and structures unfit for human occupancy or use, in the Town of Riverdale Park.

### Mayor's Report

Mayor Alan K. Thompson

It's mid-May as I write this report, and spring weather is STILL here, though the forecast has the temperature in the 90s in a few days (before cooling off again). This cool spring weather is my favorite!

#### **COVID-19 – Current situation**

As I said last month, the pandemic changes much faster than publication of this report, so I'm always guessing where we will be by the time you are reading this. If you want updates faster, I post on Twitter every time I learn something new about the status of COVID-19.

Recent updates to how the CDC reports the status of COVID-19 have made it more difficult to track. The old (and I think better) statistic was community transmission, the rate at which people are getting infected. The newer statistic, community levels, takes both hospitalization and infection rates into account when reporting the impact of the disease. The idea was that since the vaccines protect us against serious illness (and worse), an infection by itself is not a cause for as much alarm (or public health response) as in the pre-vaccine part of the pandemic.

From what I'm seeing in mid-May and whichever statistic you prefer to use I'm still very worried. The increases that I was seeing in Mid-April have continued, and both our county and neighboring areas (including Montgomery County, Howard County, and DC) have had their community levels increase to *Moderate* from *Low*. The older standard, community transmission, is **high** for almost every county in the state, and in many other states across the country. States in New England had high

community *transmission* several weeks ago, and now they have high community *levels*, which means the virus is *again* seriously affecting the health of the residents of those states. We could be, and probably are, next.

As always, do everything you can to avoid being infected to protect yourself, your family, and our community, including: (1) wearing a high-quality N-95 or KN-95 mask when outside of your home and, if you suspect you may be infected, inside your home as well to protect your family members; (2) avoiding crowded indoor areas as much as possible, particularly if the area is not well ventilated (somewhere that smoke would collect if something was burning) or a lot of people are not wearing masks; (3) avoiding poorly-ventilated areas where other people may have been within the last 3 hours; (4) regularly washing or sanitizing your hands, and (5) (probably the most important for your personal protection) staying up-to-date on your COVID-19 vaccinations – get every booster you are eligible to receive.

#### **COVID-19 – Long COVID**

Last month I discussed the fact that COVID-19 is much, much worse than the flu. I'll pick up from that discussion this month with a discussion of what's called *Long COVID*.

With the flu, you typically get sick, are sick for a week or two, and may be easily tired for a week or two after that, but then you're done. For a pretty large number of people who get COVID (I've heard estimates from 10% to over 50%), aspects of the disease linger for months to years, and perhaps permanently. There are many possible causes for Long COVID including a reservoir of active virus, a persistent immune over-response to the virus, and/or permanent damage to the heart, lungs, brain, and/or circulatory system. Even a mild case of COVID can result in Long COVID. According to the Mayo Clinic, common symptoms include fatigue, shortness of breath, cough, joint or muscle pain, chest pain, memory/concentration/sleep problems, fast heartbeat, loss of smell/taste, depression or anxiety, and dizziness when you stand. These symptoms often get worse after you stand up from sitting or lying down. I follow many people suffering from Long COVID on Twitter, and some of them who used to run 5 miles a day now have a hard time walking a few

blocks. I read a newspaper story a few days ago that said that there are *7 million people* in the US who are unable to work (or work as much as they used to) because of Long COVID.

There is some hope for treatment of Long COVID – some people with Long COVID have reported that vaccination helped clear up their symptoms, and others have found that the recently-approved oral antiviral drug Paxlovid helped. Many others saw no improvement from either. As with all aspects of COVID, it's best to avoid getting infected, or getting re-infected, using the strategies I discussed earlier in this report.

### **Budget Process**

The Town Council met in a special work session on May 16 to discuss some significant changes in the Capital Improvement Program section of the budget. These changes were needed because we received less in grant funding than we had expected. The main impact is to the schedule of several projects — we will get them done, but not as quickly as we had hoped. Another item discussed at that work session was to add a program to make Riverdale Park more attractive to pollinators. This idea was introduced by Council Member Lingua to offset the Council's decision to continue participation in the State's nuisance mosquito spraying program. The Town Council will almost certainly have adopted the budget by the time you are reading this – you can find a copy of it on the Town's web site if you want to see the details.

### **International Property Maintenance Code**

The Council has been working on a piece of legislation that allows the Town to adopt the International Property Maintenance Code; this legislation was introduced at the May 2<sup>nd</sup> legislative meeting. The Town has used a version of this Code for residential buildings for several decades, but the version currently being considered by the Council will allow the Town's Neighborhood Improvement staff to enforce maintenance requirements on commercial buildings as well. We currently ask nicely, or count on the County to enforce commercial building maintenance. As with all of our ordinances, we are aiming for compliance, not penalties, and the Town as an organization will work cooperatively with business owners and commercial property owners to achieve that compliance.

### **Mosquito Control Program**



The Town will participate in the Maryland Department of Agriculture's Mosquito Control Program this year. Spray season began at the end of May and is

anticipated to end in mid-September.

Spraying will take place after dark on **Tuesdays** and may continue until midnight or later. Spraying will commence as soon as it is dark. As a <u>precaution</u>, it is advised that residents stay inside their homes and close their windows while the spray truck is in the vicinity, bring in any pets, and remain in the home for 20-30 minutes after the spray truck has passed by. If there are people outside when the truck passes by, no spray will be released, and the truck will not make another pass down that street.

The spray schedule will rotate every 3 weeks meaning that Riverdale Park may not be sprayed each week. The frequency of spraying will be determined by surveillance data collected and complaints received. In order to determine if your community will be sprayed on its scheduled spray night, please contact 301-422-5080 between 2-4 p.m. that day. Any unscheduled sprayings will be announced on the Maryland Department of Agriculture's webpage www.mda.maryland.gov or on Twitter @MdAgMosquito and @MdAgDept.

As a reminder, to reduce the presence of mosquitos, residents must keep their property free of mosquitos breeding containers, stagnant water, bird baths, wading pools, pet watering dishes, tin cans, old tires, clogged gutters or flowerpots. Other water holding containers should be stored upside down.

### Town of Riverdale Park Emergency Housing Assistance

On March 7, 2022, Town Council approved the creation of the Emergency Housing Assistance (EHA) program and on March 28, 2022, approved funding for program in response to the exponential need for housing assistance due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The EHA program provides rent, mortgage and utility assistance to eligible residents facing or that faced a financial hardship due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Town has partnered with Sowing Empowerment & Economic Development, Inc. (SEED), a HUD-certified counseling agency to administer the program on behalf of the Town.

Tenants and homeowners may apply for their delinquent rental or mortgage payments that began April 1, 2020, for up to 12 months of back rent. The monthly amount of assistance is based on the actual rent or mortgage value less all late fees, interest, and other costs associated with the applicant's default. Residents are able to apply for utility assistance singularly or combined with rent or mortgage assistance. Utility assistance includes gas, electricity, water/sewer. A Social Security number or birth certificate is NOT required to apply. All Town residents that are in need, had a financial setback and defaulted on rent, mortgage or utility payments are encouraged to apply. ### Rain Check Rebate Program



#### **Program Summary:**

The Prince George's County Rain Check Rebate Program offers rebate incentives to property owners to install practices that will reduce stormwater runoff, reduce pollution, and improve local stream and river health.

### **Eligible Project Types:**

Rain barrels, cisterns, rain gardens, urban tree canopy, pavement removal, permeable pavement, and green roofs.

### **Eligible Applicants:**

The applicant must be the property owner or a nonprofit organization installing a project on public property.

#### **Property Types:**

Each of the eligible project types has a maximum rebate amount allowed and criteria that must be met.

#### Maximum Rebate Amounts:

The total maximum rebate amounts for the lifetime of the property are:

- \$4,000 for residential properties
- \$20,000 for commercial, industrial, and institutional properties
- \$20,000 annually for nonprofit organizations to install projects on public property

Applications are accepted on a rolling basis.








### Rental Properties in Town

### **Guidelines for Property Owners**

- All properties not occupied by the legal owners of record must be inspected and must obtain a Riverdale Park rental license.
- All bedrooms in rental dwellings must have a clear ceiling height of not less than 7 feet.
- Basements CANNOT be separated from the upstairs portion of a house by way of a key locked door or a separate entrance.
- All rental properties built prior to 1978 MUST have a lead paint certificate issued from the Maryland Department of the Environment (www.MDE.state.md.us).
- All bedrooms must have a secondary means of escape (window or door).
- Window must be openable from the inside "without the use of tools, keys, or special effort".
- A clear opening of 5 square feet for windows at or below grade (5.7 square feet if above grade)
- Bottom of the window sill must not exceed 44 inches above the floor.

## Noise Continuity Chapter 49 of the Town Code

The Town's noise ordinance seeks to promote public health, safety, welfare, the peace and quiet of the inhabitants of the Town.

Residents, visitors, and businesses are asked to help keep the noise in Town under control by adhering to Chapter 49 of the Town Code.

If sound can be heard from a distance of 50 feet away, it may be too loud. Please note the following maximum allowable noise levels:

MAX NOISE LEVELS
ALLOWED
IN RESIDENTIAL AREAS

Daytime (7 am - 10pm):
65 decibels
Nighttime (10 pm - 7 am):
55 decibels

MAX NOISE LEVELS
ALLOWED
IN COMMERCIAL AREAS

Daytime (7 am - 10pm):
67 decibels
Nighttime (10 pm - 7 am):
62 decibels
