Mayor's Report

Mayor Alan K. Thompson

It happens every year, but it always surprises me. The holiday season has arrived. I hope that you all had a safe and happy Thanksgiving, and that you celebrate whatever additional holidays you observe with careful planning to remain safe while celebrating.

CELEBRATING THE HOLIDAYS

Before discussing the upcoming holidays, I want to thank you for celebrating Halloween responsibly. In my neighborhood I did not see the usual large crowds of trick-or-treaters, and while that was sad for me (and even harder for the kids) your efforts reduced the transmission of COVID, for which our entire community is grateful.

The holidays ahead should also be celebrated carefully, but I encourage you to still celebrate them if it will bring you joy. Even if you are celebrating with only those in your household (or by yourself), consider celebrating by doing some of the things you would normally do - set the table with nice dishes, light some candles, put on some music, and cook and eat the special foods that are part of your tradition. Many years ago, I was unable to travel to see my family in Texas at the holidays, but having a Christmas tree and eating a similar dinner to what my family usually had for Christmas cheered me up and made the holidays better. I've also been "having dinner" with family this fall over video conference - I set up the computer on one end of the table, everyone in my family sits at the other, and we have a nice family dinner (I celebrated a big birthday with my brother this way, and it was great to hang out with the rest of the family as we wished him well).

We've all had to postpone or even cancel important events and holiday celebrations this year, but with a little effort we can do something meaningful, and perhaps spend time reflecting on the importance of the holiday itself.

Before I leave discussion of the holidays, I'll mention that there are many people in town who are still suffering from the severe economic impacts of the pandemic. I personally will be making contributions to local charitable organizations (including the Greater Riverdale Cares GoFundMe administered by the Central Kenilworth Area Revitalization CDC, and the Town's annual Toy Drive) to help these residents be able to eat and have a modest celebration. I encourage others to consider doing this if you are able.

SEPTEMBER 10 FLOOD UPDATE

There have been more virtual meetings to provide information and assistance to residents impacted by the flood event on September 10. As discussed in my report from last month, the County met with residents (including myself and Council Member Lingua) on October 29 and answered some of our questions about what happened on the day of the event (and a few days earlier). While I believe we are beginning to understand the only viable path forward – implementing regional programs to keep storm water on the property where it first lands – I still have multiple questions that the County has not yet answered. I expect to have those answers in hand well before the deadline for the February 2021 Town Crier, so look for more information then.

COVID-19

Every week I spend many, many hours staying up to date on the COVID-19 pandemic and response. I said last month that cases were increasing across the state, but stable in Riverdale Park's zip code; that is no longer true – as I am writing this, we have had *three times* as many weekly diagnoses as we did during the same week last month. Contact tracing of new cases indicates still that transmission is *still* occurring at bars and restaurants (and other social gatherings without masks), small gatherings at homes, during travel (even local travel), and in dorms and other "congregate settings." Large parties, which are still occurring, are also a source of new cases (this is not a surprise).

Because of the increase in cases, both Governor Hogan and County Executive Alsobrooks have instituted new restrictions, including reduced occupancy in restaurants (indoors and outside), and a requirement to wear a covering over your mouth and nose in *all* public places, unless you are vigorously exercising. These restrictions may have changed in the time since I wrote this article, so please check out the latest news at: *https://www.princegeorgescountymd.gov/3397/Corona virus*

I found a tool this week at *https://microcovid.org* for calculating the risk of contracting COVID from a given activity, such as grocery shopping. This tool lets you specify your location, how you are interacting with others (and how *they* interact with others), and what precautions you are taking (mask or not). It's quite

informative and reflects what I've been reading from disease transmission experts. I encourage you to use it so you can use the information it provides to lower your risk.

The advice on lowering risk hasn't changed, though: (1) avoid unnecessary gatherings, particularly indoors poorly ventilated indoors areas are the most dangerous; (2) maintain physical distance from others, a minimum of six feet, when you must be in the same space as other people; (3) wear a multi-layer cloth mask that covers your mouth AND your nose when in public; and (4) wash your hands or use hand sanitizer often – aim for once an hour.

COVID-19: Vaccine News

Before I talk about the COVID-19 vaccines, I want to encourage you (and ask you to encourage everyone you know) to get the *flu* vaccine. The flu vaccine is safe, effective, and available now. Because the symptoms of flu and COVID-19 are similar, you will avoid scaring yourself and everyone around you if you can avoid it. (And the flu is a serious illness all by itself.) I got my vaccine in September and it was quick and easy (I made an appointment at an in-town pharmacy about 30 minutes before I got the vaccine, but could have just walked in). It was completely paid for by my health insurance.

We got some really good news from the vaccine trials in November – one of the vaccines, made by Pfizer (I discussed it in last month's report), seems to provide 90 % protection from COVID-19. This is fantastic news, as many researchers were expecting lower levels of protection. The study must be completed before the FDA will approve it, both of which should happen in December. As I said last month, rolling it out will take a few months, with priority workers in health care getting it first, followed by high-risk individuals, and the general public after that – the "general public" availability is now expected to be in April.

Expect to hear more results soon – we will hopefully soon have a variety of vaccines to choose from, some of which may work better for certain populations (for example, some might work better for older adults, or for children).

It is very important that as many people as possible be ready to get the vaccine when available. I am in a highrisk group and unless my doctor advises otherwise will take the first vaccine I can (and I'll let you know when I do). I hope all of you discuss the vaccine with your doctors and take it soon – that's how we can get back to a more normal life.

Just a few more words on this: (1) just making vaccines available won't prevent infection, a large fraction of people will have to get vaccinated before we can control the spread of this terrible disease, and (2) until the pandemic is in much, much better control, you should continue to avoid close contact with others, wear a mask, and wash your hands often even if you have been vaccinated.

Purple Line

The Purple Line has been in the news a lot lately as the Public Private Partnership (PPP) between the state and a private consortium has hit cost overruns and seems to be on the verge of collapse. As the state tries to renegotiate the agreement, it has taken over running many of the contracts that were negotiated by the PPP. On November 10 I attended a meeting of state transportation officials as a member of the Community Advisory Team, and can report that the impact of the issues with the PPP on the project schedule is more-orless *unknown*, though the state is prioritizing completion of projects that impact quality of life, such as the utility relocations that are blocking a lane or more of Kenilworth Avenue right now. I'll let you know more as I learn it.

Register to Vote in 2021 Town Election

HOW DO I REGISTER TO VOTE?

Town residents may register to vote in one of the following ways:

- If you are a U.S. citizen, a Maryland resident, and at least 16 years old; you may register to vote by using the State of Maryland Voter Registration Application found on the Town's website www.riverdaleparkmd.gov; OR
- 2. If you have, or will have, the Town of Riverdale Park as your primary residence, for at least forty-five (45) days immediately prior to May 3, 2021 (March 19, 2021 to May 2, 2021); are at least 16 years old; do not claim the right to vote elsewhere in the United States; and have not been found by a court to be unable to communicate a desire to vote; register to vote by using the Town of Riverdale Park Supplemental Voter Registry Voter Registration Form found on the Town's website www.riverdaleparkmd.gov.

WHAT FORMS OF IDENTIFICATION AND PROOF OF RESIDENCE WILL BE ACCEPTED FOR THE SUPPLEMENTAL VOTER REGISTRY?

- An identification card issued by a federal, state, or local government entity of the United States or any foreign country or school provided that the identification document contains the applicant's name and date of birth; AND
- 2. A document that establishes your current residence in the Town of Riverdale Park if not already established by (1.) above. Examples include a copy

of house or apartment lease, utility bill, paycheck, bank statement, school record, or other document that shows your legal name and current address in the Town of Riverdale Park.

CAN I REGISTER TO VOTE ON THE DAY OF ELECTION? Yes, anyone may register to vote on the day of the election. If you do not have sufficient proof of age and residency, you will need to complete an affidavit in order to vote.

REMINDER TO NEW RESIDENTS:

Be sure to update your address with the Prince George's County Board of Elections (BOE). For more information, call the BOE at 301-341-7300 or visit https://www.princegeorgescountymd.gov/1980/Voter-Registration.

Volunteers Needed

Volunteers are needed to serve as Election Judges, Alternate Election Judges, and members of the Board of Election Appeals. Chapter 29-3(b) of the Town Code requires that Election Judges and Alternate Election Judges must be qualified voters and able to read and write the English language. Parking Permit Renewal

While the COVID 19 pandemic has certainly caused much suffering worldwide, it has also provided opportunity for us to improve services to our community with increased efficiency. The biannual renewal for the Parking Permit Program will begin soon with current parking permit placards expiring December 31, 2020. In the past, those in need of parking permits were required to make the request in-person during normal business hours at the Police Department. As a service to our Town residents, we have implemented an automated, no contact, distribution of parking permits. Payments and placard distribution will be accomplished online. Leaf Season Continues



The Town is offering **FREE** leaf collection bags to residents until mid-January. Single and twofamily homes are eligible for the **FREE** leaf bags. Residents need to show ID to receive their **FREE** leaf bags and there is a

maximum of 10 bags per request. **FREE** leaf collection bags are available at Town Hall (Monday to Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.).

Please be sure to place bagged leaves at the curb for pick-up on Monday, Yard Waste collection day. Bagged leaves should be placed at the curb on Sunday evening or by 6:00 a.m. on Monday morning.

Help us to reduce costs of the annual leaf vacuuming program by utilizing the service provided by the Town's residential trash collection company!

Leaf Vacuuming Schedule

The 2020 Leaf Vacuuming Schedule will be:

- Mondays and Thursdays: Residences north of 410/East West Highway
- Tuesdays and Fridays: Residences south of 410/East West Highway

To make the process work as efficiently as possible, residents should adhere to the following:

- Rake leaves to the curb and pile leaves away from cars and storm drains as the leaf vacuum cannot reach around cars.
- Be sure to remove tree limbs, rocks, and other debris from leaves to be vacuumed. These items can damage equipment and cause delays.

Collection Reminders

Residential Trash

Residential trash should be placed in durable, leak proof bags <u>before</u> it is placed in cans. Be sure that the can's lid is tightly closed to keep rainwater out- this will help to reduce spillage. Excess trash should be placed beside your container.

Trash cans should be curbside by **6:00 a.m.** on **Mondays and Thursdays** or the night before collection.

Yard Waste

Do NOT mix yard waste with household trash. Yard waste must be placed in paper bags or in reusable bins marked as yard waste.



Branches and limbs need to

be bundled with rope or string (do not use wire), additionally all branches, limbs, and bundles must be:

- o less than 4 feet long,
- o less than 3 inches in diameter
- weigh less than 60 pounds

Yard Waste should be curbside by **6:00 a.m**. on **Mondays** or the night before collection.

Bulk Trash

Bulk trash collection is **by appointment only** on **Wednesdays**. Residents must schedule their collection by 2:00 p.m. on Tuesday by calling 301-773-2069 or by completing a Request Service form online at *www.batestrucking.com*. The Request Service form can be found on Customer Center tab at the top right corner of the Bates website.

Please note that bulk trash collection is limited to three (3) items per week.

Recycling bins should be curbside by 6:00 a.m. on



Wednesdays. As a reminder, no plastic bags are permitted.

Let's Plan for Snow Season -Rules to Remember

The Department of Public Works is gearing up for snow season with a goal to work around the clock as necessary to remove snow and ice quickly and safely. Here are important snow removal facts the Department wants you to remember.

Snow emergency conditions are in effect in the Town of Riverdale Park when Prince George's County, the Maryland State Highway Administration **or** the Maryland State Police declare a **snow emergency**.

When a snow emergency is in effect, please follow these rules:

- Do not park any vehicle on any part of any street with a posted sign that says Snow Emergency Street;
- Only park on the even-numbered side of non-Snow Emergency Streets (parking on the <u>odd-numbered side of any public</u> <u>street</u> is prohibited during a snow emergency, except if parking is already restricted on one side of the street).
- Move your car(s) off the street so that snowplows can remove the snow from the street from curb to curb.
- ✓ Clear sidewalks in front of your house and, please, <u>do not</u> shovel snow into the roadway.

Be patient during a snow emergency as crews work around the clock to clear your street and nearby public spaces.

Remember your vehicle may be removed and impounded by or under the direction of any duly authorized police officer if you violate these rules and you will be charged a towing or impound fee and be liable for a fine of \$250.

Public Works will only plow Town-owned streets. The State or County is responsible for snow and ice removal on the following roadways:

- Kenilworth Avenue (Route 201)
- Baltimore Avenue (Route 1)
- East-West Highway (Route 410)
- 🚔 Good Luck Road

Reminder from the Police Department

As winter and the holidays approach, Riverdale Park Police Department reminds residents that it is important to take precautions when securing your vehicles and belongings.

During the cold winter months, area drivers may be tempted to warm up their cars while they stay warm inside their home or business. However, cars left running, unlocked, and unattended are quick and easy targets for thieves. RPPD offers the following tips so you won't be left out in the cold:

- Never leave your car running or the keys in the ignition when are away from it, even for just a minute.
- When at the gas station pumping gas, never step to the rear of your car, or turn your back on the car doors while leaving your engine running. Thieves have been known to drive off with the pump handle still inserted in the fuel port.
- When visiting your local convenience store for that morning coffee, make sure your car engine is turned off and doors are locked. It takes only seconds to break a window, and thieves know how to do it without making a sound, and without effort

 Be alert when approaching your car, have a plan of action, and have your keys in your hand. Check around, under and in your vehicle for suspicious individuals.
Immediately leave the scene to get help if you have any concerns for your safety.

During the holidays RPPD usually sees an increase in package thefts. People should require a signature for delivery, get a lock box for packages or tell a neighbor they have a package coming.

Fire Safety Tips

Did you know that if a fire starts in your home **you may have as little as two minutes to escape?** During a fire, early warning from a working smoke alarm plus a fire escape plan that has been practiced regularly can save lives. Learn what else to do to keep your loved ones safe!

Install smoke alarms on every level of your home, inside bedrooms and outside sleeping areas.

Test smoke alarms every month. If they're not working, change the batteries. Talk with all family members about a fire escape plan and practice the plan twice a year. If a fire occurs in your home, **GET OUT, STAY OUT and CALL FOR HELP**. Never go back inside for anything or anyone.

Rental Properties in Town

Guidelines for Property Owners

- All properties not occupied by the legal owners of record must be inspected and must obtain a Riverdale Park rental license.
- All bedrooms in rental dwellings must have a clear ceiling height of not less than 7 feet.
- Basements CANNOT be separated from the upstairs portion of a house by way of a key locked door or a separate entrance.
- All rental properties built prior to 1978 MUST have a lead paint certificate issued from the Maryland Department of the Environment (www.MDE.state.md.us).
- All bedrooms must have a secondary means of escape (window or door).
- Window must be openable from the inside "without the use of tools, keys, or special effort".
- A clear opening of 5 square feet for windows at or below grade (5.7 square feet if above grade)
- Bottom of the window sill must not exceed 44 inches above the floor.
