WORK SESSION – There will not be a work session prior to this meeting.

DISCUSSION/ACTION

• Resolution 21-41—Adopting Voter Participation Areas (VPAs). First, I think it might be helpful to review a couple of important land use terms related to this VPA discussion. The first term is Referendum.

A referendum is the right of the people to "refer" proposed legislation to a vote of the people through an election process. A referendum is, in a sense, a way to second-guess the City Council's legislative, land use decisions. Referable items are ordinances, resolutions, master plans and any comprehensive zoning regulation adopted by ordinance or resolution. For an item to be "referred" and make it on the ballot for the next municipal election, those seeking the referendum must gather the requisite number of signatures from the residents living in each of the adopted VPAs. For a city of the fourth class (South Ogden) that number is 29%.

To help illustrate, let's say that a resident or group of residents want to "refer" a section of the City's land use code to change the setback requirements within a certain zone. The resident or group would need to gather signatures from registered voters in support of the referendum from each of the adopted VPAs in the City. If the resident or group is able to get 29% of the registered voters in each of the VPAs, the issue will be added to the ballot of the next municipal election.

Because administrative decisions are not subject to referendum, the Utah Land Use Institute recommends the following as some of the ways local governments can reduce the likelihood of referendums.

- Delegate and administrative decisions that can be delegated to the planning commission, staff, appeal authorities, etc.
- Avoid having the legislative body make administrative decisions such as subdivision approvals and review of development plans, etc.
- Create specific criteria in the ordinance that must be followed if the city council decides to make administrative decisions.

Assign a list of permitted uses to any mixed-use zones – don't leave the wording of the
ordinance open ended with no designation of the types of uses which are to be allowed in
the zone.

Our South Ogden code has addressed, to a certain extent, every one of these recommendations. Staff will continue to bring code amendments/recommendations to the council as we find areas that could be improved to meet the aforementioned recommendations of the Utah Land Use Institute.

The second important term for this discussion is *Initiatives*. An initiative is the people's right to initiate a measure, issue, or question to be voted on by the people. Like a referendum, group of residents (min. of 5 registered voters) may file an application to start the process. Once approved, the group can gather signatures from the VPAs in support of "initiating" the new law/legislation. The required number of signatures for an initiative to be placed on the ballot for a city of the fourth class (South Ogden) is 11.5%. To illustrate, let's imagine that a resident wanted to create a new law to require that all residents drive a Subaru. An application, singed by 5 registered voters must be made with a copy of the text and the title of the proposed ordinance. The group must also disclose where the funding for the initiative is coming from. Once verified, the group has a certain number of days to collect signatures from at least 11.5% of the registered voters within each VPA.

The county has created four VPAs for South Ogden. Each VPA has roughly the same number of residents, are geographically compact and geographically continuous. Staff recommends that the council approve the four VPAs created by the county for the purpose of meeting the state requirements for Initiatives and Referendums.

• Resolution 21-42 – Approving Participation in and Acceptance of the terms and conditions of the Jul 21, 2021 National Opioid Settlement Agreement. This resolution has to do with the National Opioid Settlement and must be approved by the end of the calendar year. Basically, this resolution affirms South Ogden City's support of the terms of the settlement. In the event that the state can show that enough of the counties and cities agree with the settlement terms and conditions (https://nationalopioidsettlement.com/), the state may be eligible for some of the settlement funds. ULCT does not believe there will be much funding that will come to the cities but there might be a chance for South Ogden to try and get some to help support our efforts through our participation with the Bonneville Communities that Care Coalition. Most of the funding is expected to go to the state and the counties to be used to help fund social service efforts to combat opioid treatment and prevention. Once this resolution is approved, staff will send this resolution to ULCT and will register our City as one in support of the settlement on the website.





RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends approval of the VPAs

BACKGROUND

The City adopted VPAs back in 2019 based on the voting precincts then in use in the City. Due to recent re-districting efforts, those precincts have changed, if only slightly. Because the re-districting took longer than expected, counties had to scramble to create new precincts that aligned with the re-districting, therefore pushing cities' approvals of the VPAs to the last possible minute. The state mandates that the VPAs be approved by January 1, 2022.

ANALYSIS

We are a Fourth Class city, but I have to add that we are a first class Fourth Class city. :) Classifications are based on population. Third and Fourth Class cities are required to establish four VPAs within their city. VPAs are only used in conjunction with a city referendum or initiative. In order for a referendum or initiative to be put on the ballot, a certain number of signatures must be collected from registered voters within the City, and a percentage of those signatures must come from each VPA.

A VPA must be:

Substantially equal in population based on the most recent census data


Geographically compact

Geographically contiguous

You may approve the county's proposal, or you may draw your own VPAs; however, remember that you would have to meet the requirements above, and you would have to hold a special meeting to approve them before the January 1 deadline. I realize this does not give you many options, but as mentioned before, the re-districting committee took this down to the last minute.

RESOLUTION OF SOUTH OGDEN CITY CREATING VOTER PARTICIPATION AREAS AND PROVIDING THAT THIS RESOLUTION SHALL BECOME EFFECTIVE IMMEDIATELY UPON POSTING AND FINAL PASSAGE.

SECTION 1 – RECITALS

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that the City of South Ogden ("City") is a municipal corporation duly organized and existing under the laws of Utah; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that in conformance with Utah Code ("UC") § 10-3-717 & § 10-9a-408, the governing body of the city may exercise all administrative powers by resolution including, but not limited to creating Voter Participation Areas as provided at UC § 20A-7- 401.3(2)(b); and,

WHEREAS, the City Council finds it necessary to address Voter Participation Areas within the city consistent with state and federal requirements; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that creating Voter Participation Areas will materially assist in achieving the purposes described in UC §20A-7-501 and §20A-7-601; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that South Ogden City now desires to further those ends by creating Voter Participation Areas as provided at UC § 20A-7-401.3(2)(b) to effectively manage election services; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that the public convenience, health, and necessity requires the actions contemplated,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF SOUTH OGDEN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION II - VOTER PARTICIPATION AREAS CREATED AS PROVIDED AT UC § 20A-7-401.3(2)(b).

South Ogden City Voter Participation Areas are Adopted and Approved as Set Out in **Attachment "A"**, And By This Reference Fully Incorporated. The City Manager Is Authorized To Sign And The City Recorder Is Authorized To Attest, Any and All Documents Necessary To Effect This Authorization and Approval.

The foregoing recitals are fully incorporated herein.

SECTION III - PRIOR ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS

The body and substance of all prior Resolutions, with their provisions, where not otherwise in conflict with this Resolution, are reaffirmed and readopted.

SECTION IV - REPEALER OF CONFLICTING ENACTMENTS

All orders, and Resolutions regarding the changes enacted and adopted which have been adopted by the City, or parts, which conflict with this Resolution, are, for such conflict, repealed, except this repeal will not be construed to revive any act, order or resolution, or part repealed.

SECTION V - SAVINGS CLAUSE

If any provision of this Resolution be held or deemed or shall be invalid, inoperative or unenforceable such will render no other provision or provisions invalid, inoperative or unenforceable to any extent whatever, this Resolution being deemed the separate independent and severable act of the City Council of South Ogden City.

SECTION VI - DATE OF EFFECT

This Resolution will be effective on the 21st day of December, 2021, and after publication or posting as required by law.



SECTION 1 – RECITALS

WHEREAS, South Ogden ("City") is a municipal corporation duly organized and existing under the laws of the State of Utah; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that in conformance with Utah Code ("UC") §10-3-717, the City Council as the governing body of the City may exercise all administrative powers by resolution; and,

WHEREAS, the people of the State of Utah and its communities have been harmed by misfeasance, nonfeasance and malfeasance committed by certain entities within the Opioid Pharmaceutical Supply Chain; and,

WHEREAS, the State of Utah, through its Attorney General, and certain Local Governments, through their elected representatives and counsel, are separately engaged in litigation seeking to hold Opioid Pharmaceutical Supply Chain Participants accountable for the damage caused by their misfeasance, nonfeasance and malfeasance; and,

WHEREAS, the State of Utah, through its Governor and Attorney General, and its Local Governments share a common desire to abate and alleviate the impacts of that misfeasance, nonfeasance and malfeasance throughout the State of Utah; and,

WHEREAS, the City participates in and supports local opioid treatment and prevention efforts; both through Weber Human Services and the Bonneville Communities that Care Coalition; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council understands that the purpose of the proposed National Opioid Distributor Settlement Agreement is to provide funding for State and Local Governments to advance initiatives targeting opioid treatment and prevention; including first responder training, media campaigns, etc.; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council wishes to agree to the material terms of the proposed National Opioid Distributor Settlement Agreement with the Settling Distributors (the "Proposed Settlement"); and,

WHEREAS, the City Council finds it is necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, welfare, and safety of the residents of South Ogden to enter into such an agreement; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council finds the City Manager is the chief administrative officer of the City and should be authorized to enter into such an agreement on behalf of the city,

The City Council Of South Ogden City, State Of Utah, Authorizes Participation In and Acceptance Of the Agreement for the Settlement with McKesson Corporation, Cardinal Health, Inc., and AmerisourceBergen Corporation ("Settling Distributors") Pursuant To The City's Understanding Regarding The Pursuit And Use Of Potential Opioid Litigation Settlement Funds And Consistent With The Material Terms Of The July 21, 2021 proposed National Opioid Distributor Settlement Agreement Available at https://nationalopioidsettlement.com/, And Authorizes The City Manager To Sign Said Agreements; And Authorizes The City Recorder To Attest All Documents Necessary To Confirm That The City Manager Has Been Duly Authorized To Execute Those Documents.

The foregoing recitals are fully incorporated.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED this Resolution shall become effective immediately upon its passage.

SECTION II - REPEALER OF CONFLICTING ENACTMENTS:

All orders and resolutions regarding the changes enacted and adopted which have heretofore been adopted by the City, or parts thereof, which conflict with any of this Resolution, are, for such conflict, repealed, except this repeal shall not be construed to revive any act, order or resolution, or part thereof, heretofore repealed.

SECTION III - PRIOR RESOLUTIONS:

The body and substance of all prior Resolutions, with their provisions, where not otherwise in conflict with this Resolution, are reaffirmed and readopted.

SECTION IV - SAVINGS CLAUSE:

If any provision of this Resolution shall be held or deemed to be or shall be invalid, inoperative or unenforceable for any reason, such reason shall not have the effect of rendering any other provision or provisions invalid, inoperative or unenforceable to any extent whatever,

this Resolution being deemed to be the separate independent and severable act of the City Council of South Ogden City.

SECTION V - DATE OF EFFECT

This Resolution shall be effective on the 21st day of December, 2021, and after publication or posting as required by law.
