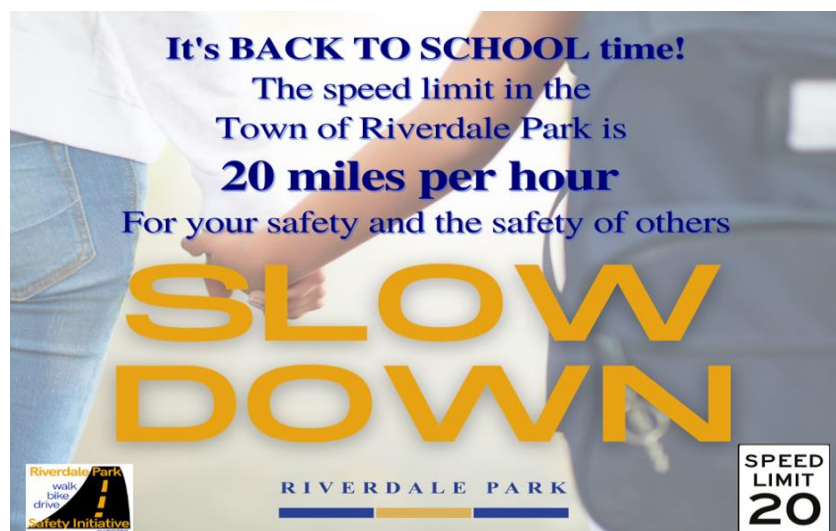

Mayor's Report

Mayor Alan K. Thompson

Contact Me

By the time you are reading this report, it will be September and fall will be just around the corner. As I write, though, it's still August, and I've been eating tomatoes from the Farmers' Market as fast as I can. They should still be in season so get them while you can. Soon enough it will truly be fall and they will be gone... but replaced by apples. I love this time of year! I enjoyed the Town Council's summer recess and I hope you did too. Now it's time to get back to work!

COVID-19

Since writing my last report two months ago approximately 25,000 Americans have died of COVID-19. This is 43 % of the number of Americans who died in the Vietnam War. The *weekly* death toll is close to the number of people who died as a direct result of the 9/11 attacks. **The pandemic is not over.** We are doing better than we were in January and February of this year, but it is still bad (and as I discussed last month, a large number of those who survive have lingering symptoms).

On top of COVID-19, we appear to have the possibility of new pandemics or epidemics. Monkeypox has been in the news (335 cases diagnosed in Maryland so far), and the number of cases appears to be growing exponentially in the United States. Polio has been diagnosed in the United States for the first time in a decade, and wastewater sampling and contact tracing suggests there are *hundreds* of cases of polio in Rockland County, NY.

Neither of these have yet reached a level that worry me. That's partly because we already have the tools to control both of these diseases. They will sound familiar to you from my previous writings about COVID-19: vaccinate (including polio boosters for those with immune system issues – ask your doctor), maintain social distance, wear a mask when in crowded conditions or in poorly-ventilated spaces, and (particularly for monkeypox) wash your hands often and sterilize items you bring into your home from public places. To control these diseases, we have to actually *use* the tools at hand. With that we can control all of them.

Just as a note, vaccine supplies for smallpox (which protects you from monkeypox as well) are not ideal, but

there are enough doses in CDC emergency stockpiles to vaccinate everyone in the USA should that be needed. Let's hope we don't need that.

Redistricting

In response to the 2020 Census the town must redefine the ward boundaries to make the ward populations approximately equal. The Town Council appointed a Redistricting Committee this spring (with me as the Chair) to make proposals to the Town Council of new boundaries that both meet legal requirements and that reflect communities of interest within the town. The Committee has met twice this summer. At the most recent meeting I presented preliminary numbers on the population of each existing ward, and we found (to no one's surprise!) that Ward 1, as currently drawn, has a few hundred more residents than ideal (which means we are required to redraw the boundaries). This is caused, of course, by the new housing in Riverdale Park Station and the residents who live there. The Committee will meet again (virtually) on September 21st at 7:00 PM. We anticipate having a few draft maps for discussion purposes at that meeting. I hope to see you there!

Flooding

As you may already know, or have seen in the media, Riverdale Park has experienced three floods since my last report. One in early July was on the west side of town, in the vicinity of Wells Run, and also impacted the southern tip of town near Taylor Road. Both of those locations had severe flooding in September 2020. The other two floods, in early- to mid-August (and within a week of each other) were on the east side of town, and it's *possible* that they are related to storm drains being blocked by debris from Purple Line construction (we are hoping to hear soon from the County on that topic).

After the flooding in early July, the Town Council and I issued a formal resolution calling on the County to improve maintenance of stormwater facilities and accelerate projects to minimize the impacts of flooding. We called on the County to improve and expand an existing program that provides funding to municipalities for stormwater projects. We recently completed a project on Longfellow Street under the existing form of this program, and those residents were not impacted by any of the recent storms. We also asked the County to provide immediate and substantial support to homeowners to help them protect their houses from future flooding as we wait for longer-term prevention projects to be completed.

Climate Change

Partly inspired by the recent floods, but also by my own assessment that climate change is the biggest threat to both Riverdale Park (and indeed the United States and the world). I will be looking at what we in Riverdale Park can do both to prepare for the impacts of climate change, and do our part to minimize it. I'll be communicating more here about that, but also welcome your input on the issue. If you want to jump in on something to combat climate change right now, the town is co-sponsoring a Tree Summit on Saturday, September 10, from 9:30 am to 12:30 pm – check the calendar for how to attend.

Passing of Joanne Hampton

I received sad news as I was finishing this report about the passing of a long-time resident, Ms. Joanne Hampton. Ms. Hampton lived on Oliver Street near Baltimore Avenue with her family for over 50 years, and she and her husband George were one of the first Black families to move into the west side of Riverdale. They raised three children, Deedee, Dervon, and Nicholas in that house. Although I didn't know her well (mostly pleasant conversations while campaigning) a neighbor described her as "the heart of our neighborhood, someone who always had time to talk, share a smile, and be a good neighbor to everyone." I extend my condolences to her family, friends, and neighbors.

Food Forest and Community Garden

The Town's Food Forest and Community Garden have been busy with volunteers, Town officials, and staff planting a variety of produce that should be ready for harvest in the coming weeks. Residents are free to take fresh produce and the Town provides the materials necessary for the garden. The Food Forest and Community Garden help promote healthy food choices, providing free food resources to residents and it also helps boost the spirit of community!

Residents are invited to stop by the Community Garden and Food Forest to harvest the ripe vegetables and fruits as they become available. The Food Forest will likely not generate a lot of fruit this season, but we expect to see more fruit from the Food Forest in the coming years. The Community Garden is expected to generate lots of vegetables for the community again this season.

The following list of vegetables and fruits have been planted at the Community Garden: tomatoes, cabbage,

squash, brussels sprouts, lettuce, strawberries, watermelon, cantaloupe, green pepper, yellow pepper, cucumber, zucchini, eggplant, cilantro and basil.

The following have been planted at the Food Forest: chokecherry, persimmon, serviceberry highbush blueberry, beach plum, elderberry, eastern redbud, American hazelnut, pawpaw, fragrant sumac, lowbush blueberry, aronia melanocarpa.

Emergency Housing Assistance

On March 7, 2022, Town Council approved the creation of the Emergency Housing Assistance (EHA) program and on March 28, 2022, approved funding for program in response to the exponential need for housing assistance due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The EHA program provides rent, mortgage and utility assistance to eligible residents facing or that faced a financial hardship due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Town has partnered with Sowing Empowerment & Economic Development, Inc. (SEED), a HUD-certified counseling agency to administer the program on behalf of the Town.

Tenants and homeowners may apply for their delinquent rental or mortgage payments that began April 1, 2020, for up to 12 months of back rent. The monthly amount of assistance is based on the actual rent or mortgage value less all late fees, interest, and other costs associated with the applicant's default. Residents are able to apply for utility assistance singularly or combined with rent or mortgage assistance. Utility assistance includes gas, electricity, water/sewer. A Social Security number or birth certificate is NOT required to apply. All Town residents that are in need, had a financial setback and defaulted on rent, mortgage or utility payments are encouraged to apply. Rental Properties in Town

Guidelines for Property Owners

- All properties not occupied by the legal owners of record must be inspected and must obtain a Riverdale Park rental license.
- All bedrooms in rental dwellings must have a clear ceiling height of not less than 7 feet.
- Basements CANNOT be separated from the upstairs portion of a house by way of a key locked door or a separate entrance.
- All rental properties built prior to 1978 MUST have a lead paint certificate issued from the Maryland Department of the Environment (www.MDE.state.md.us).
- All bedrooms must have a secondary means of escape (window or door).
- Window must be openable from the inside "without the use of tools, keys, or special effort".
- A clear opening of 5 square feet for windows at or below grade (5.7 square feet if above grade)
- Bottom of the window sill must not exceed 44 inches above the floor.
