information. You have misinformation, wrong or inaccurate communication for influencing purposes, disinformation which is a little bit more serious and negative because it influences people to think your way and, of course, malinformation where you take things out of contest. By elevating the title and position within communications, that's another great sign of the forward thinking of our Commissioners. Thank you to the three of you.

Commissioner Osterberg commented about the Correctional Facility. While we take credit for that, we really give that to the staff at the Correctional Facility. Our Warden is recognized in the State as being one of the top Wardens. When you go to a Commissioners convention, you tell them you're from Pike and if you're talking to people about corrections, they know Craig Lowe's (Warden of PCCF) name and he does a really good job up there. He is very concerned about the individuals that are, unfortunately, incarcerated. He is looking to make sure that they do not come back. When they do come back, he's saddened by that. What he feels is that he hasn't done his job, that's what his job is. His job is to make sure that these individuals get on with a productive life. Thanks for recognizing us, but the Reentry Coalition in this County is an active organization, Christa (Commissioner Caceres) will be on that. It got a little slowed down like other things did during COVID, but it's back up and running again. There are countless volunteers at our correctional facility. Before COVID we would have a luncheon up there, a barbeque to recognize the volunteers, there would be two hundred fifty people there, from all over. Some people as far away as Northampton County, PA. Thanks for recognizing that.

Meeting attendee, Kristina Vigo, asked if the Commissioners got the numbers of how much it will cost for Narcan in every medicine cabinet of Pike County? Commissioner Osterberg answered we did not. Meeting attendee, Kristina Vigo said she is grateful that we started off giving recognition to those who are doing great jobs and I believe that being active is also preventative and it's about time we touched on how we get some of these issues solved, when inmates comes back because he (the Warden) felt like he wasn't able to prevent that. There's a study of four hundred six 17 year olds, in State foster care, between July 2001 and June 2003 where 45% of those were reported of using and trying illicit drugs within the past six months. That's a study done in these youth of two, three, years. Within the past six months they were still able to get their hands on or tried illicit drugs. I remember when I first came here and speaking to you guys about preventative measures. What preventative measures are being placed out there? I think when we were speaking on putting Narcan in every family's medicine cabinet, it wasn't ignorant of me to question the intention or emotion or even ask for a number because the thing is, a dude mentioned the transparency

and how these things are affecting taxpayers? Even though it was said that it was done through a grant, we should know what the numbers are and then for the preventative and active part. What are we doing or putting our money into that may be affecting or causing children or people to become a statistic. We're putting Narcan in medicine cabinets, but we should also be checking what we are putting our money into as far as the Children and Youth system. There was a question of transparency and even honesty when it came to receiving emails on this handle that were being done with the agency. Now, we're having proposals for programs to give out medicine that would be lifesaving for those who are overdosing from drugs but are we making sure that we're being preventative from the things that we're also paying into that may be adding to those statistics? Like the youth that may be ripped away from their families for no good reason, especially against the Constitution and being thrown into a system where they're now left to experience and see whatever this world has to give them. Blowing some whistles on whether we're not only funding the problem, but then covering that as a great secret putting money toward the saving and saying well we're proposing a solution, but we also created the problem. I feel like we should really be checking our hearts and whether our actions are really helping or hindering our County and the pockets of the taxpayers. Commissioner Caceres thanked Ms. Vigo for making her statements and said she greatly appreciates her coming here to voice her concerns. As far as the annual cost, the number was not obtained, but when we get around to making that calculation, it will be publicized. Commissioner Caceres continued that she wants to speak to her concerns with respect to individuals and juveniles in foster care or in the custody and care of the foster department, experiencing or partaking in drugs. As unfortunate as it is, my fourteen-year-old son is here, it's a very cold world out there and unfortunately some children fall victim, just like some adults fall victim, to using and trying drugs. Unfortunately, they get hooked. Our job here is to make sure that the foster care system is adequately financed so that they can properly function. Whether or not a child is rightfully or wrongfully taken from a family, is not within our purview. I can tell you we're very concerned and that's part of our job and that's why we run, to serve the community and serve the County, to make sure we're doing the best we can and these agencies are properly funded. With respect to your question about the Narcan, are we doing the right thing with that, it's almost to your point about being reactive or proactive, right? Reactive versus being proactive. You mentioned the correctional facility and the Warden being concerned when people return, and you felt as though they weren't being as proactive. With respect to the Narcan, when someone unfortunately has an overdose episode in or near their home, would we want some help to be present or would we not? Meeting attendee Kristina Vigo said yeah, sure and I'm not speaking against that, as I said last meeting, I understand. I think I'm just hinting toward the Commissioners that already received emails of mishandling happening within their agency and I don't believe in coincidences but we'll say this program was proposed and I did see it as a beautiful opportunity to request a consideration and overlooking of what the funds have been going out to fund the crime that has been done against me, to be looked at. I requested that my children do not become a statistic and so may need something to look over. I'm not giving any details, just like that man who got emotional last time. I'm removing emotions, I'm speaking only on the logics. I'm speaking to the people who sign the checks because the people who are doing the acts aren't stopping it, so in effect to speak to the ones who are paying for those acts. I can just say that was a door for me to say can we keep those five children from becoming the statistics that you guys are paying to prevent and to keep and if he can answer back the email. Commissioner Osterberg answered, let me just say, we've said that before that we get those emails. We forward those emails to the agency's Directors, sometimes to NERO, sometimes to our Solicitors. The emails that we're getting mention names and children and all this and I don't think, as I've said at the last meeting, that I should be commenting on this because I don't know all the facts. Meeting attendee Kristina Vigo said but you didn't email back. Commissioner Osterberg answered even just sending back, just because you send me an email do I honestly know who you are? That's not my role, to try to investigate who is sending me emails when it comes to sensitive information. These children, your children, all these children have just as many rights as the parents do, that's why when those emails come to us, we don't ignore them, but we certainly don't respond to them. There's two phone calls on my phone right now from individuals calling about this. I forward those to the right agencies to find out more about the story and there's a lot more to the story. I'm not saying yours is any different, but you have to understand, we need to be sensitive of what we do with that information. These are children that we are talking about. Again, I don't know who those people are who are calling my phone. Just because they say who they are, doesn't mean I know who they are or that their being truthful and honest to us. I appreciate what you're saying we will get the numbers on the Narcan for you, that's a legitimate concern of how much we're spending on

Meeting attendee Kristina Vigo said NERO, I looked up this NERO and wasn't able to come up with anything. Not even my church family was able to find this, could you give me a specific address? Commissioner Osterberg answered we will, it's the Northeast Regional Office that oversees our Children and Youth. When these complaints come in, we send them to them (NERO). We send them upstairs, we send them to our Solicitor and we send them to NERO. In many cases, sometimes what happens is people send complaints to NERO and they filter in the other direction. Now, hopefully, I think they are, they are vetting what those complaints are, that the people who are giving the information are actually the ones who should be speaking to these children. When this comes to us, the Courts are really the ones who dictate these decisions. You're right, we write the checks, but in front of those two Judges over there is when the decisions are made. There's no place for us to be getting involved in that. These are real sensitive issues. Meeting attendee, Kristina Vigo, asked for verification purposes, are you now stating that you have been receiving complaints called in or emails about mishandling within CYS agency? Commissioner Osterberg

answered I've been here for twelve years and I can tell you that I have received complaints about CYS, about Transportation and about many different things, and I forward them, I do not ignore them. I know Commissioner Schmalzle doesn't either and the other Commissioners before us didn't either. We have a responsibility of how we handle those, particularly to CYS.

Meeting attendee, Kristina Vigo, asked do you know the problem process to register a complaint? I've been going through all the processes, and I've not received any response, not even from the DA, but I will keep going as a mother. Commissioner Caceres asked outside of the County, are you aware of the proper protocol? Meeting attendee Kristina Vigo answered I would utilize the County first because I'm the preventative type, why make it a big thing when we can situate it and settle that? Meeting attendee Kristina Vigo said what brought me here was actually the meeting on December 6th where it was asked about whether you had been receiving emails because you said no and I was like oh, that's like basically asking me to come. I'm grateful that we finally got to the truth and answer, which was posed on December 6th which was if you think if there was any word coming to you guys about mishandling in that agency and this was a clear answer. There have been, it's just you guys are handling the information.

Reporter Max Augugliaro of the Pocono Record asked Commissioner Caceres if she thinks there is a transitional period from activist to politician and, if so, how do you plan to make the transition?

Commissioner Caceres answered I don't consider myself an activist per se, more like a community servant. Certainly, there will be a small transition and a learning curve between what I've done in my other roles versus this one. I respect this office and I look forward to working with these two gentlemen and I would just say the first year is going to be a lot of listening and not a lot of talking.

Meeting attendee, Kristina Vigo, felt she should not be suppressed earlier. I don't think you understood the specific thing I was touching on in the Agenda. It was about pay right? What we're going to be paid, what we're signing off on and my point is it's the framework what we make our decisions on as far as representation in pay right? I just probably didn't know how to start it and may have scared you guys a little bit. Commissioner Osterberg said you didn't scare us, we just want to keep order in the meeting.

Meeting attendee, Kristina Vigo, continued the First Amendment which is Congress should make no law respecting an establishment of religion or prohibiting its free exercise. It protects freedom of speech, the press, assembly, and the right to petition the government for a redress of grievances. I would ask if you believe that anything done against that is a crime? It's against the Constitution, but if we do something against that, is that a crime? Commissioner Osterberg answered if you do anything that violates the First Amendment? If we do anything against the Constitution, is that a crime? Commissioner Osterberg answered that's for the Court's to decide, not for us, I guess I will agree with that. You have to put some more facts in there.

Meeting attendee, Kristina Vigo, asked about the Fourteenth Amendment, that all persons born or naturalized in the United States, including formerly enslaved people and provided all citizens with equal protection under the laws. Is that true? Commissioner Osterberg clarified the people have equal protection under the law? Meeting attendee, Kristina Vigo, asked even children, right? Commissioner Osterberg answered yes. Meeting attendee Kristina Vigo, added that is why people are marching for the unborn. When it came down to sending transcripts to you, why do you believe that to be too sensitive to make sure that children are receiving these protections. Commissioner Osterberg answered these are legal proceedings. Meeting attendee, Kristina Vigo, said my question is with the trial. Solicitor Farley interrupted and informed meeting attendee Kristina Vigo that she is going too far. This is not a forum for you to discuss your children.

Meeting attendee, Kristina Vigo, continued that we do agree that anything done against the Constitution is a crime though? Commissioner Caceres answered certainly a violation of the Constitution, not necessarily a crime. Commissioner Osterberg added that's for the Court to decide. Ms. Vigo continued so what we're paying off, we know that we cannot support anything that goes against it; in the aide of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, we can acknowledge that the paying of anything that might be supporting going against the Constitution is against the Constitution as well? Commissioner Caceres answered that's extremely broad, I know where you're going. Ms. Vigo said it's out on the table now. Commissioner Caceres responded the question is on the table, but it is very broad and I'm not sure that we can actually apply the question to what I know you're referring to, which is your assertion that this agency is criminal. Ms. Vigo said we'll keep that off the table, but actually that last comment, I'm grateful you picked it up. It's not a question, it's for consideration for those who have the pen in their hand. Commissioner Caceres said but you also recognize that the agency itself has to be funded whether there's one, two or twenty people who maybe running afoul of this just by your allegation that doesn't change the fact that we have a job to do and so does that agency. It's got to be property funded. How people may or may not do their job within that agency, there's a protocol you can follow. I asked you if you were aware of the entire chain to make sure that if you're not satisfied on the local level, where you can go outside of this County and to make sure you are properly preserving your rights as well. I know for a fact that if you do not properly follow that protocol, they can dismiss your allegation no matter how founded it may be. If you need that information, I'm sure that's something that in response to an email we may receive from you is what is the proper protocol. I'm pretty sure and I'll defer to our Solicitor, we're prohibited from going beyond that. Solicitor Farley said you're right and she'll give you the phone number for NERO. Ms. Vigo said thank you, all men are created

equal and endowed by their creator with certain unalienable rights that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness that whenever any form of government becomes destructive of these ends it is the right of the people to alter or abolish it. I hope you will consider our rights and liberties and where we start and where we end. We all will be accountable to that one creator.

Meeting attendee, Kevin Holian, said when we talk about the First Amendment, hate can be broken down into four different thoughts, cyber bullying, hate speech, microaggression and hate crimes. From a district attorney standpoint and from a crime standpoint, if a criminal harms a person or property, for example drawn on the side of a truck a swastika or if I reach over and smack you in the head because of race or ethnicity, gender, or sexual orientation. When it comes to hate speech, cyber bullying and microaggression, those are gray areas. It is very rare where a district attorney will pursue an indictment on those types of interactions. When looking at the Constitution of the United States, realize how and why it was written. We express ourselves through love, kindness or hate. A lot of people know how to work around it. We have to be very careful how we discuss it, how we approach it and how we position our elected officials in kind to respond to that. It's very thin ice. We're very fortunate to have a Constitution.

Meeting attendee, John Hellman, said he wants to welcome new Commissioner Christa Caceres. Meeting attendee, John Hellman said he was forwarded a letter that was also forwarded to the Commissioners from Kerry Williams, who identified herself as the president of the Pike County Chapter of Moms for Liberty. Ms. Williams said that I publicly denounced Moms for Liberty for being anti-number of groups I believe are being unfairly victimized within our society. In that letter she asks me to retract and apologize so I would like to publicly say that I'm very sorry that Moms for Liberty lost almost every single school board election that they endorsed candidates for in Pennsylvania and Iowa and a few other states. I apologize that slavery did happen; it was a brutal, disgusting part of our history. As long as you continue to make the lives of trans kids and LGBTQ folks a living hell, I will continue to call you a hate group.
